John Schultz was killed in a motorcycle accident last month. I learned of this from Jim Burgess, who was told by Paul Milewski, who was called by John's wife, Rose. (I believe I might not have gotten a phone call from Rose because, in the week before his death, John e-mailed me about problems with his ISP, that he couldn't read posted ishkibibble issues, and that the last phone number he had written down for me had an area code that expired a couple of years ago.) Jim and I spent several days searching online for an article about this, and an excerpt of the article he found is at right.

This news is very sad to me. I have known John through the hobby since early 1989, when I began publishing my first zine, Dipadeedoodah!. Since then, he has always been a player in my games, but he also has been a good friend and shown himself to be a unique individual, including expressing his affinity for Na tive American beliefs. We even talked about him coming down from Indiana to visit me in Florida in the next year or two.

John used to lead the rough lifestyle of a motorcycle biker decades ago, and this behavior led to his incarceration for the murder of another biker, which John said was self-defense. He was paroled about two years ago and found adjusting to "the new world" difficult, but he was helped by Rose, whom he married shortly before parole.

Last I knew, John was working as a trucker, which sometimes accounted for his sporadic communication, and he seemed to be making a good go of it in his new life. But after reading the accident story, I think John still might have had a bit of the wild side left in him, and perhaps this contributed to his death.

I will miss John very much. (I'm getting teary-eyed just typing this.) Please send your condolences to Rose Schultz, 692 Crest Dr., Valparaiso, IN 46383.

One more thing about John. During my Web search, I found a photo at www.thetimesonline.com/index.pl/summer/136. I don't know if this is John's cat, but it wouldn't surprise me if it were. I know John loved cats, and he even managed to have one during part of his incarceration. I can picture John sitting in the chair with the cat on his lap, looking out the window, stroking the cat, and being at ease.

A Valparaiso man died [Friday, Sept. 13, about 2:30 p.m.] after cargo he was carrying on his motorcycle became caught in the motorcycle, police said.

John Schultz, 51, of the 600 block of Crest Drive, was riding his 2002 Harley-Davidson motorcycle southeast on Interstate 80 near Halsted Street, police said.

Schultz had a bag and a sleeping bag tied to the passenger seat of his motorcycle, and the load shifted while he was riding, police said.

Some of the items became entangled in the rear wheel or the belt drive system, causing Schultz to lose control and be thrown from the motorcycle, police said.

Schultz was not wearing a helmet, police said.
An autopsy conducted Saturday concluded Schultz died of multiple injuries from the accident.

## Game Openings

Diplomacy (Marc Ellinger, Fred Weidemeyer; need 5 more players): You know the drill. Preference lists are welcome.

Colonial Diplomacy (Peter Boyum, Steve Mayers, Cary Nichols, Paul Risner, Bob Robles; need 2 more players): Try your hand at Avalon Hill's popular variant by playing Britain, China, France, Holland, Japan, Russia or Turkey. The short game victory condition (i.e., control of at least 18 supply centers) will be used. Preference lists are welcome. The rulebook is available by mail for $\$ 2$, but the map is free.

African Diplomacy (Cary Nichols, Bob Robles, Kevin Wilson; need 3 more players): Same game, different locale, as players pretend Africa is armed to the hilt and turning on itself. Ethiopia, Ivory Coast, Libya, Saudi Arabia, South Africa and Zaire aim to dominate. Preference lists are welcome. Rules and map provided for free.

Hardbop Downfall of the Lord of the Rings Diplomacy (Steve Mayers, Scott Morris, Bob Robles, Kevin Wilson; need 3 more players): Based on J.R.R. Tolkien's classic trilogy, everyone is searching for the Ring in Middle-Earth. Sauron wants to wear the Ring and have Evil rule the world. The forces of Good (Elves, Gondor and Rohan) know the Ring must be destroyed, but doing so means traveling to the heart of Mordor. As for the neutral Dwarves, Umbar and Saruman, who knows which side each will support - that's where the diplomacy comes in! Preference lists are welcome. The rulebook is available by mail for $\$ 1$, but it's free via e-mail. The map is free regardless.

Balkan Wars Diplomacy VI (Bob Robles, Kevin Wilson; need 4 more players): A great cutthroat classic featuring Albania, Bulgaria, Greece, Rumania, Serbia and Turkey. Preference lists are welcome. Rules and map provided for free.

Mitotic Diplomacy (Cary Nichols, Dave Partridge; need 5 more players): Set on the regular map, the main rule change is that new units are not necessarily built in home supply centers, but rather
existing units are duplicated. (Think cell division.) Thus, two units can occupy the same space after winter adjustments, and they defend a space with a strength of two. Preference lists are welcome. Rules and map provided for free.

Raj (Dave Partridge, Kevin Wilson; need 1-3 more players): Every turn, one of fifteen tiles ranging in value from 10 to -5 (not including 0 ) is up for bid. Players start with cards valued from 15 to 1 and must play a card that can't be played again. The highest card played wins a positive-valued token, unless there's a tie, and then the next highest card wins it. Similarly, the lowest card played nets a negative token, with ties going to the next lowest card. (See the game just ended on Page 5!)

Snowball Fighting (Steve Mayers, Dave Partridge; need 4-8 more players): Take your best shots in this backyard melee. Players have several attacks and defenses to choose from, like throwing a snowman's head and hiding under trees. It's a great, simple game that everyone who plays it seems to love. Give it a try! Rules and map provided if needed.

Kingmaker (Paul Risner, Mike Scott; need 2-4 more players: This classic game will be played using most advanced rules, many optional rules (including ones published in The General) and additional rules and cards from the Expansion Event Card Deck. (E.g., nobles killed and loyalty tables, optional parliament, commission, ambush, alliance, vacillating allegiance, royal death, attack troops from town cards, combat at sea and advanced siege.) Played Crown cards are public knowledge. Factions' order of play will rotate each turn. The intent is to speed up play, encourage battles and make it more difficult for nobles to hole up in strongholds. The rulebook will be provided mailed for $\$ 2$, and a hardcopy map should be available for free. Other rules will be available by mail or e-mail, or published in ishkibibble in the near future.

MUSLIMS TO BYZANTINES: I thought we agreed Otranto would remain mine and that the Ionian was a free sail zone. I see now that I cannot trust anyone around me in this game. Naples disappears and you go against an agreement just made. Is no one my friend in this game?

DATELINE: NAPLES: On a hot sunny spring day, a crowd gathers in the Naples town square to hear the first words of the new leader. (The previous leader was known as The Ward, because he warred with his neighbors oft and on, but usually oft.) The crowd is beaten into silence by the palace guards as the new leader trips onto the balcony, having not seen the step up to the parapet. Unscrolling a furl, the new leader begins to read his first proclamation.
"Your new Norman king, to be known as The Norm, acknowledges the many requests for assistance in foreign fields that he has received. There is a secret code of six colors (Blue, Green, Orange, Purple, Red and Yellow) that players must attempt to guess correctly using deduction from previous guesses. Each turn, a player may submit one guess. If any player correctly guesses the secret code, then he wins, otherwise I will pick one guess at random and score it as follows: a if the player correctly guesses the color and position of a part of the code, and a $O$ if the player correctly guesses the color but not the position of a part of the code. For example, if the secret code were "B G O P R R" and a player guessed "R Y P P B R", then his score would be "- ○ O".

1. Remember thy good humor, and keep it whole. These games are supposed to be fun for all, so don't become a party-pooper if you get stabbed or eliminated, which happens to everyone at some point. It's just a game. Don't make me have to slap you in public.
2. Thou shalt tithe regularly ... maybe. You must subscribe or trade to receive the mailed version of this zine. The PDF version of it and games are free - yes, FREE! Results will be given by phone or e-mail if and only if I have mailed the current issue and you contact me.
3. Honor thy rulebook. The 1976 Rules for Diplomacy will be used to adjudicate all Diplomacy games, except where noted in variant rules. If you find a mistake in a game report - unlikely as that is! - you have until the next deadline to tell me or the mistake will stand (though it might not sit well).
4. Thou shalt not procrastinate. Deadlines are clearly listed with each game report. Although I will accept orders for a game after its deadline if I haven't typeset the adjudication, don't push your luck by getting orders to me late. E-mailed orders are more than welcome. If you're using snail mail, be wise and send your orders a week before the deadline. If you want to phone in your orders, fine. Call anytime - you may leave messages of any length on my answering machine if we don't talk. If you want to send your orders by a Jehovah's Witness, forget it.
5. Thou shalt not confuse. It is each player's responsibility to make his orders legible and clear on intent. If I cannot decipher them or you make a stupid mistake, then any blame will fall on
you. Always state your name, the game's name, the position you are playing and the current turn.
6. Thou shalt not absent. If a player NMRs (no moves received), I will scrape up a standby who will submit orders for the next turn and take over if the former player blows it again. Otherwise, it's civil disorder time.
7. Thou shalt not prolong unnecessarily. After the first year in a Diplomacy game or variant, winter and spring seasons will be combined unless at least half of the active players (rounded down, minimum of two) request a separation of seasons for the upcoming turn. Conditional orders based on retreats, adjustments and player changes are allowed. No wagering, please.
8. Thou shalt not prevaricate. At any time, a player may propose a concession to a single power or a draw including all survivors. Players' votes are required by the next deadline. ( $\mathrm{NMR}=$ yes, no vote received $=$ no.) Proposals must pass unanimously to end a game before an outright win. I will state only if a given proposal succeeds or fails.
9. Thou shalt not refrain. Unless stated otherwise, all games feature black press, which is encouraged to add atmosphere to them. Only players' names and "Brer Phil" are reserved. Press will not be published if a game's adjudication is delayed for any reason.
10. Honor thy GM. Cheating or deception of the GM will result in a player's immediate, permanent and nonrefundable excommunication from this zine and any future zines by me. Call it Brer Phil's Death Slap!
