#### 1985HF - GAME REVIEW

BEN AUSTIN (Russia): First off, I want to thank John Boardman for excellent adjudication of the game. This was my first postal Diplomacy game ever, and John did a great and impartial job. Second, I want to thank Jerry Rosen for being a tried and true ally. We decided to work together from the very first move and I certainly had a wonderful time doing it. Many would have gone for the kill and tried to win on their own (as I easily could have), but if you don't have friends, you haven't got much. But enough niceness: Onto the dirt.

But enough niceness: Onto the dirt.

In "Spring 1901", playing Russia, I sent F Sev into the Black Sea and A War into Galicia. By convincing Austria-Hungary (Derwood Bowen) that the Black Sea was the genuine attack, I was able to march into Budapest unopposed in 1901. Soon Austria-Hungary fell and Jerry and I turned our attention to Italy and England, respectively, England was played at first by a lad we believe to be about 8 years old, though we can't be sure. He dropped out and was replaced by Tarlach MacNiallais, who is a great person and a fun ally (we worked together in 1985HE), but he stabbed me in HF so I had to turn on him. Jerry and I also found a formidable adversary in Simon Lack (France), who played a very good game and became a significant barrier to Jerry's naval attack.

Basically, we won by convincing France and Italy to fight each other instead of worry about us, and also by being sure to cause disunity in the west. We kept England, France and Germany at each others' throats throughout much of the game, and this was essential to my game plan as Russia. By not having to bolster Russia against a German/English joint naval attack, I was able to secure my hold on land, a grip which enentually covered the whole of the European continent. Bill Drakert played a good game as Germany, but he eventually became so concerned about my size that he attacked me. Despite my initial pledge to maintain neutrality in Prussia and Silesia, this put us against each other, and it was only a matter of time until my troops hit Portugal. I am proud, though that except for my "Spring 1901" pledge not to march into Budapest, I did not violate any agreement or truce in the entire game. After all, a man's word is a man's word.

Finally, I would note that Jerry and I pulled off what we hope is the first triple-mailing in a postal Diplomacy game. As Austria-Hungary was ailing, I courted him with a postcard pledging that I would stab Jerry with his help (Jerry, of course, consented to this). Jerry then offered him Turkish support, but only if he could be sure I was an unfaithful ally. Without even requesting it, Jerry got the postcard in the mail. He then sent it to me for a complete syscle. This is only an example of the fun we had in 1985HF.

### THE ANECDOTES OF HISTORY

Barrington Boardman, From Harding to Hiroshima: An Anecdotal History of the United States from 1923-1945 (\$20, Dembner Books, 1988)

Caryl Brahms and S. J. Simon, No Bed for Bacon, or, Shakespeare Sows an Oat (Thomas Y. Crowell Co., 1950, originally published in Great Britain in 1941)

The anecdotal approach to history and politics has its weakness. A good and vell-told story aometimes has a greater impact than masses of solid statistics which have an opposite point to make. During the Reagan Administrations we have seen how a casually tossed off presidential story about "welfare queens in designer jeans" has excused a deliberate and massive disregard for the plight of the poor. On similar anecdotal evidence, millions of Americans have been left believing that Jesse Jackson is an anti-Semite - an accusation which has no word of truth in it.

And yet the anecdote, the odds and ends of history, cannot be totally neglected. As Isaac Asimov points out in his introduction to From Harding to Hiroshima, historians too seldom tell us about the daily circumstances of life of people during the great wars, revolutions, or economic ups and downs with which history seems mainly to concern itself. The famous third chapter of Macaulay's History of England (1848) seems to have broken new ground in dealing with the life of the common people of England, contrasting 1685 with his own time. Matters have somewhat improved, and I can recommend two books about daily life in America during World War II: V Was for Victory and The Home Front which, believe one who was there, ring true.

Barrington Boardman is not a professional historian but a Connecticut advertising executive; since the region around Hartford is fons et origo for the American Boardmans, I can confidently claim him as a kinsman. He has, like myself, a lively amateur's interest in history, and since he is within a year of my own age, his child-

hood memories of world affairs are of the same period as mine.

In his preface, Boardman points out that "the author would like to have included much (that) had to be left out so that this book would not rival the Bible in word content". And, while I might disagree with the author's choice of items with which to illustrate the developments of those years, I have found only one error of fact his attribution of the invention of the game Monopoly to Charles B. Darrow rather than to Elizabeth "Lizzie" Magie; however, Parker Brothers has always been very mealy-mouthed about Magie's claim, and it is rumored that the true story will be revealed by Parker executive Philip Orbanes in his forthcoming book The Monopoly Companion. (New York Daily News, 24 April 1988) The most notable omission was the second Louis-Schmeling fight, which had an enormous impact on two continents, as a black American took less than 3 minutes to knock out the champion of the "master race".

From Harding to Hiroshima is part of a series "Isaac Asimov Presents", and those who know Asimov's love for a well-told and sharply pointed anecdote will not be surprised at his endorsement of and introduction to this book. Boardman's style is much like Asimov's, so the book is an easy and pleasant read. Its unifying theme is America's movement from an isolated and relatively innocent nation at the time of President Harding's death, to a world power with its decisive role in World War II. However, there is much material of foreign origin as well, particularly of the events that were to lead into World War II.

The book is arranged year by year, though specific dates of events within each year are unfortunately not given. Among the major stories covered are prohibition and its spectacular failure, Lindbergh's flight (his parade still holds the record for ticker tape tonnage) and subsequent tragedy, and the Hoover Depression and the Hew Deal. Since there has lately been some objection to Hauptmann's execution for the Lindbergh murder, Boardman goes into the evidence which convicted him in what seems to me to be convincing detail. We also learn that it took 2 or 3 years for the full impact of the 1929 stock market crash to be felt across the country, leaving us to wonder if a similar trail of powder is already burning.

The vast majority of GRAUSTARK readers were born after the period covered in this book. Although it does not pretend to be a deep study of America in those tran-

sitional years, you will find that From Harding to Hiroshima gives a very good impression of what it was like to be an American in those years, and what picture an American would get of the country and the world then.

The further back we go into history, the more likely anecdote and drama are to affect our perception of it. This is particularly true of periods that were populated by many remarkable individuals, and when major changes were taking place and major innovations entering history. The latter half of the reign of Queen Elizabeth I was such a period, and much anecdote has accumulated about and sometimes obscured the actual history of the times. Most of us know the stories: Sir Walter Raleigh and his cloak; Admiral Drake's game of bowls as the Spanish Armada approached; William Shakespeare writing the plays in which Richard Burbage starred while the clown Will Kemp danced a jig from London to Norwich; the specious 19th-century claim that Sir Francis Bacon "really" wrote Shakespeare's plays; the Earl of Essex and his doomed courtship of the Queen and of military glory; the execution of Mary Queen of Scots (who, unaccountably, is still regarded by some as a holy martyr); and such other strong and creative characters as the Earl of Leicester, Lord Burghley, Sir John Hawkins, Sir Martin Frobisher, Christopher Marlowe, John Donne, Richard Greene, Sir Francis Walsingham, Ben Jonson, and John Dowland.

No Bed for Bacon collects all of these into a book that is very funny and has no historical value whatever. Almost at the beginning the authors tell us that it takes place six years after the defeat of the Spanish Armada, which in sober history would make it 1594. However, events from 1588 to 1613 are all jumbled together in it. The picture of Elizabeth the Great agrees very well with what more sober historians have told us of a monarch who was at once resolute and capricious, proud and soft-hearted, a great war leader and a firm opponent of aggressive war and of religious persecution. We also get pictures of the other great men and women of the period, particularly of Chakespeare. The Bacon we see is not the deep philosopher and promoter of the natural sciences, but a mean-spirited and ungrateful shyster; we also get as good a picture of his homosexuality as could be presented in a book written in 1941. In addition, there are a few inventions: Polonius Bounce, the elderly, cynical, but good-hearted Master of the Revels; Lady Viola. Compton, who is dismissed from court for flirting with Essex and achieves her ambition of becoming a "girl boy-player"; Lady Meanwell, the ucen's fussy principal Lady-in-Waiting; and a poor nameless nebbish, a sort of Elizabethan Everyman, who seems to be on the scene at every major event in the book.

The authors love to weave scenes together, and we frequently flash from one event to another. The recent victory over the Armada dominates the book, as it would considering that it was written when England once again went in concern over invasion. We get a blow-by-blow account of the Armada campaign as the Queen and her admirals and captains reminisce during a regatta on the Thames. At the end of it, after the admirals have been over the attack of the fireships at Gravelines, she concludes: "You got at them. You hunted, you harried, you pounded, and you drove these would-be world conquerors, who dared to look toward Plymouth Sound, from our shores forever."

During the novel, Shakespeare writes, and Burbage and his company rehearse and present, Twelfth Night - with Viola, of course, creating the role of that name. The authors put forth the hypothesis that Malvolio is a parody of Sir Francis Bacon. They argue this hypothesis plausibly, and the Queen is distracted from her troubles with Essex by amusement at him. However, Malvolio as presented by Shakespeare is a Puritan, and whatever Bacon was, he wasn't that.

No Bed for Bacon is a lot of fun, but don't ask me where to find a copy at this late date. I bought mine second-hand over 30 years ago.
