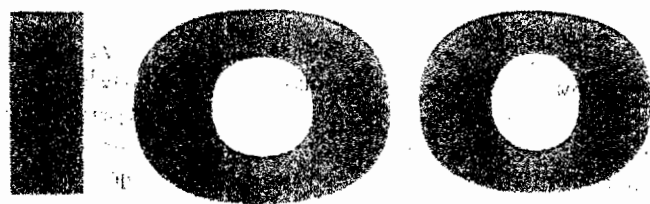
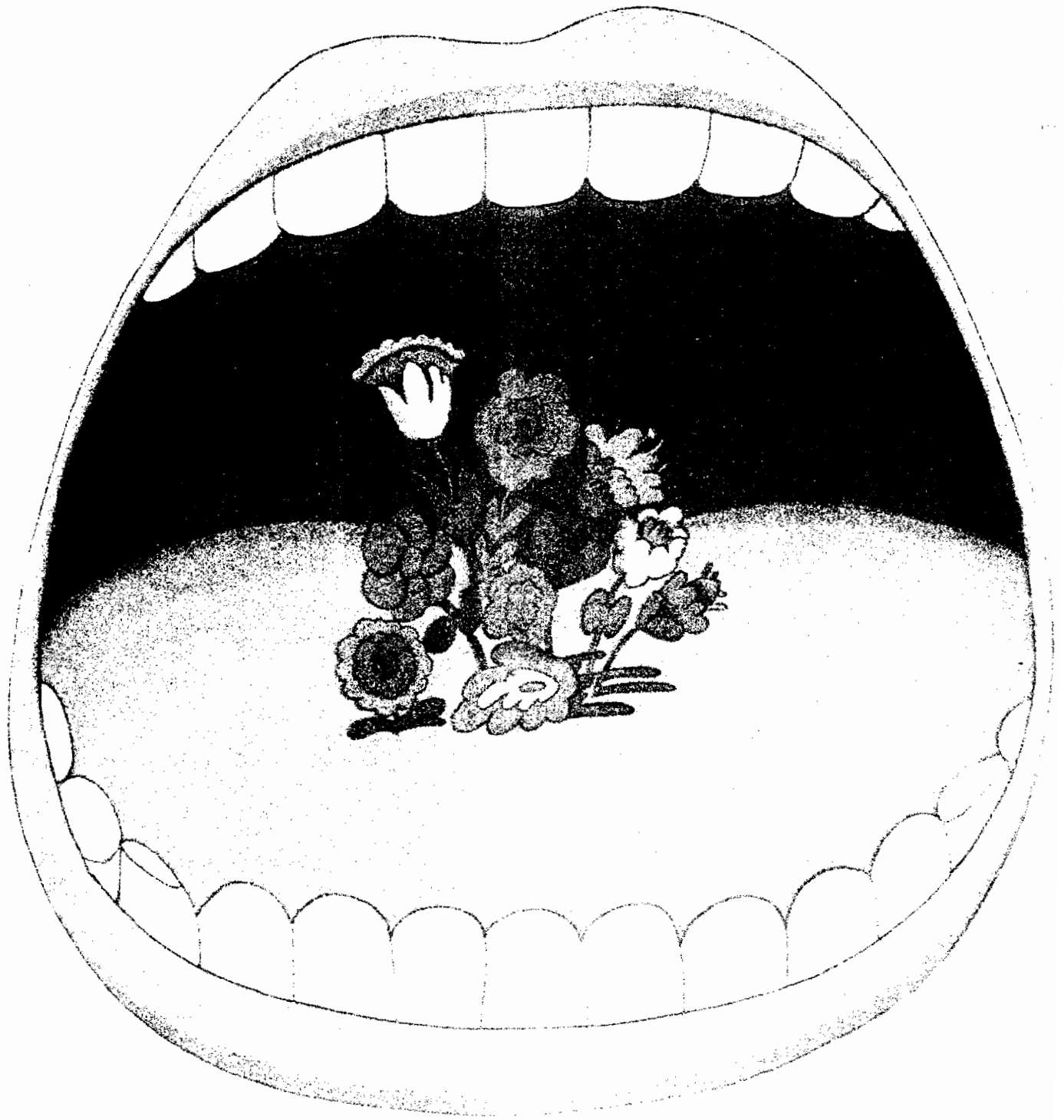

This is issue #100 of the LIBERTERREAN. Comments, congratulations, and letters from readers have provoked a lot of thought on my part in the past couple of weeks. It's gratifying to find that a project, which I find is among the most enjoyable things I do, is also enjoyed by many others. Looking back over my records, I think congratulations go to some subscribers more than to me. David Tutacko has been a subscriber to the LIB since its very beginning. Dennis Klein picked it up with issue #2. Carl Olson, Bob Spencer, and Fred Bolin also joined our little club in 1974, the first year of the LIB. These people, as well as others of you who have joined us later, all had to suffer through my experiments with how to produce this zine: my errors as well as my few successful breakthroughs.

In return for your fortitude and that of all subscribers to the LIB, I'm enclosing a game with this issue. I've not made it easy for you: the map, 12"x18", is printed on 16# paper. It might disintegrate after a couple of usings unless you mount it on something heavier. The counters while unmounted are printed on really bright pretty paper. The scenario description is included in the pages of this zine. But the rules of play are the Armored Barbarism rules we have all developed over the past 3 years. Many subscribers already have copies of these rules, so they are not included. Any subscriber who wants these rules so he may play "The Battle of Steamroller Farm" will receive them upon request, free of charge. Any others who want the rules must pay \$1.00. I've only printed enough copies of this game for subscribers to the LIB--a limited edition game! No extra copies are available. All subscribers have my permission to photocopy the scenario, map, and counters for their personal use and that of their friends, should you wish to. So you needn't request my permission.

"STEAMROLLER FARM"*

[* So named because the site of the battle occurred at a farm whose owner used a steamroller to build roads for his own use.]

This battle took place on February 28, 1943. During this period, the Allies were beginning to put great pressure on the Germans at Kasserine, to the south. The 10th Panzer Division is holding a front wider than 60 km against the British 78th Inf XX,

6th Armored XX, 26th Armored X, 38th Inf X, 1st Parachute X, and the 4th Chasseurs d'Afrique (consisting of Foreign Legion, colonial inf, and mounted desert troops [Spahis]). As if this opposition weren't enough, the Germans wanted to draw even more Allied forces away from Kasserine and into this area. Accordingly, a Kampfgruppe was formed for a raid behind Allied lines. This battlegroup was of reinforced company strength. It set out on February 24, 1943 from German lines southeast of Goubellat. It proceeded through the Mahmoud Gap in the Djebel Rihane (very difficult mountains) and debouched onto a little highland valley where they found the Steamroller Farm.

The 78th Inf division was deployed north of Goubellat, while the remaining Allied forces were deployed 8-10 km south of that town, leaving a break in their lines which the Germans had filled with mines. But to watch the gap in the mountains, the British had posted #6 Commando at the farm. This small outpost was quickly overrun by the Germans. As the Allies had withdrawn forces from this area to reinforce Kasserine, and as the Germans were keeping strong pressure on the British (Operation Ochsenkopf [Oxhead] was launched on Feb. 26), the Allies were not able to attend to Steamroller Farm until Feb. 28.

The scenario is 20 turns with the Allied objective to retake the farm and close the Mahmoud Gap again. Victory may be scored by the point value of units lost, but the Germans need to cause a loss ratio of at least 2:1 on the British to avoid a strategic defeat of this operation.

The Germans have the following forces available (You may organize your platoons & HQ as desired as if it were one company, even though it may consist of 10 or more platoons): German Panic level is "2"

The Germans also have STUKAs: 1 x Med CAS (which may only be used 6 times during the scenario). All German soft units may begin the game in IP.

The British Units (Panic "2" also):

DEPLOYMENT:

Germans may deploy freely north of hexrow 15xx. Historically, one 88 was at 1609, one at 2716; the mortars and some infantry in & about 2904; all the other AT & AA were on the hill around the farm building; the tanks and most of the transport were in a vehicle park along the road near 2818.

The British enter turn one or later mounted on their trucks at the road edge hex designated "To Aroussa".

TERRAIN:

Most of the terrain on this map is "Broken". The road is a light duty road; the trees are "Closed". The farm house is "Building". The shaded hexes are the only "Clear" terrain on the map. Please note the doubled topographical lines around the canyon of hex 2904. These denote steep cliffs which are impasable. The brown "Defilade" hexsides in 2810-2812 are only 'slit trenches' and so give "Defilade" protection to soft units only.

Good luck with the scenario, I hope you enjoy it as much as I did researching it and designing it. I've had fun playing around with it.

PS: Please note the counters are printed on both FRONT & BACK sides. If you're careful to line up the countersheets (they are cut exactly to size) you'll have pink backs on your red counters and light blue on your dark blue.
