





THE ROGUES' GALLERY  
PLAYER ROSTER

Included are 221 games for which I have complete (or near complete) records. (some games did not have a supply center chart--therefore, awards/subtractions could be off between 10-20 points in some cases.) The number of slightly incomplete games is 84. Also included are 9 games for which I have a statement of the winner and/or totally incomplete rosters or supply center charts. I have given 240 points and adjustments shall be made when the facts are in. These games are; 69ab, 69bd, 69be, 69cg, 70aj, 70az, 71f, 71bh, 71bj. Excluded are all games having less than 7 players, played by phone, played in person, using variants in the map, and using the spring raid throughout. These games were listed in LD #37. No additions have been made to that list.

The ROGUES' GALLERY readout is reproduced as an average of "points divided by corrected games". Points are awarded on the basis of 1) centers owned, 2) length of time played (where 1 = an entire game and decimals are the fractions of a country's life. Points are subtracted on the basis of 1) loss of centers while a substitute, 2) being dropped, and 3) elimination of the country. Corrected games are the total of all whole games, and fractions of a country's life in a game, as played by the player in question. By dividing by correct games an average is obtained. This average is placed in numerical order for all players having four or more corrected games. The highest accolade is given to players whose average is 100 points or more (the CENTURY CLUB). The Century Club is not presented in the form of 1st and 2nd boards.

Note that RG gives neither a bonus nor damnation to the substitute player. He obtains proportional points for his performance and only for the length of time he plays the country in question. RG is hard on the player who drops, subtracting at least 20 points from their score. Players can no longer avoid being rated for a performance by resigning or dropping. If a player plays for one full year, that fraction appears in his corrected game total.

RG has not rated players in two very specific cases; 1) a game for novices is entered by an experienced player, 2) a player has resigned/was dropped in a game and then reappears as another country in that same game.

Draws are a function of 1) centers owned (40% of the score) and number of players in the draw (60% of the score). Draws range from 170 pts for a two player draw (17 centers) and 33 points for a seven player draw (with only one center). 2nd, 3rd, 4th etc., while existing, have no intrinsic value in themselves. Centers owned is the only criteria for awarding points to players who have not won and have not been involved in a draw. Thus 2nd can move between 100 points for 16 centers and 25 points for 4 centers.

Remember to temper the averages presented by the number of games participated in! Someone who has played in 20 corrected games should be expected to be from 5-15 pts below a comparable player with only 10 corrected games, etc.

Beginning in this issue, all autumn retreats, and winter adjustments based on those retreats, will be due on the second wednesday after mailing--namely 7 days after you get the magazine! The SPRING will be due two weeks later! All builds will be mailed on Thursday morning by post card. Conditional retreats/adjustments will be REQUESTED, not REQUIRED, with all fall moves after 1902. Therefore the new Schedule will be;

#### 1. the INTERNATIONAL DIPLOMACY ASSOCIATION

a) Handbook project. I have instigated a seperate proposal to formulate, edit, compose, print and distribute a handbook on postal diplomacy by late February 1973. I propose a comprehensive photo-offset product for sale within the hobby and to new players via mail order outlets and direct sales. Thus far response has been mixed. see elections and campaign statement on this page and page 6

b) recommendation/sanction lists. I have been appointed to a commission to investigate whether IDA should seek to comment, via listings in IDA publications, on the 'ethics' of various publishers. I have broadened the scope of the commission, in line with the suggestions I made originally, to ask whether IDA should recommend publications as good risks for players and/or guarantee the games orphaned by select member publishers. The text of the questionnaire I have sent to 12 persons is reproduced in this issue. Please fill it out and return it. Full comment shall appear on December 8 to IDA and to my readers in LD 39.

c) elections; IDA is now electing a president, regional secretaries, at large secretaries, and an editor. If you mail your \$2 fee to Walt Buchanan, R3, Lebanon Ind. 46052, you will be in plenty of time to vote.

What will you get?

Well here is what I will push for if I'm elected president of IDA. (What did he say? Is he running for IDA president?) Yes. I am running for the post of IDA president for three reasons.

- 1) I have four years experience in club administration on a play by mail basis.
- 2) I have a series of programs that I wish to start in IDA.
- 3) I am opposed to Edi Birsan's views on Presidential perogatives and the handbook project.

Providing apparently unyielding entertainment for the certified lunatic fringe

An important problem seems to have developed with the IDA, and because it appears to have occurred unnoticed, it is more serious as a consequence. By now most IDA members should be aware that the organization is scheduling upcoming elections. The problem is that major and important offices within IDA are apparently going unfilled because none have seen fit to slate anyone for the posts of Vice-President-Treasurer (now ably maned by Walt Buchanan) and the increasingly important office of Ombudsman (Edi Birsan's current job). Both of these men have handled responsible posts very competently. And the key requirements for able handling of the office of Veep-Treas. should be obvious. Edi has stepped into a newly created job which functions that were not sharply defined, and given important meaning and value to the office of Ombudsman.

For those who ask, what can a Diplomacy organization do --both in general-- for one's self, the role of ombudsman has been able to establish the beginnings of precedents for to deal with disputes between players and gamesmaster. It has served to protect the player interests --which should be the primary goal -- and can shield gamesmasters from unfair and irrational criticism where deemed appropriate. Further, it can serve to protect a player's financial interest in the game by providing some assurance that a game he has paid for will be conducted responsibly, and there is an outlet for appeal when it is felt a gm's ruling is unfair. More areas of responsibility are possible for this office. It will grow in importance as the hobby thrives and as it helps to protect the hobby.

Nobody has been nominated for either of these posts, and as far as I know, they will become vacant in the upcoming elections. There is no direct machinery for re-opening the nominations that I know of --i.e. will not compel a cumbersome constitutional or legislative process (which is one of the reasons I voted against the proposed draft of the constitution).

Does this mean that after the elections, that IDA will have to liquidate its treasury will be deprived of a Veep, and that from now on the players are on their own against the GM's? In addition, care must be taken to nominate specially able people because of the serious issues of entrustment that reside in those posts.

I have one major complaint about the IDA --and I am both a member and a candidate for midwest regional secretary.

... --my objection is that too little opportunity is given to members and the Council members to briefly consider and debate how best to resolve problems.

Too often the membership is given a document to vote yes or no on, with no time permitted for flow of information, ideas and critical debate. Plebiscites without debate can leave a bad taste, because they can open up prospects of charges of collusive steamrolling. I do not think anyone can be charged with that, but I am trying to warn that a serious long term problem can be brewing if something is not done about it now.

Arrangements must be made to slate someone for these key posts and it must be done in a way that will permit time for reasonable discussion and consideration. People, we got troubles!

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Freed of the responsibility of having to publish my own zine, there are certain freedoms available to me that are not open to most GM's (to say nothing of time). I can boost and knock zines. Best is Boardman's Graustark. Subscribe!

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The Campaign for IDA  
President, 1972

I believe that the council of the IDA should have a structured agenda, in which any council member (and any general member through his regional secretary) can raise issues for debate and have them voted on in a 6-8 week period. Mr. Birsan prefers the constitutional power of the president to control both debate and voting and to retain executive power to delay voting for up to 10 full months! If I am elected I shall relinquish the presidential control of the agenda and seek an amendment to the constitution making a structured agenda permanent.

I believe the IDA should institute the printing & distribution of its own player handbook, and that it should do so within the next 3 months. To date, IDA has done very little for the average member. I wish to provide this booklet at a discount to IDA members and to fund it via an in-house series of loans from IDA members. With a meager \$200 we can produce AND advertise a high quality photo-offset booklet on the strategy and tactics of Diplomacy and on Diplomacy variants. I am opposed to having other persons finance this project and produce the booklet with only a commission paid to IDA. We can have others sell the book FOR us and pay THEM the commission! With this extra revenue, IDA can then expand its horizons greatly. We can run tournaments, conventions, games and other projects at substantial discounts to IDA members. The sales of these booklets will provide a CONTINUING source of revenue for YEARS to come, IF we do it professionally from the beginning! I do not wish to have us sit in the mud and produce a poor ditto or mimeo product, or job out the product, when we can use it as a stepping stone to improve the hobby of postal Diplomacy.

I believe I am the best qualified candidate for the post of IDA president because of long experience in club affairs. I have been president of IFW for three years and Vice President for 1 year. Under my leadership the IFW has grown from 170 members with a budget of \$1,500/year, to 540 members and a budget of \$6,500/year! I have been directly responsible for three major conventions in the United States that drew over 2,000 gamers. I was the sponsor for DIPLOCON V in 1972 and was unopposed for that sponsorship again in 1973. I have been active in Postal Diplomacy for 3 years, and a publisher for all of that time. I was the first to offer games for players new to Diplomacy at an inexpensive game fee. I have helped a number of new publishers via contributions of articles and information. I have filled the rating gap left by Rod Walker by instituting my own rating system ROGUES' GALLERY. My commitment to the hobby has been a growing one.

I have chosen to run for IDA president because the next two years will be dynamic ones for the hobby and I believe I can best lead the IDA through those years. Thank you for your time.

The course of the Diplomacy game usually finds at least one player eliminated before the final result is achieved. By Looking through the records of 178 completed games in which clear cut wins (not concessions with 15 or fewer centers held by the 'winner') were attained, I have compiled the following historical data.
