We of IMPASSABLE praise the efforts of the IDAEC to help encourage better dippy publishing standards. Well done Robert: ***Before we get on to the Gordon Anderson story, let me print a fairly short reply by Len Lakofka to Lew Pulsipher's remarks made in Verhandeln #6 (Impassable #61).

"I agree with Lew that country preferences lists are best, but many players do not send them in. In such a case I use the lists I do have and assign the other countries by lot (unless I know a certain player is playing the same country elsewhere, in which case I'll try to not give it to him again).

I am opposed to dropping a player if he drops from a game played under the same house rules. The player is paying for the games separately in most cases and thus does have an option. I will not place dropped players on my sub list nor will I let them play in a new game. Certainly that is a good rule. I would consider dropping a player from all houserule games for deception of the GM, etc. But even that is controversial.

I am in 100% accord on not having multiple players enter from the same telephone area code. It is unfair to the others.

Draw votes should be unanimous with a missed vote being a 'no' vote. Again, I agree with Lew as I have said in the Publisher's Handbook all draw votes should be by secret ballot with no tallies--either the vote is either unanimous or it is not."

((I must reply to Len's and Lew's remarks concerning draw votes. I am vehement, that is, opposed to the utmost, against secret draw votes. To borrow a term from Andy Phillips, a draw in real-life wars would really be a truce, armistice or whatever. It would be agreed to by all with no one being able to "fool" another. It would be signed on a piece of paper and troops would all stop attacking. Violations would be quite readily noticed. Hence, draws in real-life wars don't fool anybody--only later are "draws" (armistices) broken... Also, I play the postal game from the viewpoint of face-to-face play in which a vote

is generally made public.))

Len also has his comments on other statements made by Lew, but I'm going to hold them until next issue...

Potpourri

I suppose it's natural for a hobby to be conservative. People often stay in a hobby because they feel comfortable among the people and situations—so they tend to oppose whatever might change it. It is sometimes amazing, though, how DIPLOMACY people, especially some who date back to the 60's, can substitute traditionalism for thinking. A good example is the not-so-recent dispute about reprinting material. Some people seemed to think that this was 0K if only if it could be proved that it was traditional. Did that really have anything to do with whether it was right, whether anyone was being cheated or trampled upon? Of course not. But it was easier to appeal to tradition (and convenient for some, of course). This is not to say that tradition is always wrong—after all, it must have worked for many people in the past or it wouldn't be traditional to begin with—but I hope we'll see more thinking and less "traditionalizing" in the future.

A preoccupation that also seems common among the old-timers is the "I was first" syndrome, as I call it. You can find some people who seem extremely proud to have originated this or that (and, usually, they actually didn't, or it was independently originated many times). Often this is tied with playing reputations—"I was first to use such-and-such opening" (as if several people hadn't done so independently". "I was first to suggest such-and-such for orphans", and so on ad nauseam. Sometimes it seems more important to these people (only a few of them, admittedly) to determine who was first than to make progress now. Even people who otherwise seem quite reasonable puff up their chests for an "I was first" (so who cares) at times. There are occasions when one must mention who was first to keep the historical record straight, not to brag; but as much (if not more) credit ought to go to those who put ideas into effect or who spread some practice throughout the hobby than to those who first conceived them.

Have you noticed how people talk sometimes about player reputations, as though you could lose a reputation once made. Actually, it's quite difficult. Those who criticize people for not entering tournaments "because they're afraid to lose their reputations" aren't thinking. Has anyone ever suffered a decrease in reputation from losing a tournament? Not that I know of. Tournaments can only help your reputation, not hurt it. Doug Beyerlein or Edi Birsan doesn't win the annual FTF tournament, or even come close, people say so what, they had bad luck with novices or something. That may be true, but the point is that the excuse is always there, no matter what the real reason may be, and so reputations don't suffer. Relative unknowns can gain a reputation (or be confirmed in lack of reputation or in a bad reputation) --how many people knew who Blank and Wartenburg were before CITEX? -- but that's all. Once you're on top, then there is always available the excuse that people are ganging up on you because of your record, and that's why you don't do well any more. There is some truth in that, but sometimes it is more a result of one's playing style. For example, if Brenton Ver Ploeg, the infamous stabber had continued playing, probably he would have had a difficult time. Would it have been because of his record or because people knew he couldn't be trusted in the long-run. I think Edi Birsan is a good example of a player whose playing style, not his record, finally caught up to him. Other people with very good records, but who have not used the stabbing style or another style not calculated to make friends, continue to do well despite the tendency of people to gang up on those with good records.

I would like to see some people who receive many zines write summaries of some of the current topics and controversies in the hobby. For example, lately a number of articles have appeared about playing styles and types of players. Some people, I am sure, would like to know what has been said, but don't receive many zines and haven't seen many of the articles. As an example, I would be interested in reading such a summary, with the writer's own conclusion, and including a bibliography. Something like this, well done, would deserve distribution in <u>Diplomacy World</u> or some other large zine. Another subject worth summarizing might be game theory and DIPLOMACY. No doubt there will be others. You don't have to think of yourself as a DIPLOMACY expert to do this, you just need access to many zines and a reasonable mind.

((Thanks, Lew! I want to say that I'm planning a series of articles to be written by myself on my own victories in postal Diplomacy—and why I have won so many in a few number of games entered. My record is now 5 wins, 1 second, 1 3-way draw, 1 third and one loss))


