## ORIGINS NEEDS GMS

I got a call from someone representing Andon Unlimited, the organizers for this year's ORIGINS in San Jose, July 7-10. It seems that they called Robert Sacks about getting someone to run the Diplomacy tournament, and he gave them my name (probably because of the help I gave NYGB at ORIGINS in Baltimore in 1991). Those of you who remember DIPCON can uncancel those reservations - I decided against it, not in the least because of what happened at DIPCON. (Actually, the main reason is because I probably won't be at ORIGINS for more than one day, as I'm saving up for WORLD DIP CON, which is two weeks later.)

ANYWAY, I was told that they can use GMs in every field - boardgaming, role-playing, and (especially) miniatures. If you want to run an event at ORIGINS, call 1-800-529-EXPO (529-3976), ask for the ORIGINS 94 Voice Mail, and leave a message concerning your wanting to run an event. Alternatively, you can call Gary Smith directly at Andon Unlimited: phone 216-673-1887 or FAX 216-673-2125. ORIGINS will be July 7-10 at the San Jose Convention Center. (Those of you who remember the 1981 ORIGINS can relax; the site has been moved from that hotel. Too bad SJCC wasn't there in 1981, or that mess might have been avoided.)

LATE NEWS FROM HOLLYWOOD: Plans to star Dan Jansen, Mary Decker, and Jim Ryun in *The Hard Luck Club* have suddenly been shelved. (Nobody remembers the Decker and Ryun stories, do they? Decker was too young in 1972, too hurt in 1976, too American in 1980, too close to Zola Budd in 1984, and too old to be competitive in 1988; Ryun fell in the 1500 in 1972 and couldn't compete in the 4x400 because two other USA athletes were removed from the team after not showing respect in a medal ceremony they were in.)

It looks like there's more room left over in this issue than I thought (boy, these things are becoming warehousey, aren't they?), so you're stuck with another feature pulled out of this 'zine's past:

## LEMON CURRY picks the 1993 ACADEMY AWARD WINNERS

All right, who said "it can't be that hard as they were held about a year ago". No, 1993 refers to the year the movies were released, or at least released for seven days in New York and Los Angeles.

**BEST PICTURE:** The Age of Innocence. What? It wasn't nominated? Well, in that case, I think that Schindler's List will have more going for it than the anti-Spielberg types can muster against it.

BEST DIRECTOR: Martin Scorcese for *The Age of Innocence*. Excuse me? He diidn't get nominated either? In that case, the Academy will break with a not-particularly-traditional tradition and give this one to someone other than the director of Best Picture - someone named Jane Campion, for *The Piano*. She'll get votes from three camps: one who thought she did a better job than the others, one who doesn't want Spielberg to win for fear that he'll become some Hollywood megapower with power of life and death over careers (he's the producer of the top two grossing films of all time), and one who feels that this will make up for Barbra Streisand not being nominated for a film she directed that got seven or eight other nominations, including Best Picture (and whose name I've forgotten...)

**BEST ACTOR:** I can't decide between Robin Williams for *Mrs. Doubtfire* and Harrison Ford for *The Fugitive*. Pardon? Zero for two this time? It's hard to say that Tom Hanks will win for *Philadelphia* as a "career award" (i.e. voters vote for somebody whose body of work deserves an Oscar, although Richard Burton never got one, probably because he didn't get nominated for *1984*), especially since his career includes *Joe vs. the Volcano* and *The Money Pit*, but the other real contenders already have recent Oscars. However, this is the only major award this movie was nominated for, and he might get "guilt" votes.

**BEST ACTRESS:** I'm going to go out on a limb and say Rosalind Chao for *The Joy Luck Club*. DON'T tell me... Besides, Holly Hunter is a shoo-in, for *The Piano*.

BEST FOREIGN-LANGUAGE FILM: Like Water for Chocolate. That's right, it wasn't nominated, and the fact that nobody sounded really surprised by this leads me to believe one of two things: either it was eligible in 1992, or the Mexican National Film Academy decided for some incredibly strange reason not to submit it for nomination (required for foreign language film nominations). Japan is notorious for not nominating Kurosawa's films, even when he received a Best Director nomination for one (Ran) - that's a "regular" award, not one limited to foreign language films.

OTHER AWARDS: One of the songs from *Philadelphia*, written by Bruce Springsteen (so he gets the Oscar if it wins), will win the Best Original Song award (note that "Best Song" nominees must have been written specifically for the film; that's why *I Will Always Love You* from *The Bodyguard* never get nominated - it was released by Dolly Parton in the 1970s; it's also why movie versions of stage musicals usually have songs added)...the Documentary Committee must have been asleep; they nominated *The War Room* (behind the scenes in the Clinton campaign), which is a "popular" film, usually a guarantee that a movie will *not* receive a Best Documentary nomination; look at *Roger And Me* and *Truth Or Dare...*other winners will include *Jurassic Park* (for video effects) and *Mrs. Doubtfire* (for makeup).

**DID YOU KNOW...**all money bet on Oscar winners in the USA is done illegally, as the only "sports books" (places where you can bet on results of events) are not allowed to accept bets on non-sporting events like awards and elections. However, there's no law against setting odds...

Each of you will receive your nine Event cards on a separate sheet, as well as the Empire card you are dealt for Epoch I. Remember, this is not necessarily the Empire you will be playing (unlike the *Protozoan* house rules); you pass this card to another player (or keep it) as you would in a Face-To-Face game.

The initial drawing order is: Bowen, Bailey, Goode, Wilson, Hoode, Anderson - this means Bowen's card will be passed first, followed by Bailey's, and so on. (Also, it means Bowen need only list one player to pass to; Bailey must list two, in case his first choice received Bowen's card; Goode must list three, and so on, with Anderson listing all six players in the order in which he wants them to receive his card.)

To begin with, you need only send in your Empire card passing preference list. (In effect, this will be Turn 0B.) The deadline is MARCH 19. (There will usually be a nine-day turnaround between the deadline and the day the next issue is mailed, which leaves 26 days to receive the 'zine, write your orders, and have them get back to me. I am one of these "the deadline is more than a just a good idea" GMs; if you're cutting it close, use the phone. If I'm not home, leave me your number and what time you're in and I'll try to call back.)

#### KINGMAKER "ME AND MY GAL"

Before getting to the results, I have been given a rather unusual request from the person running the Kingmaker tournament at WORLD DIP CON IV. The new British rules are slightly different from the American rules, and he wanted me to post the clarifications, so (a) the North Americans that might want to play in the tournament would have some idea of the differences, and (b) if anybody wanted to suggest any changes, let me know.

- 1. The normal Event Deck is used, except that there is no Irish Revolt, and a Gales at Sea is added.
- 2. A noble in an Alliance may attack in one player's turn and move in another. (If A and B are allies, one of A's nobles may attack in his own turn and move in B's turn.)
- 3. SIEGE: It takes two turns for a siege (as if the first turn drew Bad Weather). Any size force (even 10) can siege, provided it has odds of at least 1-4. A neutral garrison will attempt to break a siege (by attacking the besieging forces) if not outnumbered; a garrison counts as half its normal size in a siege, whether defending against one or trying to break one (with or without help of occupying forces, which count as full strength). If the breaking force is defeated, it surrenders the city/castle immediately to the besiegers. (Does the "garrison is half strength" rule make any sense to you?)
- 4. STORMING A CASTLE: Instead of a siege, troops may assault a castle, whether or not it is occupied; a garrison has full strength against an assault. An indecisive or "bad weather" result may be "converted" into the first turn of a siege at the attacker's request.
- 5. Any unit defeated in a combat by (just) a neutral garrison is killed. A unit on a ship which is forced into a neutral or unfriendly port must storm the port, and if outnumbered by more than 4-1, is captured (killed if done by a neutral garrison) without entering the port. (American rules: the ship is commandeered by the port, but the passengers land in the open outside the port.)
- 6. All nobles in a combat die on rolls of "2" and "3", and all royal heirs die on a roll of "2". To determine a combat result (other than siege), a special "battle deck" is drawn, containing two sets of odds, one for "larger force victory" and one for "smaller force victory". (The "larger force victory" numbers run from 1-1 to 4-1; the "smaller force victory" numbers go down to 6-5.)
- 7. Shrewsbury does NOT control the London-to-Conisboro road. There are some other map changes; for example, Preston is adjacent to the space to its south. (A lot of the clarifications made by the second edition American map are gone, and the rules tend toward going against the clarification.)
- 8. Enemy troops may block movement on roads in the same way towns do.
- 9. "No noble may move or attack in more than one turn in a round" in this case, a "round" begins when the owner of that noble starts his/her turn. (American rules: a round always begins when the player who started the game starts his/her turn.)
- 10. "Parliament must be summoned if there is no sole King" is not called if the sole King is Henry.
- 11. Calais never becomes part of the Continent, even if a French Siege is not responded to.

Now for the actual turn 38 results:

goes to Carlisle; Neville goes to Lincoln (which is correct; last issue's "London" was wrong)
