This new series is to honor and make available to the Diplomacy world, copies of first issues of our pioneer Dippy 'zines. I know I was curious to see what they looked like and I'll bet you are, too.

This isse, we are featuring <u>Ruritania</u>, the second Diplomacy zine ever published. I was fortunate enough to borrow the first issue of it for copying from Rod Walker while I was at DIPCON IV. It is also quite a coincidence that during this week eight years ago, <u>Ruritania</u> was published for the first time. Although it has long since been defunct, <u>Ruritania</u> is still quite a notable and historic zine after making its first appearance a scant four months after Graustark #1.

Ruritania was published by Dave McDaniel of the Los Angeles Science Fiction Society for its first 26 issues. It was then taken over by John Boardman, where its game, 1963E, was carried to completion in issue #40. Dr. Boardman still has a few originals left of the later Ruritanias for anyone that is interested. They should prove to be real collector's items.

The game 1963E was notable in itself. It was the only postal game that our founder,

The game 1963B was notable in itself. It was the only postal game that our founder, Allan Calhamer, ever played in and was also one of the very few that John Boardman played in. In addition, it was the longest game ever played in the early years. A very interesting summary of the game was published by Dr. Boardman in Graustark #87 of 3 April 1966 (copies of which are still available from him) and is summarized below:

1963B: This second postal Diplomacy game was organized by Dave McDaniel, and included many of McDaniel's fellow Angelenos and members of the Los Angeles Science Fiction Society. The Russian player entered under the name of "Adhemar Grauhugel," but it soon became common knowledge that he was actually Bruce Pelz - husband of Austro-Hungarian player Dian Pelz. ((At the beginning of the game, Dian (Girard) was Bruce's fiancee. Sneaky, eh?!)) The Pelzes cooperated with Diplomacy inventor Allan Calhamer, playing Germany, in a very effective Drei-kaiserbund. Weak play by Tom Bulmer as Italy, and lack of coordination among the other players generally, led to the triumph of the Dreikaiserbund. By 1905 Calhamer concluded that he would be the next victim of the Family Compact, and anticipated this development by attacking the Pelz forces. An ill-timed double-cross of his sole remaining ally, Jack Root's France, started the German Kaiser downhill, as France promptly joined the combine against him.

In 1910, McDaniel ceased publication of Ruritania, and it passed to my management. Calhamer and Root also decided to withdraw, and their countries passed to Roland Tzudiker and John McCallum respectively. These two, in alliance, fought a well-played resistance against the Pelzes until Tzudiker was called up by the Air Force in 1916. (The game year 1916, of course.) McCallum, eliminated as France, carried on as Germany for two more years.

The failure of Austria-Hungary (Dian Pelz) to build a unit to which it was entitled at the end of 1917 meant that at the end of 1918 only 33 units were on the board. Of these, Russia (Eruce Pelz), had a majority, and hence was declared the winner. ((In the ensuing years, there has been much speculation as to whether Dian threw the game to Eruce. Will we ever know?!))

At the end of this period we will re-evaluate our financial condition, and a slight assessment may be made of member nations.
