The near-six-month-long, brutal West Central Florida summer is in the homestretch, which means I'll start kayaking again on weekends — when I can rip myself away from the TV and watching NFL games! (*Woo-HOO!*) Yes, it's that time of the year again, when pro football dominates my spare waking moments. There are a record number of people participating in this zine's Simple Fantasy Football and Final Standings Prognostication contests, and the Survivor Pool is still drawing interest. As you'll see, I made some pretty unusual predictions when compared to others in the Standings contest. (Hey, it took Dick Vermeil three years to get the Eagles and Rams to the Super Bowl, and he's in his third year coaching the Chiefs!)

• **Virus Stuff:** In case you've been unsuccessful in sending e-mails to me, I've been getting a flood of e-mail spam with 100K attachments clogging up my inbox since around Aug. 25. Dave Partridge said he got an infected message from me, but I just scanned my home computer's system, and nothing's amiss with it, so I'm concluding it's other people's fault. Any ideas or suggestions on what I can or should do to combat this problem?

• **TV Talk:** The summer is ending, and so are a lot of TV shows I have enjoyed watching, particularly HBO's "Project Greenlight," "Sex and the City" and "The Wire," ESPN's "Beg, Borrow and Deal" and "The 2003 World Series of Poker," CBS' "The Amazing Race" and "Big Brother," and ABC's "The Family." But now I can look forward to the fall season and the return of shows like NBC's "Boomtown" (easily the best drama on TV) CBS's "Survivor" and HBO's new series, "Carnivale" (which co-stars the creepy midget from "Twin Peaks")....

And perhaps the continuation of Spike TV's "**Most Extreme Elimination Challenge**," a hilarious set of physical contests taken from a Japanese series but given randy American voice-overs. The events range from contestants swinging from a rope and trying to stick onto a Velcro-coated wall to traversing a series of large rollers without slipping off and banging various parts of their bodies. Yet another great reality show that makes fun of others' misfortunes!

• **Music Update:** I've been heavily feeding my esoteric appetite for progressive rock lately, ordering more than a dozen CDs from GFT Cyclops and more than that via Amazon.com and other online sellers. Favorite albums from this batch: The Book of Dreams by **Mangala Vallis**, an early Genesis-like Italian group with different English vocalists sometimes reminiscent of Peter Gabriel or Fish; and The Gates of Omega by **Moongarden**, another Italian group with English vocals, but more instrumental and quiet at times.

• **Movie Reviews:**

"**Chicago**" (A): A wonderful movie, well-deserving of the Best Picture Oscar. Great musical numbers, choreography and acting. "All That Jazz" has been my second-favorite movie for a long time ("Monty Python and the Holy Grail" being first, of course!), so it's no surprise that I enjoyed another one based on a Bob Fosse play.

"**The Man from Elysian Fields**" (A): A very moving drama starring Andy Garcia as a frustrated novelist who reluctantly joins a refined Mick Jagger's (!) male escort service to make ends meet (no pun intended). Julianna Margulies is quite good as Garcia's wife.

"**Equilibrium**" (B+): Christian Bale stars in a "Minority Report"-esque cautionary tale set in the near future, in which citizens must regularly take injections to control emotional extremes. Bale plays a "graviton cleric" who roots out sense offenders hiding with their books and art outside the metropolis, but an encounter with offender Emily Watson sets him down the road toward rebellion. Features a lot of neat "Matrix"-style action sequences.

"**Poolhall Junkies**" (B+): A surprisingly charming comedy of a talented but frustrated pool player who turns hustler instead of professional. Starring Chazz Palminteri and Christopher Walken, it is a project directed and cowritten by Mars Callahan, a 20-something pool player who ultimately cast himself in the lead role after a production company failed to get it underway.

"**Bounce**" (B): Ben Affleck and Gwyneth Paltrow in a touching romance with well-intentioned deception.

"**Laurel Canyon**" (B): Uptight Christian Bale and his naive,

Game Openings

Diplomacy (Tim Snyder, Fred Wiedemeyer, Don Williams; need 4 more players): Preference lists are welcome.

African Diplomacy (Cary Nichols, Kevin Wilson; need 4 more players): Designed by yours truly. Players pretend Africa is armed to the hilt and turning on itself. Ethiopia, Ivory Coast, Libya, Saudi Arabia, South Africa and Zaire compete. Preference lists are welcome. Rules and map available.

Ard-Ri Diplomacy (Marc Ellinger, Steve Mayers, Karl Schmit; need 3 more players): Six powers — Connacht, Laigin, Midhe, Muma, Ulaid and the Vikings — battle for dominance of a small island circa 379 A.D. The first five powers already inhabit the island; the Vikings start off-board and are looking to find a new home there! A neat, not-well-known, cutthroat variant. Preference lists are welcome. Rules and map available.

Balkan Wars Diplomacy VI (Paul Dowden, Kevin Wilson; need 4 more players): The great, cutthroat classic featuring Albania, Bulgaria, Greece, Rumania, Serbia and Turkey. Preference lists are welcome. Rules and map available.

Middle Eastern Diplomacy (Paul Dowden; need 6 more players): Egypt, Iran, Iraq, Israel, Saudi Arabia, Syria and Turkey fight to decide who rules the area. Yet another cutthroat variant, and designed by me. Preference lists are welcome. Rules and map available.

Mitotic Diplomacy (Cary Nichols, Dave Partridge, Gerry Paulson, Karl Schmit; need 3 more players): Another variant designed by me. Set on the regular map, the main rule change is that new units are not necessarily built in home supply centers,

but rather existing units are duplicated. (Think cell division.) Thus, two units can occupy the same space after winter adjustments. Preference lists are welcome. Rules available.

HellRail (Karl Schmit; need 2-3 more players): A simple choo-choo card game with a devilish twist! Players draw cards representing both loads of sinners that must be taken to appropriate circles of Hell as well as rails that can be played to forge the routes to get there. Trains entering circles may use randomly assigned effects to rotate or remove rail cards, steal or derail loads, or acquire boatmen to cross over empty spaces between circles or rail cards, for example. Rules and photocopies of all cards and counters available.

Monopoly (Karl Muller (?), Cary Nichols; need 2-4 more players): The classic game played with simultaneous movement and tournament rules. Last player with a fistful of money wins! Rules and photocopied board available.

Nuclear War (Karl Schmit; need 3-5 more players): “Do you have change for 25 million people?” That’s what you might say during play of this hilarious card game of missiles, bombers, killer satellites, top secrets, spies, propaganda, the “Super Germ” — *and final retaliation!* Can your people survive the nuclear holocaust to come? Rules and card list available.

Snowball Fighting (Steve Mayers, Dave Partridge, Bill Scharf; Karl Schmit; need 1-4 more players): Take your best shots in this backyard melee. Players have several attacks and defenses, like throwing a snowman’s head and hiding under trees. A simple game that everyone who plays it seems to love. Rules and map available.

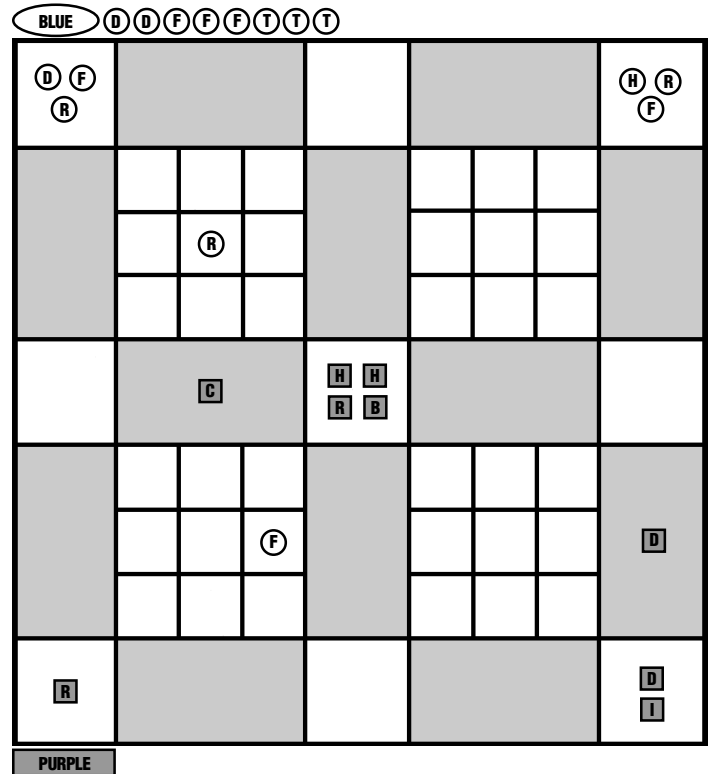

The draft worked out pretty well, because everyone's two drafted teams were in their top 10: Karl M. and I made out best, getting our 1st and 3rd choices; Paul made out worst, getting his 2nd and 9th choices.

An explanation about the draft process. As with Diplomacy preference lists, a player automatically drafted his first choice if nobody else had it as a first choice. Ties initially were broken randomly. However, if a player lost a tiebreak, he received a +1 modifier for the next tiebreak involving him. (Each player started with a 0 modifier.) Similarly, if a player won a tiebreak, he received a -1 modifier. This process was used until everyone had drafted a first team. Once all of the first round's drafted teams were crossed off everyone's lists, then the second round began using the same process, with modifiers carrying over. For example, I beat Steve in our first tiebreak, but because of this, he beat me in our second tiebreak. I have used this method the past two seasons of Simple

Fantasy Football, and everyone seems to like the balancing effect it has, so that no one player gets an unusual advantage over the others.

The contest is divided into four quarters, the first three ending at noon ET on the following days: Oct. 4, Nov. 1 and Nov. 26. At any time, you may notify me that you are dropping one of your teams and picking up an unclaimed team, or making a one-for-one team trade with another player. (Both players must order this.) However, you may not get rid of a team that you just acquired in the same quarter. Changes won't affect scoring until the next quarter begins. I will notify all players via e-mail (except for Cary, by mail) when a transaction has occurred.

Finally, each player scores one point each time one of his teams wins a game, so you can sit back and do nothing for the rest of the season, if you want — your two drafted teams are yours to live and die with; you're under no obligations to make any changes.
