CHICAGO, MARYLAND, THE IDA, AND OTHER NEWS

This past month has been one for travel. During the course of four weeks I have been to New Jersey for Diplomacy at Bob Johnson's then to Chicago for the Game Show and the DipCon, and last weekend I was over to Buddy Tretick's for more Diplomacy. I'll have to admit that I have had my share of the summer travel bug, but all's well, thank-you. This has affected Impassable as I attempted to keep on schedule with some fast typing and shorter negotiating times. Some of you have asked about two-weeks deadlines. The last issue was more of a two-weeks schedule than the normal three-weeks for Impassable. For those interested, this question is one of those in the poll.

Chicago's DipCon V was a big success and I met many of the other publishers and players in the hobby. I entered the Diplomacy tournament, but my luck ran out as I picked Austria for the first round. I played most of its survival, but left to attend the IDA meeting. The International Diplomacy Association had its first General Meeting (which I missed when I played Lord (cont. next page)

of the Ring with a couple of famous Youngstown players on Stan Wrobel's beautiful board. (They're talking about having the game made commercially, but I don't know the details.) and several meetings of the IDA Council. As the Editor of the IDA, I attended those meetings along with the other officers. The IDA is the first Diplomacy Association that is truly for the players, and the IDA has been the product of many people donating their time and money generously as well as the entire dues-paying membership. Concrete results were achieved at Chicago, and the IDA will certainly have a very bright future. There are now 100 paid members from all over the country and from other countries in the world. It is an international group of Diplomacy players and publishers. I am sure that the IDA will herald a new era for the hobby. It is nice to know that 34% of the IDA members get Impassable, but I was horrified to find out that only 37% of the Impassable readers belong to the IDA. This means that 63% of Impassable's 91 readers don't belong to the IDA. This doesn't look too good for the Editor of the IDA when his own zine's readers don't belong to the IDA. A total of 57 readers of Impassable don't belong to the IDA! Horrors! I'm going to have to rectify this! The IDA is a very worthwhile organization to join, and its official newsletter, the Diplomacy Review, is edited and published by yours truly. So, if you like this rag, you should like Diplomacy Review. If you want to join, all you need is to send one dollar to: Walter Buchanan, R.R.#3, Lebanon, IN 46052. You can make a check out to: International Diplomacy Association. I would like to see at least 25 new members from Impassable. If you have any questions, you can ask me, and I'll answer them. The IDA is an active organization and its members have planned many projects for the benefit of the players and members. One such project now underway is a handbook for the players with articles on how to play the game better. Join Now!

In the process of breaking down the readership, I have found the following statistics: Of the total 91 readers, 63% are players only, 28% are traders, and 7% are subbers. The figures are 58 players, 26 traders, and 7 subbers. A few of the traders are also players. With 26 traders, I get a lot of other zines. However, I understand that there are perhaps over 50 publishers in this country alone. There are publishers in other countries, and I got a recent request for a trade with a Belgian zine.

Last weekend I visited Buddy Tretick for

Diplomacy and other games. For that visit I brought along my version of Scotice Scripti (III) and we played it with enjoyable success. However, I got a few ideas for improvement, and won't have the rules ready until sometime next week. Those who have already sent their money, please be patient and you will be rewarded with a better-playing game. Buddy was a gracious host, and he provided free food. His new home was very lovely. Thanks for a very nice visit, Buddy.

PART TWO OF THE GAMESMASTER'S GUIDE-Notation by Len Lakofka

Presenting the moves to the players is the next topic of discussion. You wish to do this in a neat orderly fashion, one the players can grasp with just a little inspection. Let's look at the common ones: GRI Notation: 1. England(J. Player) A Lon-Bel, F Nth (S) A Lon-Bel, F Nwy-Swe, F Ech (C) A Lon-Bel; France(Hoosier Ally) F Bre-Ech, A Pic-Bel, A Bur (S) A Pic-Bel, A Par-Pic, F Por-Mao; Germany(Polevaulter P. Perambulator) F Hol-Nth, F Den (S) F Hol-Nth, A Ruhr-Bur, A Kie-Hol

All moves succeed except the convoy to Belgium, Brest to the Channel, Picardy to Belgium, and Paris to Picardy. Note Burgundy's support was cut by the German attack, and the North Sea's attack was cut by the German attack. English Fleet North Sea is dislodged and must retreat.

The English fleet North Sea is dislodged and must retreat.

Each system can use some shorthand too:
e.g.: FRANCE

f bre-ech, a bur (s) a pic-bel, a par-pic, F
POR-MAO, or F Bre-Ech, A Bur (s) a Pic-Bel,
A Par-Pic, F Por-Mao, or F BRE-ech, A BUR (S)
A PIC-bel, A PAR-pic, F por-MAO, and F NTH
(S) A LON-bel (S) F ECH. Note CB means
convoys by.

1) In system one all seven player's moves
are given and then the results are written
out for you. You must read back and forth to
see where the pieces are.

2) Each underlining shows a failure to
complete the order. If a convoying or suppor-
ting piece is dislodged it is shown separately.

3) Here the use of lower and upper cases
show success or failure of the order.

4) In this system, the location of the
piece after adjudication is shown in CAPS.
Where it moved from, or attempted to move to
is shown in lower case. If it's dislodged,
then both origin and destination are in lower
case and a statement of dislodgment is given--
although f nth S A LON-bel implies Fleet
North is dislodged as it is in lower case
letters. Convoys that failed are lined out
and support that is cut is also lined out. I
use this last system--and I am the only one,
to my knowledge, who does. I find it
exceptionally easy to adjudicate from and to
use for the NEXT season when moves and
position must be copied down. You can read
all upper case letters and place the majority
of the pieces on a board in a matter of
minutes. The only failings of any system is
when you vary it from issue to issue or when
you forget to underline or use the proper case
on the typewriter.

Possession of centers also use a few
types of notation for winter moves:

1) England Lon, Edi, Liv (or Home), Bel,
Hol, Nwy, build one (6)

2) England Lon, Edi, Liv, Bel, ~~Syl~~, Hol
Nwy build one (6)

3) England Lon, Edi, Liv, Bel, ~~Syl~~, Hol,
Nwy build one (6)

4) England lon, edi, liv, bel, ~~syl~~, hol,
Nwy build one (6)

5) England lon, edi, liv, bel, hol, ~~syl~~,
Nwy 6=5/1

1) shows what you own. The GM sees you have x
number of pieces, then tells you what you get,
lose or if you stay even.

2) Here what centers you lost is also shown.

3) Here the gain and loss for the year are
shown.

4) Same as 3, just different notation.

5) Same as 3 but shows the actual mathematics.
Centers=Pieces. Build or removals.

I believe a system in which the player
can see (as well as the spectator) the
actual changes and calculation is the best.
Lastly, winter results also vary a little:

1) England Build F lon

Germany Retreat A BUR-RUH, A PIC
disbanded, BUILD A MUN

2) England Build F lon

Germany Retreat A BUR-RUH, A PIC
disbanded or A PIC/D/ retreat off board,
Build A MUN

England has F LON, F LIV, F NTH, A NWY, A
HOL; Germany has A KIE, A MUN, A RUH, A SIL.

3) England F LON/5/F LIV, F NTH, A NWY,
A HOL; Germany a burg-RUH, A MUN/4/A KIE,
A RUH, A SIL, A ~~Syl~~

1) Shows the results, but now the player
has to look back to the last issue to see
where the pieces are.

2) Shows the results of the winter and the
location after the winter is over.

3) Is just a different form of notation.

Above all you must be clear and careful.
Watch out for typos! Be sure you use
notation as explained in your houserules
only. Finally, list the abbreviations you
use and what they mean. D can equal dislodge
or disband, so A for annihilation can be
better. H is good for Stand (Hold) as (S)
can also be support. R can be retreat or
remove. Define your terms and don't be
cryptic!!

NEXT: Insurance against loss of communica-
tion between GM & player.

Propaganda--

Cupcakeville, Switzerland--The Western Powers are looming strong and powerful and the East is waning. Only Austria-Russia seem to have an edge, and they must work quickly to dispatch Turkey. Yet, A Gal did not capture Rum, A Ukr did. That was a poor move. It makes Austria doubtful of what Russia really has in mind. The German-French alliance played an uninventive attack on Ven! A piece in Tyr and a piece in Pie in 1901 is just too big a coincidence! Italy had no choice but to defend Venice. Thus, the Austrian move to Tri is also poor. A gamble on keeping Tri open would be well taken so that a fleet could have been built! Had Austria lost Tri, he could be certain Ven would have fallen too. With a Russian ally, loss of one center could have been tolerated.

The Turkish miss makes this analysis week, obviously, but Turkey has now thrown Austria and Russia together, if they weren't allied already. Who will trust a man who misses his moves? England is the question mark. Will she ally with her western neighbors? The landing of the fleet in Bel and the army in Nor while leaving the F in Nwg should mean that StP will fall by 1902!

The builds: Austria--2 armies, what else? England--2 fleets in all but Lvp if a strong campaign is in sight versus Germany. A fleet in Lvp shows an English-French war, an army in Lon will cause everyone to be doubtful, an army in Edi is too weak versus Russia unless there is a German-English-French alliance. France--F Mar, A Par, I'll wager ((you lost, Len--GM))--F Bre will show that France still is unsure of England. Germany--A Mun and F Kie is seen required by the two-front war! Germany has played boldly and almost brilliantly, if he can follow it up. Italy--A Rom would dampen the French-German land war. F Nap is not necessary to defend against France yet. Italy needs a build or she's doomed in 1902--I think she's doomed! Russia--He must build an army in the south. Mos or Sev. StP will cause his southern gains to go to hell. F Bot should return to StP or he can use it to negotiate war between England and Germany. Turkey--F Smy is his only weapon, A Smy is asking for the defense and will cement the Austrian-Russian alliance even stronger together.

Budapest(LRV), November 30, 1901--Rumors of several acts of war were heard here today. Such things as the German Occupation Army in Holland killing 50 civilians for the murder of one German soldier, the plundering of a Tunisian village by the Italians for no reason, and mining of the Russian battleship Caspian in the Sea of Azov. None of these rumors will be confirmed by the Government until more details are known.

Dover, England, Dec. 7, 1901--The latest D.K.R. attempt at creating the world's first atomic bomb has only succeeded in blowing up the village square in Blackpool, along with 3 grocery stores, one delicatessen, and the local house of ill repute. Quote from Byron Horns-Smedlish, "Well, back to de drawing board."

Galicia--"Ruskie go home!"

Isle of Wrong, Nottingham, England--Today, chief bird watcher Thorton Morham reported what seemed to be a dingy flying Turkish co's and manned by seven dwarfs. When asked what this might mean, D.K.R. spokesman Miles Smedlish commented, "Well, nothing, I guess, unless you happen to be Snow White."

Marseilles, France, Dec. 1901--Speculation has it that there is an Italian submarine in the Gulf of Lyon. In the official statement the last paragraph seems to say it all:

"Not only does the French government deny this, but one prominent Admiral has been quoted as saying, "Of course it's ridiculous. I don't see any tell-tale grease slick." Moscow Press--"Austrian soldiers are fat and pudgy creatures who only know how to retreat."

RRINGG--"Admiral, this is the Kaiser. I'm sorry, but the treasury is a little short of cash at the moment. I'll have to put off mobilizing another fleet until maybe next year."

Sevastopol--The Imperial Navy announced today the transfer of Seaman Andri Pendehovich to the Imperial Naval garrison in Siberia. Pendehovich was known as the Seaman who forgot to cast off the lines holding the Black Sea Fleet to the dock. Shortly after the transfer was affected, the Black Sea Fleet entered the Black Sea for maneuvers. St. Petersburg, Dec. 25th, 1901--The Russian government issued a strongly worded protest to the government of Germany today, protesting German meddling in Swedish affairs. Queen Ruby noted that "If anybody is going to have affairs in Sweden, it will damn well be me."

Vienna(LRV), November 16, 1901--The Dictator today stated that he was very unhappy with the Italians, Germans, and the Russians for entering or trying to enter Austria-Hungary by force. He did say he was pleased to see that no further attempts were tried and hoped that all countries would believe him when he says that all he wants is to maintain his present holdings and strive for peace. Vienna--Queen Ruby has decided to give the Russian invaders until the spring to pull its invading army out of Galicia. Failure to do so, said the Queen, will bring immediate retaliatory reaction from the Royal army.

Warsaw--The Polish Institute for Military Studies released a report today on the military situation in Europe. There was jubilation in the Polish sectors of the city at the prospect of Europe being controlled by expatriate Poles. As one observer said, "No one but a bunch of Poles could have screwed things up this bad. It's all one big polish joke."

Berlin--Fritz the Feeble, assistant to the Kaiser, learned today that the Kaiser was preparing an invasion of London. It seems that the Kaiser has learned of an imminent British double-cross.

Italy, Sep. 21, 1901--Throughout the winter, and part of the spring, the Italian Government received calls for help from the nations of Albania and Greece because of action by Austria-Hungary against these nations. With the conquest of Albania near, the Italian Government took action. The Army stationed at Venice was ordered eastward. It's mission was to put pressure on the Austro-Hungarian forces stationed at Trieste. To it's surprise, the Army met no resistance, and it swept through Trieste with no trouble at all. War has broken out in all of Europe, and from now on I'll be giving you up to date coverage of the war, as long as the Chess players don't mind. This coverage will be between games in the Chess Championship, of course. As for the first season of fighting, much has happened. The most important news seems to be the Russian-Turkish alliance. This and the fact that Italy has successfully invaded Austria doesn't seem to be helping Austria any. Further west, France and Germany look like they are going to be fighting each other in a long hard war, and England has retained its option to go against France, Germany, or Russia. That's the war roundup for now, but I'll be back with more war news right after the end of the next Chess Game, about 3 or 4 months.

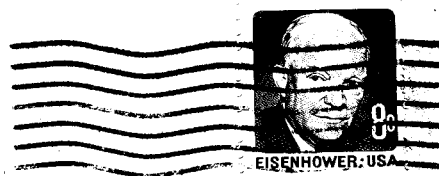
