A total of 15 players played in this game which is a poor situation, but I think that the game is pretty well balanced and the play was undoubtedly influenced by the many changes during the game. By congratulations go to Mark Tonnesen for his win as Scotland in the very first game of this variant!

FINALE: Army Cas-Lim....As much as I enjoyed being in this game, it is my feeling that the game would have been more interesting if there had not been so much inconsistency. This inconsistency when I entered the game manifested itself in the lack of consistent play by the smaller powers (Kymru, Leinster, Munster). This is especially true in the case of Munster. The failure to coordinate moves and the number of missed moves made it a rather easy task for Scotland and Orkney to press forward their united attack. This inconsistent play, above all, enabled Scotland to gain the win since the other players were able to maintain a consistently united effort to stand up against the growing power of Scotland ((ED. insert "never" after the word, "were")).

# NEWS OF THE DIPLOMACY HOBBY

Well, the news are a bit fragmentary in my head this time around, but let's get on with it piecemeal, and perhaps we'll cover a good bit of ground....

1. Lew Pulsipher, 423 N. Main St., Bellevue, MI 49021, has finished a playtest version of WAR OF THE RING (LOTR triology dip variant). It is available to anyone for the price of 25¢ third class or 35¢ first class. Map is 5 pages and the rules are 5 pages. There is also a poll attached which you can answer and return with your opinions. This is the first time that I have heard of this "feedback" technique being used to work on a dip variant, but then it should be a great aid for Lew when he comes out with his "official" and final version.

Comments are being printed here and there and a few letters to me indicate that there is at least a little support for an unofficial organization of publishers to guarantee free flow of dippy materials. would suspect that what's holding publishers back is that everyone is getting a bit sick over all these dippy organizations and they certainly don't want another one! Well, I am encouraged enough with this small amount of support to widen the base purpose to a general organization of publishers/gms! But, I'll start this when I have time to do it and not before. Also, I will run it with a heavy, but fair, hand since I know people don't want to have to argue about how to vote or decide the important issues. It would remain an informal group (not as an organization as such) of publishers/gms who are invited by myself to join me in my casual effort to link bonds and to improve our "understandings", etc. More on this when I feel that I can handle it:

Polls, I feel, can be an IMPORTANT technique to evaluate opinions and trends in our hobby--provided it is done right. I hope to begin my own series of mini-polls on various questions with this issue (look for it), but mostly dealing with what I want to find out and with my own publications as a "feed-back" type of poll. Lew Pulsipher with his North American Diplomacy Players' Poll has achieved a lot of results and it is just a matter of reading it all through since it is massive in contents. I am, hopefully, going to finish the 1st poll with this issue and begin covering the 2nd issue by issue with the next. It is simply too long to cover in one issue!

Ever hear of SMOF? I didn't until Lew sent me a carbon copy announcement made in behalf of SMOF members. I can't be sure it is a joke or not, but I'll print it here as news of a sort....

SMOF Now Accepting Members The Secret Masters of Fandom (SMOF, pronounced smoff) are searching for energetic new blood to help in the arduous task of organizing all worthy projects which go on in Dippydom without seeming to. SMOF is forced to adopt contemporary methods to keep up with the growth of hobby activity--hence this announcement. SMOF is the oldest club in DIPLOMACY Fandom. We operate in the most democratic manner. Each candidate can become a member only by 2/3 vote of the present SMOFs. Moreover, only the Chief Secret Master of Fandom knows who the other SMOFs are, in order to prevent undue or unfair influence by one member on another in votes. There is a written Constitution which the Chief Secret Master of Fandom interprets. Among other things, this means that only the Chief Secret Master of Fandom or his designate decides which candidates are placed before the SMOFs for a membership vote. Since money should not be a criterion of ability or usefulness, SMOF charges no membership fee. SMOFs are expected to work hard, however. From Doug Beyerlein:

Brian Bailey (who, I believe, is still a member of IDA) sits all alone in New Guinea; should he represent himself? This would all have to be worked out in advance, but I believe the idea that you have is a sound one.

on the subject of Larry Peery, I thought that I might tell what I know. I had the opportunity to visit with him for about four hours last October when I was down in San Diego. From what he said I have the impression that he is out of the hobby for good. His series on country strategy was reviewed as being rather poor by most people in the know and this undoubtedly discouraged him from continuing past what he had done on Austria and England. However, more importantly, he is really into building up his Institute of Diplomatic Studies into a real profit-making enterprise. He is apparently spending most of his time and money on this pursuit. Also, I believe that he has returned to graduate school and is getting some type of funding there for all of his Rand-type studies. Well, I do dig your theme, man, but you see, man, you know that this hobby is sortof youngish and since I do happen to like guy even though he's gay, I was making a "pun" with it. The inclusion of those under 21 would, I suspect, include about 90% of the hobby. But, I am older than you, that's for sure since I'm the ancient age of 28 (the only thing that matters is how old you think ....), you know, I do have a little bit of trouble remembering how much I knew when I was your sweet 16 age! I can tell you know, you know man, that things haven't changed since Alexander the Great conquered the world at the age of 16 (except you need a degree or 10 years of background experience in technological warfare) except that we live in a more complicated. Sorry to have offend any young, whippersnappers out there! Hee, hee! Croak! Cough, cough....))

From Lew Pulsipher:

"I don't understand your concern about copyrighting. Copyrighting has a long history in hobby zines. TDA copyrighted the last issue of WAZIR in June 1972, but there have been many non-TDA copyrights since then and there were probably some before. Blood and Iron, Yggdrasill Chronicle, the IDA Handbooks, and even Arena (Edi Birsan's zine) have been copyrighted at one time or another. Even when no copyright is involved, the tradition since I've been active in the hobby (and I don't date back into the 60's) was for people to ask permission before reprinting articles. Are you saying, John, that you want people to be able to reprint without asking for permission? Or that if someone asks permission and is refused, they ought to reprint anyway? If you're not saying either of these things, then you haven't a thing to worry about copyrighting. If you ARE saying one of these things, then you're advocating something that would cause a great deal of hard feeling and which would help keep the hobby on the adolescent level. I recognize that there are times when reprinting a sentence or two, in order to be fair to someone you are criticizing, may be desirable; but paraphrasing can get around this difficulty.

I worry much more about possible indiscriminate reprinting than about any restrictions that might result from a spate of copyrighting.

Changing the subject a bit, whatever happened to the "New Blood" lists we used to see in zines? Has it become a general policy to sit on such addresses so that the "other side" won't get to them?

The "new" flyer seems to have just come out. I say "new" because the announcement from GRI went out last year before DipCon, and Walt Buchanan and John Moot checked the list at the Con. I don't know what the hold up was, but I heard that other people had given GRI some advice, and from one source I heard that there was no flyer at all in the game, new or old. But I've recently received the first inquiry about BI mentioning the flyer, so it seems to have come out while everyone was talking..."

((What I am for is to have free exchange of dippy material without restrictions. If I, John Boyer, print something in Impassable, those who read it can reprint it without asking me since I have not put any restrictions on it. The only thing I ask is for a copy of the reprint and source being given. Now, as for copyrighting, I am

against the idea of turning our tradition into a legalized, formal format. I feel that considering the informal nature of our hobby and the fact nobody makes money, that to go and actually copyright your material is showing your adolescent tendencies! As a rule. I don't reprint material as I usually get enough from yourself or anyone else to provide sufficient material to fill these pages. Others like to reprint stuff, mostly to criticize or to downgrade. There are those will continue to abuse the hobby's tradition (polite protection of your authorship) and it won't matter what you do-they will still abuse the practice. So, some others get their material copyrighted. Fine, this amounts to no difference, technically, from the "hobby's tradition", but it provides for a legal basis to prosecute. What is going to happen when these people find these abusers still abusing their material despite it being copyrighted? The results will be interesting, to say the best. The worst to happen is that the hobby turns professional that much quicker. Everyone taking on a more formal, business-like approach to the hobby. Forms to fill out in your intentions of paying gamefees. Promises signed to finish the game, or be penalized by a heavy fine. Really, I'm just satirizing the possible results, but we would no longer be on a "fiendishly friendly" basis. The hobby would no longer be strictly that! why I proposed a group willing to exchange materials freely without having to resort to asking for permission and to avoid getting into copyrighting of material. I ask for permission from those who I have not made prior arrangements. This "group" would merely list those who agree to this arrangement. That is all. The arrangement is to continue the hobby's tradition and to not to copyright your material.

I get too many inquiries via the GRI flyer to publish the list in Impassable (I never really made that a practice). What I do is provide my own zine as a sample, give my personal advice and recommend other gamezines with openings. I also refer them to Joel Klein of IDA's Novice Packet Committee. He and the others including Drews and Correll do an excliently-done zine for these newcomers.

By the way, Edi Birsan, alias President BirSauron of IDA, has proposed recently in setting up a group of people with one box number to handle all the inquiries. They

would print listings of newcomers and mail them out to publishers who need them. Also, they would handle the questions asked and to funnel all the inquiries into one post office address. This would do away with the problems of the current GRI flyer system when publishers on that list keep moving around and changing addresses, or drop out of the hobby. The single address would be maintained by an organization (IDA) and members operating through it would vary as the personnel change, but it would keep the same address. Of course, my opinion is that this might work if we can find a geographical location which always will have dippy people around to get the mail out of that address!))

That covers the letters for this issue. There are a few articles to be printed and so without further delay, let's get to them:

# FLIP SIDE OF THE COIN by Steve McLendon

I must admit I was pretty disgusted with the way things were going on here—Watergate, inflation, energy shortages, etc. I almost hated to read the paper or listen to the 6:00 news. I was looking forward to my trip to Moscow. I had never heard of any problems like that in the Soviet Union and I could not help but feel that they had things under control.

After about 17 hours of flying, we landed at the airport and I could tell right away that I was in Russia. Soviet troops were everywhere. At a civilian airport, Soviet troops were everywhere. Our Soviet hosts by-passed us around customs so we did not have to go through that ordeal. I did not see one smile on the face of any Soviet soldier. They were strictly business, and one had better not forget it.

During the next six weeks I tried to learn as much as I could about life in the Soviet Union. I will try to relay to you, with as much objectivity as I can, what I learned in those six weeks.

Moscow is a very clean city (not modern, but clean). You don't find 10 or 15 bill-boards to a block, which was refreshing. There are even cigarette urns every 100 feet or so, so you don't throw your butts in the street.

The public transportation in Moscow is exceptional. You can take a subway (which is extremely clean and beautiful), a trolley, or even a taxi. Fares are cheap, too. You (cont. next page)

can ride the subway all over the city for about 10 cents.

Restaurants and street-side snack bars are everywhere. You never have to search long for a place to eat. The only shortcoming I found is the service. It is really crummy. A waiter, since everything is owned by the state, gets paid the same whether he turns a table over 5 times in one night or once. They don't have to hustle to satisfy the customers.

There is no such thing as checking accounts in Moscow. Everything is cash. But there are savings accounts. Interest rate on savings is 26. Interest rate on loans is 36.

Housing is a serious problem. I never saw so many apartment buildings, tremendously huge apartment buildings, under construction. Suppose you are a young man, a Soviet citizen, and you are ready to move out on your own, away from the family. Well, you have to get on a waiting list--about 2 years. When your name comes up the state assigns you an apartment, without regard to your work location. One consolation here is that your rent on the apartment is only about 6 rubles per month (1 ruble=\$1.35). But each Soviet citizen is allowed only 90 square feet to live in. So if you are married with 2 children the state assigns you a 360 square feet apartment. (And I thought my 700 square feet apartment was too small for me!)

Many of us have moved from one part of the country to another; Philadelphia to Chicago, etc. No problem here. But for a Russian to move from one part of Russia to another he must obtain a visa (yes, just like a foreigner only it is a permanent visa). But there is so much red tape in getting this visa most Russians stay put.

If a Russian wants to buy a car, again he has to get on a waiting list--3 to 4 years. When your name comes up it will cost you between 8,000 and 10,000 rubles. But if a foreigner wants to buy a car, and pays in foreign currency, (dollars, pounds, etc.) he can get that car for 1/3 that price--and immediately.

There are stores and bars in Moscow that accept only foreign currency, no rubles. The price for an item in these stores is 1/2 the price that item sells for in a Russian store. Usually the quality of items in these stores is much higher than items in Russian stores. When I say "Russian store" I mean those that the average Russian has

to shop in, because it is against the law for Soviet Citizens to have foreign currency.

Consider the last two paragraphs. How would you like to live in a country where your government gave a higher priority and better conditions to foreigners than you were allowed?

Everyone works in Russia. Everyone pulls his own weight (you can be arrest d and thrown in a labor camp if you are out of work more than 30 days). It is commonplace to see women driving steamrollers or an 80-year old woman shovelling snow off the streets in the dead of winter.

In Russia there are no drive-in groceries, hamburger stands, etc. that we are used to. Public radio and TV is limited. So many things that we Americans take for granted is denied the average Russian. It would take too much space to list them all.

Throughout the Soviet Union there is a shadow over the land—the shadow of the KGB, the Soviet secret police. Everywhere I went in Moscow I felt this shadow. So does every Russian in the Soviet Union. The Soviet Politburo rules the people through the KGB. There is only one way a very small group of people can rule 200 million people—fear and terror. It is this fact about life in the Soviet Union which stands out more than any other. The Russian people have been made robots and servants of the state, lacking incentive and stripped of spirit.

Yet the Russian people themselves are, in general, very friendly. I made many friends in Russia and cherish them all. If you stop a Russian in the street, simply to make conversation, chances are he will oblige you (if you can speak Russian). If you tried that in this country chances are you'll get a quick brush-off. The Russians are real people. They laugh, cry, and express emotions just like anyone else. I left Moscow with a fondness for them I had no thought would ever develop.

In my dealings with the Russians I have also visited Austria, Germany, Switzerland, Spain, and England. Six countries altogether. In not one did I see a standard of living as good as ours. In not one did I see lower prices.

Now, I am not saying that we should pat ourselves on the back and forget our troubles because we are better off than anyone else. But I think Americans do tend to downgrade their own country a little too much. Over there, Americans are treated with more respect than any other foreigners (especially in Russia, I was surprised to

discover). I didn't really appreciate the fact that I was an American; I took it for granted--until I saw the flip side of the coin.

# TENTATIVE PLAN

FOR CHOOSING A DIPCON SITE

This doesn't deserve to be called an article, but I wanted a title so that it would stand out a bit. Unlike my normal practice for articles, this is the first and only draft of this "article" that I'll write, so bear with me.

The IDA, as the only mass-membership DIPLOMACY organization, is considering the possibility of taking part in some way in the selection of the DipCon site. (For an account of the selection process-when there was any-for previous DipCons see Rod Walker's article in the Mar-Apr DipLomacy Review) While IDA has no real authority over the DipCon, neither does anyone else, and the IDA must in any case choose a site for its annual general meeting. But let's get on to a possible plan.

One possibility is to have a committee choose the site every year. This doesn't jive with hobby traditions (of democracy), but more important it leaves a very important and potentially explosive decision in the hands of a few people. Going to science fiction fandom for some precedents, we could have the previous convention choose the site for the next. In SF fandom this is done two years ahead of time. It is unreasonable to expect, however, that at present any group can prepare a case for its site, complete with preliminary plans and reservation of a location, a year before the convention is to take place. Perhaps this will occur in the future, but now we cannot expect any group to be fully prepared more than four or five months before the convention is to take place.

SF fandom suggests an alternative. The voting for the SF WorldCon site takes place by mail as well as in person. Only members

of the WorldCon may vote to choose the site of the future Con--e.g., the members of last year's con chose Kansas City as the site for the WorldCon in 1976. Persons who want to vote for the site (and also for the Hugo Awards) but who do not intend to attend the present WorldCon can take a supporting membership in the present WorldCon, which is a reduced price version of normal membership. (Groups bidding for the WorldCon begin selling pre-supporting memberships perhaps a year before voting takes place. After a site is selected, the group begins to sell supporting memberships, which may be turned into attending memberships, and attending memberships ((sic)). The price of both continues to rise as the time of DipCon approaches; rumors are that attending membership at the door in 1976 will cost \$50-100 in an effort to keep attendance within controllable limits (say, 4-5,000).

Perhaps we could try something of the same sort. One difference we have with SF fandom is that there is no mass-membership fan organization in SF fandom at all comparable to IDA. IDZ can probably be considered somewhat more trustworthy than any group holding a convention, especially one doing so for the first time. The existence of IDA is especially important because we cannot expect people to plan two years ahead, as explained above. I suggest that IDA ought to supervise a postal vote for the DipCon site, with voting being limited to persons who contribute, say, \$1 towards the costs for taking the vote, but the rest will be given to the convention to help defray expenses. The vote would be taken along about March so that there would be plenty of time for publicity and for people to make plans to go. The only practical period for holding a DipCon is from about June 15 to August 20, when everyone is out of school. (Months other than June-August were hardly mentioned in reply to the NADPS #2 question about the best month for the con).

IDA would have to establish a more or less permanent committee (though not necessarily with the same personnel every year) to take care of administration of this vote. The committee would also have another important function: to decide which sites would be put on the ballot. First, criteria would have to be established for what constitutes a well-organized and reliable group wishing to hold a convention (Convention, Committee, as it's called in SF fandom). Each ConComm would be expected to advertise

in hobby zines in order to convince voters that their site would be best, but it is possible to advertise without having anything concrete to back you up, and here the IDA committee would have to make a judgement. Also, if a regional rotation were established, the IDA Comm would have to decide whether to waive the rotation if, in their opinion, the available ConComms were of poor quality (or if none from the region in questions were bidding for the con). (SF fandom rotates the. WorldCon among 3 North American regions and the rest of the world; usually by the time voting takes place all but 2-3 ConComms have dropped efforts to win the vote.)

The Council would appoint the members of the IDA Committee, probably one per region (if a rotation is used) plus a chairman (and in accordance with the IDA Constitution, the IDA President would also be a member). Final voting would be by Australian ballot both in order to obtain a majority opinion and also to avoid sabotage. In order to avoid problems about a "World" DipCon (a rather foolish idea at this stage anyway), the con would be known as the "North American DipCon".

What criteria would be involved in determining which ConComm was best? Every ConComm would be expected to have a clear organization with Chairman, Tournament Director, Publicity Director, Treasurer, Facilities Director, and perhaps other officers. The more pominent the members of the ConComm are, the better the chances that they will put on a good convention. One-man conventions, or conventions with "front" committees in which one man does all the work, cannot be expected to be as reliable as conventions in which many are involved. The ConComm would be expected to have a building or buildings reserved formally by the time of the voting, and proof of this might be required by the IDA supervising committee. Prior experience of the members of the ConComm would be a good selling point. In fact, in SF fandom most WorldCons are expansions of regional conventions which are held each year. Thus a group which has held an annual convention of noteworthy size for the past three years would be expected to be more reliable than a committee which was established exclusively for one convention. Financial backing would be another serious question, especially if a ConComm plans to hold the DipCon in a hotel, since this inevitably leads to heavy losses with the

present levels of attendance at DipCons. Probably the best place financially for a DipCon where all the participants are staying in the same place would be at a University This year conventions are being held at Universities, using University dorms for housing at very low rates (\$4 a night in one case), at Detroit, Cincinnati, and Baltimore, and probably at other locations as well.

It would not be difficult to include the Calhamer Awards preliminary voting (if there is any hobby-wide voting at all) in the same operation with the site selection. The same "contribution" of \$1 or so would cover both. The advantage of the contribution, besides providing money for administrative purposes and to defray costs of the con, is that only serious people would participate.

If IDA chooses to establish a DipCon Site Committee, I will probably be chairman, I hope that anyone who is interested in this problem will write to me or write John for publication in <a href="Impassable">Impassable</a>. (Lew Pulsipher, 423 N. Main St., Bellevue, MI 49021).

To me, the individuals who have not learned to control their ideas are slowing down progress of the whole hobby. Some say we should begin to ignore them, others continue to play their disputes in big print.

Progress are made by a few, but they cannot do so if there is no peace in the hobby.
