

The View from Beverly Road

Bobby Stephens arrived a couple of hours later than I expected, right in the middle of our Friday night ritual viewing of "Dallas". [I know, I once said I hadn't become hooked, but my wife Cindy forces me to watch it now.] He claimed that an uncooperative Korean client created the delay. Turned out that Bobby was up on the plot better than I, and we had brief chats during commercials.

After "Dailas" was over, Cindy and my son Robby went to bed, since they wanted to get an early start for a weekend in Houston. I introduced Bobby to my office and zinefiles. We compared notes on various hobby personalities, feuds, and our current diplomatic endeavors until about 1:00 am, when I crashed. I think Bobby stayed up later, reading back issues of DIPLOMACY WORLD.

Cindy and Robby left Saturday morning about 7:00, whereupon I turned over and slept another hour or so. I fired up the coffeepot and read the newspaper until Bobby woke up. After some bacon and eggs, I felt a little more human, and by 9:30 people began to show up for the first round of LoneStarCon.

Soon after ten we were ready to begin the first game. The draw installed Allen King as the Prime Minister of England, while Guy Hail and Bruce Miller headed the other western powers of France and Germany. John Sartin got stuck in the middle as Italy, while Bobby S., Mike Whitty, and Dale Harger took on the reins of power in Austria, Russia, and Turkey, respectively.

I had to settle for the position of secretary and GM, since no one else showed up until mid-afternoon. Hmmph! The main reason I organized the minicon was to get a chance to play, but I did my gracious host number with a smile.

I'll leave the description of the game to someone else, since I spent most of the time typing up the moves after they'd been read. I got way behind in the afternoon when I had to go out for some film for my camera and pick up Libby Hail when she got off work. It looked pretty wild, and ended up in a

I thought that was going to be my entree into the game, but the fates were against my playing Dippy on Saturday.

The draw was declared about 5:30, and everyone left except Guy, Libby, Bobby, and me. After a lengthy post-mortem, we decided to go to Milto's for pizza.

Back to Beverly Road then for another game. After considering several alternatives we settled on "Extinction", an ecology-based multiplayer game of interpecies competition. The Hails and I had played it, but were rusty. At least that's why I think Bobby won. Actually, it's one of those games with

a spinner and therefore a large element of chance. Beginner's luck.

The Hails left around 10:30, and Bobby and I exchanged impressions of the day's personalities and events. We both retired with reading material, since I hadn't time to read the day's mail until then. The "revived" PASSCHENDAELE, some letters, and DIPLOMACY BY MOONLIGHT AND CHEESECAKE, the latter two brought by Guy, were my bedside reading material. Bobby chuckled himself to sleep as he read Al Pearson's trivia sendup THE ZINE OF LISTS.

I slept late Sunday morning. I awoke to the airs of feline opera: Caruso and his sister Caspia were singing for their breakfast. I knew if I didn't get up, Caruso's next tactic would be to sit on my head.

After feeding the critters, starting up the coffee, and a long read through the Sunday papers, Bobby and I decided it might be time to hustle up a few players for a short game in the afternoon. After quite a few phone calls, we had the requisite seven players and finally got started about 2:00.

We played a modified Woodrow Wilson Diplomacy. After the first 20-minute round of introductory secret diplomacy, the players took their seats around the dining room table. From then on diplomacy was conducted entirely at the table, either aloud or by means of frantically scribbled notes passed back and forth. We limited these diplomacy periods to ten minutes each. In this way we were able to cover five gameyears in 3½ hours! This timesaving mode of play strikes me as promising for tournament play. Most of the players managed to communicate fairly thoroughly, but the medium forced us to be concise and to the point.

For LoneStarCon-II I lucked out and drew France. Whitt Pond played my game-long ally England. Doug Tatsch played Germany with a sprained wrist--he's a lefty, by the way. We also had a good relationship until the last year of our game when he began to

grow a little too rapidly. I SC Chart for LSC-II knifed him. Austria was supposed to help, but Bobby was 01 02 03 04 05 guiding this nation for the second time in two days. Since he didn't want Germany to go F 6 down quite so fast, he held 7 back. Guy Hail played his 4 2 favorite country, Italy, and R 1 surprised everyone when he and Bobby gave up builds in 1901 in order to get fleets

into position for a Lepanto. The poor victim was Sultan John Mayes, who put up a valiant fight but never quite recovered from the bold T&A attack. Paul Bearden played Russia and got imbroiled in a Scandinavian war against E&G, my opening-game allies. This made him vulnerable to southern opportunism, so Russia was the first to be wiped out. Italy followed soon after, as I had built up a sizable Mediterranean flotilla and had put Tunis under seige. With a fleet in the Eastern Med, Guy offered his help against Austria in exchange for my leaving Tunis unmolested, a reasonable offer, but I had decided to turn on Germany

by then. Therefore I was not interested in hurting Austria, who also had a lot to gain from an anti-German

campaign. So Guy bit the dust.

Whitt and Bobby had to leave for Dallas, so we ended the game at 5:30 or so. After a round of goodbys and an award ceremony (Bobby Stephens took the trophy bumpersticker for Best Overall), everyone quickly disappeared into the sunset.

Caruso and I decided it had been great fun, and we are looking forward to the next LoneStarCon, say

LONESTAR COMMENTS by Guy Hail

Quite a few of us played Diplomacy at Mike Conner's house last weekend (Nov. 14-15); everyone

was very friendly.

Bobby Stephens of Dallas was nothing like I'd pictured, and he played well as Austria from 6 in 1901 to 10 or 11 in 1908. Mike Blanchard of Dallas took over for the departing Bruce Miller of Austin, who had viciously stabbed me (France) in 1904, and Mike played Germany to 10 or 12 by game's end. Dave Harger (Turkey), Allen King (England), John Sartin (Italy), and Mike Whitty (Russia), all of Austin, also all played well.

As the day wore on we had a few player changes when Mike W. gave Russia to Dave after Dave's Turkey had been eliminated. We resolved a six-way draw in 1908 with E, G, & A doing well (8, 10, and 9, I believe), with Italy (6?), France (2),

and Russia (0) not as well off.

After Diplomacy and pizza, Libby, who had been at work until 5 pm, and Mike Conner, who kept the game record, which I hope he will print in LSD (it'll show you, Eric Ozog, I ain't so nice), and was the GM, Bobby Stephens, and I played Extinction, a favorite of Libby's and mine. Libby and Mike conceded victory to Bobby Stephens long after I had been eliminated by developers.

On Sunday we played a late morning game of Diplomacy with Conner as France, Stephens as Austria, Whitt Pond as England, Doug Tatsch as Germany, Paul Bearden as Russia, John Mayes as Turkey, and myself as Italy. Libby was playing soccer Sunday afternoon and couldn't play. It was a fun game, and I finally got to Lepanto, but as in two previous games, Conner-Tatsch defeated everyone, and then Conner stabbed him for the win.

I gave up a build in 1901 to move F Ion-EAS. and Austria moved F Alb-ION. Russia went into civil disorder, out of the game psychologically defeated, but no one took Moscow for a while!

The game ended with places according to centers held. We played the game in an unusual manner: to help speed the negotiations along, after the initial Diplomacy period all of the negotiation was conducted by passed notes!

LONESTARCON--AN AUSTRIAN VIEW

Early Saturday morning (early by Austin time, that is), Game I got underway. As luck would have it, I drew Austria. I immediately checked the TV schedule to see which teams were playing football that afternoon, as I expected an early exit. I mean I was the only out-of-towner playing with six Austinites.

Rather than a boring season-by-season or year-byyear recap, I'll select a few highlights and comment on them.

The initial negotiations decided my course for me. My Turkish adversary bluntly told me he wanted Bul, Gre, and Ser. That's it! No compromise. I talked

with Russia, and after telling him the R-T is the strongest alliance on the board, and I wouldn't hold it against him to ally with Turkey, I suggested why not try something different. He agreed, and as a result, Turkey was first out.

I got lucky and got three W'01 builds. As such I made Italy my puppet. We worked well together the entire game. We even had a fake stab by Italy on Austria in 1907, I think, and we were strong at the end. John is a very good player. He quickly realized where his future lay, and after deciding to puppet he never failed me. I only wish I could have done more for him.

1904 saw Germany (played brilliantly by Bruce Miller, and later by Mike Blanchard) stab both F & E breaking up the western triple, followed by an equally super stab by England (Allen King) against six in 1906. This stab actually saved the game, preventing

a German victory.

The game ended in a six-way draw, and I generally had a great time. My lone disappointment in the game was my failure to get France (played inflexibly by Guy Hail) to fight Germany, even after Germany took center after center from him.

Oh yes, I almost forgot. In replaying the game, I discovered a German Flying Dutchman. It went un-

detected. Good work, Mike B.

The second game was strange in deed. After a twenty-minute initial negotiation period, all negotiations were done at the table, either orally or by note. Paper flew fast and furious. It was great fun.

Once again, I drew Austria. R-T attacked me. but lack of communication and a lack of interest on the Russian's part saved me. Russia went CD, and Turkey and I had an uneasy truce the rest of the way.

No truly memorable moments in this game. Again,

a draw with Austria tied for most units.

So all-in-all, I did well. I definitely got Best Austria. I'm looking forward now to WarCon where I hope to draw another country. Maybe Italy this time.

LSC-I: ENGLAND SINGS by Allen King

When blood runs cold. Yes, that's how it felt when I realized my ally had betrayed me and stabbed not only me, but also our other ally, France. Even though I anticipated the stab on the move it was made. thus thwarting Germany's immediate aims, the stab prepared the way for the fall of France and eventually of England.

As I am a novice to Diplomacy, it was almost the first time I had been in a position of dealing with an effective stab, and I must say, it wasn't a pleasant feeling at all. So, for those other novice players who will eventually experience the same sensation in their own way, I offer the following advice:

1) The stab may literally be a bolt from the blue. and it will have a momentary stunning effect on many players, as it did on me. But remember--don't panic. This can really throw some players into a frenzy, if they sense you are totally disoriented. I cried loud and long inside, but remained calm outside.

2) Don't swear vengeance (unless you know you can bully the stabber), but instead, keep talking! I would suggest even continuing a dialog with the trespasser and his present allies, if time permits. I always (well, almost) will make time to talk with my ex-ally (the stabber). 3) Look carefully for flaws, strategic or tactical, in the stabber's new alliance, and use them in

subsequent discussions or to stab back. Look first, then talk. But make sure you are over your internal panic before you talk.

4) Dangle tantalizing promises of vassalhood in exchange for life and turning on the stabber's new ally. Do the same for the new ally. But be careful and plan your pitch carefully in this regard. It could look like panic, which will draw the sharks for certain.

5) Finally, poison your ex-ally or get him drunk enough that a more reasonable sort must take his place. A game of Diplomacy is worth that quick trip to the convenience store for a sixpack or wine!

Oh, what about me, you say?! Well, as fortune sometimes does, she smiled. Germany's representative left almost immediately after the stab, and a good friend of mine happened along to take his place. Although he took one more center from me, I was able to turn the tables on him and stabbed him for three centers. When the game ended, I was happily allied with...yeah, you guessed it: Germany. And I had grown to a respectable 7 units and eliminated Russia. But Ghod, did my blood run cold!

LSC-1: VIEW FROM THE EAST by Dale Harger

First, Mike Conner's taste in art is above average, which is rare. Excellent taste in art is, in non-Aristotelian nondescript terms, accidental.

Second, my first experience as a Turk was exciting, not so enlightening, however. There are still many things I cannot figure out: Why does vodka rot the brain? What did the Austrian do for the Russian and the Italian? Would Bob Marley have made a good Dip player? And just exactly what religion are Turks?

Face-to-face Dip certainly has a flair all its own. Occasional free moments are spent speculating on the psychology of a puppet and watching Conner scurrying back and forth to the typewriter.

Germany was played superbly. From a southern viewpoint he seemed to choreograph beautifully with F-E-A. Guy as France was expanding methodically until Bruce's departure crippled his plans a bit.

The real shiners of the game were John, Mike W., and I, who displayed good sportsmanship. And even I diplomed Russia's being included in the declared draw, even though she had no units. You're welcome, Mike.

LSC-I: RUSSIAN RECOLLECTIONS by Mike Whitty

I didn't win this game, but I had a lot of fun. Imbibing a quart of Almadén Riesling (pretty good for a domestic white) didn't help my strategic planning, but it sure made losing a lot more enjoyable. I drew Russia, and since I play Ivan in my postal game, it gave me a little confidence. However, I followed a different strategy, picked the wrong ally, and was down to the Grand Duchy of Petrograd and Norway when I left. Sest Levi's, as the Frenchies say.

Bobby Stephens and I got along well from the be-

ginning. I was interested in experimenting with an A-R alliance. We cooperated for a while against Turkey, but as the E-G alliance started working on me, Bobby seemed to lose interest in me as a full ally. Not that I blame him. If I had been able to suicide effectively against my enemies, I would have wanted him to pick up my centers (sort of like leaving everything to him in my will).

I never trust anyone with a Texas accent worse than my own. Hence, I did not trust Allen King, and for good reason. His rapid attack "over the top" almost took me by surprise. However, I was able to hold off against him, and Germany, not England, was

the big winner in the A-G alliance.

I will join in the chorus of those FTF players who say "Guy Hail is too much of a Mr. Nice Guy to play." He missed several excellent opportunities to stab his western allies, including the unstoppable Mid-Iri-Lpl "back-door" stab.

Bruce Miller seemed rather quiet, but he definitely got the better of his louder English ally. I predict that he would be a formidable opponent in a postal game. John Sartin and Dale Harger had not played much before, but they showed enough common sense to hold on for a while against tough odds.

Overall, the game was one of the best FTF games I've seen. It was certainly better than another boring Texas Longhorn victory, which was my alternative for the afternoon.

LSC-I: THE VICE-KAISER SPEAKS by Mike Blanchard

The German Chanceller would like to extend his heartfelt appreciation to the French government, who even though stabbed by the preceding German government, continued to be a valuable ally. I must admit that this is probably because if he didn't he would not have continued all all. Although the war was settled as a draw the German/England and French(?) alliance clearly had the upper hand and would have smashed the Austrian/Italian alliance if time had but permitted.

While it may have appeared that the German left flank was somewhat weak, it would have quickly stabilized along the Mos-War-Mun line.

The A/I left flank, however, was on the verge of collapse. The French fleets were in good position and the Austrian and Italian did not have sufficient naval power to be able to prevent our breaking through and rolling them back, taking supply centers as we went.

At least that was the plan, but we all know what they say about the best laid plans.

The game had two limiting factors: first, there was no GameMaster, and second, two of the players said in advance they had to leave at 5:30 for Dallas. adding a certain element of pressure on the game.

In retrospect there were 3 very strong players, 2 average players, and 2 weak players. The game was determined more by this factor than by any other. France & Austria-Hungary tied with 9 centers, followed by Germany with 7, England with 5, and Turkey with The time limit determined the end of the game, rather than an agreed draw, in fall 1905.

The weak-player countries, Russia and Italy, were crippled by fall 1902, each for different reasons. Russia was done in by strategic paralysis and excessive hesitation, waiting far too long to see "how things would develop". Even after being crippled, Russia was reluctant to seek alliance with anyone and hence was attacked by everyone. Italy, on the other hand, was done in by strategic grandstanding and a total lack of caution. In throwing everything it had against

Turkey at the start, Italy left itself completely at the mercy of its neighbors. It was partitioned in one magnificent swoop by France, Austria, and Germany.

The average-player countries, England and Turkey, were never threatened with elimination, but were contained at opposite ends of the board. England's expansion was inhibited by its failure to establish itself as the dominant power in Scandinavia after Russia collapsed. Turkey's expansion was inhibited by its inability to capitalize on Russia's collapse, due primarily to its need to defend itself against the completely suicidal attack it was receiving from Italy.

The strong-player countries, France, Germany, and Austria, were in dominant positions by fall 1904. Aside from the fact that they were limited by time. these countries were also limited since they were being played by three strong players who knew each other and knew how strong a player each was. Thus, no one was ever willing to let another obtain any lead. Also, none were willing to trust each other enough to form the winning alliance. If any two of these three had formed a firm alliance even as late as fall 1903, they would have been the decisive winners under the circumstances.

I would definitely say France did the best. Austria benefitted from the collapse of Russia and Italy, but was unable to deal with Turkey and thus was forever having to use its forces to keep Turkey bottled up. Germany attempted to back-stab England, a move which proved premature in that Germany had no alliance with France and was unable to crush England by itself, so Germany had to guard itself from a thenceforth hostile and pro-French England. Both Germany and Austria-Hungary had setbacks due to improperly written orders, a problem which France never had. France, on the other hand, was very secure in that it had no hostile neighbors behind it to deal with and had not made any enemies up to that point in the game.

And that's the way it was in Austin on 15 November 1981. This is Whitt Pond, as England, saying "Good night."



VIENNA: As a demonstration of the well documented Austrian desire for peace with our Italian neighbors, the Government announced a reversal of the unfortunate "Keep-em-honest" policy made necessary by events.
