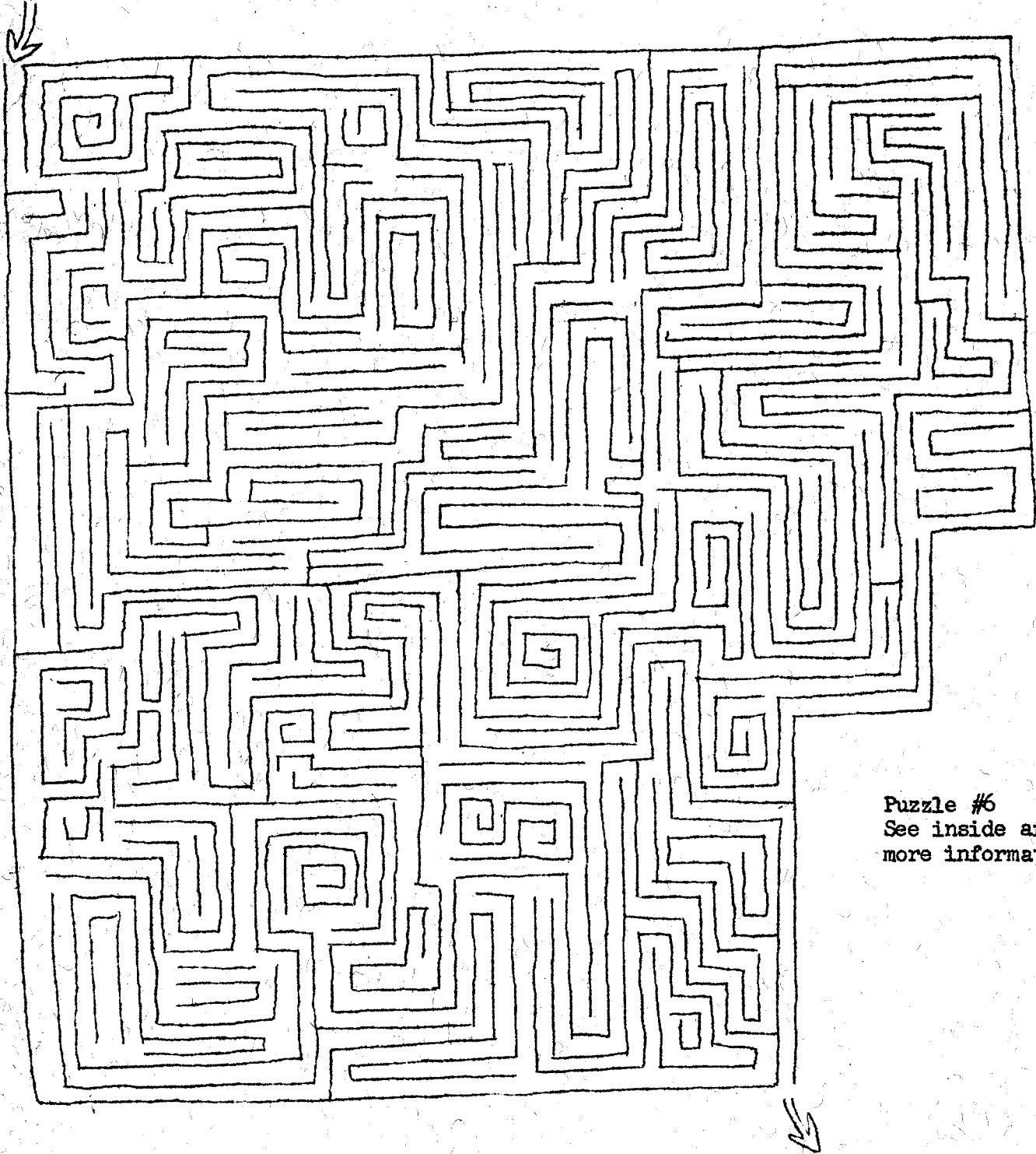

PUZZLE #6

I thought that I would do a different kind of a puzzle. Since it was big in area, and not altogether lacking a pleasing look, I put it on page one as a cover. It is a maze puzzle with only one path and one solution only. I checked it for errors and found none. Thus, I hope you all will enjoy the puzzle. The puzzle is called "Labyrinth" and was taken from a book of mazes by Vladimir Koziakin. It has a rated time of 15 minutes to solve. Can you beat that time? In any case, don't expect to see a solution for it as it would take up too much space. Have fun. (Caution: If you don't want to ruin the front cover of your "precious" Impassable, try using tracing paper.--Ed.)

THAT EASY SOLUTION FOR PUZZLE #5

The miser places three coins on each pan of the balance. If these coins do not balance, the counterfeit coin is one of the three coins in the higher pan. The teller then takes these three coins and proceeds to the second weighing by taking two of these three coins and placing one on each pan of the balance. If these two coins balance, then the third coin is counterfeit. If they do not balance, the counterfeit coin is in the higher pan. Now, suppose the three coins in each pan balance; then the six coins are good. Hence, the counterfeit coin is one of the remaining two. The miser then weighs these two coins to determine which one is good.

OPTIONS

by Douglas Beyerlein

Impassable is both happy and proud to present another original article by Douglas Beyerlein. Doug is an eminent Diplomacy player in this country, and appears on many polls as one of the best around. We take our hats off to another fine article from Doug. We hope that our readers will enjoy this article on "Options" while learning some of the finer techniques at the same time. Again, many thanks are extended to Doug for a very fine effort.

An option is the potential ability to change from one strategy or alliance pattern to another. Having as many options as possible in the game of Diplomacy is very important. Options allow a player to prevent or retaliate against a stab, change from an unproductive to a game-winning alliance, or do whatever is needed to win. In other words, having a variety of options is insurance against unforeseen events.

Options are important in every stage of a game. However, they are most critical and numerous at the start of a game. Assuming that there are no pre-set alliances each player is somewhat uncertain as to what the other six players will do until the Spring 1901 moves are published. It is then in this initial stage of the game where having options can make all the difference.

Options are dependent upon the plans of the other countries on the board. As a commitment is directly opposite to an option each player should try to get the neighboring countries committed to a line of action away from one's own country at the start of the game. This reduces your opponents' options and increases yours. Some examples of how this should be done follow. (1) Germany can try to get England committed to an attack on France with the move by England of F Lon-Eng on the Spring '01 turn. At the same time Germany is neutral to France with the conventional opening of A Mun-Ruh, A Ber-Kie, F Kie-Den. England now has little choice but to continue its assault on France (especially if France decides to retaliate after seeing the English fleet in the Channel) while Germany has the option to attack France, England, or Russia after its 1901 gain of neutral supply centers. If Germany does not want the English attack to succeed it can tell France of the planned attack and thus commit both of its neighbors while retaining its options. Obviously Germany could also work it the other way around with France instead of England moving to the Channel.

(2) Austria can attempt to commit Turkey to moving A Smy-Arm. If this is achieved on the Spring 1901 turn Austria is almost guaranteed of a Russo-Turkish war while Austria is yet to be committed to either side. The Austrian player may then ally with either Turkey, Russia, or even Italy after spending 1901 protecting its borders and grabbing up Serbia and Greece in the Balkans. With Russia and Turkey committed to a war Austria can assess the situation and then join the side which offers the best chance of future growth.

As from the above examples it can be seen that the interior powers (Germany, Italy, Austria) can make the best use of options and commitments. This is because they are the most exposed to attack and therefore must force the exterior countries to fight among themselves to give the interior powers a chance to win. However, the exterior powers can also make good use of options if they want to do so although it is not as critical to their success.

Options can be a disadvantage in special situations. When an initial game alliance involves a quick stab and blitz of a third party it is very important that there be no delays. The commitment is total, but the potential rewards great. If a player tries to be too uncommitted at the start of a game in order to retain all possible options that player will likely find all the neighboring powers converging on him and all his options now useless. Thus, it is the right combination of alliance commitments and open options which separate the winners from the losers. And of course remember this is all a result of good diplomacy and nothing more. Used as such success is only 18 supply centers away.

HOW ABOUT AN ARTICLE FROM OUR NOVICE PLAYERS?

Doug asked if I could get one of my new players to write an article on how things look when entering into the hobby. Indeed, I, myself, had written such an article in Issue #2 of Impassable entitled, "The Trials And Ordeals Of A Beginner."

Rome, 2 May, 1901--King Ernesto il Ginzo today demanded that Austro-Hungarian authorities cease harassing Italian tourists at the border. He threatened to send Italian forces into Trieste to ensure proper treatment of Italian nationals. When queried by the press as to why the King didn't order Austrians held for similar "virtue checks", King Ginzo responded that he didn't think that there were enough virtuous people in Austria-Hungary to make the endeavor worthwhile.

St. Petersburg, Jan 15th 1901--The Russian War Office announced today that due to Revolutions sweeping Galicia, the Ukraine and Sweden military units of Imperial Russia have been put on full alert. The fleet at St. Petersburg has been ordered with a full complement of Imperial Marines to Sweden to put down the revolt there. The First and Second Imperial Armies have been ordered to Galicia and the Ukraine to suppress uprisings in those areas. Minister of the Interior, Prince Andrei Narishkin revealed that the uprisings were the result of the followers of the revolutionary Karl Marx and expressed the hope that the civilized countries of Europe would help squash this threat to order.

Sevastopol, 18th Jan 1901--Commander of the Black Sea Fleet, Grand Duke Sergi Eisenstein ordered the Fleet to sea on its annual maneuvers. The Duke said he hoped to meet his Turkish opposite and share some of the excellent Vodka that he had brought with him.

Turkey--The Sultan of Turkey has been drugged. He remembers nothing. All of his correspondence has vanished. Will the allies please refresh his memory on his commitments?

Venice, 1 May, 1901--Italian border authorities today reported that Austrian guards were harassing Italian citizens who were passing into Austria. Muttering something about virtue checks, the Austrians were requiring all good looking young Italian females to spend several hours in the customs house before being allowed to pass into Austria.

Vienna (LRV), March 12, 1901--An unidentified source today announced that the Dictator has planned a meeting tomorrow with the Joint Chiefs of Staff. The reason was not given, but it is believed to concern all of Europe since several top ambassadors have been reported to have returned in the last few days from their posts. The recent threats of a general outbreak of hostilities throughout Europe is thought to be the reason.

Vienna (LRV), March 13, 1901--The results of a ten-hour meeting today between the Dictator and the Joint Chiefs of Staff were released just recently. As suspected, it

concerned the threat of war throughout the continent. The First Army has been ordered to move to and capture Serbia, the First Fleet is to move to Greece subduing Albania first, the Second Army has been given the task of protecting the Capital and protecting the coast. Due to the great strain upon the Dictator from these meetings, it was announced that he will be away from the Capital for the next few weeks.

GAME ANALYSIS--This game is fortunate to have Lenard Lakofka analyze as the play develops. Indeed, even before the war started, Len had written a Winter, 1900 "analysis":

The first annual Vienna Conclave to study the properties of unusual communications, which were dubbed 'Telepathy' by senior research analyst Dr. Johnathan T. Bower in his paper 'Impassable and Unlausable Properties of Mental Phenomenon, convened on March 8, 1900.

Preemptive to this conclave, a series of experiments in the great capitals of Europe had taken place, and each had sent one representative who demonstrated unusually profound 'telepathic' powers. These seven persons were: Doctor Otto von Kraut, research physicist at Berlin University; the renown 'the great Humdinger,' Mr. Hubert Heratio Humdinger, an Italian Caberet performer and mind reader; Camel dealer Aliben Pasha Sid Yid; Moisseur Pierrie Landau, Professor of Kinematics at Paris University; General Akim Asimov of the Czar's Imperial Guard; Mr. Francis Grauarch, a reporter for the Vienna Daily Blab, and Miss Wilman Lutush, a lady of calling from London's lower west side.

"My distinguished guests," said Dr. Bower while staring at Miss Lutush's assets, "our first experiment shall be to try to pool your telepathic abilities on a common verse and see if it can be transmitted."

So the group sent forth their moody verse:

"I do not know beneath what sky,
Nor on what seas shall be thy fate,
I only know it shall be high,
I only know it shall be great."

And across all of Europe persons turned from side to side to catch a glimpse of the unseen poet, discourses trailed off as men's minds were caught by the short quatrain, and deep, in what man called 'space', a consciousness was touched.

At once the power each could wield became apparent--in their union great

Winter, 1900 propaganda--

Constantinople (Dec. 14, 1900), Reuters-- Abdul Hamid II, Sultan of Turkey, announced today the deployment of naval squadrons and several regiments of Janissaries along the Russian frontier. He said that this was a result of the inordinate territorial demands made by the Russian Czar. "To have yielded to such demands would have sacrificed the territorial integrity and independence of the Ottoman Empire," the Sultan was quoted as saying. He also commented that the Turkish people were originally sympathetic to Russia, but that now Turkey must turn her eyes westward, in the hope of declawing the avaricious bear.

Italy, Dec. 21, 1900--Greetings to all the nations in Europe. Recently the government in Italy has been overthrown, and free elections have taken place. My supporters (the people of Italy) have elected me as the Dictator of Italy. I have accepted this position in the newly formed Republic of Italy on the condition that when the existing crisis in Europe is alleviated, I shall step down from my position and see that free elections are held again, and a Democracy is established in Italy.

Italy, Dec. 31, 1900--Now that winter is well under way, the delicate situation that exists in Europe has become inflamed. All Europe is panic stricken at the prospect of war. Words have been flying all over Europe in the past few weeks and all the nations in Europe have been preparing for war by increasing their armies and navies. Italy too has been increasing it's army and navy, but not for

the intent of starting a war, just for defensive purposes. I expect that by the end of this winter the Italian Army will consist of two units stationed at the major Italian cities of Rome and Venice, and the Italian Navy will consist of one tremendous Fleet stationed at the coastal port of Naples.

Rome, Jan. 1, 1901--Late this afternoon, after the festivities of New Year's Eve have died down, and most of the hangovers have been slept off, the Dictator of Italy has made a speech before thousands and thousands of his followers. In his speech he informed them of the diplomatic relations that went on between him and a few of the other Heads of State of the major powers of Europe last night. The most specific statement he made was at the close of his speech when he said, "I believe that we have found a friend, but unfortunately, we have found an enemy also."

Vienna--Reliable sources have warned us against a double-cross by our seemingly loyal friend, Turkey. We hope that this is not true, but if it is, all I can say is, Turkey, BEWARE!!

Vienna--We have tried to negotiate peacefully with the Czar, but we have received information that leads us to believe that a Russian-Turkish Alliance is being formed. If this is true, I say to the Russians, take your proposals and shove them up your...(etc.)

NSG--In a recent edition of a popular London newspaper, there was a cartoon concerning the letter sent to a French Diplomatic Official from a high ranking German Official. This letter was made public by the French Government after a lengthy series of letters had been sent between Germany and France concerning peace. In the French letter sent to Germany right before this last letter, the German Official was asked if he had spoken to Victoria about peace. In his next letter, the German Official was quoted as saying, "Victoria who?"

CARRYING EN PASSANT GAMES

There was only one complaint about my own decision to move up the deadline for En Passant games to match my Impassable games. There were several letters that were positive and thankful about my taking over for this summer. My policy is now firming up to be this: En Passant games will continue to be included within the pages of Impassable, but press releases will be kept to a bare minimum. My own games will continue to enjoy their space for press releases. As for missing moves, I will have any player missing two moves in a row replaced by anyone willing to submit moves. This applies only for those who are regular readers of En Passant. This means that the several "open" positions and those of Meiken and Lugosch will be filled by anyone willing to play. Kirschenbaum only missed one season, but needs to send in his Autumn retreat/Winter removal orders in order to continue. I will not automatically eliminate units and allow the player to continue playing a country.

One person has sent in General Orders. I want to inform you all that I allow GO's and make use of them if you miss a move. Please be sure to include all the information and date of expiration. Also, you may send extra copies to insure one getting to me. One fellow sent in his orders by Air Mail/Special Delivery--75¢ of postage. A pretty expensive way to play this game. Avoid these problems by sending in orders early, and then revise them if you have to.

A REPLY TO FORUM QUESTION #4

Gee Whiz! Only one reply on the question of polls? Gosh! I thought that there were more controversies on that than on anything else but perhaps for feuds. Oh well, the one reply follows:

From Mark Weidmark--What do I think of the polls going on? I myself feel that they are mainly a popularity contest. How does anybody know how well I play, when I'm no farther than 1903 in any postal game I started in? I may well be the best player in history. And so may many others. When you take a poll with people, the only person who is going to rate enough to get the points is somebody everybody knows. Thus, I feel it is actually a popularity poll, and not a player skill poll. There may be a little distinction between the skills of the players

who rank in popularity to make it, but this is likely outweighed by the aforementioned factor. No, they are not valid! They are not needed in their present form! In IMPASSABLE? I would say "okay, maybe" with restrictions. A poll might work if the receivers of IMPASSABLE were the only ones eligible to vote, and that they could only vote on the players in IMPASSABLE. The evidence of the player skill is right in front of the readers noses, in the games, and it doesn't have the disadvantage of only the commonly known players being rated. A poll on a larger scale, without other modifications, which would be difficult, reverts back to what I feel is a popularity poll.

PANDORA'S MAILBOX

We have room to print two of importance. The first is from Mark Weidmark in reply to Lakofka's Pumpkin Seed Attack comments:

Note, I think Lakofka has got it mixed up with his Pumpkin Seed attack. Aren't you supposed to attack your ally, dislodge him, and have him retreat into the enemies supply centers? ((No, Lakofka meant that as a stab of your ally by having a former enemy, or a permanent enemy unit, dislodged into one of your former ally's centers.--ED)) Noting Len's dedication to Edi Birsan in 1971 DQ ((Thanks for the correction.--ED)). I was in fact the ally who Len dislodged in that game, having me retreat into Turkey's (Birsan's) open Greece. Quite interesting. Now from Greece, I supposedly supporting him into Serbia, which I in Albania, had unsuccessfully attempted to enter. I hereby testify the stab works, but how far I'm going to get with one army in Greece, is beyond me!

Our second letter is from Rod Walker:

It's always a pleasure to meet a Diplomacy player who has played in exactly zero postal games and already knows so much about the hobby that he can tell you to cut out "the usual Diplomacy banter". Considering that the entire published corpus of postal Diplomacy literature is now over 20 linear feet, such instant expertise is truly amazing.

However, for the average novice player, for whom this sort of osmosis fails to work, coverage of the Diplomacy field in IMPASSABLE is about the most important contribution you can make.

IMPASSABLE is, after all, a Diplomacy fanzine. One would think that this should indicate its content. Alas, Mitch suggests

you take up politics. The amount of published material on that subject is very considerable. Although I have dabbled in this subject in my own publications from time to time, it seems to me rather out of place.

What contribution could be made to the field by our amateur 'zines? How many postal Dippy players are equipped by training and experience to deal with political questions in a constructive way? Very few. The most political of our GM's, John Boardman, has had no formal training in the field, and his naive and hysterical approach to international affairs--and domestic politics--betrays his lack of preparation. Of course, as Barnum once said, "There's one born every minute", so Boardman's semi-literate sophistries always find fertile imaginations to appeal to. Nothing is more dull than the preaching of amateurs pretending to be Great Experts. I sincerely hope that IMPASSABLE will not screw itself up the way GRAUSTARK has.

You know, you're only on Issue 5, which is a hell of a time to worry about "improving". No 'zine really hits its stride right away. Eventually you will find your own 'zine style and hit on things which strike responsive chords in the readership.

One of the most fertile fields we have upcoming is the IDA. There are any number of plans, programs, and proposals upcoming which will no doubt be controversial. Some of the 'zines are going to have to take the lead in this debate, and IMPASSABLE, it seems to me, should be one of them. I realize that this is the sort of "usual Diplomacy banter" which won't appeal to Mitch Bailey--but after all, he can always read GRAUSTARK and Reader's Digest.

THE EDITOR SPEAKS OUT

This is the last page and this is the column of space. I was going to print more letters, but I have run out of space. So, I'll make a brief reply to Rod's letter. Rod brought up an interesting question when he asked how many of us were qualified to deal with political questions. What intrigues me is the broader meaning that perhaps if we, an elite, are not able to handle such material intelligently, whether the rest of us can. Also, aren't we all citizens with a vote in our country's affairs? Are we not capable of running our own country? I was a Political Science major myself, and the one thing I learned was that it is very hard to change anyone's political philosophy. So, I won't attempt that in Impassable. I may mention something, but I won't preach any philosophy. After all, this is supposed to be a dippyzine. Perhaps someone would want to start a modern edition of the "Federalist Papers"?
