Underlined moves are not possible. The French armies in Mar-seilles, Picardy, and North Africa and the French fleet in the Western Mediterranean were not ordered, and hold their positions. The French army in Burgundy was dislodged and annihilated. The English army in London retreats to Wales, and the Turkish fleet in Greece retreats to the Ionian Sea.

The Italian moves are not possible, because the Tyrrhenian Sea does not border on Piedmont.

Unless Ken Davidson, the French player in 1965L, sends in "Fall 1906" moves, play of France will be taken over by the stand-by player: Anders Swenson, 145 Ponderosa Lane, Walnut Creek, California 94598. If Swenson sends in "Fall 1906" moves for France, and Davidson does not,

TIDE OF WAR TURNS AS
CIVIL STRIFE DISRUPTS
LAFAYETTE POWERS

No "Fall 1905" moves were received from the Lafayette Tactics SAssociation. Neither was a retreat order sent in for the Austro-Hungarian army in Munich, which was dislodged in "Spring 1905". This army is therefore removed.

Underlined moves are not possible. The English army in Munich and the German army in Galicia were given conditional orders, depending upon the direction of the Austro-Hungarian retreat from Munich. However, the conditional moves did not take into account what actually happened. These units therefore hold their positions.

The French army in Brest and the Russian army in Berlin are dislodged and annihilated. Other LTA forces hold their positions. These are:

AUSTRIA-HUNGARY: Armies in Budapest, Tyrolia, Rome, and Ruhr; Fleet in the Adriatic.

LAST-MINUTE ORDERS CHANGE COURSE OF WAR

The deadline for "Fall 1903" moves in 1965Q had been 26 February 1966. All moves had come in by noon of the previous day, so they were published in GRAUSTARK #82 and mailed out on the 25th. This was done with hopes to expedite the play of the game, allowing slightly over one week for the three required "Winter 1903" moves instead of a full two weeks.

However, a revised set of German moves came in on the 26th. The necessary changes in the "Fall 1903" moves were sent out immediately to all players. Since one of the three affected players lives in Brooklyn, and none is further away than Ohio, the same "Winter 1903" deadline was kept.

PRESS RELEASES - 1965A

WASHINGTON (November 9, 1911): Secretary of State Morris Hillquit today stated that "the government of the United States of America views with grave misgivings the Russo-Japanese treaty and the plans for joint maneuvers by these Powers on the territory of the Korean Empire. The United States of America does not recognize the recent conquest of Korea by Japan, and is providing every facility of aid to the Korean guerrilleros who are presently trying to drive out their conquerors."

WASHINGTON (November 10, 1911): Senator Beveridge (Rep., Ind.) today strongly criticized Secretary of State Hillquit's offer of support for Korea. "On the Senate floor he demanded: "Does the administration of the Farmer-Labor Socialist Peace Party plan to invade Asia and make war on both the Russian and the Japanese Empires?"

Beveridge was answered by Senator London (FLSP, N. Y.), chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee and a leading administration spokesman. London denied that the administration had ever contemplated a commitment of American troops. "The people of Korea can be free of foreign imperialism," he told the Senate, "only if they themselves fight for their freedom. An independent Korea cannot be handed to its people on a silver platter by the soldiers of another country. Imagine what would happen if large numbers of American troops were to go to Korea and fight against its oppressors. The Korean people would regard us as just another of the many foreign nations which have overrun and conquered that peninsula during its unhappy history. The new Korean government would be, not a truly native government, but military hangers-on who held office at the pleasure of American generals. We do not wish this future for the Korean Empire, or for any other nation in Europe or Asia. This is what America will do. We will provide arms for the people of Korea, which the Russo-Japanese alliance cannot prevent short of a total naval blockade. We will educate Korean guerrilla leaders in America to lead their people in war and in peace. We will print tons of books and pamphlets for them. Without committing a single American soldier or sailor, we will tie down thousands of Russian and Japanese troops in a futile war. Furthermore, we will expand existing contacts with the peace movements in Russia and Japan themselves, in hopes that they will eventually be able to turn those countries into the ways of peace."

WASHINGTON (November 11, 1911): The Department of State and District of Columbia Local 99 of the Construction Workers of America today made a joint offer to the Russian Embassy for the purpose of repairing damages caused by the riot of 30 January. The riot, the work of Russian anti-war exiles, was caused by the offer of the Russian Empire to sell as slaves prisoners of war taken in the present European struggle. Under the terms of the agreement between the government and the union, the U. S. government will supply building materials, and the union members will donate their labor. Local 99 is composed entirely of anti-war refugees who have come to America from Russia since the war broke out over 10 years ago.

It is not yet known whether Russia intends to accept the offer.

LONDON: The Tsar was found innocent, on the grounds of insanity, of the assassination of King Edward.

LIVERPOOL: The English Mid-Atlantic fleet, together with the North Atlantic fleet, have established a French route for troop rotation to England. Members of the French Freedom Navy have been granted English citizenship and homesteads in Yorkshire. Six months of the year, each French sailor will take rest in the security of Yorkshire. And England hopes to return these Frenchmen to Brest. Someday, with any luck, all of France will be returned to France, even unto Burgundy.

MANILA (December 15, 1911): President Aguinaldo of the Republic of the Philippines today announced that an All-Asian Peace Convention will begin in Manila on July 4, 1912, the sixth anniversary of the negotiation of Philippine independence. The Convention will discuss ways and means of keeping the present European conflict from spreading to Asia, including the replacement of pre-war governments in some countries. In addition to official delegations from the new Chinese Republic and the Empire of Annam, refugee and rebel groups from Japan, Korea, India, and Russian Asia will be present.
