# NEWS OF THE DIPLOMACY HOBBY

Douglas Beyerlein and Marie Cockrell were married last month in Chicago. They will live at 240 Hawthorne, Apt. F, Palo Alto, CA 94306. Will Mr. & Mrs. Boardman Numbers please forward the number for Novice Game #11?

The issue of copyrighted material in the hobby has hit a new peak. Rod Walker is printing copyrighted material, or at least a lot of it with editorializing has taken the position that copyrighting your material in hobby publications is against the traditions of the Diplomacy hobby. His main target is, however, TDA which makes a practice of copyrighting their material. I wish to note that IDA has also copyrighted two Handbooks which in total means many more articles than TDA has copyrighted!

The point is that more than TDA alone copyright material. The reason these people or IDA or anybody copyright material is up to them. Though this hobby has been founded on amateurism and friendship, the time has come to recognize that the hobby is slowly moving towards professionalism. The point of making money has not yet been reached, but someday that will also come about. To copyright your material is quite legal and there are legal safeguards.

My personal opinion is that if someone wants to copyright their material, fine with me. I probably will never publish it as it will in most cases be too much bother to get permission, but I would ask permission! I prefer that there be no copyrighting in the hobby, but it exists in the outside world and we are unavoidably attached to it whether we like our fantasies more than real life.

Mention is made in Speculum #16 (Dave Kadlecsek) of denouncing the Calhamer Awards. TIDA are apparently going to do their best to "ruin" the Calhamer Awards. To do so, they intend to block vote for special candidates, or whatever. This potential threat to the Calhamer Awards has a special interest to me since I'm the chairman of the currently inactive IDA Committee to Advise on the Awards (fancy title I just looked up). Actually, the awards, or any awards for that fact, do not have meaning unless the participants are serious about them.

It is my personal opinion that the Calhamer Awards should be continued, but basically limited to publisher awards. If publishers are going to sabotage the awards, then they're less likely to sabotage the

awards if they're primarily publisher awards. I think that the publishers know more than the average player since they trade and gm games. To counter-act claims of "elitism" the awards will have to be restricted to publishing awards with others directly related to publishing. Then, the voting will be limited to publishers only. The international community in this hobby is much too large to allow a player-wide vote on any practical basis. Facts of life, I would say, but the committee is not yet finished on its deliberations (once it gets going again--delay due to my lack of time the past two months of overtime work for my company).

Quite a few comments have been made in various hobby zines about the Gemignani Awards. The GAs are an antithesis of the Calhamer Awards--instead of the most outstanding, they are voting for the least outstanding (the worst). Margaret Gemignani, after which these awards were named has written to retract her name, but to no avail. The GAs are a tough joke at best and I will not publish the ballot--anyway, they've been published often enough for most main-stream fans to have gotten one by now.....

To late to print in last issue was a bit of interesting information: I received one of those chain letters along the line of "Think a Prayer" and Bad Luck if you don't, good luck if you don't break the chain. The postmark was from Chicago and the last name on the list was: Gordon W. Anderson.....

The Anderson Protest (to use a dignified title) of IDA's handling of the elections is continuing. I have received a third-hand copy of what Anderson has been printing--it didn't make much sense to me, but I wrote him a reply at his new address. Haven't heard from him yet. As for the controversy, the IDA is in the process of concluding its referendum of the membership on the question.

One of the many services provided by the International Diplomacy Association is the International Subscription Exchange. Edi Birsan and David Johnson handle the U.S. and Britain ends, respectively, of the chain set up to make transfer of money easier. I myself just got a notice of money made available to me for a Handbook order...so it is useful and saves a lot of trouble. ## FRANKLY SPEAKING . . . by Francis McIlvaine

## THE HONEST REVIEW

Advertising makes or breaks many services and products. In Diplomacy there are two primary ways to advertise, through direct mail samples or through referrals also known as 'plugs'. Direct mail is a very nice way to let someone see your product but it is very expensive. New zines typically direct mail a few issues out to friends or people that they have addresses from mailing lists of one sort or another. This is a generally expensive way of doing business. In the Diplomacy zine business profit margins are almost non-existent. Sending out a lot of samples is not a very productive way to get subscribers, some people will not want your zine because they don't want to enter another game, some because they don't like your format, some because they are broke, etc. A much better way for this direct mail system to work is to have someone write to you (enclosing a stamp or two) and ask for a sample. This way you know the person has at the very least marginal interest in getting your zine, the free sample then becomes a good investment, and even better the person making the request has sent the stamp for the zine thereby eliminating your marginal cost for the issue. I assume that you have printed a few extras so the cost of giving one of those extras away is only the cost of the stamp.

With that type of system you must be mentioned by some people to attract the attention of those looking for games. This also is a very good way of a gamesmaster with no openings of providing his readers with a service, a game opening section. Plugs are usually very short descriptions of the zine and usually are more concerned with rates than with content. There is also an 'Honest Review'. An Honest review is one that knocks the zine to be reviewed. This, by contrast, assumes that good reviews are dishonest, a connotation that I object to. Oh, I'll admit that I have seen 'Honest reviews' that didn't knock anyone but the usual connotation is one of knocking.

I am not saying that a gamesmaster should favorably review a magazine he doesn't like, not at all. There are a few ways that this can be handled. If an editor gets a zine he feels is less than adequate he can simply not review it. Even if the first issue is bad, that is no reason to assume that the person editing it will not get better with experience. Anyway, giving an Honest Review to a new zine is fairly rare as they are reserved for the big zines. A very good way to start a feud.

About the only review of a new zine, of the 'Honest' type, that I have seen was a review of BINARY in which the author knocked Harry Riley and his zine. No matter how good or poor this article was, the timing was horrible because Harry Riley ((the publisher)) had died just before that from a brain hemorrhage. The editor of the magazine then apologized in the next issue for running that article saying that at least Harry had never read the article. Had Harry lived through his ordeal and as recovering read this article I doubt that it would have aided his recovery at all. It is a totally subjective sort of thing anyway you read a zine and hate it, I read it and love it. Since it is traditional for zines to give away samples for a stamp or two each member of the Diplomacy community can receive a copy, if he is interested, and decide for himself if he enjoys the material or not.

Diplomacy World has had more 'Honest Reviews' than any other zine I have ever seen. It has been knocked by a few zines over and over again. Heck, even if I was a firm believer of these articles I would have to get a sample just to see what the fuss was over. One zine after knocking Diplomacy World complained that in Walt's listing of openings he had left theirs out, this shows the uniting effect that this zine has and its importance. To my way of thinking, it is a sign of class that Diplomacy World does not feel that it is desirable to knock those zines in return and start a feud.

To sum up I feel that you should always be honest in your reviews and if you feel a zine is not up to par you can simply remain silent about that zine. An exception is after you have published a favorable review of a zine and that zine has gone sour, in that case I would think it is your obligation to pass on the news to your readers. I would think this would apply in cases where the zine was failing to appear with any regularity or lack of interest had reduced the zine from a good one to a sloppy thrown-together job. A minor change such as turning from a press writers' zine to a zine with many articles could be reported or not as a news item. The knocking of another zine without good reason does the hobby no good, in this hobby we are all able to make up our own minds on the merits of a

zine if we are given a sample copy. One bit of advice is never subscribe to a zine without asking for a sample. I have done this a few times on recommendations and in a few cases I did not like the zine, thereby wasting the editors time in sending me the zine and my own money. The only one who gains in such a transaction is the post office. #end#

SPAIN, PART FOUR, The  
Monarchists and the Republicans,  
or, Whatever Happened to them  
Democrats?

The Napoleonic invasion helped bring on the wars of independence in Latin America which had by 1825 stripped Spain of most of its empire (with Cuba, Puerto Rico, and the Phillipines to be lost later in the Spanish-American War). In Spain itself conservatives and liberals struggled endlessly. Ferdinand's changing of the law of succession in favor of his daughter, Isabella II, brought on the first uprising of the Carlists (1836-39). Reactionary monarchists, constitutional monarchists, and republicans vied for power. Isabella had to abdicate (1868), as did her successor, Amadeus (1873). A brief republic (1873-74) was torn by new wars. In 1876 Alfonso XII was put on the throne; he was succeeded in 1885 by Alfonso XIII, who kept Spain neutral in World War I, supported the Primo De Rivera, dictatorship (1923-30); was deposed 1931, when republic was established. Election of a radical coalition in 1936 precipitated military uprising. The bloody civil war was won by Insurgents in 1939, and Franco set up a corporate state. Fascistic Spain sympathized with the Axis in World War II, though legally neutral. Drawn into the Western alliance in 1953, when U.S. agreed to military and economic aid in return for installation of air and naval bases, Spain was admitted to the UN in 1955. In 1958 Spain ceded its former protectorate of Spanish Morocco to new kingdom of Morocco, but the status of Ifni and Spanish Sahara remained in dispute. The 1947 law of succession

declared Spain a monarchy, with Franco as head of state pending the choice of a king. No attempt had been made to restore the Bourbons as of 1973. The End.

F. The Calhamer Awards--got a few ideas on how to wrap this one up quickly....

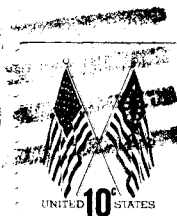
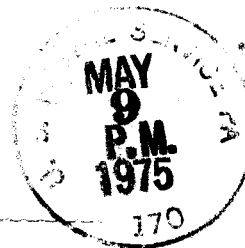
