Re: rating publishers. I don't see this particular system. Most GMs who recommend, or at least list, 'zines with openings, can and often do say something about regularity and reliability.

The real problem is the new 'zines, and this system offers no real way of differentiating between them. In fact, there is probably no real way of telling much. You could rate on age and occupational status, I suppose. More important is this question: does he own his own machine? Are his fees adequate to meet his expenses? How long has he been in the hobby as a player, and what is his record in terms of missed moves, e.g.? Is he overinvolved as a player? Is he a good player? (A good player is usually a conscientious person because the negotiations require it.)

But still, what does a rating mean? John Koning and I would each have rated as high as possible the month before we disappeared. Charles Reinsel would rate as high as possible and I wouldn't recommend him as a GM to Buddy Tretick, even. No--I take that back. He's unemployed. (By the way, I would certainly reverse the scores given students and military. I have heard theses, finals, heavy course load and the like given as an excuse for delaying or quitting far more than an overseas assignment. The GMs who have started up, run off a few issues, and then

disappeared were heavily, almost primarily, students. And Rich Hull is no real example--when he stopped pubbing, he was being sent by the Navy back to school.

No, I think rating publishers is no real solution. I like Birsan's idea of getting new pubbers to serve some sort of "apprenticeship" with one or more orphan games (financed by IDA, of course) before they open games of their own. This program would have to be "voluntary", but in fact could be made almost compulsory by a "conspiracy of silence" on the part of established GMs, in refusing to recommend or even list new pubbers who had not served their "apprenticeships", and/or by having everybody urge a "wait and see" attitude to their readers (which will have the effect of discouraging players). It won't be a complete control, but it will help the situation a lot, especially if we have enthusiastic support from the GMs. They should give it--after all, when some GM starts up a bunch of games and then disappears, who has to pick up the slack? This will decrease that problem and also decrease the number of games orphaned in the first place--an ideal solution because it palliates and cures simultaneously!

Impassable here: As usual, Rod gives a lot of food for thought, and what he has just said about "apprenticeship" training for new publishers is quite a juicy thought for our consumption. Rod was one of two big boosters when I started publishing two years ago (March, 1972) with Impassable. I thought I was good and many told me I was good--right from the very beginning with the first issue. It was true that I did start off well organized for I thought and planned Impassable for a year prior to coming out with it. You would not believe all the planning, figuring, etc. I did! Anyhow, so thorough was my planning, etc., that I have not changed much since the first issue!

This great amount of planning is not always true with new publishers, and this is when we have problems. New publishers MUST BE MADE TO REALIZE how much work is involved in (cont. pg. 9, col. 1)

Rome, January 1910: The Italian government revealed today that an offer of peace had been made to the English government. The government spokesman stated that King Ginzo had offered the English a guarantee that there would be no invasion of the British Isles if the English would withdraw their forces from all other areas of Europe and position them in the British homeland. The King was quoted as saying that he would prefer

the British to maintain one fleet and two armies but he would be satisfied if they kept two fleets.

((Can't)) With all these errors compounded by an erroneous "error correction" report, the Autumn/Winter 1909 season is postponed. Remember that the Russian F Nth must now retreat elsewhere.

publishing and running your own games. In my mind, there are two types of drop-out pubbers: a) The one who drops out early due to lack of planning and knowing how much work was involved, and b) Those who stick with it and burn themselves out by overdoing it. Rod has suffered the latter, and many other good publishers have suffered the latter, but we are primarily concerned about the former. This is where most of our drop-out pubbers come from. The latest idea in the hobby is that what Rod mentioned about giving orphan games to new publishers as an apprenticeship for them. This could be enforced by a pact of silence among experienced publishers, but the idea of doing it would be controversial enough to make it fail if enough experienced publishers don't go along with the silence. In my case, an apprenticeship would have slowed my entry, and who is to say I or others don't deserve to do all they can when they're worth it? The big problem is deciding when the apprenticeship is over. How long a period of time? Are we to consider quality of work as a criterion? Perhaps the best thing to do would be to simply make know to all players that the publisher is new and not proven. We can only say, then, that the players must be cautious about new publishers when they start out. Despite my good start, quality wise, my growth was slow enough to try any ambitious publisher--if you don't get your games filled because the word is being spread around that you're new and not proven, you may just drop out anyway! So, this is food for thought and very volatile of a subject. Any other comments? We thank Rod for correcting our "erroneous answers" to his puzzle. We didn't think we were right on any other than the last one about who's "ex"--what, you mean you don't know?

On the good side, we don't smoke or use matches in a nervous habit.....

Most of the other news has been with IDA. I've already mentioned the DW crisis, but the IDA is making great progress in other areas of unifying the hobby. Great strides are being made in England, for example, to remove any feeling there that the IDA is an American organization to dominate the world. Getting off track, you might notice a large number of English traders in our address list. England has a sizeable group (larger than Canada, I think) of publishers and they're all good! The sad part is that international games are prohibitive costwise. The IDA is doing a lot in trying to bridge the gap between North America and Europe, but gaps as big as the Atlantic will take time to close.

Back to people, the word or rumor has it that Conrad von Metzke will be cutting back on his activities in the hobby. As you all know, he's one of the pillars of the hobby in that he does much of the statistical record-keeping. He's in charge of assigning Boardman numbers for all regular games, and he does a host of other things too numerous for us to even remember! Predictably, his superhuman output of work is draining him. We hope that his new plan to spread the work around with regards to the Boardman numbers will help solve his crisis. What he does is a valuable service to the hobby, and if he can't do it, then I don't know who can. If he can't, then I'll be the first to propose that IDA try taking over the job. (Conrad, that's not a threat, so don't write me a nasty letter!) The big tradition is that the Boardman number assigner is independent of any hobby organization. Of course, the IDA has been the only one to last more than a year, and the IDA itself is only a bit over 2 years! Nevertheless, the IDA is going strong, and no matter what happens, it will be a force to

keep the hobby going smoothly and efficiently. Okay, enough news, a little article material? We have a reply from Bill Conner on his rating system versus Len's rating system (see Impassable's #30 and #31). See below!

RABONE RATING SYSTEM VERSUS THE DOUG BEYERLEIN MEMORIAL RATING CARNIVAL SYSTEM COMMENTS

by Bill Conner

The comparison of these two systems leads to an item by item analysis.

The RABONE System is easier to understand, simpler to use, and deals with small quantity positive numbers.

The Doug Beyerlein MRC System is more mathematically accurate, more impressive, generally, and expanded well upon the excellent Rogue's Gallery base ((another of Len Lakofka's rating systems)).

Both of these systems share startling new concepts in relationship to other current rating systems by taking into account supply centers won, years of play, and national difficulty (ND) factors as a basis of their rating.

Both of these systems also share the refreshing idea of rating a substitute player with what he earns rather than what he has inherited.

The RABONE system applies the ND factor as a handicap at the beginning of each new concept similar to a handicap system currently used in golf, bowling, etc. In practice this amounts to giving Italy and Austria a three (3) point head start over Russia in what would normally be a game ended with roughly 30 points for the winner. The ND factor is stronger in the Doug Beyerlein MRC System than in the RABONE System; stronger meaning more weight.

The RABONE system applies supply center points on a basis of one earned gets one point. The Doug Beyerlein MRC System applies supply center point factors in a couple of manners with the result that they probably account for 90% of a country's point earnings as compared to 25% for the Rabone System.

The RABONE System applies year points on a basis of one Fall survived earns one point with the result that the majority of points available for earning are year points; which contrasts sharply with the Doug Beyerlein MRC System.

In fact, it is probably safe to say that the biggest difference in this comparison is that the RABONE System puts most emphasis and subsequently most points on years played with

the idea that they will cancel each other out by being identical for all original surviving players. It has been clearly objected that this factor should be weightless by applying a fraction to the RABONE System Years Points such as dividing by two (3.4 or 5) or multiplying the other two factors ND and Supply Centers by two (3.4 or 5).

And, the Doug Beyerlein MRC System applies a multiplication factor based upon years against all points earned to derive the total game points. In short, the formula shows the French example earning 1.66 points in the basic formula multiplied by the year factor of 1.0 (9/9) for a total of 1.66 game points. A possible side twist of this example could have been France in a different setting, earning 1.66 points in the basic formula multiplied by a year factor of 50% (5 years survived of a 10 year game) for a total of 0.83 game points. This multiplication factor could be a very strong factor also.

In curiosity, what do others think about the RABONE year factor being divided by 2, 3, 4, or 5? As an alternative, what do others think about the RABONE ND and Supply Center factors being multiplied by 2, 3, 4, or 5? The object under question is to increase the weight of earned supply centers (winning) versus time of years spent (survival).

That leads to another curiosity question, what does the general player think about winning compared to surviving?

1. Is winning vastly more important than surviving?

2. Is surviving under-rated in most current rating systems?

3. Should rating systems such as RABONE and the Doug Beyerlein MRC Systems be encouraged to force the consideration of survival factors and energy spent (year points) with ND (national difficulty points) as alternate evaluation criteria to be built into comparisons with the concept of winning only?

4. Will anyone both to say: they are asking me---the everyday 'zine reader to express an opinion on some subject? Will any of your just plain guy readers respond, John? Or will they just leave it to Doug, Len, Edi, you and me?

((Come on, you readers! If you don't want to risk having your opinion printed in this gamezine, then why don't you write to Bill in private/secret? I'm sure he'll appreciate hearing from you! Yet, I'll accept any good criticism of these two rating systems!

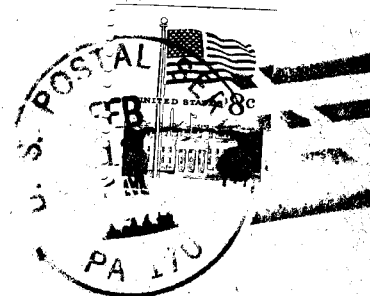
STILL MORE ON WAR
