





THOSE NEW POSTAL RATES

With its usual bad management, the U. S. Postal "Service" introduced on 14 May 2007 a new and hopelessly complicated set of postal rates. So far, the only information I have been able to pry loose from postal clerks is an inadequate pamphlet entitled "New Postage Prices: What You Need to Know" (Publication 620). Now the rates for first-class mail take into account not only the weight of a piece of mail, but also its size and thickness. We are not told how large or thick a piece of mail must be in order to require the payment of a "large envelope" rate. For those people on the Internet, the address <usps.com> allegedly provides more information.

An ordinary letter is 41c for the first cunce, and 17c for each additional cunce. However, this rate is valid only for letters which weigh less than 3½ cunces. Anything heavier, no matter its size, must go at the "large envelope" rate. This is 80c for the first cunce, and 17c for each additional cunce. However, this "large envelope" rate is valid only for mail weighing less than 13 cunces. Anything between 13 and 16 cunces must go at a "Priority Mail" rate of \$4.60. Since 13 cunces cost "only" \$2.84, it will

Today's Terrorism Alert Color Code is way up in the gamma ray portion of the electromagnetic spectrum, in honor of the Bush Regime's silly attempts to make it appear as if the United States is in immediate danger of being attacked with nuclear weapons by Iraq - no, scratch that for Iran - or by North Korea. (No, that is not a misprint.) For this panic credit David Frum, inventor of the notion later enunciated by Bush the Son as the "axis of evil" in a preposterous attempt to somehow tie the present world situation to World War II.

Diplomacy is a board game of negotiation and conflict for the period of World War I. It was designed by Allan B. Calhamer and is now published by Hasbro. Another new postal Diplomacy game is now being organized in Graustark, at a game fee of \$35. (For Canadian and Mexican addresses the game fee is \$50, and for other foreign addresses it is \$100, or 80 euros in cash.) This game fee includes a subscription to Graustark for as long as the game lasts, whether or not you are eliminated. With your game fee send in a list of the countries you'd like to play, in your order of preference, and I'll try to put you as close to the top of that list as I can. If you do not already have the postal rules for Diplomacy, which were last published in Graustark #749, let me know when you send in your game fee, and I'll send you a copy.

Graustark subscriptions for non-players are 10 issues for \$15 for U. S. addresses, and \$40 or 35 euros for others. Back issues as available # 2132 are 10 issues for \$5/for U. S. addresses. To)foreign addresses, back issues have the same price as for foreign subscriptions. Players who phone in their moves should call me at 718-693-1579. An answering machine is attached to this phone.

I want to again remind players that the U. S. Postal "Service" is not capable of reliably getting mail here in less than a week. Please take this into account in sending in your moves. If, a few times, your moves have arrived here by mail in less than a week, do not assume that this will always be the case.

Graustark readers who are interested in postal games which don't run here, are invited to write to the publishers of 'zines with which I trade, and ask what game openings they have. For their addresses, see all the readers indicated by "(T)" for "trade" in the Graustark Directory on pp. 10-11. Several of these publishers run a wide variety of postal games.

The jury duty, which forced a postponement in the deadlines for this present issue, was settled out after a mere two weeks. It was interesting to watch the positions of us jurors, which at first had seem badly divided, work out into a generally accepted compromise after two sessions of negotiation.

Compromise is the wisest way to settle differences of opinion, a matter of general experience which sometimes blinds us to the fact that the very important issues cannot be handled this way. Consider the most bitterly disputed issue that ever divided Americans. The finest political minds of the time worked out one carefully considered

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compromise after another. It was felt that one side might accept a plan that it did not like, in order to get another plan which it wanted badly. And yet every one of those compromises collapsed, because the issue simply could not be compromised. And in the end it was not compromised, but settle with the words "Henceforward and forever free."

The English gamesmaster Paul Evans, for whose postal gaming 'zine I trade Graustark, writes that he did not get a copy of the forged issue of Graustark. ("#773a", significantly dated "1 April 2006".) Apparently the forger did not send copies of his creation to foreign readers. This may be due to the fact that whenever domestic postal rates rise, foreign rates rise at a much higher rate. Or it may be that, insofar as any sense can be made out of the forger's motives, he was feebly trying to satirize my belief that peace is preferable to war. And nobody in Europe is going to buy that. From the beginnings of the American invasion of Iraq, there has been a notable lack of enthusiasm in Europe for this increasingly bloody and futile campaign. Many nations refused to get involved at all. Chief among them was France, which led Congress to take the supremely silly step of decreeing that French fried potatoes must henceforth be called "freedom fries". And some nations that did send troops have thought better of it; Great Britain and Denmark are now pulling out of the mess. All Latin American nations except El Salvador either refused to send troops, or have withdrawn the troops they did send.

Meanwhile, nobody in Washington seems to comprehend what experiences Europe may have had, that would make most Europeans reluctant to get involved in a war. This of course excepts the Balkans, whose peoples seem eager to go to war to avenge what Evil Them did to Innocent Us in 1389. And they have been fighting these wars of revenge on their own soil, not in the Muddle East.

As for "freedom fries", I am reminded of a World War II slogan promoted by Katz's, New York City's most famous kosher delicatessen. To counteract unfamiliar army food, Katz's urged its customers to "Send a salami to your boy in the army." Now it can be "Send freedom potatoes to your boy on the Euphrates."

Political commentators of several different opinions have been complaining about allegedly slanderous words uttered by Senator John Kerry (D-MA). These words, spoken to students in California, were:

"Do you know where you end up if you don't study, if you aren't smart, if you're intellectually lazy? You wind up getting stuck in a war in Iraq."

I have read and re-read these words, and I cannot figure out what is supposed to be wrong with them. And they certainly seem to be supported by the statistics, as reported by Craig Gordon in Newsday (2 November 2006). Only 4% of enlisted military personnel have graduated from college, compared with 25.2% of the civilian population over 18. The proportion of enlisted personnel who have had any college training is 11.4%, compared with 52.4% for the civilian population.

I want to repeat my recommendation that every American should have a passport. The complete inability of the present all-volunteer U. S. forces in Iraq and Afghanistan to suppress resistance to American occupation makes the imposition of a military draft more likely. A bill to this effect has already been introduced by Representative Charles Rangel (D-NY). It would draft both men and woman, of ages 18 through 42. Flight to Canada or some other foreign country would be necessitated by such a draft; indeed, close to 200 U. S. troops have already fled to Canada in search of political asylum.

From 7 January 2007, passports are required for all air or sea travel to other western hemisphere nations. By 1 January 2008 this requirement will be extended to land travel as well. (*Park Slope Courier*, 30 October 2006) For information on how to get a passport, ask at the nearest post office, telephone 1-800-ASK-USPS, or log on to <www.usps.com> and click on the government links page.

This should be done at once, because the new regulations on passport use are sure to produce a great many new applications. Also, if a draft is planned, the government may decide that it should not be as easy as it now is, to get a passport.

In fact, so many applications have come in that a great backlog has developed, and anyone who has influence with a government official is desperately trying to get the application expedited. As a result, the government has postponed some deadline dates, and may postpone more.

The new passport regulations, when they finally go into effect, will be particularly bothersome on parts of the border where many people commute daily to work. For example, thousands of people live in Windsor, Ontario, and commute to jobs in Detroit, Michigan, or vice versa. Stopping commuter buses, and inspecting every passenger's passport every work day, will be strongly resented, and may in practice prove to be impossible.

Additionally, passports have recently been thoroughly re-designed, complete with interior illustrations. The government may be planning to eventually invalidate the familiar dark blue passports, thus making it possible to introduce new restrictions on

the issuance of the new passports.

The Democratic victory in the 2006 elections should lead no one to believe that it would mean an end to the American attempt to conquer and annex Iraq. Many Democrats, including the two Senators from New York, support war and voted for the infamous "USA PATRIOT Act". As I went to vote in the primary election, I was approached by a political hack who tried to solicit my vote for Killery Clinton. I asked him why he wanted to send 80,000 more troops to Iraq. He professed ignorance, so I told him that this was one of his candidate's proposals. Then I asked him whether he was going to be one of the 80,000. He said he wasn't. So I told him that if he wasn't going to take her seriously, why should I? And to that, of course, he did not have an answer.

News telecasts frequently show North Korean troops, and those of several other nations, goose-stepping in formal parades. Presumably such nations believe that this shows military ardor, efficiency, and determination. Older Americans remember films of German troops goose-stepping under the Nazi regime. Actually, goose-stepping originated in the British army as a punishment drill for drunkenness. It is no wonder that the residents of English-speaking nations regard this marching step as a display which is at best silly and at worst stupid.

From 1983 to 1988, BBC-TV broadcast a hilarious series of four dramas about four members of the Blackadder family during four critical moments in English history. Four gentlemen - and I use the term very loosely - named Edmund Blackadder were featured, along with their slob servants all named Baldrick, and other recurring characters, including "Lord Percy Percy". The first Blackadder was a pretender to the throne - but in the 15th century, who wasn't? The second was a lord at the court of Queen Elizabeth The third was butler to the Prince Regent in the early 19th century, thus demolishing a period which was once popular with historical romance novelists. The last, in "Blackadder Goes Forth", was a captain on the western front during World War I, and thus of interest to Diplomacy players. (Note the Blackadder family's steady downward progression in society.) The adventures were written by Rowan Atkinson, who played the Blackadders on television, and by Richard Curtis and Ben Elton.

In my opinion, "Blackadder Goes Forth" is the best of the lot. This is how World War I, for which a map is reprinted on p. 2 of this 'zine, is explained:

"Blackadder: ...[T]he real reason for the whole thing was that it was just too much effort not to have a war...in order to prevent a war in Europe, two super blocs developed: us, the French, and the Russians on one side, and the Germans and Austro-Hungary on the other. The idea was to have two vast opposing armies, each acting as the other's deterrent. That way there could never be a war.

"Baldrick: Except, well, this is a sort of war, isn't it? "Blackadder: That's right, there was one tiny flaw in the plan.

"George: Oh, what was that? "Blackadder: It was bollocks."

NAPOLEON DYNAMITE

A review by Joseph T. Major, reprinted from FOSFAX #213, published by Timothy Lane

Michael Kurland, The Empress of India: A Professor Moriarty Novel (2006, St. Martin's Minotaur, New York; \$25)

If you had read William S. Baring-Gould's Sherlock Holmes of Baker Street (1962) it would seem that the relationship of Sherlock Holmes and "the Napoleon of Crime", Professor James Moriarty, was far more complex and extensive than could be deduced from a mere reading of the Canon. Far from being strangers, they seem to have been very well acquainted, back from those old days on the Holmes estate in Norfolk when the squire hired a tutor to plant some knowledge in his sons' heads.

In a sense, Kurland has taken this a step further. It seems that like student, like tutor; Moriarty has developed and employed the whole art of detection: making deductions and using them in the criminal world. As a consulting criminal, that is; drafting plans and providing equipment for spectacular break-ins, swindles, and the like. In three previous novels, The Infernal Device (1978), Death by Gaslight (1982), and The Great Game (2003), while doing his best to promote the spread of human knowledge, the Professor has dealt with activities both illegal and otherwise, providing advice to those on both sides of the law. When a certain meddling unofficial person doesn't try to pin every outrage in London on him, some of which he actually wasn't connected with.

Such as this one. The ship Empress of India is bringing a cargo of gold bullion to London, where it will serve as the backing for an issue of Indian currency; thus stimulating the economy, encouraging commerce, and the like. If it disappears en route, therefore, it's obvious that that infamous consulting criminal James Moriarty is responsible.

Particularly because he was on the Empress of India and was carrying out a criminal plan. Just not this one. This puts Moriarty in the extremely inconvenient position of having to solve one crime to cover up another. In fact, there are several other criminals in the area, including one very suspicious gang leader.

Oh and did I mention that while inspecting the area around the vault where the gold would be stored, Sherlock Holmes vanished? The first scene of the book, in fact, recounts an invasion of the Moriarty Home by coppers both official (Inspectors Lestrade and Gregson) and otherwise (Dr. Watson and Mycroft Holmes) to protest this matter.

Several of the recurring character of the series appear, primarily Mr. Maws the ex-boxer and butler and Mummer Tolliver, the man of all trades, some even honest, but also a number of the more colorful characters of the London underworld. Not to mention Colonel Sebastian "Tiger Jack" Moran, the other perpetrator of the crime in question. However, Benjamin Barnett, the journalist who was a significant character on the other works, and the talented and notable Cecily Perrine (later Barrett) do not appear here. (But then, neither does Harry Flashman.)

The story is set in 1890, thus predating both The Great Game and "The Final Problem". One wonders how Kurland will deal with the case of John Douglas of Birlstone...

obviously be cheaper to mail large bundles at the 13 ounce rate.

Domestic postcards cost 26c to mail, in addition to 2c for the card itself. The rates for mail sent out of the country are concealed in Stygian darkness. We are only told that they "vary by destination" and are "69c and up". I am apparently going to have to present such mail, piece by piece, to a postal clerk until he or she decides that it will be easier to give me one of their tightly guarded rate listings.

Obviously, these new postal rates will be so cumbersome to deal with, that the USP"S" will have to work out something that will be easier for us to use and for them to administer. They will probably try to work yet another rate increase into these
