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- DIPLOMACY REVIEW V-9 has just been mailed. It has many inaccuracies in it and I will detail them.
1. Scott Rosenberg, in a phone call to me, one to Doug Boyorlein and one to Walt Buchanan agreed to back the new proposal for the IDA NA. He has now abrogated that promise.
 2. Scott Rosenberg could have advertised this upcoming issue of NA, as he was suppose to per the agreement, but he did not. Almost all word came through Buchanan, Boyer, and myself in NA, IMPASSABLE & LD--this information came through me. Mr. Rosenberg in his own publication did not advertise the issue.
 3. Mr. Rosenberg was well aware of the fact that my resignation as president was conditional upon my return to the duties of VP/Treasurer the post I was elected to. The Council passed a bill allowing me to return to that post when a new president was elected. However we did have an acting VP and I turned the office to him to allay some of the controversy about the Canadian question. Mr. Rosenberg consulted the highest authority available, HOKELF, and decided that this was illegal and therefore that I was without office in the IDA.
 4. Mr. Rosenberg says that his records have not been updated since June because of my erratic records. Treasurer's reports were issued on; January 28, February 25, March 28, April 14, May 18, June 27, July 31, August 31, September 30 and November 4. These are approximately 1 month apart. In each case a copy was sent to Rosenberg within 3 days of the deposit being sent to the bank. Tihor was sent copies every other month to update his records. Please note that for the entire year 1976 Stephen Tihor has sat on his hands. He missed half of the called for votes and did not produce the census. He also did not keep the membership records up to date, it appears. The fact that Rosenberg did not keep his records up to date is due to his own malfeasance.
 5. The major problems of IDA were due to two causes; A. The publication committee was producing material that the membership did not like--regardless of the fact that Mr. Rosenberg was producing only that was "REQUIRED" by the constitution. B. The Council had turned into a debating society in which no useful work was being accomplished. For those two reasons the Baltimore meeting said we needed a new constitution that would better serve the membership. Mr. Rosenberg wishes to compound his unhappy work as editor by torpedoing the possibility of reform through misrepresentation about his true intent. He is trying to lay all of the blame at my door alone. I have made errors but I have tried through compromise to salvage something from the Baltimore meeting. Mr. Rosenberg has fought that all the way.
 6. In DR V #4 Mr. Rosenberg could have called for debate on the constitution--instead he decided "to stop everything" and then compromise after the fact. He then went back on his promise about that compromise. Scott now says he wants the new document defeated and a return to the 13 man chaos of 1976 till a new document is drafted.
 7. Be informed that I am still keeping the IDA records and treasury. Money sent to Tihor, after observing his record for 1976, will be throwing money down a drain.
 8. I urge you to ratify this new document, which, with reasonable men as elected officials, will proceed to help the hobby. Doublechecks upon doublechecks will yield no progress. If New York wants to splinter away that is their loss. The dishonesty of the Editor and his high handed method of handling his office must not be tolerated!

Why should the IDA NA Constitution be perfect?

1. Effectively we are NOW a regional organization, having separate treasuries for North America, Europe and United Kingdom. Therefore having Britain and Europe vote on the dispersement of funds which are all from North America (with almost no exceptions) is unfair to North American members--as we have no vote in the dispersement of UK or CE funds. Also regional matters should be voted on on a regional basis.
2. Hobby business is not going forward at this time. To delay this process by not passing the new constitution would mean elections for 13 people to run the old IDA while that organization wrote a new document. The organized hobby would have difficulty surviving such a test.
3. No constitution can be perfect. In the final analysis it is the elected officials who must run the organization. If a person who is a nit picker is elected to any organization he will try to bog the organization down in bureaucracy. A streamlined organization, in which every officer is a worker responsible for a specific job(s) has a better chance of surviving than one with many people with no job. Now we have 13 officers. Only 6 of the 13 have a specific job. While the new document may have holes reasonable men can make it work. It is written so as to be workable.

In DIPLOMACY REVIEW Vol. 5 #5 you will notice a bias. I feel that bias is inescapable. Some of the material printed is VERY old and is so far from being current thought from the persons involved it is pathetic.

Therein we also find Lew Pulsipher getting in his licks. As many of you know Lew and I do not often agree. I do not agree with all of his statements in DR Vol 5 #5. I mean Lew and I agreeing twice in one year would be unthinkable. Lew says that none of the constitution drafters should run for office in 1977. I fail to see why. The one thing we should note is that the opposition to the constitution, almost to the man, is not going to run for anything in 1977. Why they are giving it the kiss of death if they are not going to run seems insane. I plan to run because I think we have done the right thing in pushing for a new document. Perhaps we rushed it and I'm not saying that I did everything correctly. But I'll not kiss the organization good bye just because I am one of the people who tried to reform it. This also allows the voters a direct chance to vote for or against me. I want that vote and I think I have a right to it. I am not going to run and hide from the membership after all of this!

Notice--on handbooks.

I have an ample supply of 1974 Player Handbooks and plenty of Publisher Handbooks. However I have no 1975 Player Handbooks. The assortment given to me at Origins contained only three 1975 Handbooks and a large number of Diplomacy Reviews. Therefore do not send me any money for the 1975 Handbook. I will be mailing refunds on any 1975 orders I have. I fear the balance of the 1975 Handbooks are either sold out or they were misplaced at the convention.

The BOARDMAN NUMBER SUBSIDY

EVERYTHING #29 carries a long discussion about Doug Beyerlein's decision to charge \$1 per Boardman number assigned. I feel that Doug defends his position very well. He is giving from 300-600 hours per year of his time to keep the Numbers. Gamesmasters think nothing of charging from \$4 to \$20 for a gamefee but they begrudge Doug \$1 of that \$28 to \$140 total! The number of Boardman numbers being requested will increase dramatically in 1977 and beyond as AH does more selling of Diplomacy sets. It is unfair to ask to pay for this cost out of his own pocket. Early custodians had it MUCH EASIER and can afford to say that they did not charge anything so neither should Doug. Yet when you compare the amounts of work involved there is not question that without a subsidy it would cost the BNC from \$200-\$400 in 1977 alone.

A number of magic items and spells allow the user the abilities of ESP, Clairaudience and/or Clairvoyance. Items such as Magic Mirrors and Crystal Balls can summon images to their surfaces. Rings, Wands and Talismans give the ability(s) as a particular range from the wearer (saving throw theoretically applicable). Spells give an ability as a function of range and duration and also must be concentrated upon to be maintained. Yet all of these Objects/Spells are poorly explained, if explained at all.

Skyring abilities would be effected by three of the six basic characteristics; Intelligence, Wisdom and Constitution. One or more of these characteristics would effect the ability to use an item/spell, to resist a skyring spell/item, and to determine the length of time an item/spell may be used. Clarity and accuracy of the spell/item would be a function of use, level, intelligence and wisdom.

Rings, Wands, Talismans and Spells.

ESP is a spell that "detects thoughts", this does not necessarily mean read minds. The thoughts at the surface of the mind (conscious) would be the most likely target. Probes of memory, knowledge or into the subconscious would be very unlikely and almost never selective.

Clairvoyance is seeing in the mind's eye the location of thoughts OR it could be a view through the senses of the skyring being OR it could be a view as a neutral third party. The sense of sight would be the most likely sense used. Taste, feeling, hearing and smell would rarely be activated.

Clairaudience is hearing through the other's ears or hearing the scene as if you were a neutral third party.

A skyring item (other than a Crystal Ball or Magic Mirror) will add 2 points per skyring ability to the constitution, the wisdom and the intelligence scores of the user of the item.

Duration using a skyring item.

A Skyring item is an automatic detection piece of equipment. There is no constitution cost until a Contact is made (make saving throw BEFORE revealing a contact). Once a Contact is made it can be maintained for the number of minutes equal to the constitution score plus any bonus(es) for the item. Contact beyond this limit yields a 3% of insanity per minute of contact. I.e. 3% 1st minute, 6% 2nd minute, 9% third minute etc. Also each extra minute will DEMAND 10 minutes of rest (no spell may be cast AND subtract 4 from die roll for any personal combat).

A Skyring SPELL's overall duration is set by the spell but once a Contact is made apply the above formula.

What is detected? (for items other than Crystal Balls & Mirrors)

Sum the wisdom, intelligence and Level of the Skyring being (add any bonus(es) for the item). Thus a figure using a ring of ESP whose Intelligence is 14, Wisdom 11 Constitution 8 and level 4 could use the item with no danger after making a contact for 8+2 minutes (Constitution plus a bonus of 2 for one ability). The Figure's potential would be $(14+2)+(11+2)+4=33$. This sum is the potential.

Subtract from that potential the sum of the wisdom, Level and intelligence of the contact (that is the resistance). Add the difference, if any, algebraically to the required saving throw for the skyring being. If the saving throw is made record as "no contact" but the skyring being will be aware of the attempt. If the being fails the saving throw contact is made. There is a 2% chance (times level) of the figure being aware of the contact.

By looking at the algebraic difference between Potential and Resistance (P-R) the exact nature of the probe can be determined. Cast percentile dice.

As a third person you can scan the area of the skyrred person. As the senses of the probed person are used you must wait until he turns his head etc.

When using the figure's senses remember that some do not 'see' or 'hear' as humans do. "thoughts" of the undead might be especially cryptic as would there senses. There are times when a bonus can be gained as in using the eyes of an eagle or hearing of a wolf or a penalty might arise as in eyes of a bat or hearing of an ocre jelly. A Spell of Clairvoyance acts as an ESP spell except that it has the bonus of seeing. Therefore you would roll on the ESP table to see what parts of the thoughts of the skyrred figure you can probe and then you would roll again to see if your seeing ability would be via his eyes or from another position. The same would be true of a spell of Clairaudience.

Crystal Balls and Magic Mirrors allow you to summon figures to the object. Give a bonus of +4 for each ability to potential, but -4 from constitution. Increase the % chance of insanity per minute to 4% and 20 minutes to the rest period/lowered fighting capability for each minute over and above the constitution limit.

Crystal Balls and Mirrors require a knowledge of the figure being sought and/or the location where the probe is to occur. If you have never seen the precise figure and his level is 4 or higher there will be no contact. If you know him by sight there is a 90% of Contact (Saving throw prevents penetration beyond conscious mind regardless of the cast on the ESP table).

A gener type (race) can be sought such as an orc, an elf, a dwarf, a human magic user, etc. and there is a 50% chance of a contact with a first level figure, 20% chance of a 2nd level and 10% chance of a 3rd (20% chance of total failure).

For each mile of travel one minute of skyring time is consumed in any search.

Probes of locations can be done via a 'wizard eye' if the skyring item has clairvoyance. Stopping, starting, and changing direction of the 'eye' is with a (7% chance)(Intelligence) for control. Thus those of Intelligence 15 or higher have full control.

Clarity of the scene, both constant focus and ability to measure distance is at (6% chance)(Wisdom). Thus those of Wisdom 17 or higher are always accurate. Let the deviation from the required score guide you in determining the error in control, focus and measurement.

Example;

Goroth, a 10th level Wizard, has a Crystal Ball with Clairaudience. His I = 16, W = 12 and C = 10. He seeks two contacts.

1. He wishes to see into the abbey at Gaxzil which he has never been inside of but he knows where it is (3 miles away).
2. Probe the mind of the hero Gorath I = 7, W = 6 who is 1 mile away. He knows Gorath by sight.

1. The allowed length of the first probe, with no chance of insanity, is 10 minus 4 (constitution minus penalty for a Crystal Ball) or 6 minutes with not damage. He travels 3 miles via a wizard eye so he now has 3 minutes left. (note; All Crystal Balls have Clairvoyance.) He sees the abby. The eye is moving toward the front gate. He enters the gate and is moving forward. A door to his left. There is a $7\%(16)=112\%$ chance he can turn the eye to that door. He turns and passes into the door. Behind is a well lit passage. It branches left and right. How many feet to this break off? $(6\%)(12)=72\%$ of being right. He casts a 92. The judge says 70 feet, it is actually 40 feet. Go straight, a door before you. Pass through it. Enter a large chapple-- an altar before you and a figure kneeling--your three minutes are up. Do you continue? Yes. There is a 4% of insanity, check at once. Stop at figure. Probe the figure. His level is 7 W 16 I 14. Your potential is $10 + 16 + 12 + 8$ (4 for Clairaudience, and ESP) = 46. His Resistance is $7 + 14 + 16 = 37$. Difference is 9. Figure fails his saving throw (his throw would normally be 12 -- a cleric 7th level vs a Spell. It is now $12 + 9$ which he can not possibly make.) There is a $(2\%)(7)=14\%$ chance that he will know he is being probed. Let's say a 27 comes up--he is oblivious of the contact. 2 minutes pass. 8% chance of insanity. Do you continue? You roll a 92--you probe his subconscious as 80% chance of knowing his alignment (a 6--he is evil lawful), his is speaking a prayer to Hades. Since you can not probe deeper you break contact as the prayer could last a long time and each minute of contact increases your chance of insanity by 4%! You must now rest 2(20)=40 minutes minimum! If you are attacked during those 40 minutes you can use NO spell and would be in personal combat at -4 to hit an opponent.

2. Probe Cornath.

Again 10-4 gives you 6 minutes of probing time. minus 1 minute to travel the mile to him so 5 minutes are left. 90% chance to summon him. A 39. Cornath appears. (note that if Cornath were 8 miles away you could still try to summon him but you would have to check for insanity at the end of 6 and 7 minutes and then the actual probe would require one more check before you began.) He fails his saving throw (Potential = 46, his Resistance is only 4+7+6 for 17 thus the difference of 29 would surely wipe out any possible saving throw.) You roll an 83. You probe random memory, subconscious and conscious thought. Roll a 52. You get a vision of him playing as a boy (there was only a 20% chance of any thought of value to you). Subconscious 64. He is evil chaotic. His conscious mind roll a 47. View as a 3rd person. Bonus roll 4. You also gain the sense of smell. You sense smoke and fire. He is thinking about the battle he and his fellows will enter tomorrow! He is thinking of the glory he will gain. As you look around you see 10 other fighters--two bearing torches. 5 minutes are up! 4% chance of insanity--do you continue? Yes. A 47. He now must be speaking to a fellow soldier. He speaks of a serving maid at the Blueboard Inn. 2nd minute, 8% chance of insanity. you: An 88. He continues. When will he march tomorrow? At dawn comes an answer from a man to his right. 3rd minutes. 12% chance of insanity. Continue. a 10! You go nuts for 2-7 weeks!

A spell of ESP

You move for 10 minutes with no contacts. They come to two doors. You are a 7th level MU W 12, I 14 C 10. Behind door A is an evil level 1 W 10, I 10. Behind door B is an evil Superhero level 8 W 10 I 13. Neither of them is listening at his door. At door A the orc would need a 16 for a saving throw. Your potential is 12+14+7=33. His resistance is 1+10+10=21. 33-21=12 so add 12 to required saving throw. a 23. therefore you do not need to cast the dice. Roll percentile dice. A 29. You probe his conscious mind only. You detect someone thinking about the food he is eating. Let's say three minutes of actual contact have passed. You have 7 contact minutes left (remember that there is no bonus for a spell). You may probe the orc for 7 more minutes with no possible loss. The ESP spell itself has 120 minutes of duration so it will last 120-(10+3)=107 more minutes. If you continue past the 7 minutes of actual contact there is a 3% chance of insanity per minute plus the required rest period. That rest period would be invoked as soon as the last contact were broken. You probe the orc for 2 more minutes. Then break off and go to the other door. The superhero has a resistance of 8 + 10 + 13= 31. The difference is only 2 added to his normal saving throw of 12 equals 14. He makes the throw! This means he knows that you are out there!

A Helm of Telepathy worn by the Skyring Being adds a bonus of 10 to any Skyring attempt. If worn by the Skyring being his saving throw goes down by 15 regardless of his combined Resistance score.
