VER PLOEG SPEAKS...Brenton VerFloeg

As promised, I am going to try to forget about the game that is being played out before our very eyes, and merely take the positions involved and analyze them from an abstract point of view, contingent on what their best interests demand. This time: ITALY.

Italy is my least favorite country, by a margin of maybe 20-1. Offensively, it's almost impossible to get new builds to the front, and defensively, Italy at 4 or 5 units will often get nailed from one side if he fares out on another. Given those inherent weaknesses, the Diplomacy weak sister is in a potentially excellent position from which to build this year. He is not subject to the defensive weakness, provided he moves quickly enough, because France will obviously be too busy. Offensively, Austria is on the ropes, so it's a race against time for Italy. Can he become a major power before E/G roll down on him from behind? If so, perhaps he can pry one of the allies away from the other. By annihilating the Apulia army this next turn, he can go to four in the Fall, and be at five by next year. The crucial issue is his alliance structure.

Italy has one obvious ally--Russia. R/I is almost a certainty as far as usual procedures are concerned, for Italy must, above all, grow now or he will never have the chance. But assume that done for a moment. What strategic problems confront him? (1) At his front is Turkey--powerful and obviously impossible to defeat before potential enemies break through France. Must he fight Naus with Russia, or turn against him? (2) If he protects himself for the short term by an alliance with Russia, and gets tied up against Turkey, who will protect his rear? (3) If he allies with Turkey, where will he expand, and how will he ever manage to curtail the traditional habit of Turkey in an I/T alliance to slip past Italy to "stop the Western powers" and somehow manage to find lay-over points in the Italian ports? (4) What alliance structure will serve to break the E/G danger? All of these must be considered, if only in general terms.

In terms of solution, Italy is saddled with all the problems which his country implies, and there are a great many. He must, however, (1) try to break up the English and Germans; (2) NOT allow the Russians and Turks to

unite--if this alternative comes off, he may as well forget it, and let E/G hit R/T somewhere in the middle of his country; (3) eliminate the Austrians on his front as quickly as possible, in order to gain enough power to become an effective negotiator (and note that his alliance structure must be set BEFORE he gets a center or two; if he builds fleets, it's anti-Turkish, and he doesn't want to have to do that unless there is no other alternative). Those are negative requirements, of course. Positively, and in obvious correlation to the above, he might try several things at this point:

[1] Gain an alliance with E against G by arguing that he could take the ground portion of the assault. This cannot be credible, however, without a Turkish alliance also, because the Turks would bowl though weak Italian sea power long before the English could help out.

[2] Try to become the naval power for a Russian/German/Italian play. Obviously, the German alliance would be scheduled to come into play only AFTER the demise of France--E & G would be pretty foolish to give up all those centers now after starting in on them. Italy could build all fleets, and might become the crucial power against the English and Turks, picking up concessions as he went. Iberia perhaps from the English, and a couple of centers from the Turks. The key of diplomacy, of course, is to keep the REST of the board in stasis while YOU make headway and gain the initiative. Frankly, this method would serve Italy the best.

[3] Try to knock out Turkey with a Russian alliance in time to be able to forget about the Germans and English. In fact, the whole point would be involved in a race against time. Obviously, this is a poor alternative, but sometimes when you have only small change because of the positions of other powers, you must do the best you can....

[4] He might, finally, try to ally with France, sending a fleet out his way in order to help out, and maybe sending two. Here again, he would have to have a Turkish alliance, which would probably be hard to procure, but he could argue that Turkey would have to do SOMETHING in order to hold up the E/G alliance. And even if it involves keeping three inactive fleets, he could argue that it's better that the fleets be inactive than that the western powers become so large that they would bear Turkey down. Turkey will have no trouble getting third in this game, but that's not what anyone tries for. First, of course, he would have to get Turkey either to abandon Austria, or turn Austria against Russia, while ceding a center or two to Italy to provide for the much needed extra fleet or two (or three). A dangerous game for Turkey, but aren't they all?

As far as being attractive, and starting from equal positions, I would rate, in order of preference, in this way: 2,4,1,3. The big problem with Diplomacy, though, is that you do NOT start out anonymously--the countries are all played by people, and they all have their separate ways of doing things. Having talked plenty about personalities last time, I spent this entire article on NOTHING BUT artificial considerations of strategy. Any attempt to read personalities into this article, or any resemblance to any person living or dead, is entirely coincidental, and the management denies all responsibility therefor. Now I'm going out and get stoned.
