NEWS of the diplomacy hobby

Well, let's see now. There isn't that much to report on except in the area of plugs and private efforts....

Letters to John Beshara have further cleared up many mysteries in my mind about TDA. For whatever it is and for whatever it stands for, it is an operating organization and it is providing some services. Many could complain about it being dominated by Mr. Beshara, but then it is an admitted private organization funded in part by Mr. Beshara's own funds. Their \$1.00 membership dues is lower than that of IDA's, but they don't have to publish an organizational newsletter-not being a democratic organization. As it is, it is a private effort with people who think alike trying to do what they think needs to be done. If you don't like to be bothered about elections, whether someone is usurping your powers, etc. and just want to join a "club" organization, then TDA will do for

The Diplomacy Association is the hobby's first organization open to everyone. Since its inception in 1971, TDA has maintained its membership fee at a nominal dollar a year. Checks should be made payable and mailed to:

In contrast, the IDA (International Diplomacy Association) is a democratic organization, also open to all, but designed to operate on democratic principles, ie., elect officials to lead the efforts to provide services, etc. This organization was founded in 1972. Its membership has also been steady at \$2.00 ever since its inception. However, for the extra dollar, members do get the organizational newsletter, <u>Diplomacy Review</u>.

Both organizations are working in their own way to provide services and products.
One of IDA products has been the production

of the 1974 Handbook--a collection of articles by some of the best writers in this hobby. The IDA also provide services in game insurance, and has several committees working on the problems of the hobby.

My concern is that there are little or no duplication of efforts between TDA and IDA. The people have their choice of organizations and can belong to either or both. I for myself have recently rejoined TDA. My personal preference, from long association with IDA, is of course for IDA, but that doesn't mean that IDA and TDA can't work together to help keep the hobby functioning smoothly.

There is little news on Gordon Anderson and his El Conquistador. Unsupported rumors indicate he is having financial problems, but whatever the case, I have not heard from any source of El Con coming out. In fact, I have heard of one source stating that it has not come out.

The hobby does face problems such as these gamezines folding with the orphaning of many games. The problem is accentuated by the fact that orphans are not easily relocated in new homes since most publishers have already filled their own zines with games. As an example I am now currently running 14 games with one more to start fairly soon. Then, I'm hoping to get a demonstration game going of some of the best known players with the best records possible. Then again, I'm also running a non-dippy game of Bull Run. So, if I were to go kaput. you can see the problems that would arise. My demise would affect 15 games and some 75 players and two gamezines. So, it is a problem which seems to have no easy solutions.

Local news are that I will be working overtime for this and the next month at the least. Maybe a third month of overtime will be needed at work, but whatever it will mean I will be busier than usual. This may or may not affect quality of the gamezines I'm publishing. It should not, but I will not be able to publish between weekends. Thus, if I am sick like I was during the Valentine/Geo. Washington holidays, I can't publish and the publication will have to wait until the next open publishing slot (in this case it was next weekend—the zine being effected being the Calking Awards Committeezine.)

I bought a new VW car-this one's called the RABBIT. So, you could say I traded my bug for a rabbit (laugh). It is very nice and gets up to 38 mpg. With the automatic and extra weight from soundproofing, I'm not

Then I wanted to get NADPS #2 out in Diplomacy World, and I didn't want to get #2 out until results of #1 were printed somewhere, so I wrote an article for DW. When I got back to school I found an unpleasant surprise. When Edi Birsan decided that he wanted the British to do something similar to the MADPS, I told him that I would not count the thing; I told the same to Pete Swanson, who directed the survey in Britain; but the forms were sent to me anyway, uncounted. Fortunately there were only 28, and since I had not typed up the results for the NA version, I decided to tally the British piecemeal (total time was 3+ hours, and I had no intention of taking that much time all at one shot). So the results follow, with overseas (actually European) results in double parentheses unless otherwise shown. Let me make it absolutely clear that I will not tally overseas ballots again. The only means I have for retaining my sanity is to count a few forms a day, which I cannot do for Europe. Moreover, if the British think surveys are worth doing, then they ought to think they're worth counting. If they don't feel like going to the trouble of it, why should I? If the British want to work out something to let Birsan count them, that's fine with me.

Something I've learned through surveys is that people don't read very thoroughly. Another is that a lot of people like to make little cracks--"dumb question". "meaningless". "poor organization"--not constructive criticism, not anything that includes a suggestion about how to do better, just bad-mouthing. This is something one has to live with in the knowledge that most people think any question is pk even if a few don't. You should see the questions I reject!

If someone wants me to correlate between two results (non-mathematically, i.e.) then give me your reasons and I'll try to do so this summer. There will be no NADPS (at least. not by me) this summer. I hope that some people will do special interest surveys at that time.

I am giving results in very abbreviated form, little more than raw scores. For more details see DW 1-6.

IMPASSABLE'S HISTORY COURSE Part Two--Spain

((Our readers will remember the four-part series on Poland. With this issue we will begin our second national history course with a study of Spain. We hope you'll enjoy reading the crap. Ed.)) Spain, Span. España, sovereign state (194,449 sq. mi.; pop. c. 30,817,000, incl. Balearic and Canary Islands), SW Europe; cap. Madrid. In Africa Spain has Spanizh Sahara, Spanish Guinea, and Ifni. Continental Spain occupies Iberian peninsula except Portugal and Andorra. It stretches from Pyrenees (boundary with France) and the Bay of Biscay in the N to the Strait of Gibraltar in the S. It has a long Mediterranean coast in the E and SE. Atlantic shores in the NW and the SW. Central Spain is a vast plateau, the Meseta Central, between the Cantabrian Mts. in the N and the Sierra (con. pg. 12, col. 1)

SPANISH HISTORY, CONT.

Morena in the S. It is cut by mountains : (notably the Sierra de Guadarrama) and river valleys (Douro, Tagus, Guadiana). N of the Meseta the Ebro flows to the Mediterranean. In the S the climate is subtropical; the great river is the Guadlaquivir. Spanish products are mostly agriculture--citrus fruit, olives, grapes (such wines as sherry and Malaga are well known), vegetables, cork, and cereals. Much of the soil of the Meseta, however, has been exhausted by sheep grazing and poor care. From the mountains come various minerals (eg., copper, iron), and fishing is a major industry on the coasts. Industry has been developed particularly around Madrid, around Barcelona, and in the NW (Basque Provs.). Though there are strong elements of unity in Spain (e.g., Roman Catholicism is at least nominally almost universal), there are regional variations. The standard language is Castillian Spanish, but there are dialects. In two regions (Catalonia and the Basque Provinces) non-Spanish languages are spoken, and there have h been many moves to autonomy or independence. Other regional divisions are more or less related to medieval kingdoms and historical provinces, among them: Andalusia, Aragon, Asturias, Old and New Castile, Estremadura, Galicia, Leon, Murcia, Navarre, Valencia


