One Nation, Under Sedation

As part of the national war on drugs, this column will serve as a source of information for citizens. To effectively combat drugs, it is imperative that America's people fully understand the types of drugs available to them, and the harmful physical, mental, and emotional effects these drugs can have.

Marljuana: Inhaled through pipes or "joints," marijuana may cause cancer or contribute to respiratory illnesses. It is also speculated that marijuana decreases fertility in males. Those under the influence of this drug may experience very mild hallucinations or altered perceptions of reality. They may also become hungry or sleepy.

Cocaine: A very expensive drug which is generally inhaled through the nose, cocaine is a stimulant which leads to increased energy and self-confidence. However it can also cause irritation of the nasal passages with overuse and have a bad effect on the heart.

Crack: A form of cocaine which is smoked, crack is believed to be extremely addictive and can be quite dangerous because of its powerful stimulant effect.

Caffeine: Found in coffee, tea, cola and some other products, (and sometimes taken in pill form), caffeine stimulates the body and brain, and can cause nervousness in its users. It is also speculated that caffeine leads to cancer and other diseases.

Sugar: Sugar stimulates its users and leads to increased energy. It can cause tooth decay and obesity with overuse, which in turn can overtax the heart and lead to cardiac arrest.

Jogging: An addictive drug which can inflict stress on weak hearts and cause muscle strain. Improper use may lead to heart attacks.

Shopping: A very addictive drug which causes alternate periods of depression, anxiety, and euphoria. Habitual shoppers sometimes turn to crime to support this addiction.

"Woodstock Magic," written by Fran Lantz, created by Eileen Goudge (Avon/Flare, \$2.50 paperback; ages 11-17). And so on, in that vein. This is not at all a well-written story — but it is, well, a *trip*, the second in a new series entitled "Swept Away" ("swept away by time... swept away by love..." — You dig?).

For various political or ideological reasons, no other nation of Europe wished to be host to this meeting, until the Queen appealed to an Icelandic tourist, the Viking chieftain Askold the Breekless. This formidable warrior had been a special guest of the Queen at the Winter Solstice Festival, and was staying over at her particular request, since that year's Year-King was a midget Irish monk.

After arrangements were complete, the Emperor of the Temporary Roman Empire and the King of Pundschdruk journeyed to Iceland. To get them into a relaxed mood for their serious work, Askold personally guided them on a tour of the scenic wonders of his land. However, so deep and bitter were the disagreements between Senilio the Great and King Mikhail that the tour merely exacerbated harsh feelings between them.
