This woman whom I had earlier noticed was now playing France to my England. Interesting. But at the same time it was upsetting to note that France, Germany, Italy, and Russia were all from Chicago. Well, to make a short story shorter, Marie Cockrell knew how to play Diplomacy, and together we participated in a 5-way draw. I was impressed. ¶Round Two placed me in an all-male game, fighting it out with the likes of Allan Calhamer, John Boyer, and Warren Wyman. Sigh, no Marie. ¶Next it was Sunday and time for Game Three. And then it happened. There are times in one's life when everything falls neatly into place, and important decisions become obvious and without doubt. They feel right. And that is what happened on that Sunday in August. Marie was assigned to play Turkey, and I was Austria, and a sixth sense told me that An alliance was about to form that would outlast and expand beyond the realm of Diplomacy. ¶The game broke half-way through for what later proved to be a two-hour lunch. And our work is fairly similar in that we both work with computers. If you want to join this list for the K-game, which probably won't open for six months at least, drop me a card. Meanwhile, the lineup for this game looks promising!



DIGEST BOOM. More and more publishers are shifting to photocopy reduction in the production of their zines. It makes good economic sense. Roughly twice as much material can be printed in the same space that way. Also, photocopying can yield much more legible results than the old-fashioned ditto or (ugh!) mimeograph, and offers wider scope for graphics. Most of the zines using reduction have taken up the "digest" format pioneered by DIPLOMACY DIGEST (Mark Berch, 492 Naylor Place, Alexandria, VA 22304) In simplest form, the pubber fills an  $8\frac{1}{2}$ "xll" sheet with typing, and this becomes the reduced page. Actually, more can be accommodated without sacrificing legibility, but this requires some cut and paste. Three zines. LSD, GWMM, & LIBERTERREAN, use reduction with a full-sized page, the latter on 11"x17" sheets, folded, like a magazine. Dear Former Diplomacy Game Player in BLACK FROG:

Yes "former" is correct because BF will be no more. I made a decision in mid-December to get out of the "hobby" and to no longer publish BF. I made the decision somewhat tentative at the time, subject to changing my mind--after all I had a lot of time and money at stake in the hobby to be leaving it cold. But the longer I live with the decision to quit the happier I am about it.

To most of you, I feel that I owe nothing and could care less about you or your game. But to a very few others I feel a certain debt of friendship and because of this will keep an obligation to complete the games started in BLACK FROG/EAST OF EDEN.

There will be differences. Publication of adjudications will be by letter and not in a 'zine. There will be limitations on the amount of press from any one player in any one season. Turn-around time (the time interval between deadline and publication of adjudication) will probably never again be as prompt in the future as it was in the past. Neutral orders by computor [sic] for NMR's will not be used in the future (I have already destroyed the programs and used the seven mini-discs they were on for other purposes).

Oh yes, the games do belong to the players and you are welcome to rehouse them anywhere else to your liking at any time you want. In fact, if any one player in any game objects to my continuation as GM--then I am simply not going to continue as GM.



Russian lesson of the month: Russians usually omit the first two words "Поздравлаю вас...", which mean "I congratulate y'all...". The preposition "c" plus instrumental case gives "...with the New Year", or in Cyrillic "с Новым Годом". The official Soviet holiday is New Year's, but most Russians also observe Christmas. The appropriate greeting for that day is "...С РОЖДЕСТВОМ ХРИСТОВЫМ", literally, "with the birth of Christ".



### Sense of Omission

Part III. Asseverate the Positive

In the first two parts of this series, I illustrated some blunders of our linguistic forebears--borrowing halves of natural word-pairs and adopting affixed words without taking the roots alone. Another major class of words that got lost in earlier stages of our language's history is the Lost Positives.

These missing words first came to my attention when a friend invited me to join the Society for the Restoration of Lost Positives, a sort of idea-in-the-mind-of-God group looking for them and pushing their use. He pointed out two of the Society's early successes, ept and couth. Impressed with their work, I said I would be delighted to join. Evidently, delighted was the wrong word to use, for my friend never mentioned SRLP again. Still, I feel that several years' dicated work has toned for that slip, and I now propose to show you the principles and results of the Society's work.

a negative is a word containing some formal element that expresses denial, privation or nonexistence. The de- in denial and the non- in nonexistence make these words negatives; privation, in spite of its meaning, is not formally a negative.

A positive is a word obtained by a certain treatment of a negative: removing or inverting that part of the word that made it a negative. Ungrateful has the positive grateful by deletion; heedless has the positive heedful by inversion.

Finally, a *lost positive* is a positive that does not exist in contemporary English, through the negative does. *Couth* was lost for a time; dictionaries do not yet recognize the restoration of *ept*; and *effable* is still in the developmental stage.

Many of the lost positive cause no trouble. From exempt we get empt "subject to an obligation"; from abominate, ominate "not to mind much"; from defenestrate, fenestrate "throw in through a window" (the dictionary gives fenestrate, but with a quite different meaning); from disburse, burse "refuse to pay"; from impecunious, pecunious "rich"; from unkempt, kempt "combed, tidy"; from ruthless, ruthful "full of sorrow, causing sorrow" (in some dictionaries as an archaism) and so on. Surely I need laborate further.

There are, however, some refinements to the search. First English ahs many hidden negatives, or cryptonegatives, and thus lacks many hidden lost positives. I'll start with claim (from exclaim) "to cry, but not out". Undulate gives dulate "move in a straight line". Cimate "leave mostly untouched" comes, of course, from decimate. Distinctive yields tinctive "pretty much like the rest", while impetigo yields petigo "absence of contagious skin disease; healthy complexion".

Lost positives often make the best definitions of other lost positives. For instance, plain "make unclear; lucidate"; cernment "criminating taste". To falcate means "leave the money in the till; scond".

Many of the definitions may strike you as wishy-washy or dull. Then what about pepsia "chronic good digestion" and comfiture "satisfaction with the latest turn of events", aster "catastrophe narrowly averted", and pology "statement denying repentance or regret"?

Careful work with lost positives reveals, as you might have pected, numerous puns. Dicate comes from both abdicate and dedicate and means "stay on the throne; continue to accept responsibility" and "apply oneself less than diligently". From intricate and extricate we get tricate "not very complicated; free of toils" and "leave in the toils". Here is a hard

one: precate "not curse or condemn; veigh" and "keep one's disapproval to oneself; fail to protest".

Finally, lost positives lend themselves to complete, connected utterances, if not to coherent ones. "Hausted ecutives of the company, having erted every fort in the firm pectation of an uberant piration, ulted over the asperating climax." "Gruntled airport officials viewed the aster with may." "The theory of the Panding Iverse predicts that the tance between galaxies will continue to crease." "The still-toothful agenarian hibitionist chalantly took a dictory position in the terchange, but we soon plained to him why this would have a verse fect on his tax emption."

Truly the restatement of lost positives is a goal serving of our every fort, something that we can all say to chieve. In so doing, we will vigorate our languate and prove our lives. From a merely superb strument we will vise the most traordinary artifact ever agined by the mind of man.
