The last issue of NEOPHYTE has brought results! That issue has prompted Bob Johnson to say, "Do you get LIAISONS DANGEREUSES? Hor Poop! ...I have run into more than a couple of foolish people. But!, none nothing has been as bad as the recent claptrap I received recently of the mimeo of Len Lakofka. ...After a stupid ignorant attack on Rod Walker...he begins speaking for everyone, telling us what we don't like about the potential new DipOrg, the interim constitution and assorted people. ...Lenny baby, I ask you, if you didn't want to work within the DraftComm, why did you come crying to me, begging that I let you on. ...as for our wondermay Lenny...wouldn't it be nice if he waited to run for office and promised to obey the rules that govern an organization."
A few Days later Rod Walker said:

"You ((Bob Johnson)) wanted to get the machenery rolling whether it was ready or not. Len is right in this respect; the DraftCom did we not write a constitution. It merely accepted, without public debate, one you wrote yourself. I will tell you frankly, I think it is a very bad document...it would have been wiser to let the Comm. work and propose a better product.... The point is, we now have a document which I doubt will inspire confidence, no election in sight, an exhorbitant \$2\$ fee, and a public fight among the 'founding fathers'".

I believe I shall quote the last NEOPHYTE, to refresh your mempry: "1. No nne shall collect dues until the intirum constitution is adopted by the members.

- 2. No final constitution shall be started until dues are legally collected under the rules of the legally adopted interim constitution.
- 3. The election now in progress shall be a referendum to select a group to act as coordinators for six months only."

I can also quote more from CA 1,2, &3, GALLARDIA 1 #7&8, and NEW ALBION 3, in whihe the following was stated: 1) Bob would collect opinions on the Interim constituion he wrote and mail them to all of the committee for discussion and debate. (He did not.) 2) An election was to be held and finished by Feb. 1, 1972 (It has not been run.) 3) A contest for the name fo the New Organization was to be held. (It was not.) 4) The Interim constitution was to be ratififed by the membership by January 1, 1972. (It was not.) 5) "Disagreements should be resolved privately...we should cooperate, at least publically."

One of the most vexing problems in postal play is the missing of a move (build, retreat, removal). As you may know the U.S. Postal Service Inc. is not too swift when it comes to getting mail from place to place on time--if at all! Orders and 'zines are often LOST NEVER to be found! How can you avoid this problem?

The first problem involves the receipt of the magazine. You can, with a reasonably dependable GM, time the arrival so that missing it will be obvious. Yet not every GM is on an absolute schedule. Therefore it is wise to have your ally write you as soon as he receives the zine, and for you to return the favor. You can go so far as to have him include the zine in xerox form, but that is asking a lot. If the zine is missing you can usually recover if you find out quickly.

The next problem is the submission of orders. There are a

number of systems.

1. The carbon system: Make a carbon of your moves and mail them on two seperate days. One will almost always get through.

2) The receipt system a) enclose a stamped self addressed envelope or post card to be mailed back by the GM or b) get a Post Office receipt card for 15% (I believe).

- 3) The advance order system. File with the PRIOR move, a set of orders AND some "sealed orders" to be used in case you misss a move. Most GM accept this type of order. SO can be as brief or as detailed as you wish. ALWAYS provide for retreats/removals/builds! It can be a fatal error to overlook this possibility. If you have to, give a general rule of thumb for these three possibilites, i.e. build armies before fleets and list supply centers in order or desire, or remove in the north first, or retreat to the home lines first, etc. Always provide SOME kind of rule so you don't miss all-important builds, removals, and retreats!!
- 4) Telegraph your move REQUIRING the message be MAILED NOT PHONED to the GM.

5) Telephoning your moves yourslef (if you're rich or close)

6) Ally method. Send a copy of your moves to an ally who will mail them with his orders (this is not allowed by some GMs so check first).

It is important to note that the GM does not live at home waiting for your move AND that people living in his mome are NOT his agents. Special Delivery letters, Letters he must sigh for, and phone calls at all hours are NOT appreciated by the GMs!

Your best policy is to mail SOME orders as soon as the zine arrives, and ALWAYS have sealed orders on file. Don't wait till the last minute and depend on the mails to get the move through!

I recommend the purahase of a columnar pad to use for your records. Title the columns:

1) Gamemaster &/or magazine 2) Boardman #, game # 3) deadline, 4) moves dated 5) moves sent on 6) receipt enclosed 7) receipt returned, 8) phone mall made on 9) deadline extension requested 10) communique sent on 11) communique required answer on 12) Treaty expires in and whatever else you care to add. This system allows you to keep track of your games and communications. A receipt should take 7 working days to get back to you.

Good luck, and lets hope postal rates don't go up AGAIN!

MUNICH; minister of culture Karl Kunstliebr expressed shock today at theflippant characterization of the German people as "Latinazed Huns" by the great Italian General, Luigi Cadorna, of Caporetto fame. "I can't imagine why he would say such a thing," the Minister complain, "Why, hardly any Germans can speak Latin, and it's common knowledge that all of the Huns are in Austria-Hungary!" The Minister added that he did not consider it an insult to be called a Hun, but only wanted to set the record straight.

MARSEILLES/via munich/; German enginners on loan to France today broke into a network of Italian tunnels while digging fortification five miles east of the city. Advancing down the tunnels toward the Italian border they uncovered and caputed what porved to be the entire Italian spy organization in Southern France, gathered together to celebrate the birthdayof Benito Mussolini. When asked about the Italian intelligence operations the captain of enginners snorted in distain. "Intelligence? Stupidilty is the word! If there were any brains in Italy they come from Austria!"

KIEL--In a raredisplay of diplomatic candor German Defense Minister Wilhelm Kriegmacher admitted that there had been a mistake in the recent sale of arms to France. "We game them the wrong fifles, "he said." instead of modern, German made weapons we game them Italian muskets of the ighteenth century. It's not surprising they didn't work, considering the country of origin!" He indicated that the muskets had been captured en masse by a band of German mercenaries in 1783 in Bologna and sent home to Eavaria as a trophy. When askedif the mishap was accidental he replied, "just a slipup in the supply system. We're looking for the guilty culprit now." He mentioned a group or suspicious Italians known to be working in Germany. When told about Italian contempt for German weapons the Minister collapsed in gales of laughter. "We'll see how they like the battleships our marine enginners are building in Marseilles!"
