News & comment within and without/L Lakofka

NEW ORGANIZATION takes its first unsure steps!

- 1. The election, bungled as it was, is now over and final! the results of the final election are: Interin officers; President, Larry Peery, VP; Walter Buchanan, Ombudsman; Edi Birsan, Editor; John Boyer, Atlantic Regional sec.; Steve Nozik, Pacific regional sec.; John Biehl, Midwest regional secretary; Lenard Lakofka, At large secretaries; Rod Walker and Elliot Lipson. The name of the "new org" is "International Diplomacy Association" and its newsletter shall be "the Diplomacy Review".
- 2. Some early business in the IDA:
 - John Boyer has, in a letter to the council members, suggested weighted votes for some members of the council. Thus as MRS (Midwest Regional Secretary) I'd cast about 15 votes. Large Secretaries (ALS) would cast 68 votes etc. However, two problems quickly arrise. Would ALL officers maintain a council How could the council be polled? If we have an executive and a legislative brance then the "executive would get to execute and legislate, in short obtaining a double vote. If we agree that there are two branches then only the Ombudsman and the secretaries should vote on legislation. Second, how can the council decide this question? If each council member gets one vote in the decision, and we vote to use weighted votes, we cancel the precedent we just used to obtain the weighted vote system. I am strongly opposed to this "after the fact" call for a rape of the regional secretarie's vote. Our combined vote would equal that of one "At large" secretary. If the constitution wished to have such a system it would have to have created it.
 - B) In a recent publication of Larry Peery he comments on receiving flak from some of the members about the election and other topics. This criticism may be early. We must give him a chance, after all. If he thinks that he will dictate or decree he is wrong, and we are all aware of it. One of the topics he did not answer, in this across the board hand washing was the subjuct of the creation of an election committee. Both Walter Buchanan and I are in favor of such a body and we will now try to rally support amoung the other council members!
- 3. INTERNATIONAL DIPLOMACY ASSOCIATION games to open in LIAISONS DANGEREUSES!! LD will open three games, LD 17, LD 18, and LD 19 exclusively to the members of the IDA. Their format shall be as follows: LD 17-- open to all members of the IDA for \$2.50!! LD 18 open to members in the MID WEST region and on the COUNCIL only--\$1.00!!!!! LD 19 Futuristic Diplomacy--open to all IDA members, \$2.50. This is NOT a variant of Diplomacy! Each move will carry the standard time scale for reference (spring, summer, fall, autumn and Winter) but it will also carry a dateline in the future, in an attemt, to stimulate the PRESS. Therefore the first full set of moves will occur in the MONTH of January in 2001!
- 4. LIAISONS DANGEREUSES prowdly announces the formation of the PUBLISHER'S GAME (LD 16). Game fee now \$5.00 Paid are; Buddy Tretick, Chris Schleicher, John Boyer, Steve Cooper, Charles Welsh, and Tom Leahey. ONLY one more PUBLISHER is needed to open this exciting game!


