MONTY'S NEWS AND COMMENT is brought to you by BLONDIE'S PIZZA (locations on Powell near Market in San Francisco, Telegraph near Durant in Berkeley, and corner of Willow Pass and Contra Costa in Pleasant Hill), semi-official pizza of DIPCON XXVI (too bad none of those locations are exactly "near" San Mateo)

Here's the message about which you were warned: please note that this is subject to verification by Avalon Hill (oh, by the way, the company that complained abuot the use of the name "Avalon Hill" is out of business, so use of that name is OK), but the source is reliable: according to the "upcoming releases" section of a mail-order gaming newsletter, Deluxe Diplomacy (with the wooden blocks) will sell for FIFTY-FIVE DOLLARS. According to the latest AH pricelist, regular (plastic pieces) Dip sells for \$25.

I can come up with two reasons for such a price: (a) the

cost of the wooden blocks; (b) a sudden increase in prices for AH's new games. (Advanced Third Reich, which isn't that much different from "normal" 3R other than the two unmounted maps, sells for \$50.) Note that the wooden blocks should be available separately when the game is released, although I wouldn't be surprised if the cost of all seven sets of armies and fleets is more than \$55. (The original wooden blocks cost a lot, too; remember, this was AH's most expensive game at one time.)

The first issue of Grass Roots, the quarterly PDO Zine Directory, has arrived from John Caruso. According to John, "the PDO Zine Directory was founded by Michael Mills over 10 years ago" and was revived because "gone are the days of zine reviews under the guise of being a zine register...(this) will be the Directory that Dipdom has sorely missed for some time!" The main difference between GR and the Zine Register is that GR will list the particulars of each 'zine (name, publisher, how often, how big, how old, costs, game openings) without the descriptions given by the zine's publisher (and others).

A few clarifications seem to be in order. First of all, Michael Mills' original ZD came out in 1980, before the PDO existed, and it included the 'zine descriptions that the new ZD specifically excludes (although I don't remember Mike allowing anybody other than the zine's publisher from writing the text for that 'zine). Second, GR seems to be a copy (although a slightly larger, more encompassing copy) of Known Game Openings that Robert Sacks used to (and still might, although I haven't seen one recently) publish. (Pontevedria only lists 'zine name, address, and openings.) Third, if it's a "neutral" listing, why is Masters of Deceit (the second novice package) called "Dipdom's welcome wagon" while Supernova (the first novice package) called "Dipdom's overturned covered wagon"? Fourth

(and last), why is there a space on the information questionnaire for "anything important or different about your 'zine youd'd like to see mentioned" if this isn't supposed to include "reviews"?

One question for John: if it's the PDO Zine Directory, do all of the proceeds (n.b. as opposed to "profits", or "losses" as the case may be) go to hobby services like the proceeds of the PDO Relief Auction do?

THE GREAT DEBATE #2

This happened in the Pacificon Diplomacy tournament: Italy ordered A Nap-Rom (convoyed by F Tyh) and France ordered A Apu-Nap (supported by F Rom). France claimed that Army Naples can't cut the support of an attack into Naples by itself, while Italy claimed that the attack came via Tyrrhenian Sea. THE DECISION: The army attacking Rome started in Naples, so the attack comes from Naples; therefore, the support from Rome is not cut, and Army Apulia to Naples succeeds. (Does this rule need to be changed?)

SAY, DID YOU KNOW: NCAA Constitution 17.7.5.2(d) says that a football conference championship game in a conference of 12 or more teams (i.e. SEC) does not count toward the limit of 11 regular-season games. Then again, NCAA Football Rule 3.1.3 says that if the game ends in a tie, the NCAA tiebreaker is used: each team gets first-and-10 on the opponent's 25 (it used to be first-and-goal on the 15) and whoever gets the most points after both teams finish their possession wins (if it's still tied, try it again.) None of this wimpy "sudden-death" stuff (my idea: sudden death is OK if the team that receives the kick can't kick a field goal in their first possession).

TOP KNIFE #55

Tournament results are like commuter buses - months of inactivity, then three of them show up. Yes, this is a bumper edition of *Top Knife*, the IDTR subzine.

ATLANTICON

was held July 3-5 in College Park, Maryland, which is closer to Washington than to the "traditional" Baltimore. As usual, Robert Sacks ran the Diplomacy tournament and the "Hobby Meeting". Unlike "usual", however, only 21 people showed up (according to Robert, more people played Pax Britannica), which means that the winner gets all of FIVE count 'em FIVE IDTR points.

The Sacks system weighs SC counts more than most systems; a player's score is supply center average (counting the player's final year 10 times), plus 10 points for a win or divided among the players in a draw.

There will be a NYGB meeting at Robert Sacks' room at Philcon on November 14. Speaking of meeting, the Atlanticon Hobby Meeting revealed that Gemco did not pay NYGB for running events at last year's ORIGINS; as a result, NYGB will not make DIPCON bids for future ORIGINS. (Not that it matters much, as 1994 ORIGINS is in San Jose, which

is in the same state as 1993 DIPCON and so is ineligible.)

(Canadian) CAN-CON

was held July 31-August 2 in Toronto. Unfortunately, only 18 people played Diplomacy, which is less than the minimum 21 required for IDTR rating points, but Doug Acheson still managed to have six games played (some players played three rounds). Special mention goes to Nelson Heintzmann who arrived too late in the morning and had to leave too early in the evening to get a game in, but still GMed in the tournament.

The scoring system is a slight variation of the "SC count plus X points divided by players in a draw"; in this tournament, the player in a draw with the most SCs got the "full share" of 60 points, with lesser players subtracting the difference between their SC count and the high player's count from the full share. For example, if three players were in a 3-way draw with 12, 11, and 9 centers, they would receive 20, 19 (20-1), and 17 (20-3) points respectively.

Again, as fewer than 21 players participated, no IDTR points are awarded

Note Cal White and Gerry Paulsen tied for Best England (despite the SC count difference) as both received 20 points in their England game; each had the most SCs in a 3-way draw.

PACIFICON

was held September 5-6 in San Mateo, somewhere between San Francisco and San Jose in northern California. This year saw a return to the "traditional" rules where a game started whenever seven players showed up, subject to certain conditions, most of which were changed during the tournament because not enough players were there to enforce the rules and get enough games played. Because of the problems, next year's event, which will also be DIPCON, will use a traditional system of rounds, either four open rounds or three plus a top board.

32 players participated in the tournament, run by Don Del Grande (when he's not typing up $Top\ Knife$). The scoring system was a basuic "Supply Centers plus X points for a win or shared in a draw"; in this case, X = 32, and all wins were worth 50 regardless of final SC count. Best 2 games counted.

Best Germany (8/4D) was Martin Johnson, who was 12th.

With only Avaloncon and the Continental European tournaments remaining (well, those and the results from last year's Midcon, held only 10 months ago - DOES ANYBODY OUT THERE HAVE LAST YEAR'S MIDCON RESULTS?), Michael Chau of Australia still leads the table with 106 points, followed by World Champion Steve Gould and Manorcon winner Phil Day with 100 each, and Shaun Derrick and Frank Meerbach with 91 each.

BRAD WILSON (Italy, somewhere in there): I was in this game? My, my, what wonders come forth when a game ends. Congrats to Charles, and to Don for what looked like being a solid GM.

STEPHEN DORNEMAN (Turkey): Well, I must confess to a truly lackluster performance on my part in this game. As always, I started with the best of intentions, writing all the players, making grand alliances (particularly with Russia), dividing up the continent at least mentally by 1905. However, things started going downhill quickly. My ally suffered from NMRitis, and finally dropped out in 1910. The French/German alliance appeared unshakable, and I couldn't seem to get past the Ionian. I might have brought on some of the above, as by 1911 I became too involved in real world worries (culminating in a long stretch of unemployment, now thankfully over) to write the other players regularly.

Still, I wasn't going to roll over for a two-way draw. I served France (and the rest of the board, by Press Diplomacy) notice that if he wasn't going to stab his ally, I would work to throw the game to Germany, the dominant partner.

And so it goes.

Congratulations to Charles Mercer; all standbys who go on and win deserve a special place in Heaven (or Hell, depending on whether or not I'm in their game). Thanks to Melinda for playing out her position. Ethereal thanks to Tom Slaughter, for what might have been. A pat on the back to myself, for being the only original player to finish out the game. And a cheer to our GM, for finishing out another long Dip game in fine fashion. Now put me on the standby list! (It's my turn for a win....)

***** How about putting you on the playing list? I still need a seventh player for my new game....

CHARLES MERCER (standby Germany, the winner): A final word on Les Miz: I came into the game as a standby and I never thought that Germany would be so successful. Germany's position in relationship to Russia when I took over was the key to success. Russia's back was wide open. I almost think of it as picking up a fumble on a wide open football field after the quarterback was sacked. The only major challenge was to run down the field without stumbling, which I almost did with my NMR - the postcard that took a week to get from me to you.

All the pieces fell into place, Turkey was heavy on fleets and Italy and France remained stalwart in their opposition to Turkey. Although that alliance showed some signs of sagging toward the end (what alliance doesn't), it held together long enough to carry the day. Thanks for the opportunity to play in Les Miz and thanks to Jim Goode and Dave Anderson for their support.

each other. (By the way, Charles, you do get a \$1 sub credit for finishing your standby position.)






DEADLINE for AUTUMN/WINTER 1909 and SPRING 1910 is OCTOBER 29 - Here's the press:
