To the newer subscribers, this is not the first time that we have done this. You see, LDNS, is a money losing proposition. As increases in cost have gone up I have eaten it gratiously. But the time has come where you must once again decide on how you want LDNS to continue. At the bottom of this page is a form you should check off and return with your orders (Traders need not do this.) What we are talking about now is cost of the zine to you. Here are the options:

- A--Legal sized paper. The heavy paper that I used to use solely which never had a problem of bleed thru. 6 to 8 games included. Any other games available on a supplement basis. Cost: 10 issues 4.00 (6 games) \$4.50 (8 games) Supplements at 10 for \$1.
- B--Legal-paper. Sub 20 (same as what is used in this issue). 8 games along with supplement for rest of the games if there is not enough room in the zine. Cost: \$3.50 for 10 issues.
- C--Standard size paper Sub 24 (the heavy paper.) 8 games with supplement. Each game would be limited to ONE page for press and moves. (Excesses may be pressed into the zine only if room. Cost: 10 issues: \$4.50
- D--Same as C but Sub 20 paper. Identical to this issue. Cost: \$4.00 for 10 issues.

There are reasons for the cost differences and should anyone wish to hear them just drop me a line.

Which do I prefer. I personally don't care. I hated standard size paper because in LDNS I have a lot of press and it seems that one game used about 2/3rds of a standard page and there wasn't enough room to put another game at the bottom. I don't like games that overlap from one page to the next and I don't have time to "layout" the zine better. But with these guidelines there is no problem either way.

Now the decision will be based ENTIRELY on the responces that I get back from this survey. If only one person responds then I will go by his decision. Its up to you.
