EDITORIAL:

Did you all make it through 1984? At least one LIB subscriber wants me to keep the 1984 Essay contest open for one more submission. So, if you also have something more to say, send it in.

Reagan's administration changed its tack a little bit during 1984 on the Nicaragua question. Did you notice? They used to say the "Contras" were going to overthrow the Sandinistas and establish "democracy" (of course there was no democracy when the Contras were in power before the Sandinistas. And a larger percentage of Nicaraguan voters voted for the Sandinistas than US voters for Reagan in their respective elections this past Fall).

Now the official line is: US support of the Contras is designed only to keep the Sandinistas "off-balance" (sounds innocuous enough doesn't it? Hardly sounds like anyone is getting hurt at all!) so they can't send Communist weapons to the rebels in El Salvador. After 5 years of US claims of Sandinista support to the El Salvador rebels one might expect to see some evidence of Communist weapons in El Salvador. Has there been so much as a pistol found captured from the rebels? If there had been, you can bet Reagan would hold a giant press conference to show it off to the world.

Face it, the Reagan administration just wants dependent client regimes in Latin America, and isn't concerned at all if the countries are democratic or not.

ARMORED BARBARISM 1985:

It is August, 1939 once again and WW2 is about to erupt. More than 30 LIBbers have developed and played Armored Barbarism since 1975. This is the first AB game to be opened in more than a year. I want 10 players: Germany, Russia, France, United Kingdom, Italy, Poland, Spain, Turkey, United States and Japan. But I will begin as soon as the first 8 positions are filled, adding the US and Japan later. I think I will be able to play a small neutral, Sweden, without disrupting the game.

Each issue of the LIB will be one or more monthly turns in which players have full diplomatic and economic control over their countries. Military control includes all strategic decisions, maintaining rosters of infantry divisions and armored regiments, purchasing units from a two-page appendix of vehicle types. Infantry and armored carriers are standardized. Operational decisions about zone attacks and defenses, whether to send reinforcements to an embattled zone, or to withdraw, how much to commit to an attack or defense are all fully within the players' control.

Weather is a factor in this game, and is important enough to probably reduce operations during winter months (except in N. Africa and the Middle East), so some turns might include more than one month. Minors may be politically controlled, and strategic movement of units require fuel expenditure (if you don't save enough PP in your fuel account, your units won't move). However, players receive monthly income. You no longer have to wait to do annual budgets.

Tactical combat will be played with the force mixes chosen by the players using the SSI computer game "Combat Leader". I and my friends here in Eugene will play each month's tactical scenario twice and combine the results for the combat reports to appear, along with player press and reports of force levels engaged, in each issue of the LIB. It is possible players in other locations might be assigned tactical scenarios to play provided at least two can get together from opposite alliances and have Combat Leader to play.

If you want more information, a SASE will bring you a copy of the rules and a strategic world map. If you want to play, accompany your request for assignment with your preference list of positions, the \$3.00 game fee, and at least \$2.00 for the first 8 turns at \$0.25 per turn.

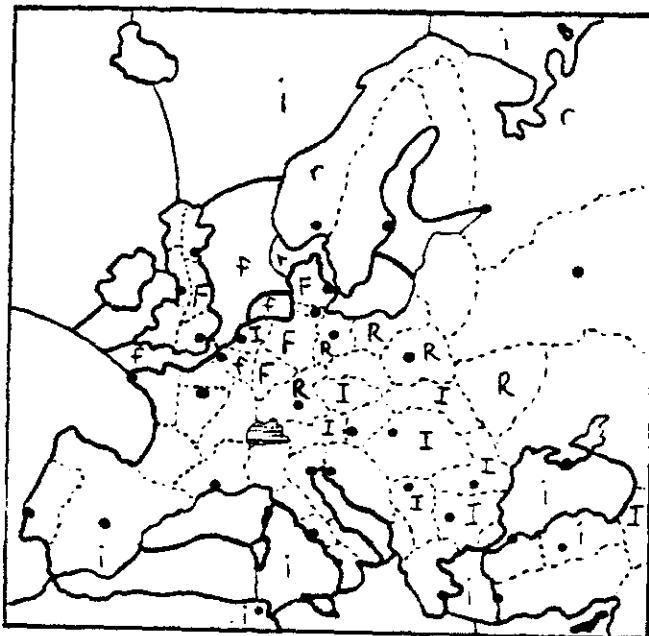
PRESS:

believe it was fair, and what I'd have done in your position.
Now you'll be a clear & distant third, after losing Den, Rum &

FIELD OF FIRE

Field of Fire (Avalon Hill, \$30) is a one-player tactical
game simulating eight small-unit infantry combat scenarios from
WW2. Those of you familiar with Broderbund's Operation
Whirlwind will notice some similarities in this game. Roger
Damon designed them both, and Field of Fire is a further
development and improvement on Operation Whirlwind.

Each game lasts an hour or two, and all player input is
with the joystick. You give orders to your units in separate
Fire, Movement and Assault phases. Operations occur during a
"real-time" phase in which you must keep close track of the
action in the battle. At any time, you may press the Select key
to re-target your units' fire, or the Option key to order an
assault.

The units are fire-teams of 1-6 men, or individual tanks.
There are Headquarters, Rifle teams, Machine Gun crews,
Bazooka/Panzerfaust teams, Mortar crews, Forward Observers,
Engineers and Anti-Tank Guns. Each unit is identified by the
name of its leader. The documentation describes each of these
men. You might consider the information when giving each of
them tasks to accomplish. The program provides an Editor to
allow you to change the names of any of the 32 characters in the
game.

There are 10 terrain types in the game, including roads,
trees, ridges, hilltops, woods, buildings, streams and rivers,
mountains and hedgerows. Terrain and distances may block the
line of sight to a target. The map scrolls smoothly across 5
screens. Status messages appear at the top and bottom of the
screen.

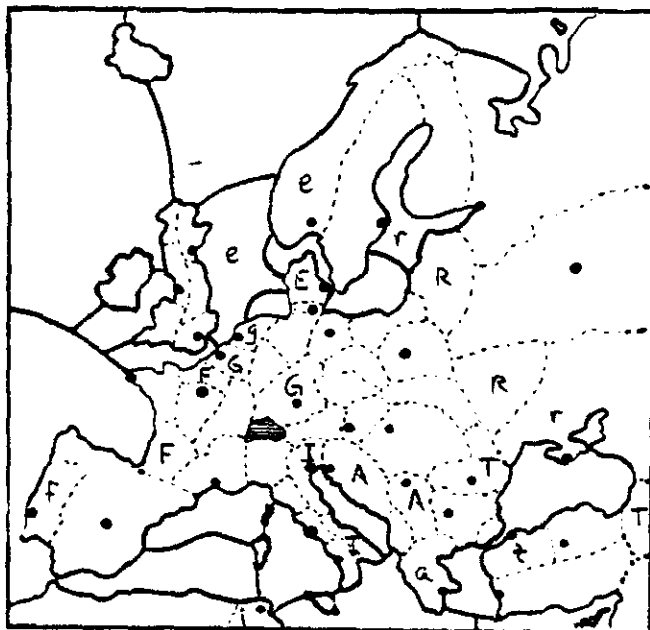
The 8 scenarios include a Night Patrol in Tunisia; Forever
Road in Sicily; Omaha beach D-Day landing; Night of St. Anne to
close a pocket on some Germans; Up From the Beach, breaking out
of the beachhead; For Aachen, block-by-block clearing of a city;
Ardenne Dawn, the last-ditch German counter-offensive; and
Roeder Crossing, one of the last obstacles before the Rhine.

The last 8 pages of the 25-page manual is a detailed
description of the actual "Night of St. Anne" written by the
commander of I Company of the 3rd Battalion, 26th Infantry, 1st
Division.

For players of wargames, this program is an excellent value
for the money. The color, graphics and sound are appropriate
and well-executed. It is really 8 games in one, as each
scenario is complete in itself. The program offers the option
of a "Campaign Game" in which you play each of the scenarios in
order. Player performance is graded at 5 levels from
Questionable to Strategic.
