My congratulations, again, to the winner, Joe Hrbek for a long and perservering game. Jim Fish also finished well with Russia and has a chance in the Championship Game. What follows is Joe's victory statement.

Having suffered through this game for three years, including a month-long cross-country trip and a seven month cruise through the Orient, it seems such a part of my monthly routine that I find it hard to believe that it is finally over. From my point of view as Italy, I can attribute my victory to luck and one firm alliance. The luck resulted from a strategic mistake by the original players of France and Germany. They had stag d an attack on Italy and Austria and had superior position; for some reason, they changed their mind and withdrew. By that time, we had formed a grand alliance between Italy, Austria, and Russia, and having made peace with each other, we went ahead with out master plan against France and Germany and England. The going was slow but steady and after a few seasons, the result became obvious. The one alliance was the original one between myself and Jim Pyle of Austria. We reached an understanding to work for a tie in 1901 and stuck to it until he quit the game. We included Russia in our

grand alliance when it was needed for our survival but had to turn on him when he started to grow too big too fast. Our attack was well planned and it succeeded to the extent that Russia effectively became a puppet of Austria, with our guarantee of third place as a reward. When Pyle quit, I wrote Jim Fish and suggested that we keep the spoils among the original players so we pulled a nasty on Austria ((Ball)). From then on, Russia and Italy cooperated to the fullest extent and I think we both benefited despite the early bad feelings that existed between us. I think I owe a vote of thanks to both Jim Pyle and Jim Fish for their cooperation and a well done to John Boyer for running an outstanding game and 'zine.

From John Baker:

...."If the STAR TREK movie is a success, the TV series will be revived. They were considering getting another alien like Spock but the makeup and time consumed applying it was too expensive.

Whatever happened to the Postal Dippy Tourney proposed by Paul Boymel in DW I, 1? Did anything ever come of it? I doubt it, as I haven't heard anything of it and I understand that Paul has recently dropped out of the hobby, but why doesn't someone revive it as a multi-zine arrangement? You seem to have something of the sort (I am going by your mention of a Championship Game) but this is apparently a one-zine thing. Referring again to DIPLOMACY WORLD I,1, I suggest that the idea be revived, though it should be biennial rather than annual; three rounds in one year is out of the question, and it might have to be triennial. Why don't you run something in the next IMPASSABLE about this? I would be willing to be either or both administrators, unless, as Paul put it, "a more experienced player were to desire to perform both administrative tasks." I would suggest these modifications to his outline:

Two games in the first round (see A., 1. in his outline). The entry fee would be used strictly for the prize fund (see B.) Several scoring systems might be proposed and, probably after the tourney has started, be voted on by the players, the plurality winning. (C.)

(D. 1.) is very much optional, and probably not even desirable. This should be a simple tournament, and I do not see how IDA sponsorship would help in any way; the gamefees would be separate from the entry fee, and the only expense I can think of (other than postage, which the administrators will probably waive) would be the prize fund, which would be paid for by the entry fees. IDA sponsorship might well bog it down in a hobby-wide debate.

Note that gamemasters could run and consider this as just another game; after all, there are always openings, and all this would do would be to keep people from playing in more than two tournament games. If gamesmasters supported it, I don't think that the tournament would have any trouble.

Well, what do you think? Is it worth a try?"

WHY FEDERATE?

BY LEW PULSIPHER

IDA has an international problem to solve: what can be done to be sure that people of areas of the world other than North America don't become dissatisfied with the IDA structure. There are two vital conditions to be considered. First, there is a fear of American domination in Dippy fandom in other countries. Probably most of us in NA laugh at this as unrealistic and unfounded, but it is there and it must be taken into account. Second, there are limitations of mail service (speed or expense) which make it impractical for there to be much interaction between countries (or more accurately, mailing regions) at the lower or "grass roots" level. The North American Diplomacy Players' Survey results indicate that no more than 5% of the total of non-publishing NA players read any overseas zine regularly. Even among those who do, the average is less than four per person.

Unfortunately, "international" has become a magic word to some people. There are realistic measures that can be taken to promote international cooperation, but an attempt to bring fandom together at the lower levels is doomed (as we have seen), even now when most of us speak some form of English. Few seem to be thinking of what will happen when there are hundreds of postal Dip players who do not speak English at all. The effort at the lower level, that is, with a large proportion of hobbyists including many non-publishers, is doomed because the basic activity in Dippydom is playing DIPLOMACY, and international games are very expensive and time-consuming. When players become active in large numbers who don't speak English well enough to play comfortably in that language, this will be even more the case.

An "international Diplomacy Review" is not a solution, it is a straw grasped by those who still think of the word "international" as an invocation or incantation. What is there to talk about? The average Joe Dip-player, even many publishers, just doesn't have any stake in anything in the hobby outside of his little circle of zines and friends, and there is no reason why he should have. Once he has satisfied his needs, why bother with elsewhere? It's just a goddamn hobby, not a way of life. To a few of us the hobby IS almost a way of life, but we lifers must remember that most other people think differently.

There are two types of material which could be of interest to persons of more than one mailing region. First would be general news of the hobby, articles such as Pete Birks' in the latest Diplomacy World, etc.--all material that ought to go to the largest circulation zine in the hobby, and the one (I think) a Britisher said was the only real international zine, Diplomacy World. The second type of material would be the same kind of thing one finds in Council Courier and Queen Victoria's Funeral pertaining to administration of international programs and to the creation of new programs and services. Now how many fans are interested in this kind of thing? 25? 15? Certainly not enough to justify the expense of sending the material to all IDA members in an international Diplomacy Review. What will most people do with such a thing? Glance at it, maybe read a few things, forget it, waste it, that's all. And we still have the language problem--what do we do when we have 40 German-speaking and 40 French-speaking members? An international DR would help their leaders (who, I would guess, will be likely to speak English competently) but it won't do a thing for most of them.

I favor a federal structure for IDA (hereafter referred to as International Diplomacy Federation to differentiate it from regional orgs). Federation will permit each mailing-language region to handle its own affairs with minimal interference and no fear of domination by Americans or others. If the British fear American domination, what will the Germans or French or Spanish think? At least British and North Americans all speak versions of the same language, and have close cultural-historical ties. As each mailing-language region is introduced to DIPLOMACY, as the Germans recently were, then the IDF (and not the North American DA, which is what it has been in effect up to now) can encourage the new people to form their own organization. This doesn't preclude help from the more developed regions: they can offer to help in various ways, but they should never try to force their aid on new regions. One of the British-NA problems has been that Edi Birsan and a few others have tried to force their help and participation in the affairs of the British Region, and naturally the British have reacted somewhat negatively to this ignorant interference. Germans French, etc., won't act differently, either. It is abundantly clear from the British experience that IDA-F cannot hope to incorporate new people directly into the NA IDA, and

that, even when an autonomous region is established the older regions will have to lean over backwards to try (probably unsuccessfully) to calm the fears of the new region.

In the federal structure, each region would look out for its own internal affairs. This would extend to the form of government-administration--there would be no requirement that the IDA region would have to have elections or anything else. It would not be possible for the IDF to completely avoid some interference in internal affairs because the IDF Council would have to decide which group, if any, to recognize as IDA for that region. Each region would select (in whatever way it chose) representatives for the International Council (which would, in case it is not clear, be completely separate from the North American Council). Each region would contribute funds to the Council in proportion to the number of representatives it was entitled to. The number of representatives per region would be considered according to the population of the region, or perhaps to the postal Dip-playing population of the region, not to the number of members. Number of members depends too much on the kind of structure involved in the regional organization, dues levels, etc. No one wants to see membership lists padded just so that a region can have more reps. No one wants to force regional organizations to recruit warm bodies in order to look good. The only requirement would be that the regional organization be the most representative group in that region that wished to join IDF.

There would have to be some kind of matching of number of reps with populations which would prevent dominance by a large region, such as NA, yet would avoid the UN mini-state problem. One means might be to have the largest one-third of the regional organizations to have 3 reps, the middle third two reps, and the lower third to have one rep. For now, with only two regions, both would get three reps. The reps could also be officers of the region, but not necessarily so. These reps would be the IDF Council. They would elect a chairman and an editor (not necessarily from among themselves). These jobs might be combined. Probably a rep of the largest regional org would serve as temporary chairman. Terms for reps would be set by the regional organizations. The editor would publish a zine with the deliberations of the Council, to be available for comments and subs to anyone. This would serve as a kind of international DR, but only those people interested in international affairs would receive it, with non-Council members subscribing to it as they would to any other zine. The Council would be a forum for discussing, creating, and supporting international projects and services. Just as IDA regional organizations serve as instruments for recruiting workers, the IDF would recruit workers for international projects.

People in unorganized regions could join nearby organized regions until their own area becomes organized.

I sometimes wonder about the flap for international cooperation. I see little evidence of real effort in some phases of the hobby to promote international cooperation in the most logical manner. For example, someone familiar with most NA zines (I am not), and with British tastes insofar as they differ from our own, could write a detailed review-description of them and send it to the IDA/UK so that the latter can get it published with the largest circulation obtainable. The reverse could be done with publication in DW. I'm sure more subs and even trades would be started if only people knew what they were missing. Right now, it is virtually impossible to get any useful information about the British hobby from American zines, and I suspect the situation is about the same in Britain for the American hobby. Most people have too much inertia to start digging around to get information--you have to put it in a very accessible place (like DW) or they just won't bother.

The only way we can possibly become the big happy family that Birsan seems to envision is from the top down. Attempts to further alter the non-federal structure will disappoint the British, disturb the Americans, and still force another revision when non-English-speaking people become a large section of the hobby... The end.

((Comments from this Editor: I largely agree with the substance of Lew's article. I have myself urged federation of IDA to make it truly international in fact as in name. My only basic differences with Lew is in the structure of IDF's International Council. I feel that membership on the Council as such should be on a one-for-one basis with each organized region having a representative. I feel that having more than 10 will cause problems in the deliberations of such an international council. It is difficult enough now for the NA Council to act by the postal system with its 12 or so members! But, the point has been well made. IDA does need to become federated. I would also welcome a separate Canadian regional organization since they are now a region represented on the NA Council.))

((Anyone out there with his own ideas, please forward them to this Editor and I'll print them. My opinions on this are that any such tournament's main problems would be its length and the need for many gamesmasters to be involved since we couldn't limit the tournament to just a few games. Any such tournament, furthermore, should be a type of elimination, I should think, thus requiring perhaps more than 3 games. Any ideas? Send them in! My own Championship game, by the way, is for the winners/best players of the first seven novice games. It is now waiting the conclusion of the last of the first seven: 1972BW.))

From Rod Walker:

"I do not mind people talking about what I'm doing. I am annoyed, however, when the talk is wholly inaccurate.

While it is true that I am copywriting my 'zine, I wish you had had the kindness to note that I have in writing declared the copyright null and void with respect to all postal Diplomacy publishers (with 5 named exceptions).

Your "invitational publishers group" would be unnecessary if people in the hobby simply realized that reprint rights between 'zines should be and (with a few exceptions) are virtually unlimited.

However, I think the idea has merit. I would certainly be willing to join if you got started, and to help the initial formation. I do not approve of copyright as a means of preventing reprint. I do approve of it as a method of protecting a financial interest...but in this hobby, that excuse is not likely to be valid in most instances." ((So far, Rod is the only publisher to have commented to me in letter about my proposed organization in last issue of Impassable. Any others are interested? Let me know!))

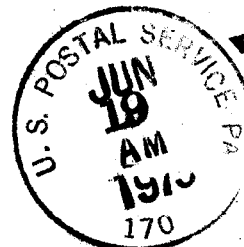
