Very Deep in the Heart of Texas

Remember your first experience with LSD!?!
Was it all that it had seemed it would be...or more?
My first experience was last September, and I became hooked on it. But LSD is more than I first thought it was. Much more. Only recently did I completely

realize just how much more.

First, let's examine what all of us know from this last year about LSD and its pubber, R. Michael

September 1980: LONE STAR DIPLOMAT burst

September 1980: LONE STAR DIPLOMAT burst onto the Diplomacy scene like a glowing meteor. No zine until this time, except for DIPLOMACY WORLD, had ever looked so professional, so beautifully laid out. LSD abounded with cartoons, graphics, contests, and well-run games. In short, LSD was stunning.

R. Michael Conner, a self-admitted freelance translator of scientific and technical literature from Russian to English, used his zine to stress Texas and "Texasism". LSD games were named after Texas's flora and fauna ("Armadillo", "Bluebonnet", "Cactus", etc.). He continually plugged the other Texas zines (THE DRAGON & THE LAMB by Steve McLendon and THE GREAT WAR IN MODERN MEMORY by Guy Hail). And, in March, 1981, he even sent each subber a Texas flag to celebrate the 145th anniversary of the independence of Texas.

Mike also supported certain other zines. We,

Mike also supported certain other zines. We, all of us, know these surface facts which are readily apparent to any observer. But let's scratch that polished LSD surface a little. Perhaps you will be as shocked as I was at what I discovered.

First, we must look at two facts, seemingly irrelevant to this article, but actually very significant to my findings:

to my findings:

(1) Hawaii, Vermont, Texas, and the South are the only parts of the U.S. that have ever been independent. Today, Hawaii and Vermont could never survive by themselves, and the South is much too fragmented. Only Texas possesses a united population fully aware of, and proud of, its identity (a feeling continuously stimulated by LSD) with abundant natural resources and technology to become a successful nation on its own

ful nation on its own.

(2) Mike Connors (the actor, not LSD's pubber), who starred in Mannix, is of Armenian descent.

Armenia (on the Diplomacy board) is a part of Turkey.

A little-known fact is that there is the Armenian Soviet Socialist Republic (or ASSR), which is part of the Soviet Union-----RUSSIA!

Let me put it to you bluntly: What is a Russian linguist named R. Michael Conner, also of Armenian descent, even doing in Texas?! What is the need for a Russian linguist in Austin of all places? This is what has puzzled me for a year and what has caused

The "Fiestas Patrias de Diez y Seis de Septiembre" brought feasting, music, dancing, and the traditional "El Grito de Dolores" patriotic programs to Central Texas towns in observance of Mexican Independence Day

of Mexican Independence Day.

The "Diez y Seis," or 16th of September, marks the official beginning in 1810 of the Mexican independence movement against Spain in the village of Dolores in the state of Michoacan.

Father Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla, the parish priest in Dolores, issued his "Grito de Dolores," or Cry of Dolores, on Sept. 16 after hearing that he was about to be arrested for his work in social and economic reforms. The Grito demanded racial equality, redistribution of land, the siezure of government power to prevent the Spanish from turning over Mexico to the "godless French."

French."

Thousands of Mexicans flocked to the banners of Father Hidalgo and followed him to the Spanish and Creole mining town of Guanajuato, which fell to the attack forces on Sept. 28, 1810. Royalists eventually defeated Hidalgo's armies at the Bridge of Calderon on Jan. 18, 1811.

Hidalgo was captured on March 19 and executed on July 31. Other leaders took up his cause over the next decade, and the separation of New Spain from Old Spain formally was recognized on Aug. 24, 1821. The new Mexican Empire was born with Agustin Iturbide, soon to be crowned Emperor Augustin I. The Empire, however, was short-lived. however, was short-lived.

Just points out the importance of the historical perspective DD. Finally, we have to congratulate John Daly, who celebrated the 2nd anniversary of DOGS OF WAR. For a subfee of \$4 and gamefee of \$3, you'd better run, not walk, to the post office. North America's #1 GM has announced game openings. See the mailing list for addresses of all these highly recommended publishers.

WAR STARS AWARDS. Lack of space has forced us to postpone the War Stars Awards ceremony, but it's just as well. There are so many polls and awards right now, it makes sense to save something for another time. However, we cannot let this opportunity elude us. Heartiest congratulations to Jack Masters for his fine zine and its consistent showing in the polls. The last couple of issues have been the best ever. Unfortunately, he is serious. A new job and a cutback in free time has forced him to put a freeze on new subs (not renewals, whew!) until things improve. Just keep the frogs coming, Black Jack.

PLUGS. Thank Ghod Konrad Baumeister has decided to publish once more. Thanks also that he's abandoned ditto. Now everyone will be able to read every jewel of a word of GIVE ME A WEAPON. Quickly send off for samples of fifteen zines, only to encounter the first period of waiting. Then, inundation! Samples zines from all over the country, many with personal notes. All suggest that I go slow and write lots! OK, I'll only join one game...to start.

A letter to a potential GM, and six letters of charming introduction later...I discover that the first thing a novice must do is be patient.



Critics say that subzines belong in a separate poll, and point to the absurdity of EMHAIN MACHA competing against its subzines BERSAGLIERI and THE SNAKE PIT. Others say that any offering by Bernie Oaklyn belongs in a class by itself, and would prohibit LE FRONT... from the competition.

WALKER'S WONDERFUL WORLD OF FANTASY

I recently sent for a sample of Rod Walker's new zine PELLENORATH, which is devoted to "the geographical settings of fantasy and science fiction stories (samples available for \$1, address elsewhere in this issue). I also asked for some recommendations for reading in this area, one to which I am a newcomer. His reply may be interesting to readers of LSD:

"Fantasy" is a very loose title for what PELL covers. It's any created world that has a strong enough geographical base to generate a map. As you will see from #1, I cover a mainstream novel (Pale Fire). No. 2 is an Edgar Rice Burrough special, who passed for science fiction in his day. No. 3 covers two fantasy settings (Prydain and Zimiamvia) and a definitely sf setting (Viriconium), and a 3rd fantasy, Dorimare. Of Nos. 4 & 5, one will be devoted to the Darkover novels (sf, tending to sci-fantasy) and Mike Sirota's novels will be in the other (definitely fantasy,

Sirota's novels will be in the other (definitely fantasy, although very close to the Burroughs version of "sf".

In the future I will cover old historical romances, such as McCutcheon's "Graustark" novels; mainline sf, such as LeGuin's The Dispossessed; probably there will be an article on operettaland (G&S, Ofenbach, etc. where mythical places are used); children's fantasy (Oz, Paphlagonia, etc.); and an incredibly wide range of materials generally. I'll get to planets such as Dune, Krishna, Tran-ky-ky, Treason, Wellworld, Hegira, Dextra, Pern, Silistra, Gor, Tschai, and others which aren't really fantasy...some not even close to fantasy.

As to "must read" books: Where to begin?
Fantasy is a pretty broad field, and of course there's the inevitable debate as to whether some things at the fringes are fantasy at all. Is Darkover a fantasy series? I confess I don't know, but it is a must read series for me, fantasy or not. The later and longer novels are better: Heritage of Hastur and Forbidden Tower being much the best, followed by Stormqueen, Two to Conquer, and the Shattered Chain. The new one, Sharra's Exile, is not out yet, or if it is, I've not yet seen it. There are 16 or 17 books in the series to date. series to date.

If you get into the Sword & Sorcery genre, read the Conan books and subscribe to AMRA. But much better (wittier) are the Fafhrd/Grey Mouser stories of Fritz Leiber. Alexander's Prydain novels. Karl Wanger's Kane books. Donaldson's "Thomas Covenant" trilogy. Tolkien, of course, Cabell's Poictesme books. Don't bother with the Gor novels, nor the Akers/Prescott Kregen series (now up to 25 volumes). Read anything written/edited by Sprague De Camp. Anything. Skip Lin Carter, who is entirely imitative of almost everybody.

But a lot is a matter of taste. I don't like many of the things I have to acquire to support my peculiar

of the things I have to acquire to support my peculiar interest.

"Fantasy" includes too many diverse types of writing to consider as a "lump". True fantasy would probably include classics such as Dunsany, Clark Ashton Smith, and Lovecraft (in his Dreamworld phase) plus things such as Middle Earth and Poictesme. But then you have sword-and sorcery, which looks like fantasy but isn't. Conan, Brak, Thongor, Kothor, Kyrik, Kull, and that crowd lack the grace and delicacy and eeriness which is true of fantasy per se. "Alternate present" novels are a sort of fantasy. So are "post-diaaster" and "distant future" novels which aren't true sf in the current vogue for technical accuracy and thinly veiled "social commentary".

And so on. Anyway, the interest in PELL is strictly geography. It's even (eventually) going to cover the Book of Mormon (which I consider a fantasy but which is taken seriously by a lot of people).


He looked up at Bill, who was standing frozen and wild-eyed, and having some doubts of his own.

me to come up with the theory you are about to read.

First the man's three names--all significant: "R."
Michael Conner". "R." stands for "Russian" or "Red",
that much I'm sure of, given the causes that he has
championed in the hobby during this past year (see
more below). "Michael" is the favored name of the
greatest Russian heroes and Tsars. And "Conner", a
fiendish pun on "Connors", definitely comes from the
word "con" meaning: "To swindle or defraud (a victim)
by first winning his confidence; to dupe." This leads
us to the zine itself--LONE STAR DIPLOMAT!

Through LSD, R. Michael Conner has certainly
gained our confidence. LSD was voted 4th in the
Class of 1980 Zine Poll and 7th in the 1981 Leeder
Zine Poll. He also ranks high as a GM. He has
established a powerful base in the strategic Southwest by extolling and promoting "Texasism".

But for what reasons has LSD sought to gain
our confidence? What are R. Michael Conner's aims
and goals? Well...I sincerely believe...he is...a me to come up with the theory you are about to read.

Conner also offered paid game fees to anyone who would enter an Irish variant game in EMHAIN MACHA. (Note: Communists have been linked with Irish terrorists before as well as with other national

Even stronger are LSD's links with the "red" elements of the hobby. LSD carried an issue of the GREAT WAR IN MODERN MEMORY by Guy Hail within one of its issues to promote GWMM. Why? True, Guy Hail evidently knows a lot about history and GWMM is a beautiful zine, but there is a more sinister side to this "promotion". Is is also a coincidence that one of the prominent leaders of the U.S. Communist Party is named "Gus Hall"? Bearing in mind the similarity between Mike Connors and Mike Conner, juxtapose (didn't think I knew a word that big, did you?!)

"Guy Hail/Gus Hall" for comparison. Coincidence? Again, no!

LSD also carried a copy of PARANOIACS'

MONTHLY, put out by a known red-head, Jack
Fleming. One of the games offered in PM is opened to red-heads only. Coincidence? Again, I think not. wrote me a 4-page letter on Russian grammar! Clearly

In LSD#7, Conner expressed the typical Russian characteristic of annoyance at losing a fair election (Russians just aren't used to losing elections!) when the headlines read: "GRR! Bad Dog Tops Mascot Poll".

And in August, R. Michael Conner claimed to have hepatitis. Note the symptoms he listed in LSD #12. They are the exact ones that the Russian leaders have when they think about the situation in Poland nowadays! Clearly something was greatly worrying the pubber of LSD. What was it?

Again, we can only speculate. I really think it was only a "diplomatic" illness used to cover a trip Conner made out of the country. I think he went to Mexico City to report to his superior, Luis Porteny Sorokin, whom you may recognize from LSD's subber list in #4. (Sorokin is of Russo-Cuban parentage and is a key element in the planned establishment of the Austin-Moscow-Havana axis mentioned earlier.).

Sorokin is also France in "Gulf Coast", a game which has featured messages in several languages, including Russian! What Sorokin and Conner discussed in Mexico City can only be conjecture, and in any case, is only of secondary importance to the basic theory that I have outlined here.

The important part is that R. Michael Conner and his LSD have made quite an impact on the Diplomacy hobby during the past year. I just feel that impact should be closely scrutinized and have offered my own humble hypothesis...so I can get an extension of my sub and be "impacted" on some more! Better Read than no LSD at ail!
