


Flagship Reliant, Copenhagen: Admiral Singh spoke today of the reduction of the German Imperial Forces to one unit.

GM to Europe: The A/E/F/T, E/F, E/F/R, and E/F/T proposals do not pass. The A/E/F/T and the E/F got one yes vote each; all the other votes were No, with four players voting on each proposal. Sorry, but I won't take your orders for draw proposals yet to be made; you must vote on each proposal as it occurs. (Please accept this fact of Hoodwink life as a courtesy to the complexity of my bookkeeping.)

Germany to France: Hope you are smart enough to believe me. Germany to Renown: Check it out. I can be very selfless. Suiciding out is an acceptable strategy.

Germany to Austira: A WAR-GAL? O ye of so little faith. France to Russia: You're right. Austria likes to lie to everybody. France to Austria: Thanks for offering to help me against Italy. And thank you for trying to get England to attack me. It's so nice of you.

Precious White to Dark Blue: It isn't very sporting to involve the Gamemaster in the Diplomatic proceedings. He has enough to do. Consider this as a punishment raid, not intended to stick. A certain amount of lying is expected in this game. Just don't involve the GM in your complicity. That's out of bounds in my book.

Russia to Turkey & Italy: Now you see what I've been talking about — a lying little Austrian weasel. Sic 'em.

Russia to Austria: Did you think that your return of what was mine would turn my brain to mush? I think not.

Vienna to Paris: What's with this English fleet in the Channel? You told me you and England had an agreement to demilitarize your borders. Were you lying to me... or is this the English stab I predicted?

Austria to "You Know Who You Are": I'm grieved at the abuse you're directing at me. So I attacked Russia — so did Turkey. England to Turkey: With France pulling off three units, you stand to gain this year. Italy, too. Here's hoping that one of you will gain Budapest.

England to Italy: Your belated build should be interesting. Aren't you glad you waited?

Turkey to England: Yeah! It's about time someone stuck France. Thanks a lot. I'll be nice in turn and stop hostilities in the north. France to Turkey: I don't want to argue with you about my beloved draw any more. Or about anything else, either. My priorities have suddenly changed. If you don't press Italy in the south, he'll be free to move north and so can you. I can hold the dog in the west for a while.

France to Perfidious Albion: I'm just too trusting. But I'm also overly vengeful. I'll do anything to stop you.


France to A/B/E (Anyone But England): OK, I've had my fun. Now it's your turn. England doesn't yet have this won, but he will if we don't get together now. I have no more ambition in this game than to stop the sorry sucker, and that means in the future I'll vote for any draw that doesn't include him and yield my centers to whoever can use them most in the anti-English fight.

France to Italy: Well, it didn't turn out the way I hoped. You do have a lot of maneuvering room to the north, but it will disappear if you don't move fast.

France to I/T: I'm proposing the I/T and will do whatever I can to see it come about. But you guys have to go for it. Among the three of us we have 18 centers to his 14, and he can't get the rest he needs to win if you guys don't squabble. If you're thinking about picking sides, remember that it was England who stabbed Germany and then me, while I passed up the chance to stab Italy any number of times. You both know I was a faithful ally to England and now I could be one to you. As an indication that I'm speaking truth, I'm bypassing Rome and Naples and leaving Budapest.

Italy to Ahimsahib: What the heck — what's a little treachery among friends?

Italy to France: Frankly, you both worry me.



GM to Europe: Here's how the voting went. On the G/I/T, it was 4 Yes (France, Italy and Turkey requesting it public) and 1 No (Germany, public). On the G/T, it was also 4 Yes (France, Germany and Turkey requesting it public) and 1 No. Newly proposed: G/I/R/T, G/T. Remember that  $NVR \neq No$ .

Turkey to the World: It appears that we have reached a stalemate that will not be broken. I am willing to join in any draw including myself and I am sure Germany feels the same way. Italy and Russia have played their part in reaching this stalemate and France has survived so I've no reason to not include them at this point, even against my disdain for 4- and 5-ways. Germany to Turkey: I will accept G/T, but never a G/I/T.

Italy to Germany: No, no, no — I was talking about way back in the beginning of the game when I asked you for an alliance against France. You said sure but you wanted Brest, Paris and Marseilles. I wanted to cut England in on the deal but you would have none of it. Can I produce your old letters and cards? No — do I look like the kind of packrat who saves all his game correspondence?

I got Brest on a fluke of misordering by John Schultz. I wrote my orders contingent on his moves. Look it up.

Italy to Turkey: I'll vote for the G/T, but only if you ask for it in our correspondence. Otherwise, let's let him stew in the stalemate for a while. I got time.





Also... while the Key Opening is a very powerful A/I opening, I suggest using it only in regular Diplomacy. It's too tricky for Gunboat play.

**England to Germany:** I think we could have a really strong alliance. Russia seems kinda inept and we could cause trouble elsewhere, too.

Rome to Vienna: I was going to move to Serbia but realized in time that would only break your Serbian support for the fleet move into Greece — support that would be necessary since Turkey is likely to go there also. Please note my fleet move — bypassing an extra build to go after the heathen Turk. The Pontiff has declared holy war and the Italian peoples are committed to the cause. Please consider an Austrian attack on Bulgaria while I'm keeping him busy at sea. My move back to Venice is only to guard against that army in Tyrolia; if you have pulled back, then I will also pull back. You can expect a fleet build in Naples — moving into the Ionian.... Remember Lepanto!



GM to Europe: Now proposed: F/I/R, R/I/T draws. Please remember that a proposal is not prevented from passing by anyone's omitting to vote, or as we say here, "NVR≠No." Also, please note that Russia owns SWE, not France as I incorrectly listed last issue.

Italy to All of Europe: Something's got to give — the continent canna stan' the strain!

### Crab press, continued:

Italy to Russia: Better get your fleet into the Black Sea quickly. If you hit him now while he's busy with me you can pick up some gains and remove a potential rival. Remember the *Holy War!* 

Italy to Turkey: Ho! Ho! Ho!

Rome to Paris: I agree. If you don't pick a fight, I won't either.

Germany to France: My "purely defensive" move was just that. I hope yours was, too.

Germany to England: I'm listening. I can't help but notice that you and France aren't getting along too well. Probably a side effect of strong fences.

Germany to Russia: Thank you for graciously ceding Sweden to us. In return, we have halted all patrols of our eastern frontier. The Kaiser looks forward to doing business with you again sometime.

Turkey to World: Oh boy, my predecessor really cooked my goose.

**Turkey to Russia:** You should back off and protect yourself. It seems the Germans are launching "Operation Barbarossa" a tad early.

Turkey to Austria: You'd better do a swift about-face. You stand to lose more than you will gain.

Turkey to I/G: Thanks for coming to my aid!
