

Well, while the American boats were squabbling about qualifying, "The Black" was out there winning races, and the Royal New Zealand Yacht Squadron takes the 100 Guineas America's Australia II's Stars and Stripes' Black Magic's Cup. (Originally, it was called the 100 Guineas Cup, awarded to the winner of a boat race around the Isle of Wight - the schooner America. The New York Yacht Club made it a challenge cup and called it the America's Cup after the victorious yacht. Technically, that's still its name, but I maintain the "tradition" of renaming it after the boat that the current holders used to win it.) When I was in New Zealand in 1992 and saw the frenzy over that year's America's Cup races, after hearing that the San Diego Yacht Club had let the defense turn into

a "rich man's club" like New York and Perth before them (one of the main reasons I did not want the New York Yacht Club to win the cup back), I figured that this was the one country who could make it a "people's cup".

Unfortunately, we'll have to wait until early 2000 for the next races. (Actually, qualifying begins in late 1999.) Usually, there's a three year gap between series, but somebody felt that holding it in 1998-99 would clash with the Whitbread Round-the-World race that year, as well as trying to hold the event close to the 2000 Olympics, which will be in October 2000 in Sydney, Australia.

Now that the Cup is held by a club outside of the USA, any and all USA yacht clubs which want to challenge can do so, including the St. Francis Yacht Club of San Francisco. Prospective captains need to be aware of *the curse*: the only person to represent SFYC in an America's Cup so far died within four years...

I outlived another one: the impossible has happened - Melinda Ann Holley is folding *Rebel* because of publishing burnout! *Rebel* was famous for three things - games, more games, and yet still even more games. The Holley Award was originally intended for "quantity participation in the hobby".

Speaking of the Holley Award, the **1995 Hobby Awards** Ballot is included at the back of this issue. The four awards are: the Don Miller Memorial Award for hobby service, the Rod Walker Award for literary excellence (the nominations are for individual articles), the John Koning Memorial Award for playing Diplomacy (not limited to PBM), and the Melinda Ann Holley Award for "hobby participation". Send your votes in to David McCrumb, 3636 Oldtown Road, Shawsville, VA 24162, or E-mail your vote in to dmmcrumb@bev.net. The deadline is July 24.

Note that this is the last year for the Holley Award (originally intended, if I remember correctly, as an award for female hobby participation, then "quantity participation", then "quality participation"); it will be replaced with a new award, details of which are to be announced along with this year's award winners at DIPCON, which is at AVALONCON this year.

Well, it wouldn't be much of an anniversary issue without digging into the hobby history, so I pulled out an old Runestone Poll ballot to see what OTHER 'zines are still being published. (Unfortunately, the oldest one I could find was from 1986.) There's Alpha & Omega, The Appalachian General, Boast, Cathy's Ramblings (now Ramblings by Moonlight), Cheesecake, Costaguana (on and off), Diplomacy World, Diplomag, Dippy, Everything, The Gamer's Zine, Graustark (of course), Perelandra, The Prince, Protozoan, Rebel (just folded), and Ter-Ran. (This only includes Diplomacy 'zines from 1986; Empire, for example, has been around since before 1986, but non-Diplomacy 'zines were not allowed on the Runestone Poll ballot back then.)

THE OPERANTS

E-MAIL GAME? I'm giving consideration to running a game of **Kingmaker by E-Mail** using "normal FTF" rules - that is, one player moves at a time.

Here we go again - at one time, there were five players ready to play, then (I thought) it was down to two, but now four players have expressed interest, and I don't see a fifth player any time soon, so we'll start this game with four.

The following Advanced Rules will be used: A (IPs may be allocated to Aparatschik), B (declaring support for another player - any such declarations must be made in advance by conditional and/or standing orders), C (strengths and weaknesses), and F (increasing IPs during the game). Rules D (Intrigue cards), E (bribes), and G (initial allocation of "10+" IPs) are not used.

KREMLIN ~ PBM HOUSE RULES

- 1. The Advanced Rules as supplied with the game, except for Advanced Rules D, E, and G (Intrigue Cards, Bribery, and initlal allocation of "10+"), plus any "official" errata from Avalon Hill, will be used except as modified in these rules.
- 2. The first set of "orders" mailed in by each player will be the distribution of his 55 IPs. They must be distributed 10, 9, 8, and so on down to 1. IPs *can* be distributed to Nestor Aparatschik. Note these IPs are not *declared*, merely allocated. (See *Prepare to Play* in the rules.)

- 3. Each game turn is divided into two PBM turns. The first PBM turn of a game turn consists of the Cure, Purge, Investigation, and Health phases; the second PBM turn consists of the Replacement, Rehabilitation, and Parade phases.
- 4. When the PBM rules call for an action by a Character, the player controlling the character at that time submits the order. If a player controls more than one Character who has to submit an order at the same time, the player can write different orders for each such Character (in some cases Funeral Phase "second nomination lists", for example the orders must be different).
- 5. The following events occur in the first PBM turn of a game turn:

CURE - Each player may move any Politburo members into and/or out of the Sanatorium.

PURGE - The KGB, Idealogy, Party, and Industry Chiefs may write purge attempt orders. Only one of these Characters will actually be allowed to attempt a purge, but since which one is not known in advance, all of these Characters' controllers should write orders "just in case".

INVESTIGATION - The Defense, Foreign, KGB, Party, and Industry Chiefs may conduct a trial and/or condemn a Candidate to Siberia. In addition, each Politburo member must order Guilty or Innocent votes for each other Politburo member in case a member is sent to trial. Any votes not specified are assumed to be "Guilty".

HEALTH - The GM makes the health rolls for all Characters. This is the last thing done in the first PBM turn of a game turn.

6. The following events occur in the second PBM turn of a game turn:

FUNERAL - If the Party Chief post is vacant, each Politburo member must:

- (a) Nominate an eligible (see Sequence of Play part 5) Politburo member to become Party Chief;
- (b) Cast a yes or no vote for each Politburo member in case that character is nominated (in either the first or second nomination) any votes not specified are assumed to be "Yes";
- (c) List the Politburo members, other than "himself" and the character nominated in (a), in order of preference to become Party Chief, in case a second nominee is needed.

EXAMPLE: The Foreign Minister nominates the current Defense Minister to become Party Chief, votes "Yes" for Defense Minister and "No" for the others, and lists the others in the order, Economy, Sport, KGB, Idealogy, and Industry. Assuming the Sport, Idealogy, and Industry Chiefs vote "No" on the Defense Minister's nomination, the second nominee would be the Sport Chief (the highest character on the list that voted "No"). The Defense Minister votes "No" for the Sports Chief; if two others also vote "No", the Foreign Minister, having made the nominations, becomes Party Chief.

REPLACEMENT - The Party Chief (or, if the post was vacant at the start of the PBM turn, all Politburo members, in case they become Party Chief) shifts Politburo members within the same level. The KGB, Foreign, and Defense Chiefs (or any characters that can be in those positions after Progress By Age) order promotions for Candidates to Second Level and People to



HOW TO WIN: (This happened in the first PBM Kremlin game in this 'zine - now it's "official") If nobody controls the Party Chief at the end of Turn 11 (because nobody allocated IP on him), the game ends with no winner.



HISTORY OF THE WORLD "ONCE ON THIS ISLAND"...It wouldn't be a "representative" issue without at least one game delayed, right?

Neither Jim Bailey nor Dave Anderson sent in orders, and since missing orders this late in the game would have a disastrous effect, I am delaying the turn by one issue. Should their orders arrive quickly, I will adjudicate Epoch VI and send it out separately, especially since the next deadline (and it's just a Declare Events turn) will be delayed anyway because I'll be at ORIGINS.

While we're waiting, here are a few corrections:


