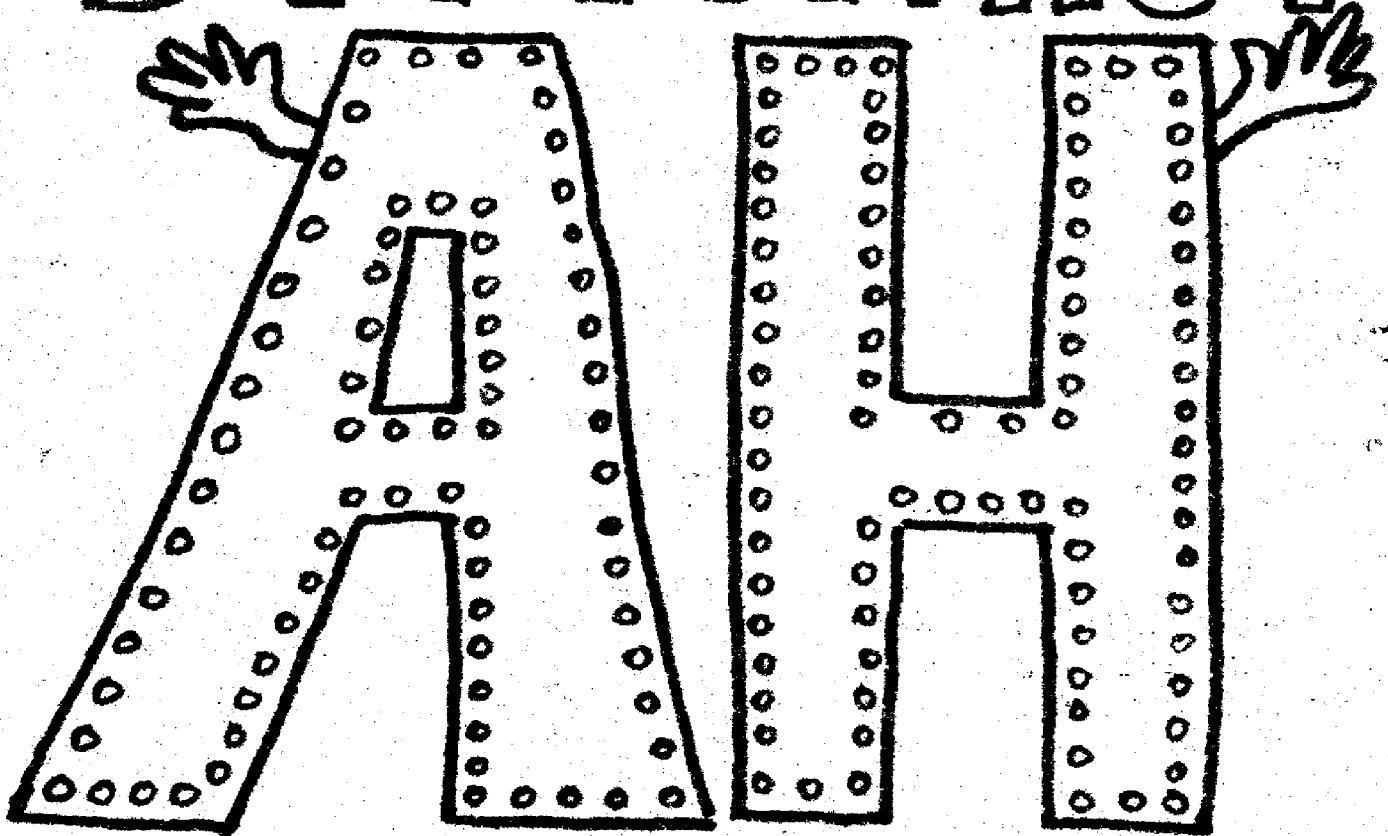

Errors: Germany didn't have Fleet Edinburgh, but did have Fleet Clyde (which moved to Liverpool). That leaves him with only 20 units. Also, he has 23 centers, not 22. I counted them wrong. So, Germany builds 3 units.

GM Note: I am postponing Spring 1918 because of several requests for voting on draws. I myself no longer enjoy gamesmastering this game (which is probably why I make more errors here than in my other games) and I believe the players also aren't enjoying this game. Since this is a variant with little meaning to anyone, I am going to make a change in how we vote. Instead of requiring a unanimous

vote, I will take the majority of supply centers for the approval of a draw vote. Germany has 23 centers, Italy has 18 centers, China 15, Japan 10, and Austria has 14 centers. England won't count. There have been several separate proposals on ending this game. The proposal receiving a majority will end the game. If none gets a majority, I will ask other publishers for any precedent on ending this game arbitrarily on my own. If more than one proposal gets a majority, the highest will win and end the game. The proposals to vote for are:

Proposal #1: 5-way draw (Ger/Ita/Aus/Chi/Jap)

Proposal #2: 4-way draw (Ger/Ita/Chi/Jap)

Proposal #3: 3-way draw (Jap/Chi/Ger)

Proposal #4: 2-way draw (Ger/Ita)

Proposal #5: 3-way draw (Aus/Ita/Ger)

These have all been proposed by the players of this game. You must vote yes or no to all proposals. No vote will be counted as a yes vote. (Example: Proposal #3 gets yes votes from Ger/Jap with no votes from Ita/Aus/Chi. Results are 38-32 in favor and proposal passes.)

COMPLEX ALLIANCES

Numerous articles have appeared on the 'Opening' for various countries. Edi Birsan is especially noted for his Italian and German openings and both have influenced the play of those countries. Unfortunately mass alliances, that is, unions of 3, 4 or perhaps 5 countries have not been discussed in depth. Forming a proper lattice of alliances can allow for radical opening play that would be disastrous if the groundwork were not properly laid. Take an Italian-Austrian alliance for example. Normally these countries must get at least one build each to function--a total of three ideally. Yet if Austria and Italy can gain Russian and probably German support they can make very bold 1901 moves. The diplomatic atmosphere must be one that is anti-French and anti-Turkish in the Opening. England and Russia must then be checked in the Middle Game so that the Central Powers go into the End Game together.

The Opening is one designed to attack France and Turkey early on. This is done via: A Vie-Bud, A Bud-Ser, F Tri-Alb; A Ven-Pie, A Rom-Ven, F Nap-Tyr. This is fairly standard except for the move to Tyr. Russia should be moving F Sev-Bla, A War-Gal!, A Mos-Ukr; Germany should be trying for Burgundy, whether he makes it or not, while going to Holland. Initially England must be in on this attack with a move to English Channel, for example. In the Fall of 1901 Russia takes Rumania with the Army from Galacia; Austria plays A Ser-Gre!, A Bud-Ser!, F Alb-Ion; Italy plays F Tyr-Wes!, A Pie-Mar, A Ven-Apu! Italy gains nothing and Austria gains one and perhaps two. However, the Italian/Austrian pieces are in an excellent position for a 1902 offensive. France will be beset from three sides as will Turkey. Spring 1902 calls for F Ion (C) Ita A Apu-Tun! as the key move. If two builds are given to Austria, one should be a fleet, if only one build, then build a fleet anyway. The real danger is from a Russian stab, but in an alliance he has more to gain in the long run than from a stab at this point. The Austrian fleet, of course, goes to Albania. If Greece has not fallen to Austria it attacks Greece, otherwise Fall 1902 calls for F Ion-Eas, F Alb-Ion as part of a 1903 'Lepanto'!

If the entire board is playing an optimum game there is little or no danger that France/Turkey will fall too fast and give Russia/England too big of a head start.

What is crucial is that a war between Russian and England be started with Germany-Austria attacking Russia, and Germany-Italy attacking England. Germany will not gain too much because he is fighting both England and Russia.

Obviously, aggressive English/Russian players will try to turn the advantage of the Opening game into an advantage in the Middle game. If this happens then one of these two powers will likely have the best shot at a win. That alternative is what holds Germany-Austria-Italy together. If any of those three fight England and/or Russia will surely gain most.

When you plan an opening you must look deep into the End game and form alliances/non-aggression pacts in the OPENING GAME that will get you to your End Game goal. Worrying about the Opening for your country alone or in alliance with only one other country will not yield a winning result.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

This issue we have a rebuttal type of letter from Rod Walker on Lew Pulsipher's comments of last issue.
From Rod Walker:

"Lew Pulsipher and I have been going round and round about the hobby's history for some time. He has, for instance, been lecturing me for a considerable period that the attempts by "TDA" to deceive hobby opinion in 1971 are no longer relevant in dealing with different attempts by the same group to do the same thing in 1975 or 1976. I submit that historical patterns are always relevant. For instance: this country did not have to go through Watergate to learn that Richard Nixon was a creep. We had but to examine his career from 1946 to 1962 and then vote for Hubert Humphrey. (I was one who knew; when Nixon was inaugurated, I resigned my commission rather than serve under him as CinC.)

Anyway, "the past is dead" is an anti-historical bias in my view. It denies two essential tenets of true historicism; first, that the past is a living and essential part of the present; second, that the past is

something which must be actively (although selectively) preserved. The discipline of history (to which I've also devoted 3 years of graduate work, by the way) is deeply split over issues such as these.

I do not buy Lew's assertion that the postal hobby has changed fundamentally. Changes are primarily of degree, not of kind. As the hobby becomes larger, the problem of communication becomes more difficult. I do not see that Lew disagrees with my premise that the only feasible way to insure that articles reach most of the postal Diplomacy public is to have them widely reprinted.

His sole quibble is one of "permission". I can conceive of one case in which this should be sought. If someone has done or created something which he is pushing commercially...the IDA Handbooks are good examples...there should be no reprinting without written permission, of course. On the other hand, there should be enough copies of such things to go around.

As to other items, I see no particular harm. Lew says he can provide examples if we wish. I certainly wish. I am never impressed by vague references to unspecified evidence. Let's see the nitty-gritty of the thing and make a judgement.

Now, as to reprinting for the purpose of attack. Anyone who prints something lays himself open to being hoist on his own petard. I see no sense in protecting him by the contrived requirement that he has to consent to it. I have reprinted some items for the precise purpose of showing how ridiculous or inaccurate they are. Lew's letter is rather circumlocutiously and delicately referring to that fact. Presented with the same situation, I would do the same thing. If the hobby is having a piece of bilge shoved down its throat, the author of the said bilge deserves no protection whatsoever from having the whistle blown. I am not going to quibble over niceties of protocol in such cases. Even if I were to admit (which I do not) that some sort of moral principle gives an author unlimited jurisdiction over written material clearly in the public domain, I would never concede that the same principle applies to the author(s) of deliberate claptrap.

Those whose little bubbles are thus popped would do well to ponder the advantage of giving up any scheme to fool some of the people all of the time. Meanwhile, I eagerly await Lew's promised specific examples. I would love to see just how big is the teapot all this tempest has blown up in.

VERHANDELN

Before beginning the main body of this column, I have a couple responses to Ablehnen #3. Those who have already learned to ignore Robert Sacks ought to skip the following paragraphs. Those who think Lew Pulsipher ought to be ignored won't be reading this anyway.

First, Walter Luc Haas asked me to say something about his problems with Sacks for the benefit of those who don't receive Walter's Bumm. What Sacks means in his accusations of monopolistic or exclusionary policies by the World Variant Bank is that the WVB won't do what Sacks wishes. In Bumm 13 Walter explained his position. The following are excerpts: "It was explained to Robert Sacks several times...that he has nothing to do with the WVB, that the WVB is strictly neutral and not linked with any organization such as IDA, TIDA, etc., nor with the office of the MNC, and that his discussions of WVB matters, his polls/ballots/bills/votes [in DVC] are of no use but rather make things more complicated...I agree that a discussion zine about variants and variant-matters would be interesting, at least, maybe necessary too. But what the 'DVC' (or Robert Sacks) is trying to do now, is to get power and influence over institutions and people, who not only don't want this, but also deny that the 'DVC' has any right whatsoever to do so...I am sure the WVB is interested to cooperate with whomever as long as its neutrality is guaranteed." The problem is that Sacks demands subservience to DVC, not neutrality.

Second, we have Sacks' idiotic notions about threats and improper procedures. A "threat" often exists only in the mind of the person perceiving it. It is my custom to often let people know ahead of time when I plan an action they might not agree with or might wish to respond to. Thus I informed Sacks that I would comment in Verhandeln on his unfair criticisms of IDA. In the same vein I told him I would place somewhere else my letter dissociating myself from DVC if it were not printed where it belonged, in Phoenix. This was not a gratuitous precaution nor a threat, merely a statement of fact. Nick Ulanov's final letter to DVC was not printed because it was allegedly non-substantive--read, not in accordance with Sacks' views. Dick Vedder's comments for Phoenix were frequently suppressed; when he resigned he felt compelled to send copies of his final comments to DVC members individually. I would rather my comment went in Phoenix; but if it is/was sup-

pressed (I haven't found out) what recourse do I have but to go elsewhere? Unfortunately, Sacks perceives any disagreements with him as a threat to him.

Then Sacks turns around and complains that he was not informed of something ahead of time, even though he calls it threat when he is informed. At any rate, my letter was written for publication in Phoenix, and would not be in the hands of DVC members until several weeks after it reached Sacks. Since I knew the final DW deadline, I knew Sacks would receive my letter before any statement appeared publicly (DW was where the statement was made). Sacks' accusation that he was not informed until after the public statement appeared is false. I might also ask publicly why Sacks has not pursued the course he outlined in his letter to the Verhandel'n publishers stating that he expected my IDA-DVC column would be "malicious and non-factual" (complete text in Speculum) and that he would take the matter to the IDA Judiciary Comm. if it was. Was this a threat, a cheap means of trying to squash criticism (cheap and a threat because it was not carried out)? If Sacks believes it was not malicious and was factual, why is he making such wild accusations and lying about it and about me?

Verhandel'n #8, An Annual Publisher's Survey?

Some people cringe at the word "survey", but one can't ignore the value of the information you can collect via a survey and in no other way. It seems to me that people who are interested in the progress of the hobby as a whole would benefit from an annual survey which indicates publishing and GMing trends; and to some people the information would be interesting to know, whether useful or not. An example of how uncertain we are even about major trends occurred this summer, when one knowledgeable person told me that many zines were experiencing circulation decreases, while so far as I could tell from the half-dozen zines I received, circulations were rising. I was also told that many GM's were having a hard time filling their open games. Aside from asking many publishers (a survey, in other words), there are few ways to keep track of what is happening. One can look at the increasing number of GM's with openings in the "Need A Game" column of DW and expect that it will be harder to fill a game (though which comes first, the large number of openings or the difficulty because there aren't enough players, is impossible to tell). The old Archives Publishers Survey was a compilation of circu-

lation statistics only, and was discontinued because it encouraged circulation races without providing much worthwhile information.

A one-time survey would be much less valuable than an annual poll, with many questions asked on every poll. With the latter those who are interested in such things can have a chance to discover and take into account hobby trends. Such a survey could be printed directly in Diplomacy World, and the results, in a later DW, would be available as data for hobby historians as well as for more immediate use. Walt Buchanan would be the logical person to compile the survey, but I've already broached the idea to him and he hasn't volunteered. If I wasn't going to be moving around I would do it. But until someone comes forward, this is no more than an idea.

Below are some questions that might be asked on such a survey. No doubt if anyone follows up this idea, he'll be able to think of more.

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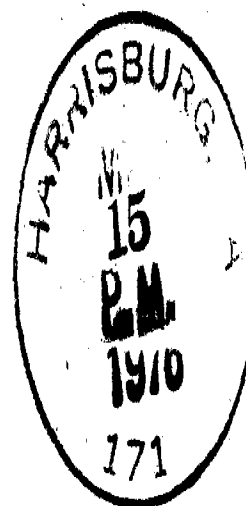


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
