### INTO THE ARCHIVES NO. 40

Interest in rating systems seems to be picking up lately as can be expected now that the hobby has grown to a point where there is a large body of games to be rated and the data on them is becoming more easily accessible. However, as the following articles by Rod Walker, one of the hobby's leading ratings authorities, will show you, there is still no general consensus as to which is the best rating system. As you can see, the Postal Diplomacy Rating Commission has a lot of work cut out for it!

#### THE ARBITRARY NATURE OF SO-CALLED "OBJECTIVE" RATING SYSTEMS

Doug Beyerlein's excellent article in Hoosier Archives #74 ("A Comparison of Rating Systems") raises one point which I believe needs to be examined more closely. His analysis is generally precise and objective. However, in commenting on the Numeron rating system, he notes that it "is also very generous to other survivors," suggesting that "this is considered by some to be the major drawback of the arbitrary style ratings." It is this statement with which I take issue.

Systems such as that in Numeron (or Antares) are often called "arbitrary" because a point system is designed by the rater and applied to players. The implication of the term "arbitrary" is two-fold: first, that the system is simply the personal whim of the rater and second, that the system is subjective and biased, somehow, better.

In my opinion, the zero-sum systems, and particularly those which do not assign points below draw or victory (such as the ODD system or the Calhauer Point Count) are far more arbitrary and subjective than the others.

This sort of system works well in a two-player game, such as chess, where a player can only win, lose, or draw. Diplomacy, however, is a multi-player game. Between the player who was first eliminated and the player who won, there are five other levels of performance.

The presumably "objective" ODD or CPC systems reduce these five players to the level of the seventh-zilch (or worse). The philosophy behind this is the attitude that those who have not won have, by definition, lost. That is a nice semanticism, but it is an unfair and arbitrary judgment. The performances of the six players who do not win vary widely in most games; any fool can look at a supply-center chart and see that this is true. Counting a second-place finish as a "loss" is not objective, nor is it fair, nor is it reasonable. It is based on a highly subjective sort of tunnel vision which sees 7 players but conceives of only 2 results.

It may be that the points assigned to various performances are "arbitrary." In every case I have seen, they represent an honest attempt by the rater to achieve an accurate numerical appraisal of performance. The problem of quantification is always an important one, but this should be discussed, not ignored. At least rating systems based on such quantifi-

cation are making honest attempts to deal with the real situation. They are not covering up the problem with the sophistic "if you don't win, you lose" notion.

It may also be, as is sometimes said, that counting supply centers is no real way of assessing position in a game. I must agree in part, but the number of centers held is a piece of raw data which is real and valid. It is easily verifiable and is in addition self-quantifying. Whatever shortcomings this data may have, I cannot think of any available data which are better suited to the task at hand--defining who did what in a game.

The so-called "arbitrary" systems are admittedly that. However, they are also honest. They do not pretend to be other than they are: subjective attempts to correlate available data. By contrast, I contend that the zero-sum win-loss systems are mere sophistry. By basing themselves entirely on one single datum (who won), these systems ignore other data which are at least as significant. To pretend that such systems are not arbitrary, or are not subjective, is mere sophistry. They are the most arbitrary and subjective of all rating systems.

As a side note, let me observe that one can observe the same attitude in one segment of the Vietnam debate. There are those who contend that there are only two sides of the war, "us" and "them", and that we can only be "winning" or "losing". I contend that a Diplomacy game can only be "won" or "lost" is on the same intellectual plane.

To repeat: I am not attacking or disagreeing with Doug Beyerlein's article, which I consider to be a fine one. I am merely dealing with an attitude which is widespread and which I feel is erroneous.

In sum, in my opinion, the ODD and CPC rating systems are neither fair nor accurate in rating players. Each system refuses to deal with the actual performance of 6 of the 7 players in the game. Deliberately ignoring 6/7 of the relevant data is no virtue. Nor can any confidence be placed in results achieved by such artificially and excessively selective methods.

#### ARCHIVES PUBLISHERS SURVEY

Since the "Archives Trading List" hasn't been published since Hedder Archives #52, it is about time to do it again. However, since I trade with all current publishers, I thought I would kill two birds with one stone and give you some additional information. Therefore, I have listed all publishers chronologically by the date that they began publishing without a break in publishing of more than 3 months. If any publisher had a break of more than that, I have footnoted the prior publishing periods. Although the great publishing boom of the last 2 years is reflected in the data below, it is still obvious that the attrition rate among Diplomacy publishers is something tremendous. It is a rare publisher indeed that lasts more than a couple of years. As of July 1971, there are over 100 publishing efforts in existence, and a good many of them have gone out of business. As of July 1971, only a handful of publishers are still going (prior to 1971).
