Analysis: by Eric Verheiden

Since there is not much to go on in Spring 1901, perhaps a few words about the analyst might be in order. I am 24, a pure mathematician by training (with a recent Ph. D. from Caltech), currently working as a programmer-analyst in a local aerospace firm. My Diplomacy activities go back seven years, mostly in postal play. I have never published, nor held hobby-wide elective office, as has our fortunate publisher. My hobby "reputation" is evidently due to a large number of articles, mainly on strategy and tactics, and to the large number of postal games I play in, 20 or so continuously for the last 3-4 years. On rating lists, my rating varies from about Margaret Gemignani's to the top 10 or so, mainly because I play a lot of replacement positions and go down in flames in most, but not all of them.

As to the Demo game, I have been in games with Sergeant and Diehl and probably Kendter, Sr. I have started receiving Reges 'zine Against The Odds lately (recommended). The others are unknowns to me.

The western situation in Spring 1901 is uninformative. The openings are all very standard and nuances are likely misleading. The English open is very standard. England retains the option of covering London with the army if the French are nasty and loses the the option of convoying to Nwy and still having F Nth to play with the Low Countries. The German opening is also very standard. Germany may keep the Russian from Swe if he is so inclined, a nice bargaining chip. With the French in Bur, he can either cover Mun against a stab or go for Bel or even S A Kiel-Hol. The French opening is nice. The F Mid-Spac

(over)

A Spa-Por could signal an anti-Italian offensive, but this is unlikely with England and Germany to deal with in the north.

In the east, the Austrian played a typical opening aimed at Ser and Gre and keeping any unfortunate misunderstandings out of Trieste. Somewhat pro-Russian since he did not go to Gal, but nothing definitive. Italy plays a Lepanto, anti-Turkish and probably indicating an Austrian alliance. Turkey evidently thought he had a Russian alliance (otherwise F Ank-Blk for sure). Russia appears to have thought otherwise. His opening is easily the most aggressive on the board. If carried through, Turkey has had it. Two on one is bad enough, without the Black Sea at least neutral, it is hopeless. Of course, Austria might get the shaft instead. It could work, but Turkey is then taking a big chance, too big for that explanation to be really plausible.

((Super job by all concerned. I hope that the readers of LDNS will follow this game closely for with the good play I've seen-- I've seen Fall '01 too--and with the commentary of this fine caliber this will be the Demo game of Demo games.--JHJ))

KEEPING UP WITH THE JONES' or THREE DAYS AND THREE NIGHTS IN PASADENA

DipCon was rolling around, and for the first time, it was to be held on the west coast, in an area readily accessible to myself and the other crazed Diplomacy players of Las Vegas. Maddog Mirti, Wild Bill Coburn and myself planned to make the pilgrimage down to Northridge to play in "the big one". Accomodations were going to be a problem, as during our previous trips to southern California we were able to stay at USC where Tom (Maddog) goes to school from September through June.

The situation was alleviated when I read in LDNS that good ole' Jerry Jones was willing to put up pilgrims in Pasadena. (I guess all those trades have some practical use after all.) I quickly wrote, reserving our "room"; I thought I'd get my claim in early before Jerry woke up some morning and realized what a mistake he had made.

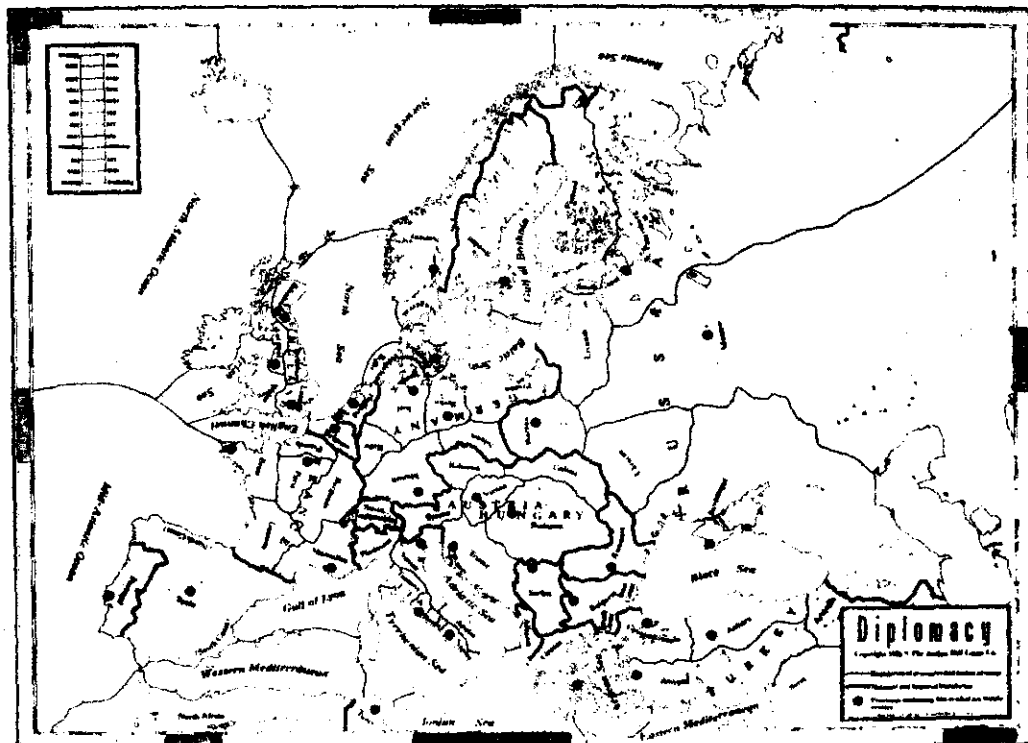

PASADENA: Dear England, The next time that you are in LA and you don't stop by for some of Pat's infamous spaghetti you may find your orders mysteriously "misplaced."

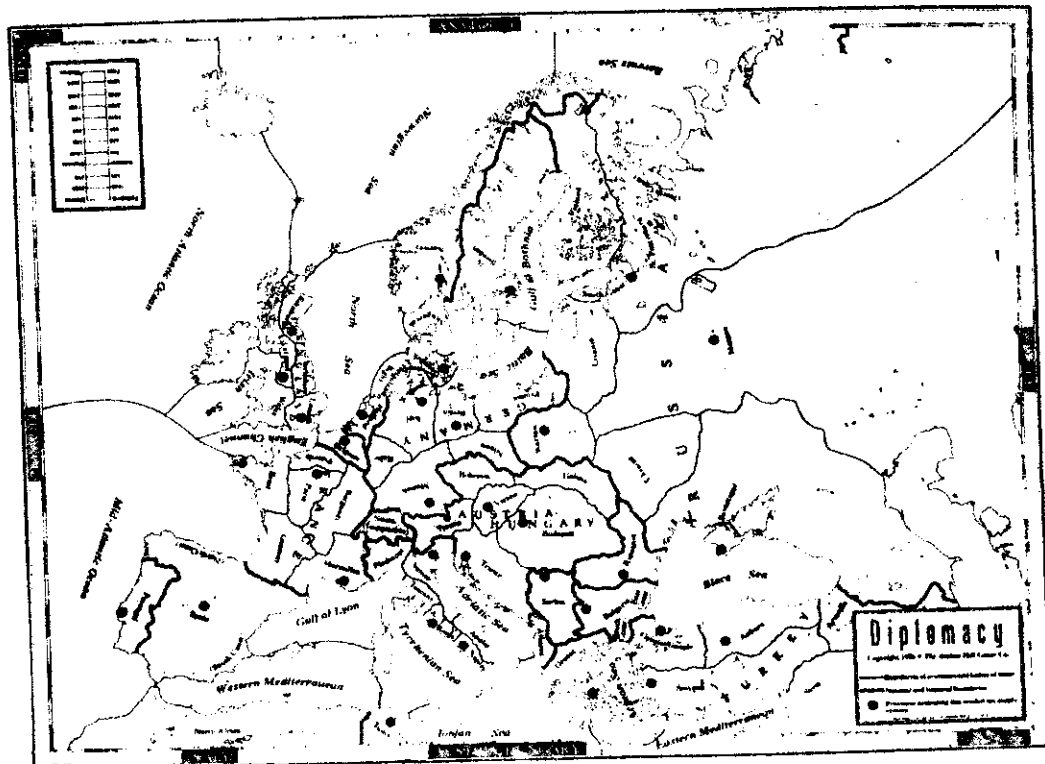

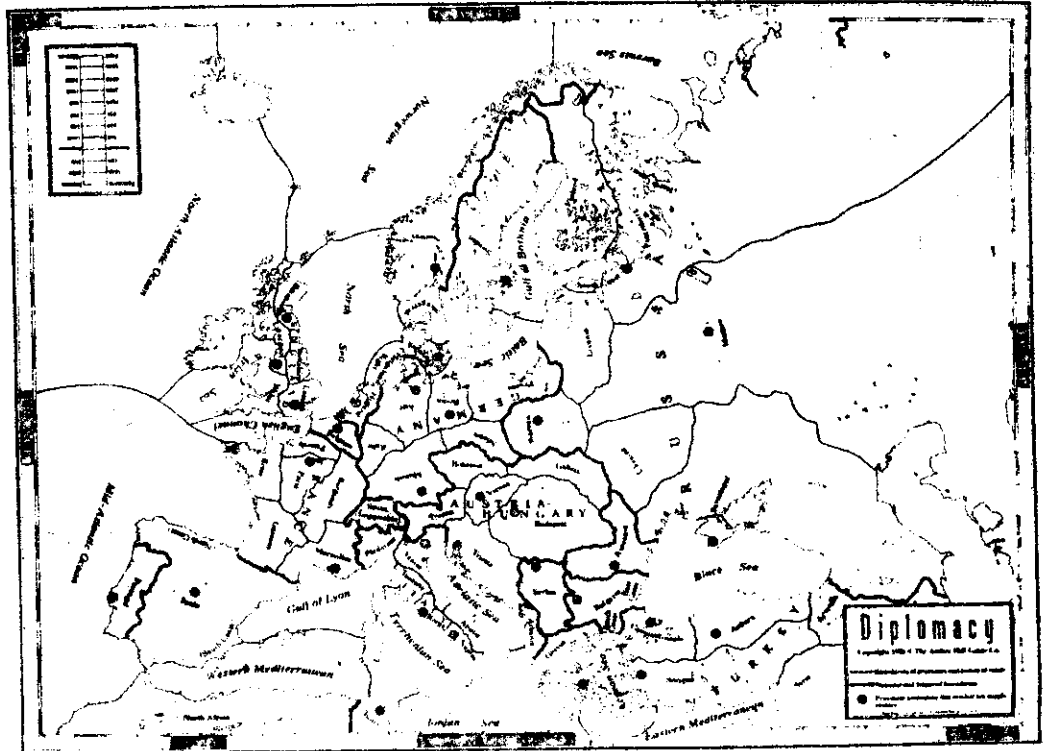

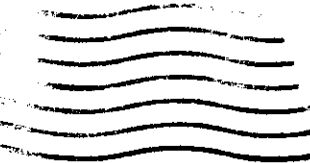
France to England--Goodbye. My condolences. You're a classy A-1 guy Mr. Diehl.

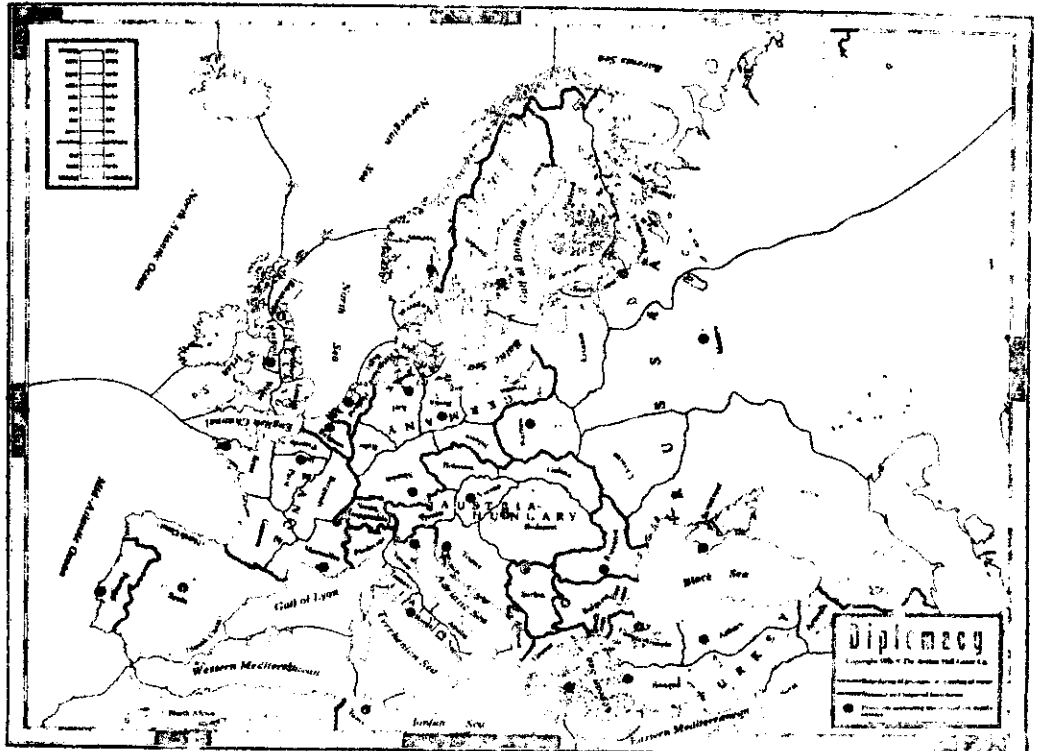

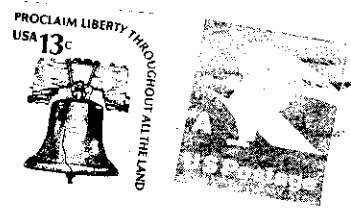
