TACTICS, STRATEGY AND GRAND STRATEGY: A PROBLEM IN DEFINITION

((Another excellent article by Ron Stephens! I like the way this guy writes, and he has "arrived" just in time to replace our aging authors who have apparently lost all of their ideas or energy to write. Welcome to the writers. Ron!))

Any seasoned diplomat will concede the necessity of deliberate obfuscation in the negotiations process. After all, what more certain way is there to unsuccessfully negotiate than to sharply and painfully delineate points of certain conflict and disagreement? However, there are still some areas existent where a great deal of needless obfuscation occurs. This serves only to "muddy" communications and inaccurately convey meaning to another.

Among the most bandied about terms in simulation games and in game magazines and among armchair military theorists are <u>tactics</u> and <u>strategy</u>. I am not interested in the causes for this. Rather, I am interested in providing a basis for usage of the terms and possible application of the concepts embodied. In so doing, perhaps the hobby will in some small way benefit.

One common misconception is that tactics is subordinate to strategy or forms a sub-set that is basically included in strategic considerations. This may often appear to be so but in fact, both tactics and strategy are fairly distinct. Strategy deals with the planning and carrying out of projects which involve movement of forces while tactics deals with the processes of moving or the mere handling of forces.

Strategy is derived from the French "strategie" which means in essence, "office of general" or "generalship." Thus, strategy should properly be restricted to mean the practice of combining or emphasizing the means which military theory and reality afford for the purpose of planning and directing great military movements and operations, i.e., generalship.

Tactics, on the other hand, is concerned with manuevers or procedures of movement. It comes from the Latin word "tacticus" and pertains to arrangement or order especially when applied to war.

Both these words are primarily limited to military and battlefield application. They fail to cover the overview of the war, although <u>strategy</u> is often misused in this context. For this larger area, the term <u>grand strategy</u> is most useful.

Grand strategy supercedes strategy. It is the greater or national view of campaigns and battles as a whole which takes into account political, psychological, economic; and social implications as well as the narrower military or strategic considerations. Grand strategy includes the various diplomatic arts which many times have tremendous strategic and, hence, tactical value. The classic example is the power which loses every military engagement yet succeeds in its grand strategy objectives because of skillful negotiations, of having exhausted the enemies' resources, of having created a positive public opinion, of having exhausted an enemies' will to fight, etc.

In <u>Diplomacy</u>, it is my view that tactics are a minor consideration as units are so large in size as to diminish the value of great tactical expertise. Movements do not require great tactical skill. Rather, it is in strategy or the long range planning of movements that a player will be able to attain his objectives. Thus, limited tactical skill is not a very great liability in <u>Diplomacy</u> but a serious deficiency in strategy is invariably disastrous to a player.

Even more devastating is a lack of an adequate grand strategy. <u>Diplomacy</u> is an unique simulation game in that each player occupies a totalitarian leader's position of being solely responsible for and being able to command his own tactics, strategy and grand strategy.

Historically, few of the great military figures had complete control of this operational triad. In democracies and republics, grand strategy is reserved as a governmental perogative subject to the approbation of the masses. Cromwell's trials with Parliament during the English Civil War, the changing command of the Army of the Potomac during the American Civil War and Epimanondas' problems with the citizenry of Thebes against Sparta serve as illustrations of this.

These same limitations governing formulation of grand strategy are evident in totalitarian regimes also. Belisarius' problems with the Byzantine emperor's jealousy, the Czar's ineptitude in the Russo-Japanese and First World Wars, and Von Moltke's problems with his sovereign amply illustrate this dependency on head of state or popular opinion to fulfill military objectives.

Rome: The proposal to concede to me is interesting and welcome, but hardly likely to succeed. This game has had more than its share of shifts in the basis of power, and now a chain of events has worked to place onnce-lowly Russia in the ascendant. My position is only mediocre: my failure to anticipate that Mahler would combine his turn on Russia with a stab of Italy, and my typographic mistake (inadvertently changing Ven-Pie to Ven-Tyo when submitting a change of other orders) that allowed Austria into Piedmont both worked to slow my tempo by creating incursions on my position that required and require inordinate force and time to excise. Meanwhile, Germany has

given Russia Denmark and, more importantly, the collapse of Beyerlein tactics and attention (failing to retreat A War and letting A Mos be annihilated) since his marriage has let Russia get his shoulders well off the mat. With room to build and a wide front to advance on a Russian-Italian race to the center of the board would be a close-run thing only if I'm lucky.

The most outstanding examples of historical military leaders who were able to control tactics, strategy and grand strategy and who were able to decisively influence events, can be reduced to three men. In <u>Diplomacy</u> each player has the opportunities available to Napoleon, Alexander, and Frederick. With this potential, it seems imperative that an effective player be able to differentiate between tactics, strategy and grand strategy as well as effectively formulate

and carryout each.

There is no lack of tactical and strategic talent in play by mail <u>Diplomacy</u> (at least in so far as it is possible to measure tactical ability). Instead, there seems to me to be a dreadful repetition of developments analogous to the Austro-Prussian War of 1866, the Franco-Prussian War of 1870 and the Russo-Japanese War of 1904-1905. In these cases, the attacker profits not so much from his own expertise in strategy and grand strategy as he does from the graver blunders of the defender. Thus, many games are not determined by good effective grand strategy so much as who's grand strategy has less mistakes in its fulfillment. (Sorry! To be concluded nextish!)
