OOPS - looks like there's another GM in town that says *History of the World* is PBMable as well. So much for my statement last time. Besides, it might be a while before the HotW game actually starts here, despite having enough players, as (a) I'm still working out PBM mechanics (simultaneous moves or sequential with tons of conditional orders?), and (b) the *Railway Rivals* game has also filled, and I said I wouldn't start two games until the *1830* game I'm currently running ends. Anyway, this is issue 136 of Lemon Curry (well, that's what it's called now), from Don Del Grande, 142 Eliseo Drive, Greenbrae, CA 94904-1339, USA, phone (+1) 415 461-2692, but only 6 PM to 11 PM Pacific time (0100-0600 GMT through October 30, then 0200-0700 GMT) and try not to call between 8:00 and 8:30 PM on Thursdays...where was I? Oh, yes, E-mail ddelgran@nyx.cs.du.edu, although you take chances sending orders by E-Mail as I don't (sometimes can't) read my E-Mail every day. (Add E-Mail to mail and phone as the acceptable means of giving orders, but it's not my fault if you use E-Mail and I can't get to it.)

MONTY'S NEWS AND COMMENT is brought to you by the DIPCON XXVI COMMITTEE, winner of the Silver Blade award (read on for this story...)

DIPCON XXVI: THE UNTOLD STORY

(but if it's untold, what am I doing with it here?)

It all started at last year's DIPCON in Lenexa, KS (a suburb of Kansas City). By a narrow margin, the meeting decided that the Pacificon types would host DIPCON XXVI. The next eleven months are pretty uninteresting...

AUGUST 1: I call the hotel hosting the convention (the Dunfey Hotel (part of the Dunfey/Omni chain) in San Mateo, about halfway between San Francisco and San Jose) and ask for reservations for the weekend of the convention at the special rate. Despite the convention being a month away and none of the pre-registration packets having been sent out, they were not only sold out, but I was 25th on the waiting list... Eventually, I got a room at another hotel (a Days Inn which until recently was a Holiday Inn) about two miles away. The only problem, which turned out to be not quite as bad as I thought, was that the Dunfey is notorious for not having enough parking. Normally, I park on Friday and don't get back in the car until Monday.

AUGUST 2-24: I don't receive a pre-registration packet in the mail. This is not unheard of for this convention staff, but usually it arrives at least three weeks before the con. I'm a little worried because Pete Gaughan was sent what I thought was an advance copy in which a printing error left out one of the two DIPCON announcements.

AUGUST 25: The pre-registration packets appear in game stores. Too bad they say "must be sent in by August 20". (Not that it matters; as a GM, I have a badge set aside for me, and since the Dip tournament lasts all day Saturday and Sunday, I don't have time to enter other events.) The printing error appears to have been corrected, as there are two DIPCON announcements.

SEPTEMBER 2: Somebody posts the "DIPLOMACY A-Z" onto Internet News with a note "to put a copy on disk and give it to Pete Gaughan". I hope my boss didn't see me download 20 files...

SEPTEMBER 3: Arrive at the hotel. Pete and Cathy are in the DIPCON Hospitality Suite, along with Steve and Daf Langley (long time no see) and Larry Peery. I spend 90 minutes on a wild goose chase looking for the guy that has my badge...

SEPTEMBER 4, 9 AM: Everybody up for round 1. Pretty good turnout, including Xavier Blanchot and Eric DuFourmentelle from France. We manage to fill six boards. There's a slight delay when I'm told I managed to put the one "couple" (two people I didn't know and didn't know they were together) on the same board. Hohn Cho, top Dipper from four years ago in San Diego (technically, Edi Birsan "won DIPCON" that year, because the con consisted of a number of events - including brick throwing (!) - and a combined score determined the "overall winner") gets the only win, and five of the six boards manage to get a result before the eight-hour deadline for morning rounds. (This is to allow one hour before the evening rounds.)

5:15 PM: At the flea market, I managed to get a mint copy of Titan (even all of the dice are in the box) for \$6...

6 PM: Round two. Unlike round one, there is no eight-hour limit. (Technically, there was a 8 AM limit, but the longest game was over by around 2 AM.) GM'S FIRST PROBLEM: Edi Birsan leaves and asks me if it's OK for another player on the board to order his pieces. Since, in an earlier game, I allowed a substitute player (albeit someone not already in that game), and since it would be the same as if that player told Edi what to write and Edi wrote those orders, I said it was OK. (Mistake?) Soon after, I'm told that I told another player that he couldn't have another player write orders for him, and as a result, a 10-center power went into CD and eradicated a 2-versus-2 battle. (I don't remember saying that; neither does Pete.) Two more wins, by Matt Calkins and Nick "how do you pronounce that name" Beliaeff.

SEPTEMBER 5, 9 AM: What luck - there's a parking spot. Now for round three. GM'S SECOND PROBLEM - well, more like

GM'S WORST NIGHTMARE: 36 PLAYERS

Three choices: one, six boards of six; two, dig up six players to fill the seventh board; three, BEG and PLEAD (and BRIBE) somebody to leave. Good news; somebody didn't show up. Bad news: Xavier Blanchot was talking to Pete Gaughan and says that I was told by Eric that he would be here in time. Back to 36 players. Worse; Steve Cooley, who didn't hear his name called for boards 1-4 and, assuming he was on board 5, went to the bathroom, came back to find out that he had been left off every board. (DOUBLE OOPS - when shuffling the players' cards around to form the boards without too many players playing against others more than once, Steve's fell out). After minutes of sweating, somebody finally agreed to step down and let Steve play in his place. Mark Twitty got the only win in the five boards, all of which ended by 4:30. Just enough time to run out to the car, pick up some dinner, get back, spend forever finding a parking spot, and eat. More luck; I found a parking spot right away...

6 PM: The fourth and final round. Nobody else (not even Pete) knows the scoring system, but everybody knows that a win beats two draws (other than "some" pairs of 2-way draws); there are four wins and one with 2 2-ways so far. Four of the five boards end relatively early; at 1 AM, the fifth board ends in a 2-way draw between Hohn Cho and Dave Grabar. With a win and a 2-way draw, there doesn't seem to be much doubt who the winner will be.

SEPTEMBER 6, 8 AM: Before the awards breakfast buffet starts, somebody (who shall remain nameless) comes up to me and Pete and asks that the results not be announced because of at least one incident concerning one of my tournament rules: if a game ends in a draw, all of the players can agree to change the final supply center counts for the game. (This was put in to allow players to agree to a result without having to go through the motions of writing orders if everybody agrees to the final result. If anybody didn't like the result being proposed, they could say "no".)

Unfortunately, John Boardman will have to wait until another day to find out the answer to one of physics' great questions, "What happens when matter and anti-matter meet?"; neither Robert Sacks nor Chris Carrier showed up.

Anyway, the first order of business is to decide the site of next year's DIPCON; the two sites that presented bids were Dixiecon and Atlanticon. Dixiecon got the nod by a 12-6 margin. The Dixiecon bid proposal proposed David Hood, Michael Lowrey, and Steve Cooley as the next DIPCON Committee; however, the voters decided on Hood, Lowrey,...and Robert Sacks. There were no amendments proposed to the charter; I thought about proposing one that would name the tournament as "The United States Open Diplomacy Championship" (as it's Avalon Hill's policy, which I follow, that the Diplomacy tournament winner at Avaloncon

is the "National Diplomacy Champion"), but decided against it.

Next was the awards ceremony. Pete had decided not to award the Silver Knife award for best stab of the tournament, until somebody proposed that it be given to me for sticking it into the backs of a number of people during the tournament... The "Hammered" award for receiving the hardest hit went to Tim Haffey, for a 5-center to 1-center drop in one year in round 2 and a 1902 elimination in round 3. The best country awards were based on the highest scored game for each country; Germany and Turkey were wins (two each), while the others were two-way draws. Only Xavier Blanchot was there to pick up his best country award. For some reason, the best country plaques didn't say "Best (country)" but "Outstanding play of (country)". That's worse that WORLD DIP CON III with its "Best Austria" through "Best Russia" - and "Best Sultan Of Turkey". (Is a turkey's "sultan" white meat or dark?)

SCORING SYSTEM: A win is worth 125 points, regardless of how many supply centers (SCs) the player had. Otherwise, a player's score is based on "SC points" plus, if part of a draw, "draw points". A player's top two games counted as his/her final score.

Fewer than 3 SCs scores no SC points; a 7-way draw scores no points if the players voted on it, or 12.8 points if the draw was forced by a time limit or by a stalemate.

Ties are broken in the following order: (a) a player who was in two or more games beats someone who played only one game (but number of games does not matter past two - for example, four games does not beat three); (b) best single game; (c) win/draw value of the player's two high-scoring games (win/draw is 1 for a win, 1/N for being part of an N-way draw, and 0 otherwise); (d) win/draw value of the player's high-scoring game; (e) highest average final score of the player's opponents (if someone was played more than once, his/her score was counted once); (f) GM's discretion.


