Commencary by Exic Verheiden

PRIM 1902

Nice to see that the players are interested in my comments. Anyway, the Anglo-German and Russe-Turkish alliances seem to be gaining steady ground.

In the west, England and Germany eased up a bit on Russia to concentrate their efforts on France, the nore important target. The situation going into Spring 1903 is a 3-2 army advantage for Germany against France, counterbalanced somewhat by a 3-2 fleet advantage for France against England. However, England and Germany both have reserves counitted to the east where France does not. France must play aggressively and hope that Eussia is able and willing to exert enough pressure from the east in time to do some good. Frankly, it doesn't look all that encouraging, mainly because it is just Russia, facing a major commitment against Austria. A Russo-Austrian alliance would be a lot better for France.

In the east, Austria played a good defensive game with what he had available. What with Germany drawing off the Russians, the result is that Austria currently has only two enemy smales poised on his (revised) borders. To stave off immediate disaston, Austria still requires a realliance with Italy. By annihilating IA Alb, a lot of the opportunity for an Italian attack is eliminated. If Italy can be persuaded to build a fleet rather than an army, he is committed to a defensive game against Turkey. Austria can be expected to threaten to give it all to Russia and Turkey if Italy builds as army; what to do if the bluff is called is a matter of personal choice. My own preference is simply to carry out the threat and devote my attentions to another game.

Rubsia and Turkey have the opposite problem of keeping the Italians in line. An offer of Trieste, pledges to restrict fleet building and the observation that stalements plays into the hands of England and Germany are good arguments. Turkey could also bring up the possibility of "easing out" Russia after Austria goes, particularly since Russia will run into heavy going against the west. With Turkey at play, these and Italy "easing out" Turkey is no longer feasible.

DDITORIAL: by Jores

Also about nine months ago I started the horserading game which has been to riddled with delays that I am forced to cancel it and return the game fees. Maybe as this pace slows down we can run it again, no promises, just a hopeful thought.

How for a few of the comments that you have made about four week deadlines. All in all the feelings have been mixed. Nobody said that they'd get out of the zine but here are a few postions of what has been said:

- ...sorry to get your form letter about the slower LDNS schedule. Couldn't you farm out some of them (orphan games) to all the new zines coming along...
 (The problem here is twofold. First of all LDNS was never designed to be a fast zine. That is to say my goal for LDNS was strictly to publish a zine that would be interesting to read with a quick turnaround time. As to the orphan games, a lot of them are being "farmed out" but there are only so many publishers around that are willing to take orphan games or have at least told me about it.)
- ...regarding your plans for LDNS I think you are doing a terrific job and if you need a four week cycle to keep it up, so be it.

 ((Thanks for the comment and I really do need the four weeks. Seriously I wonder how many would ever have noticed if I had just changed to four weeks and not told anybody.))
- ...I emplore you to reconsider. I don't know much about publishing but I do know about being a player. Four weeks is too much time to negotiate, the game looses its vitality and people loose interest...Might I suggest a sub zine every two weeks for games past 1904 or by player consent?
- ((I can see your point and it is something to consider but being on the West Coast I would never publish on a two week schedule. Also I don't think a game is over or in such a state that negotiations aren't important just because the game is past 1904. Look at some of the games inside this zine and you'll see just how quickly things change even in the latter part of the game.))
- ...I enjoy LDNS so much that getting it every three weeks was a real treat but then again the pace of the game has almost caught me short once or twice. That's something I won't miss.
- ((You'd be amazed how many times I get a last minute change of orders that arrive on the Monday after the deadline. Hopefully four weeks will allow a little more time for coordination of orders.))
- ...boo on four week issues ((Go soak your head.))
- ... I would like to move that the two games I am in be put on the four week deadline. Am I to understand that you will be picking up the games from Watergate?
- ((I am all geared up and prepared to take the games from Watergate. If anyone out there knows where Cliff is and can make it so I can get in touch with him or he with me, then Watergate's games will be picked up.

Further note on orphan games. While I am not the "Orphan's Game Director" I am taking it upon myself to do what I can so

- 1. If you are a publisher and you are willing to take an orphan game, let me know.
- 2. If you are in a game that has been orphaned and no one has picked up, let me know. Together we can straighten this up.

NEW HOUSERULES:

Separation of Seasons: There will be two distinct seasons, Spring and Fall. Winter orders will be due by return mail after the Fall orders are shown. As soon as I get all of the Winter retreats, removals and builds they will then be passed along to the players. Even with this system a separation for Winter after the Fall Season will be granted, hopefully the need for it will deminish. (The exception will be Winter 1901 which will still be separate.)

Phoned results: It is permissable for a player to phone and ask for the results on the Sunday (or whenever for that matter) after the deadline.

Why Draw Really Spells Defeat in Diplomacy or Why Every Game should Have a Winner. by Stan Johnson.

Draws along with NMRS have long been the bane of Postal Diplomacy. Jerry commented on a seven way draw in another zine, I feel any draws with four or more players participating has been a waste of time. A Postal Dippy game takes quite a while to complete, along with the effort involved. This is quite an investment of time and energy. Why waste it? The purpose of a Dippy is to select a winner out of seven players, something of a challenge, multiplayer draws defeats this purpose.

The ability to fall back on these draws actually hurts game play. People are less likely to break alliances when the power structures dictate they should, many feel a safe draw is better than a chance at a win. (even sure wins are sometimes cast aside). If a player knew his ally had to win the game (or lose) there would be pressure on him to work with others in the game against the main power.

I should like to see a game ratings system developed where persons are penalized for draws beyond say 3 players. I feel the current systems encourage draws by overly ratings conscious players. Remember, Dippy is only a game, but in games like this, winning isn't everything, it's the only thing you win no laurels for mere survival.

Some players feel they have to stab to win and don't like to do this, John Boyer disagrees and he should know.

ON THE CORRECT PROCEDURE OF PLAYING DIPLOMACY by Chairman Mao Tse-Tung (as told to an LDNS subscriber)

We have come to the great master himself in order to get his ideas on the correct procedure for playing Diplomacy. First of all, to begin to play in a Diplomacy game, "We need an enthusiastic but calm state of mind and an intense bur orderly work". Without this, one cannot begin to succeed in Diplomacy. Be sure and understand the rules because "It is well known that when you do anything, unless you understand its actual circumstances, its nature and its relations to other things, you will not know the laws governing it, or know how to do it, or be able to do it well.

The name of the game is Diplomacy and as Chairman Mao says "Exchange Information". This means that members of a party committee should help each other and exchange views on matters that have come to their attention. If you have difficulty convincing a potential ally of mutual benefits, Chairman Mao suggests as for people who are politically backward, communists should not slight or despise them, but should be friend them, unite them, convince them and encourage them to go forward.

Once these allies have seen the light, one should treat comrades fairley because to treat comrades like enemies is to go over to the stand of the enemy. 5

After the game is underway, Mao tells us that "Conditions are changing all the time and to adapt ones thinking to new conditions." In short, we must be prepared. Being prepared, we shall be able to deal properly with all kinds of complicated situations."

Chairman Mao does not wish us to become discouraged in negotiations because "The present problem is that many people consider it impossible to accomplish things which could be accomplished is they exerted themselves."

When we play Diplomacy we should remember to support whatever the enemy opposses and oppose whatever the enemy supports. When attacked by your enemies, should one attack or defend ones country? Chairman Mao gives us our answer. "In actual warfare, the best role is played by defence much of the time, but if the war is taken as a whole, attack remains primary." Remember that everything neactionary is the same, if you do not hit it, it will not fall. This is also like sweeping the floor, as a rule, where the broom does not reach, the dust will not vanish of itself." Il

The Chairman also reminds us not to forget tactics in Diplomacy. It is not enough to set tasks, we must also solve the problem of the methods for carrying them out. If our task is to cross a river, we cannot cross it without a bridge or a boat. Unless the bridge or boat problem is solved, it is idle to speak of crossing the river. Unless the problem of method is solved, talk about the task is useless. 12

Do not become discouraged in a protracted war with another player for "At certain times in the revolutionary struggle, the difficulties outweigh the favorable conditions. But through their efforts, the revolutionaries can overcome difficulties step by step and open up a favorable situation. Thus a difficult situation yields place to a favorable one. 13

If you do succeed against one enemy, he careful about the others in your game. As Chairman Mao tells us, "Just because we have won victory, we must never relax our vigilance against the frenzied plots for revenge by the imperalists and their running clogs. Whoever relaxes vigilance will disarm himself politically and land himself in a passive position. 14

Remeber be resolute, fear no sacrafice and surmount every difficulty to win wictory. 15
