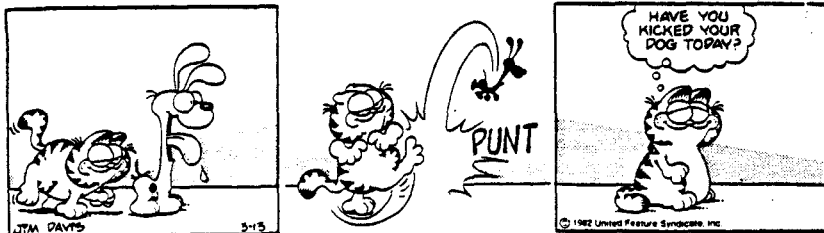

FLAGSHIP CONTROVERSY. The latest debate in Dippy circles concerns the place DIPLOMACY WORLD holds in the hobby. A quarterly zine published by Rod Walker, DW has been called the "flagship" of Dipdom. It has received recent criticism for printing material from a narrow segment of the hobby and for convincing John Leeder to give DW exclusive first publication rights to his polls. As to the former, that situation can be remedied quite easily and obviously. When a wider circle of writers begin to submit material, Rod won't be forced to print page after page of tactics articles by Mark Berch or "self-promoting" editorials by Larry Peery. The latter criticism is a tribute to Walker's (and DW's) reputation and persuasiveness. Who wouldn't try to get rights to the most widely respected polls? Another tempest in a teapot. DW is not the "flagship" of the hobby, and I understand that it no longer receives a subsidy from Avalon-Hill. It is a personal zine, unusual in its format and publishing frequency, and history. It is far from a prozine, which in my mind is what a "flagship" should be. But Rod is entitled to steer his own course and make DW over in his image. Everyone else in the hobby does that with their own zines. Why should DW be any different?

D&L FOLDS. It's been reported elsewhere, but I'd like to add my salute to Steve McLendon, who recently announced the transferral of all games formerly housed in his DRAGON & THE LAMB to Bob Sergeant's ST. GEORGE & THE DRAGON, with Jeff Richmond taking on the GM responsibilities. D&L was a prominent zine during its five years of publication, and Steve is highly respected as publisher, GM, player, and contributor to the welfare of the hobby. D&L was the home of some of my earliest postal games, and it will always be remembered fondly.

K-GAME SLATED. The following people are eligible to participate in LSD's eleventh game. Paul Milewski has already paid, and if Pond, Drews, Scheifler, Owen, Landeros, and Quinn would be so kind as to send me their \$10 gamefee by August 20, they will fill out the program. In case one or two of these folks decide to opt out, will Winter and Luedi indicate their willingness to play (send no money yet)? I'll notify the players as soon as I have seven confirmations. [Others on the waiting list for the L-game include Mayes, Tatsch, Nichols, Kovalcik, and Cannon, but this game will not open until two currently running games wind up.]

WHAT'S AHEAD. Only the Shadow knows for sure, but I intend to continue to publish LSD and open two more games at least. At that time there will be six games running, a level I think will be comfortable for me to handle. My involvement as a player has been diminishing and will continue to do so, although I may decide to enter a new game or two when things settle down in the fall. (It seems harder for me to devote a lot of time to correspondence when there is so much daylight in the summertime.) I have not lost interest in gaming or publishing, but my recent change in lifestyle has created unexpected, but not unwelcome, demands on my time, both social and work-related. One option that I am now considering for LSD is to decrease its size to eight pages when the gameload drops to six. This would be accompanied by a reduction in subfees if it is instituted. One factor in that decision will be the degree of participation by the readers in the submission of articles. If I have plenty of material to print, I would prefer to remain at the ten-page level, but that remains to be seen. Right now my file of articles is empty. Anyone want to contribute?

PHONE BIZNESS. Players seeking to phone in game orders will have the best luck in reaching me during morning hours on weekdays. My house is not air conditioned (I like it that way), so I'm in the habit of rising early, working while it's comparatively cool, and heading for the lake or the neighborhood swimming pool in the afternoon. Evenings are almost always reserved for play, too. I've been seeing a lot of the current movies (Tron, Star Trek II, E.T., Midsummer Night's Sex Comedy, Garp, among others, plus some classics and foreign films such as the Grant-Hepburn Philadelphia Story, the Brazilian film Dona Flor and Her Two Husbands, the modern German film Das Boot, and others), and I generally do not stick around home in the evenings.

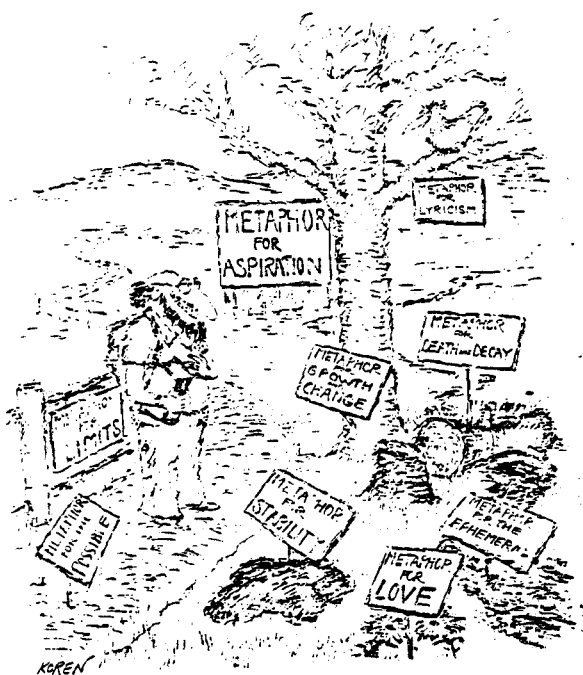

Thanks for the compliment and the stats. I don't believe it has anything to do with my GMing, however. The relatively high gamefee probably attracts only very serious players. But your data show a low NMR rate even before the \$10 fee went into effect. Subfees have always been in the highest range of dipzines, though. Maybe that's a factor too. Whatever the reason, I really appreciate the efforts of the players who keep the games rolling.

Dear Mike:

Bill Quinn is correct in his comments regarding Fre(e)donia, but not the spelling. The Texan republic was spelled with one "e". It was a very brief affair, lasting from 16 December 1826 to 27 January 1827. The movie Freedonia was spelled with 2 "e"s. This was in fact the 2nd attempt to make the area independent. A prior rebellion at Nacogdoches proclaimed a "Republic of Tejas" in June 1819. I might add that I am as knowledgeable about real obscure places as I am about fictional ones. A native Mexican "Texas" was also proclaimed in San Antonio in 1813. The rebellious "Republic of Anahuac" also began in Texas (1813-1815). The State of Texas also proclaimed itself a Republic in 1861 prior to joining in the Slaveholders' Rebellion. Santa Ana obviously was not wrong in being suspicious of the area.

Bell Schilling is right about the other two "Mouse" novels; I ran across them myself only recently. I've not seen a copy of Wall Street; it and Beware are both long out of print. However, Beware at least has been reprinted (Borgo Press, PO Box 2845, San Bernardino, CA 92406, Cover price \$3.95). Since Beware

The PUZZLER

Whitt Pond's trivia quiz brought more entries than any other puzzler ever printed in LSD. Doug Tatsch wins the two free issues for his exhaustive and correct response, printed here. Len Blasiol also gets two freebies for correct answers. Congratulations to the two of you.

1. Famous horses in history: Traveler was R. E. Lee's famous steed during the Civil War. Comanche was Captain Myles W. Keogh's horse, the lone survivor of Custer's Last Folly at the Little Big Horn River in 1876. Although wounded 7 times (3 seriously--in the neck, lung, and groin), he survived to the age of 30, dying of colic at Ft. Riley, Kansas, on Nov. 9, 1893. He is currently embalmed and on display at the University of Kansas. Bucephalus was the war horse of Alexander the Great. In lower case form, bucephalus, a noun, refers to "a riding horse, especially if spirited and mettlesome--often used ironically". Incitatus [note spelling] is the beloved horse of Caligula, Roman Emperor from 37 to 41 AD. The horse was made a consul of the Empire and was supplied with a marble manger, ivory stall, gold drinking goblet, furniture, and a retinue of slaves. Caligula was known to hold parties at which Incitatus was the host.

2. This is a considerably edited phrase from a speech given by William Tecumseh Sherman to a group of Union veterans at Columbus, Ohio, on August 11, 1880. What he really said was, "There is many a boy here today who looks on war as all glory, but boys, it is all hell. You can bear this warning voice to generations yet to come. I look upon war with horror, but if it has to come I am here." Another phrase he actually wrote down during the Civil War was perhaps more to the point, "War is cruelty, and you cannot refine it."

Honorable mention (but no prize) goes to Dick Martin and to Terry Sutor, who supplied the following answers:

Dick: 1) All of them are spaceships to be built in the late 23rd century and explore the Crab Nebula. 2) PFC James Langdon as a Panzer IV bore down on him during the Battle of the Bulge.

Terry: The four items in #1 are all travel trailers or the like....The best thing General Sherman said was, "If I am nominated for President, I won't run, and if I am elected, I will leave the country", or something like that.

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To underscore their interest in trivia, two more LSD readers sent in quizzes. I'll save Rod Walker's until next time. Here is a nautical trivia quiz from Peter Ansoff. The best answers will receive three issues of LSD.

1. Each of the following ships participated in a famous naval engagement: Virginia, Macedonian, Amagiri, Pallas, U-29, Conqueror, and Natividad. Name the opposing ship in each case.

2. HM Destroyer Sheffield, recently sunk in the Falklands war, had an experimental funnel design known as "Loxton Bends". What is the only other ship of the class to have this feature?

3. What was the largest-caliber gun ever mounted on a) an aircraft carrier and b) a submarine, and what ships were involved?

4. In the WWII era, US fleet carriers were named after battles and famous USN ships of the past. There were three exceptions. Two of the three, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Wright, had names whose sources were self-explanatory. What was the third exception, and what was the story behind her name? (n.b. Rod Walker is ineligible to answer this one!)



No one correctly identified the language and the motto printed on the button shown left above. Since Al Giddings was the only one to try, and since he came close, I'll give him the prize of one issue of LSD, and his answer is printed below.

To make things more interesting, I'll add another button for a reward of two free issues for correctly identifying both languages and both slogans.

At first glance I thought it Swedish but could not seem to translate *bedre*. Swedish *bedra* means deceit, but this didn't fit into *En tand*, meaning "a tooth". Since Norwegian, Icelandic, and Danish all resemble one another, I'm sure the language is Scandinavian; which I don't know. Swedish *värk* means "ache", but this isn't close enough to resemble any of the other languages. *Bättre*, on the other hand, means "better" and I guess could resemble *bedre*, say in one of the other languages. I'll guess the language as Norwegian and the translation "One tooth better", whatever that means.

This month there are two Stars: Andy Lischett for the one shown at left, and James Woodson for the North Star which accompanies his article on another page. Each gets one issue equivalent (doesn't anyone want any of these dumb bumperstickers anymore?) for the star, and James also gets three for his article.

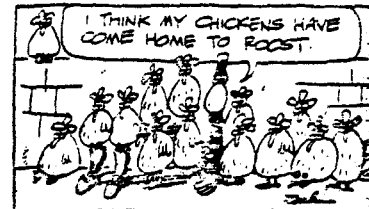
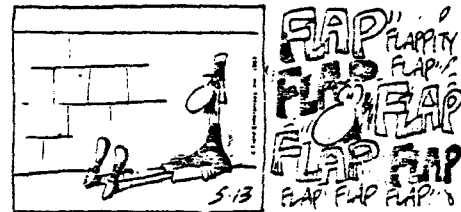

When I moved from sunny San Diego to attend the University of Minnesota in the Twin Cities 2½ years ago, I expected it to be different.

The weather, I was sure, would be brutal, compared to that of my hometown in southern California. In this I was correct.

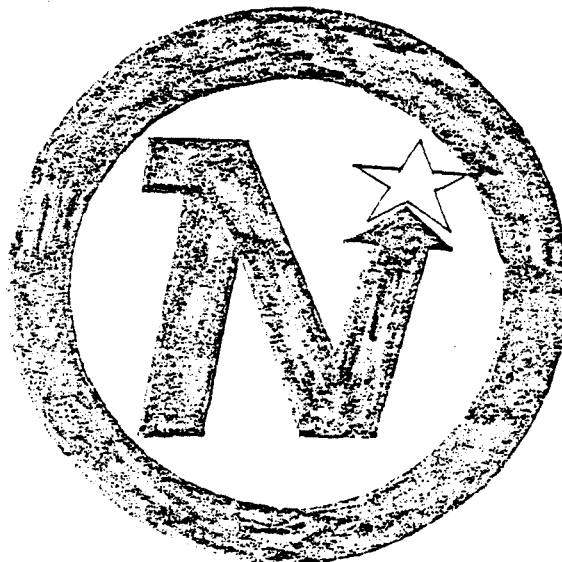
The people would not be the same, but the change was not great, and I have not detected any thick accents in Minneapolis and St. Paul. One thing, however, that I did not foresee was the popularity of ice hockey.

In San Diego there was a minor league professional team in the 60s and early 70s, and after that a WHA team for a while before both the team and the league folded. There is also a youth hockey program, but it's not really popular. There is, however, no high school program and only a single collegiate team (USIU, the team is almost exclusively Canadian). This is no real surprise considering the weather.

Minnesota is completely different. Starting with the youngsters, almost every neighborhood has a rink or lake, and just about every kid grows up on skates. This breeds a large youth program. All this talent feeds the best high school hockey in the nation. Imagine watching a high school football or basketball game, and compare the quality of play to a college game. You'll probably notice a big difference. Now, when I saw a high school hockey game here they did not seem to be much less skilled than what I had seen of the University team (and the Gophers are one of the best in the country). In short, these kids are good!

Collegiate hockey in the Midwest is the best in the country. The last two NCAA crowns have gone to North Dakota and Wisconsin. The runners-up were Wisconsin and Minnesota. I'm not sure who won the title farther back in the past, but Minnesota won three national titles in the 70s.

On the professional scene, the North Stars have become one of the NHL's better teams (they were the Stanley Cup runner-up last year). When their games are televised many students here in the dorm are watching. The lounges are packed during the playoffs. Even a southern California boy can't help but

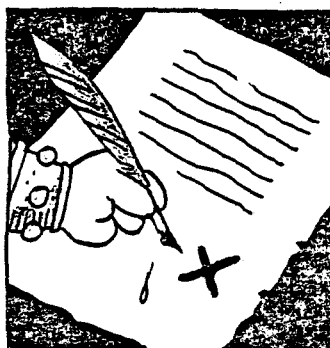


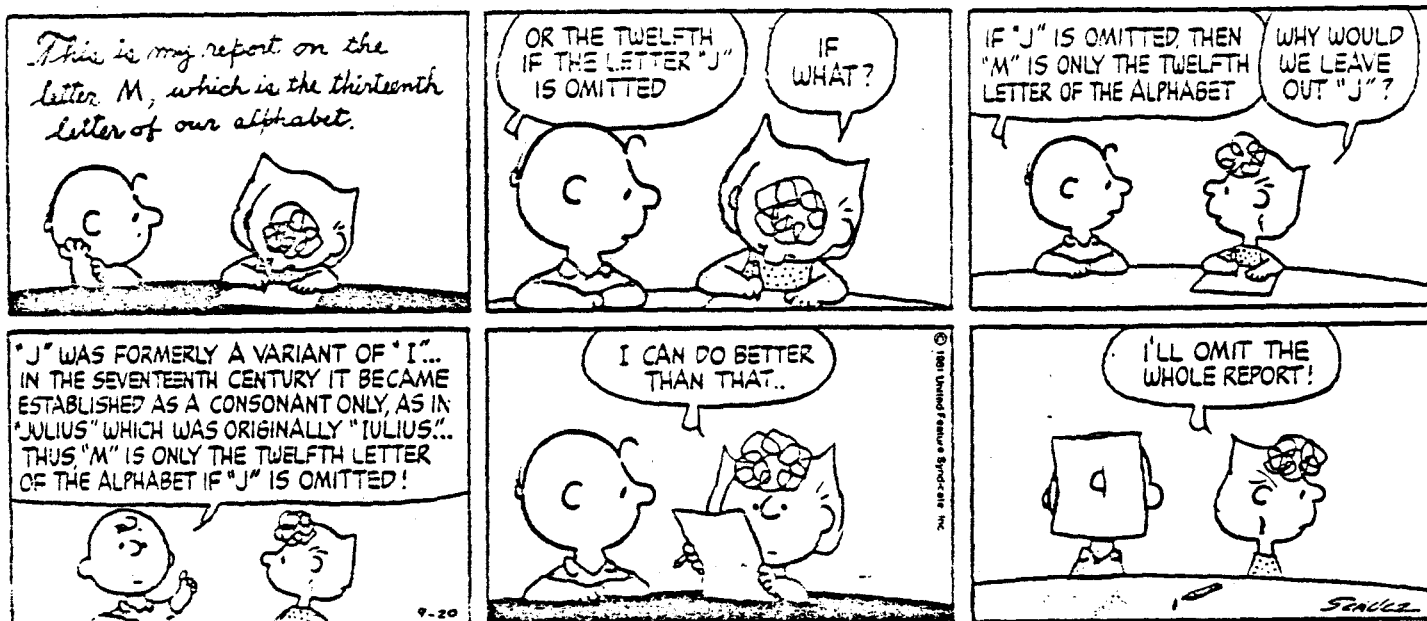
be a fan.

One more team that most of you have seen is the US Olympic team in 1980. The Gold Medal winners were coached by University of Minnesota coach Herb Brooks (now with the New York Rangers), and I believe at least ten of the players were Minnesotans.

Two years ago the Gophers were playing a WCHA playoff game here, and the game was scheduled in the afternoon, because the high school tourney final was being played that night on a different ice. The University knew that attendance would be down if they had to compete with the high school game!

My eyes and then head slowly moved to discern Paul Rauterberg on Russ's rocker, snuggled up in embryonic form. Behind slept James Wall of Madison, Wisconsin. How anyone could sleep eight hours at a con is beyond me. He managed it. Gropping my way to the bathroom, Bill Becker was found, alive and awake; he looked like he hadn't even been to the con, but his gastronomic tales (endlessly) confessed his participation.

Cons (in this case, micro-cons) never really manifest themselves on a person quite the manner as with the morning-after-staying-all-night-wake-up-roll-call. Mornings aren't the greeting at the door, the games, the travelling, the beer, the munchies, the hours and hours. Mornings are the numbness that comes from all of those; your mind feels like puking, and your body wants to slide into oblivion. No, cons don't start with the morning after; neither do they end with the final knife or the return to asphalt, rubber, home, and reality.

I awoke at 6 am, and with my aunt in tow, I hopped in my faithful (and very exhausted) Pinto. My destination? Kalamazoo, Michigan, home of Bill Becker. He would drive the rest of the way to Burbank; we'd drop off my aunt on the way. Bill is an admirable cotraveller. Even though we arrive at the Rusnak residence late, we are the first to arrive. Followed shortly by James Wall and Mark Frueh, and shortly again by Paul Rauterberg. Marc Peters (another Badger state resident) would arrive in another 45 minutes. This is the roster, then: an even seven.

I don't think anyone has described the Rusnak estate in much detail. It's a small two-story affair, made large by having many little rooms and by being a maze to walk through (I got lost my first time there), furnished in nothingness, and with a smiling conservative for a butler. The lawn is carefully manicured to an eight-inch height; the traditional wreck in the driveway is a Buick Skylark (the garage reveals a Dodge Aspen). The refrigerator is my favorite curiosity at Russ's. It's interesting: every time I visit it to see if there's anything in there, anything new, that is, besides six or seven cases of Old Style (attention: Bob Osuch!!!), a generous supply of soda, and a bottle of catsup. There were some new things this time, but Russ had excuses for all of it.

Game numero uno was wild, exceedingly: one of the best I've ever played ftf, if not the best. Having

originally drawn Italy, Marc agreed to trade it for Turkey; James drew Russia, Billy Austria, Mark England, Rauterberg Germany; our host played the French.

I have little notion of western events other than Rusnak building three in 1901 because of miswritten English orders. I initially allied with Russia. Italy took Tri in the spring, and I bounced Becker out of Ser. From there things got a little crazed. With Rauterberg moving east and negotiations going well with Italy, I decided to move north. Mistake. In the meantime, Becker is making and breaking deals with everyone. Soon, so is every one else in the east. By 1903 there are no alliances in the east, no trust; insanity prevails. Rauterberg and I joined up in Russia, but then didn't do anything. EFGR continue to fight in the west. The only ones not fighting are FI, and they're beginning to creep across the board. A GERT effort to halt things is sabotaged by Frueh, and Rusnak gets England. Rauterberg's holed up in northern Russia. Becker, having still survived, works on Italian leftovers. I take Tunis, but can't hold onto it in the face of the French. Rusnak's at 17! Before fall 1908 orders are read, we find that Stp cannot be held. Rauterberg and I are outnumbered by French fleets, and the unnameable has happened: Rusnak wins.

Game two was anticlimactic. I drew Russia this time with Frueh as Turkey, Rauterberg as Austria, Wall as Germany, Rusnak as Italy, Peters as France, and Becker as England. Frueh, Rat, and Wall combine to give me -1 builds for 1901 (Turkey got three). Sucked right in, I was. I did manage to get two builds in 1902, yea! As the result of a five-way conference, AT are stopped cold, but Becker and I obliterate Germany anyway. Kind Bill keeps me alive for a while, then does me in in 1907. FE are working well together; Frueh finally stabs Rat, and a three-way is agreed upon: EFT. GIR all bite the dust in this one. I think Paul survives with three. (I don't have SC charts; that's why they're not here.)

The next day we played Cosmic Encounter before heading our ways home. A good sound meal at a Kalamazoo steakhouse returned some sanity to my body. Thanks for hosting, Russ. I enjoyed seeing all you fellows again. I had a great time. My only regret? No closed circuit of the happenings in Baltimore.
