PLAY SUSPENDED; LAFAYETTE POWERS QUIT!

Anders Swenson, captain of the Lafayette Tactics Alliance, writes that the failure of Brian Baily to submit moves leaves the LTA no alternative but to surrender to the Youngstown University Diplomacy Club in 1965NT.

The Gamesmaster accordingly invites other GRAUSTARK readers to take up the fortunes of the alliance of France, Austria-Hungary, and Russia. The first team of three to send in a cut-rate entry fee of \$1.50, and "Spring 1906" moves for the alliance, will replace the LTA in command of these countries. If no entry comes in by 16 April 1966, the game will be terminated and the YUDC declared the winners.

VERSAILLES: The Austrian Ambassador to France was declared persona non grata today at the Court of Avaricius XIII.

AVIGNON: It is rumored that the Pope in exile has excommunicated Baron Münchhausen. He is also said to have remarked caustically about how low it was necessary for him to stoop - "actually bothering with someone without a von in his name."

PARIS: News reached the Ministry of the Interior today that the Austrian Minister of Strategy had collapsed in convulsions after partaking of a freshly opened bottle of "Creme de France". A strict investigation was ordered the King's Wineworks in Burgundy.

PARIS: King Avaricius XIII charged the Austrian Emperor and Minister of Strategy with treason

The Russian army in Rumania is annihilated. Play in 1966G will be suspended for two weeks, owing to the spring vacation at Brooklyn College. The moves from "Fall 1907" to "Spring 1909" will be reported in GRAUSTARK #89, which will be published on 1 May 1966.

BERLIN: Before he was called to the throne of the 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ th Reich, Kaiser Max III had been a retired captain in the merchant marine, serving as German consul in the Squiji Islands. It is now being rumored around Potsdam that he is outfitting the Third Fleet, presently on the Baltic station, with a design to making a hasty return to that tropical backwater.

These reports invariably come as footnotes to a story, probably originating with Prince Rudolf von Rhabarber, that the Empress has taken to berating Kaiser Max for the present state of the 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ th Reich. "Dummkopf!" she is reported to have shouted at him, "a nize peaceful island you had to leave to take charge of this dum-boozled Empire! Better you should quit and try to get der oldt chob back!"

ATHENS (June 23, 1904): With much pomp and circumstance today we welcomed our liberators, the Turks. Sultan Abdul Boob-Sheet was so impressed that he appointed some of our most distinguished citizens to high posts in His Celestial Greatness' Satrapy of Greece. We pledged eternal loyalty against the Austrians and their vassals, the Italians. Admittedly a few of our citizens showed despicable treason in staging protest rallies where IBM cards were publicly burned. We have taken care of these people. Ours is a government by consensus. - Grand Vizier Spiros Preposterous, Celestial Minister of Information.

CONSTANTINOPLE (June 26, 1904): We have just received word of the serious illness of Grand Vizier Spiros Preposterous, Our Man in Athens. He is said to be suffering from extreme over-exertion, brought about, no doubt, by the Sultan's gift of 26 comely wives to him. We fear for our so-newly-won foothold in the land of Plato and Papandreou. - Allah Ben Had, Chief of Staff.

BERLIN (Sept. 1, 1904, AP): In a lightning coup the government of Count Down was overthrown and the Count and his supporters arrested. Replacing the moderate government was a junta led by the senior officers of the General Staff.

It is believed that the Count's military failures, especially the disastrous invasion of England, plus the treaty of peace with France resulted in a showdown between the Count and the generals. For four days ago Count Down and the General Staff met with the Kaiser in his quarters. It is believed at this meeting the issues were discussed and the fate of the government determined.

It is too early to determine what effect the coup will have on German foreign policy, but this observer believes that the generals will attempt to renew diplomatic relations with England. The General Staff never favored a treaty of peace with France. In fact, if the recently published letters of von Moltke are true, the Chief of the General Staff violently opposed the treaty. And only the personal intervention of the Kaiser prevented him from resigning. So I would not be surprised if Germany recommenced its invasion of France.

ST. PETERSBURG: King Charles I of Russia has ordered all armies to secure the homeland and move into the Austrian highlands to kill every last soldier of the Dual Monarchy!

towards the Lafayette Powers. "Our Strategy Minister, M. le Turnier, submitted several excellent plans to his Austrian counterpart, who was supposedly responsible for the co-ordination of the allied advance. Had any one of the three plans been followed correctly, the war would now have reached a successful conclusion. We completely agree with the Tryphemian Prime Minister, M. Taxis, that we are decadent. 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PROGRESS OF POSTAL DIPLOMACY

At the last count 33 postal Diplomacy are under way. Their moves are regulated by 11 Gamesmasters in 10 bulletins. In addition to the overall system of identification of games, used in GRAUSTARK, some Gamesmasters employ their own identification systems.

COMPLETED POSTAL DIPLOMACY GAMES

The previous table shows that, of the 39 postal Diplomacy games which have been begun, only 6 have thus far been completed. However, several of the older games, including 1964C, 1964D, 1965B, and 1965I are approaching completion. I have developed a tabular form which shows at a glance the rise and fall of various powers as a game proceeds. The first row gives the year, with the first two digits eliminated; thus "04" means "1904". Below the year is the number of supply centers held by each country at the end of that game year. If, for any reason, a power actually has on the board fewer units than supply centers, each such deficiency is indicated by an asterisk.

1963A: This was the first postal Diplomacy game, and only five players could be recruited for it. Three - Goldman, Lerner, and Keshner - were members of the East Paterson Diplomacy Club. Dave McDaniel, who later founded Ruritanian, tried to play Austria-Hungary with the aid of a computer, but was eliminated before he could assess the value of such a procedure. (It still remains as an interesting question to be investigated.) While the EPDC players maneuvered among themselves, Derek Nelson as Italy quietly eliminated Austria-Hungary and then attacked them. Goldman will shortly reprint the game in Wart Hog.

1963B: This second postal Diplomacy game was organized by Dave McDaniel, and included many of McDaniel's fellow Angelenos and mem-

bers of the Los Angeles Science Fiction Society. The Russian player entered under the name of "Adhemar Grauhugel", but it soon became common knowledge that he was actually Bruce Pelz - husband of Austro-Hungarian player Dian Pelz. The Pelzes cooperated with Diplomacy inventor Allan Calhamer, playing Germany, in a very effective Dreikaiserbund. Weak play by Tom Bulmer as Italy, and lack of coordination among the other players generally, led to the triumph of the Dreikaiserbund. By 1905 Calhamer concluded that he would be the next victim of the Family Compact, and anticipated this development by attacking the Pelz forces. An ill-timed double-cross of his sole remaining ally, Jock Root's France, started the German Kaiser downhill, as France promptly joined the combine against him.

In 1910, McDaniel ceased publication of Ruritania, and it passed to my management. Calhamer and Root also decided to withdraw, and their countries passed to Roland Tzudiker and John McCallum respectively. These two, in alliance, fought a well-played resistance against the Pelzes until Tzudiker was called up by the Air Force in 1916. (The game year 1916, of course.) McCallum, eliminated as France, carried on as Germany for two more years.

1964A: In this game what was to be a fairly common pattern manifested itself. By 1907 two major powers - in this case Derek Nelson's France and James MacKenzie's Turkey - had each eliminated all significant opposition in its part of the board, and were facing each other in a two-power war. Furthermore, smaller countries that had been hard-pressed by a major power allied themselves with the enemy of their nearest enemy. Here, England was allied with Turkey and Italy with France by the end of the war. Earlier in the game, England had looked promising, but continuity of English policy was interrupted by frequent changes of player. Several players were eliminated early through failure, on either their parts or that of the U. S. Post Office, to get all their moves in.

1964B: In this most interesting game there was a rather unusual winner - Austria-Hungary, played by John Smythe. An early alliance with Italy, combined with weak play on the part of Russia, led to the Dual Monarchy becoming the dominant power in the East, as Turkey was in 1964A. The most noteworthy feature of this game, however, was the determined resistance offered by Turkey to the Austro-Hungarian advance. John McCallum made Smythe fight for every supply center, and was still in the game when Bob Lake as France and John Davey as Germany stopped trying to double-cross each other long enough to notice that surrender was the only way out.

1965A: This game took on a peculiar character when England made an early seizure of St. Petersburg and was able to move in sufficient forces to hold it against a Russian counter-attack. Despite a Russo-Turkish alliance which swept Italy and Austria-Hungary from the board, and planted Cossacks and Janizaries on the coasts of the Atlantic, England was able with three fleets to keep Gibraltar closed and an overwhelming Turkish force bottled up in the Mediterranean. By the end of the game, England and her allies with 11 supply centers were able to deadlock the 23 units of the alliance of the eastern powers. Turkey was able to win only by a more or less voluntary cession of supply centers by Russia.

POSTAL DIPLOMACY ROSTER REVISIONS

Charles Wells' postal Diplomacy bulletin, which briefly changed its name to Magazine and is so listed on p. 6, has resumed its former name, Lonely Mountain.

Dan Alderson has just brought out the first issues of two new SuperDiplomacy bulletins describing the progress of a second game. Mesklin Memes reports the moves, while The Toorey Triennial Tortoise carries the players' press releases. No subscription rates are given.

Diplomania has moved into high gear, not only in the controversy over the interpretation of postal Diplomacy rules, but also in the development of new forms of the game. Jerry Pournelle's rules for Economic Diplomacy, originally printed by Dan Alderson, have been reprinted in Diplomania #5.

Two variants are under way already in Diplomania. A game of Middle-Earth Diplomacy (see GRAUSTARK #76 and earlier issues of Diplomania) has been begun as TWJ-1966-DM. This game will not be listed in the GRAUSTARK register. The other is an anonymous game, in which no player will know the identity of any other. This game, TWJ-1966-EE in Diplomania and 1966J here, includes efforts by the players to find

out one another's identity. Pending release of the players' names at the close of the game, they are here listed by pseudonyms.

1965A IS ENDED, BUT THE PRESS RELEASES LINGER ON

WALES: A group of Turkish diplomats arrived from North Africa to discuss the Turkish forces moving from France into Russia and the Balkans.

MOSCOW: The Kremlin announced today that the recent meeting of the Sultan of Turkey and the Grand Duke resulted in the provinces of Austria occupied by Russia being ceded to Turkey. SEOUL: Yesterday a terrifying rumor began to circulate among the members of the international colony here. Everybody is talking about the rumored expedition the Russians have sent to reclaim Alaska. To partially substantiate the rumor is the report that the Imperial Navy of Japan was ordered on War Alert. All leaves have been cancelled. Are the eastern powers going to war with the United States?

MOSCOW: People are talking about the removal of the occupation forces from Austria-Hungary and Serbia. From all over the Russias rumors are spreading about long military trains moving eastward. If the rumors are true, then over 50 divisions (one million men) are on their way to Siberia.
