

DUNGEONS & CHRISTIANS - CLXXXIII

Lately, those few Christians who recall who blessed the peacemakers have been wearing buttons that ask "Who would Jesus bomb?" New they have their answer, from none other than the Reverend Pat Robertson. Apparently Jesus would bomb President Hugo Chavez of Venezuela.

Nor is Robertson's proclamation out of step with the historic traditions of Christianity. Almost every Christian declares that the Christian doctrine of a "Just War" describes every war fought by the country of which that particular Christian is a citizen, and to none of the wars fought against that country.

Suborning the murder of the leader of the currently fashionable enemy nation is an old Christian tradition. Leaving aside the pious murderers who called themselves "Crusaders", we learn that almost five centuries ago Sir Thomas More, the Lord Chancellor of England, took time out from his favorite pastime of burning "heretics" to write a book about how the ideal nation should function. In this book, entitled *Utopia* and still regarded as a classic, he tells how Utopia makes war at low cost by assassinating enemy leaders — exactly the idea proposed by Robertson.

And how did More's co-religionists respond to his proposal? He was eventually proclaimed to be a saint. Nor was this advice forgotten. During her son's presidency, Lillian Carter urged the assassination of Ayatollah Khomeini, indicating that her two sons were excellent examples of the principles of heredity.

It will do no good to protest that President Chavez was democratically elected twice by large majorities, and defeated a crack-brained attempt to recall him from office. In the last century, the United States procured the overthrow of nine democratically elected governments. (Anatol Lieven, New York Times Book Review, 4 September 2005) President Chavez responded to the call for his murder by formally requesting the extradition of Rev. Robertson, and of a terrorist lammister named Luis Posada Carilles, who owes Venezuela many years of prison time for blowing up an air liner. No one expects that either man will be given up by the U. S. government.

If you play any role-playing or board games, you have probably encountered some of the Christian fanatics who have for the past 25 years or so been attacking Dungeons & Dragons (D&D) and other role-playing games, video games, and even board games. The principal opposition to these bursts of religious fanaticism comes from the Game Manufacturers Association (GAMA) and from the Committee for the Advancement of Role-Playing Games (CAR-PGa). This column relies heavily on reports from both of these organizations. CAR-PGa Newsletter is published monthly by Paul Cardwell Jr., 1127 Cedar, Bonham, TX 75418 at \$12.00 a year for domestic, and \$13.50 a year for foreign, addresses. It keeps us posted on attacks on D&D and other RPGs, and provides us with arguments and strategies to be used against attempts to censor or ban games. It also lists upcoming gaming conventions.

It had been my intention to continue in this **Graustark** with information from **CAR-PGa Newsletter** about attacks on D&D, and on the attacks that have been made against the latest version of Grand Theft: Auto since the revelation about an alleged erotic content. However, the events in New Orleans have impinged even on my publication schedule. I expect to return to this topic in the next issue.

After so many claims that last December's Indian Ocean tsunami was an expression of the wrath of an imaginary spook up in the sky, I expected similar judgments about Hurricane Katrina. After all, New Orleans, often called "The Big Easy", has long been notorious as a center of alleged immorality, to the point where more breasts are displayed during each annual Mardi Gras celebrations than Janet Jackson ever showed at the 2004 Superbowl. But what surprised me was the direction from which came the first such condemnation of which I heard.

It started because Governor Haley Barbour (R-MS) "continues to draw criticism for opposing international protocols to reduce global warming." (Glenn Thrush, Newsday, 1 September 2005) Robert F. Kennedy Jr. responded that "Perhaps it was Barbour [who] caused Katrina, at the last moment, to spare New Orleans and save its worst flailings

- PATRIOTISM is the claim by House Majority Leader Tom DeLay (R-TX) that the Columbine High School Massacre of 1999 was caused by the teaching of evolution.
- PATRIOTISM is the continuing attempt by the U. S. government to prosecute a student named Osama Awadullah for perjury after a false confession was beaten out of him by police in 2001. (Patricia Hurtado, Newsday, 25 May 2005)

(For Canadian and Mexican addresses the game fee is \$50, and for other foreign addresses it is \$100, Ρ or 85 euros in cash.) This game fee includes a subscription to Graustark Ε for as long as the game lasts, whether or not you are eliminated. With R your game fee send in a list of the countries you'd like to play, in your Α order of preference, and I'll try to put you as close to the top of that list as I can. If you do not already have the postal rules for Diplomacy, which were last published in Graustark #749, let me know when you send in your game fee, and I'll send you a copy. N Nerves

Graustark subscriptions for non-players are 10 issues for \$15 for U. S. addresses, and \$40 or 35 euros for others. Back issues as available # 2110 are 10 issues for \$5 for U. S. addresses. To foreign addresses, back issues have the same price as for foreign subscriptions.

I want to again remind players that the U. S. Postal "Service" is not capable of reliably getting mail here in less than a week. Please take this into account in sending in your moves. If, a few times, your moves have arrived here by mail in less than a week, do not assume that this will always be the case.

For their addresses, see all the readers indicated by "(T)" for "trade" in the Graustark Directory on pp. 10-11. Several of these publishers run a wide variety of postal games.

Paul Evans has just sent me further information about the RAF Mosquito, a light bomber used to good effect during World War II. My interest in this matter got started with my review, in Graustark #761, of Sir John Mortimer's crime novel Rumpole and the Penge Bungalow Murders (2004, Viking, NY). Two of the murder victims had during the war been the pilot and tail gunner of a RAF bomber which was allegedly shot down in France, killing the third crew member, the navigator. A crew of three seemed rather small for a bomber, so I looked into a couple of history books and discovered the De Havilland Mosquito, though without any information on the size of its crew. I cited these meager findings in #765.

Paul downloaded further information from http://www.aviation-history.com/ dehavilland/mosquito.html>. It seems that the plane was "conceived as a bomber [but] became one of the war's most potent fighters." In all, 27 versions of the Mosquito were built during the war, and "it carried phenomenal loads over extremely long distances, performing feats out of all proportion to the specification originally envisaged by its designers...an outstanding warplane on every count." Its crew size does not appear in these specifications, but Paul recalls it as having a crew of two, seated side by side. This would have ruled out a tail gunner. The bomber cited in Rumpole and the Penge Bungalow Murders must therefore have been some other type of plane, unless it is merely an invention by the author.

Tom Butcher writes that when he lived in Tokyo he had trouble finding opponents for over-the-board Diplomacy. "The Japanese objection," he wrote, "was that the game's required attributes were the worst possible: deceit and treachery. As one Japanese young woman put it to me: 'Skill in Diplomacy is a sign of a very bad character.'"

Of course, Diplomacy is not the only game about which this sort of thing has been said. Sherlock Holmes put it this way:

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Overseas Graustark readers have been asking for details about the extremely destructive hurricane which recently struck New Orleans and Gulf Coast regions of Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Florida. While I have no relatives in that region, I have like all New Yorkers been following the horrendous news reports from the South. This was a direction from which we received much help after "9/11". Biloxi came through for us, and now we are going to come through for Biloxi. New York City is mustering rescue workers and equipment, and sending money. Rather than funding any of the charities of religious orientation, I am making a contribution through the Mayor's Fund to Advance New York City, City Hall, New York, NY 10007, since I believe that hurricane relief is a civic obligation of New Yorkers. Checks should be made payable to the fund, with "Hurricane Katrina Relief" on the memo line. I recommend contributions to this fund to readers.

Being situated mostly below water level, New Orleans has filled up like a bathtub, and no one can even guess when it will again be habitable, or when a reasonably full death count will be available. One report called the world's fifth busiest port "an inevitable city in an impossible location". And this may well prove to be the deadliest natural disaster in U. S. history, worse than the 6,000 deaths in the San Francisco earthquake of 1906, or the 8,000 deaths in the Galveston hurricane of 1900.

I want to thank Mark Blackman, John R. Biehl, and Paul Cardwell Jr. for sending in some of the clippings which I have been using in collages on **Graustark** covers and elsewhere.

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"Defending a conflict that critics liken to Vietnam, President Bush said yesterday that the war in Iraq was more like World War II." - New York Daily News, 31 August 2005. Ah yes, it's all coming back to me now - the draft, rationing, massive conversion from civilian to military production, shortages of consumer goods, Boy Scouts going from door to door collecting scrap metal and old paper, volunteer neighborhood air raid wardens, practice blackouts, and government campaigns promoting the sale of war bonds and stamps, with massive responses from the public. You have been seeing all this in your neighborhood, haven't you?

Figures on the expense of the American invasion of Iraq have just been published in an article in the New York Times of 20 August 2005. Professor Linda Bilmes of Harvard has run up a calculation which sets the amount already spent on the wars with Afghanistan and Iraq at \$258,000,000,000. (That's "billion" with a "b".) Running costs of this war over the next five years — and Bush will be in office for almost four of those years — are estimated at \$460,000,000,000. To this she adds \$315,000,000,000 in veterans' costs, \$220,000,000,000 in interest on deficit financing of these expenses, and \$119,000,000,000 as the effects of an increase in the price of oil. This totals out at \$1,372,000,000,000. (That's "trillion" with a "t".) At a conservative estimate that's \$11,300 for each household in the United States. (Could you use a new car? Or afford to put gas in it?)

And if gasoline prices rise any higher, we may soon be paying almost half as much per gallon as Europeans pay for it.

MURDER MOST ROYAL

Margaret Frazer (pseudonym of Gail Frazer), *The Bastard's Tale* (2002, Berkley, NY; \$6.50 pb). For reviews of the eleven previous books in this series of detective adventures of the Benedictine nun Dame Frevisse, see ##673, 675, 677, 724, 729 and 737.

Margaret Frazer's *The Bastard's Tale* takes place 254 years later than Sharon Kaye Penman's *Dragon's Lair*, reviewed in the last issue, but the Welsh are still unreconciled to the English conquest, and capable of generating enormous complications in the lives of their English rulers. The bastard of the title is Arteys, the historical half-Welsh son of Prince Humphrey Plantagent, Duke of Gloucester and youngest brother of the late King Henry V. The terms of King Henry's will made Gloucester the guardian of the king's infant son and successor King Henry VI, while the only other surviving brother Prince John, Duke of Bedford, was in charge of keeping newly conquered France pacified, using methods we have seen more recently in the "pacification" of conquered nations.

But by now, after Bedford's death and the revolt led by Jeanne Darc, France is lost, and Gloucester is now the heir presumptive of his nephew, who is 26, has as yet no children, and is progressing from childhood to senility without an intervening phase of adult lucidity. In previous novels in this series, we have seen Gloucester as the leader of one of the two factions among the young king's handlers. Gloucester is a "Hawk" who favors reconquering France without regard to the cost in men and money. Gloucester's bastard uncle Cardinal Beaufort, Bishop of Winchester, is a "Dove", who wants to give up the French conquests, probably so he can get hold of the money that otherwise would have been spent on war. As he is now about 70 and in very poor health, active leadership of this faction has passed to his grandnephew the Marquis of Dorset, and to the Marquis of Suffolk, third husband of Dame Frevisse's cousin Alice.

As the climax of the rivalry between Beaufort and Gloucester, a Parliament is to be held in bitterly cold weather in February 1447 at a large Benedictine abbey at Bury St. Edmunds, probably the only place other than a large city where all the notables and their entourages could be accommodated. As the book opens, Arteys, now in his middle twenties, hears his father say that he intends to attend this Parliament to which he has been summoned. But, since Gloucester lives in Wales and is popular with the Welsh, his advisers are opposed to him visiting such a nest of his enemies as Bury St. Edmunds is likely to be. However, Gloucester's wife has been imprisoned for five years on a trumped-up charge of "sorcery", and he hopes this Parliament can be induced to release her. Arteys is a member of the advance party which is to see to the duke's accommodations at the abbey.

Cardinal Beaufort frequently gets involved in the affairs of Dame Frevisse, who would, as she grows closer to her fiftieth birthday, rather continue her quiet and useful existence in a convent in Oxfordshire instead of getting involved once again in court intrigues. However, Beaufort can make claims on their kinship, since his mother was the aunt of Frevisse's late and much beloved uncle Thomas Chaucer, son of the poet. And as this book begins he asks the prioress of that convent to send Dame Frevisse to visit her cousin Alice, Chaucer's daughter, at Bury St. Edmunds, in terms that can barely be distinguished from a command. Obviously, something is afoot on which he would like to have the support of her well-known investigative talents.

At the very crowded Bury St. Edmund's, room is found for Frevisse, as a fellow Benedictine. While awaiting further instructions from Beaufort, she takes under her wing Alice's four-year-old son John de la Pole. Young John is an active and inquisitive child who has attached himself to a company of players, and will have a small part in a play which they will be performing before the king and queen and other notables of the realm. One of the members of this company introduces himself to Frevisse as "Master Noreys", but she recognizes him as her long-time friend Joliffe, a traveling actor who is in the custom of using a variety of names for his own purposes.

It is Joliffe, who seems to be involved in some freelance plotting of his own, who introduces Arteys to Frevisse. Suffolk is spreading the word that Gloucester plans to bring a small army to Bury and seize control of the king, but we recognize this as a sort of plot still practiced in our own time: X loudly claims that Y is planning to do something sinister, unlawful, or both, when X is actually planning to do this to Y. Alice senses that something is wrong, and confides to Frevisse that her husband no

longer takes her into his confidence as to his plans.

Almost as soon as Gloucester arrives, he is arrested in the king's name by the nobles of Suffolk's faction and charged with high treason. But then Arteys, making a secretive night visit to his father's cell, surprises and kills a man who is trying to suffocate Gloucester. And, although Arteys leaves the corpse in the cell next to his father, who seems now to be in a coma, it is fished out of a local river the next morning. He later proves to be a servant of Suffolk.

Soon Gloucester slips from his coma into death. (This is the author's approach to a death for which historians have never found a satisfactory explanation, and she briefly discusses the matter in an epilog.) There is an outcry of public indignation against Suffolk for allegedly procuring his murder, and Suffolk tries to cover his tracks by arresting Arteys and four other followers of Gloucester. It is Suffolk's intention to summarily sentence them to the protracted and degrading mode of execution then customary for high treason. He apparently expects people to believe that if Gloucester's followers are executed for high treason, their master must also have been guilty of it.

We are told by historians and novelists alike that Gloucester had been popular with "the common people", which probably means the people who would feel good if France were again conquered and subjugated. (Compare the attitude of the dwindling number of fire-eaters who want Iraq or Iran to get this treatment.)

Usually murder mysteries are wrapped up quickly once the detective gets to work. But this one lasts on into high summer, since it is a historical fact that Cardinal Beaufort died a few weeks after Gloucester, and that Arteys' trial and execution was to take place even later. Frevisse returns to her convent. But Suffolk plans to try his victims in London, and Alice, deeply worried about her husband's role in this matter, once more asks for Frevisse's presence. This, and Joliffe's quick wits, provide Frevisse with an opportunity to bring matters to a happy conclusion by pulling a tremendous bluff on Suffolk.

The ultimate beneficiary of all this turmoil, and inheritor of Gloucester's popularity, is the king's second cousin, the Duke of York. He is a better intriguer with a much cooler head than Gloucester, and is the next heir to the throne and the only adult, sane, male member of the royal family in England. As such he is a natural focus for anyone who resents the control which the Suffolk faction has over the king. Suffolk's faction knows this, but Frevisse and Alice would probably have been gratified by fore-knowledge that in three years Suffolk himself will pay a heavy price for his plotting.

In the fullness of time, John de la Pole will marry Princess Elizabeth, daughter of the Duke of York and sister to the eventual Kings Edward IV and Richard III. Their eldest son John Earl of Lincoln will be proclaimed the heir to King Richard after the death of Richard's own son, but will be shoved out the way by the Tudor claimant, who becomes King Henry VII. The Earl of Lincoln and his younger brothers will all be killed, in battle or on the scaffold, while pursuing their claim to the throne.

for the Mississippi coast."

For over half a century the Kennedy family has been prominent in American political affairs and also, from time to time, in tabloid reports of sexual escapades. But, after gradually degenerating from the high hopes and insincere promises of the Kennedy presidency, the Kennedy legacy has apparently run out in a morass of religious fanaticism about divine punishment by hurricane for people who do not agree with the passionate but unfounded faith that global warming is caused by human activity.

And this Kennedy has acquired some rather odd allies. I don't mean just an obscurity like J. Crestwell Munnings, whose letter to the New York Daily News of 1 September 2005 blames Hurricane Katrina on the fact that "Man in his quest to challenge the Creator has blasted hundreds of rockets into outer space and in his arrogance has upset the balance of nature...Man needs to cease further space exploration. His failure to do so will result in his ultimate destruction." A somewhat more prominent religious fanatic named Muhammad Yousef Al-Mlafi, an official of Kuwait's Ministry of Education, claims on a website of the Middle East Media Research Institute that "The Terrorist Katrina is One of the Soldiers of Allah" and is "upset with America for its unbelievers." 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U. S. District Judge Alvin K. Hellerstein has declined to make public 87 photographs and four videotapes of the torture of prisoners at the U. S. Army's Abu Ghraib Prison in Iraq. (Newsday, 31 August 2005) This is likely to produce massive indignation among the American troops who are depicted torturing those prisoners. To judge from the attitudes of these soldiers in the pictures that have been released, they are proud and happy about their actions, and are likely to resent any attempts to hide the evidence of their triumphs from the American people. They will certainly be backed

up by Attorney General Gonzales, who supports the torture of prisoners, and by Secretary of Defense Rumsfeld, under whose authority Abu Ghraib and other American prisons in Iraq were established.

Imagine how the Marines would have reacted if the government had suppressed the photographs of them erecting the U.S. flag at the summit of the highest mountain on Iwo Jima in 1945! These photographs from the American military prisons in Iraq are this war's equivalent of that moment of triumph - an emblem of military pride and a reminder to the American people of just what our armed forces are accomplishing in our name.

This refusal to display the evidence of the American victory in Iraq is likely to have portentous consequences. There was once another nation whose soldiers and veterans, after a victorious war, asked, "If our side won the war, why is the country still in such a mess?" Eventually they found a leader, marched on the capital, and seized the government. The leader's name was Benito Mussolini.
