

THE REALLY BIG CHILL

In many fields of activity, people are used to cyclical systems. Politics alternates between periods of liberal dominance and periods of conservative dominance. Literature alternates between works labeled "romantic" and works labeled "classical". Heredity and environment compete, with varying success, as explanations for human motivation.

It doesn't work that way in the sciences. Progress there is not cyclical, but linear. Evolution, nuclear energy, and genetic engineering cannot be un-discovered, or reversed by reactions against them. However, people outside the sciences seem not to be aware of this distinction. I realized this a few months ago while speaking with a man who has an excellent background in business and politics, but is not particularby knowledgeable in the sciences. He mentioned the disclosures about nuclear wainter that first bagen to come to public attention in late 1983, and expressed relief that this scare tactic had faded from the pages of the popular press.

That's not how science works. When Pluto was discovered in 1930, great interest in it, and enthusiasm for astronomy in general, appeared in the media. You don't

hear much from those sources about Pluto lately, but it's still there.

The idea that a nuclear war might cause major changes in the Earth's climate, and that these changes would have drastic effects on life on this planet, was first called "nuclear winter" by Richard P. Turco, one of five scientists who developed the model, and presented it to the Conference on the World after Nuclear War, held in October 1983. (The others were O. Brian Toom, Thomas P. Ackerman, James B. Pollack, and Carl Sagan, and from their initials this is called the "TTAPS Model".) For the first time, these atmospheric scientists studied the effects of the billions of tons of dust, soot, and ash, that would be blown into the atmosphere by the bruning of cities, forests, and grasslands as the result of nuclear weapons.

The TTAPS model depended on a computer program designed to determine the effect of introducing such pollutants on a large scale into the circulatory pattern of the Earth's atmosphere. You may find the details, wirtten in simple, non-technical language, in Gene B. Williams' book Nuclear War, Nuclear Winter (Impact Books, Franklin Watts, 1987) This book of 103 pages of text is necessarily brief, but its biblio-

graphy includes several books that go into greater detail.

Prior to publication of the TTAPS model, it had been assumed that the full-scale, all-out mutual attack of nuclear missiles by the United States and the Soviet Union would be a sort of large-scale repeat of the aerial bombing of World War II, with the survivors creeping out of their shelters to rebuild as Europe was rebuilt after 1945. This is the sort of thing most of us were used to thinking of as "World War III". The TTAPS model had over 95% of the sunlight blocked off, causing the temperature to drop well below freezing. Most plants would be killed, and the animals dependent upon them would also die. Comparisons were made with models of the catastrophe that exterminated the dinosaurs some 65,000,000 years ago, caused presumably by a comet or asteroid striking the Earth.

Coincidentally, ABC televised a program called The Day After, some three or four weeks after the TTAPS study was made public. This dramatization of the effects of a nuclear war lagged well behind the reality. Despite an excellent dramatic presentation, ABC had the world getting off far too easily from such a war, compared to what

the TTAPS study was showing.

(Incredibly, the pro-war lobby reacted with high indignation to The Day After. They eventually dragooned ABC into presenting an entire one-week 'miniseries' called Amerika, which moaned about how bad things would be under a joint occupation of the United States by the Soviet Union and the United Nations. ABC did not give us any evidence that the Soviet Union intends to conquer the United States. However, they can be forgiven for this, since no such evidence exists. After high ratings produced by curiosity on the first night, Amerika sank without a trace.)

And what did the TTAPS model present as the best possible scenario after a nuclear war? A 10,000 megaton attack - well under the capability of the world's present nuclear stockpiles - venic reduce the sunly of vel to less than 1% of what it is now,

and keep it there for over a year. In the first week, temperatures could fall by 10°C (18°F). After a month had gone by, temperatures could be as much as 40 or 50°C (72 or 90°F) below normal. And they would stay that way for a year. Thotosynthesis in plants would be unable to function if as little as 15% of the sunlight were cut

off, a thing that could happen in a "mere" 100 megaton war.

Worse would follow. Inland bodies of water could have as much as two meters of ice covering them. Animals that survived the other effects could die of thirst. The oceans would remain warmer than the continents - which means that powerful onshore winds would blow, preventing ships to put to sea for fishing. Available food stocks might be contaminated by radiation. Distribution of fossil fuels would cease to exist, and farming in many parts of the world could not feed the population unless gasoline-operated machinery were used. Insects are much less affected by radiation and extremes of temperature than are their predators, so they would get the biggest part of any crops that anyone could raise. The extermination of the human species becomes a serious possibility under this scenario, and the extermination of all higher forms of life is not to be ruled out.

Faced with this evidence, the var-lovers have virtually panicked. Some of them, perhaps with more scientific training, have endorsed the conclusions of the TTAPS study - and then gone right shead with planning nuclear war. Some have agreed with TTAPS, but gone on to say that the "defense" system various called "Star Wars", "Peace Shield", or "SDI" will protect us from this danger. Williams has a few pages about "Star Wars" which refute this notion. Some var-lovers have attacked the stody itself - the model is flawed, the nuclear exchange would not involve so many megatoms, the scientists have found what they wanted to find. Williams also takes up these objections, and describes past and future refinements of the original TTAPS model which

could give us a better idea of what could happen.

But let us suppose that the whole TTAPS model is a gigantic hoax, perpetrated by Pacifist scientists to scare humanity out of the action of a nuclear war. Then what are we faced with? The answer was given by a 1979 study by the Office of Technology Assessment. "Up to 73% of the American population could die as the immediate result of a nuclear war. This study does not take into account the deaths occurring after the holocaust, even from such 'normal' problems as radiation, lack of medical care, and war-related serious injuries." A pre-TTAPS study by the World Health Organization extimated that 1,000,000,000 people would die as the immediate effect of a large-scale nuclear war. Another 1,000,000,000 would die from such side-effects as radiation, epidemic disease, or starvation. This is the "best-case" scenario that is being given to us by people who believe that the nuclear winter studies are incorrect. The

only appropriate response to such people is to spit in their faces.

On the heels of Williams' book comes one which shows the readiness of the U.S. government to consider the use of nuclear weapons. It is To Win a Nuclear War, by Michio Kaku and Daniel Axelrod, who are both physicists. (South End Press, 1987) Ever since 1945, it seems that high American officials have been considering nuclear war as an acceptable alternative in dealing with the Soviet Union, or with "third world" wars. These are not dubiously authenticated quotations from fringe maniacs like Phyllis Schaffly or T. K. "With Enough Shovels" Jones. Presidents of the United States, and members of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, are here quoted (sometimes in their own memoirs!) as advocating the use of nuclear weapons in Europe, in China, in Korea, in Vietnam, and sometimes by first-strike attacks on the Soviet Union itself. The most frightening was "Operation Duck Hook", President Nixon's plan to escalate the Vietnam war in November 1969 unless the Vietnamese gave in to his ultimatum. As quotations from Nixon Administration documents themselves indicate, this was planned to be a nuclear escalation. But as the deadline drew near, and the anti-war movement grew in strength, President Nixon realized that such a nuclear escalation would not be tolerated by the American people. He reluctantly abandoned it - and a good thing, too. I recall the temper of the public at that time. If President Nixon has used in. clear terror in Vietnam, the American people would have stormed the White House, dragged him out of it, and stomped him to death, and the day on which it happened would still be celebrated as a national holiday.
