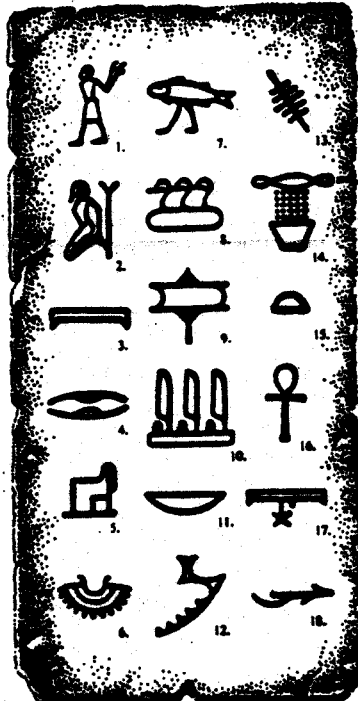

Dear Mike,

How do I like Washington? Well, I haven't seen very much of it so far except Seattle. I must say I like the weather on this side of the mountains. All the flowers in bloom here were a welcome sight to an Easterner who is used to the advent of spring in late April or mid-May, not in mid-March when it arrives here.

The cost of living is a bit lower here too. Fresh veggies, wine, and beer being considerably cheaper than in Eastern Canada. Surprisingly, some items are more expensive here, like tinned kidney beans or tinned mushrooms.

I especially like the Sunday paper. This is an American tradition I wish would make it to Canada. We have a Saturday paper which is similar but not nearly as thick as the US city papers at the newsstand.

The one thing I don't like is the incidence of violent crime here. Just yesterday, for example, a bank robber was shot dead trying to escape, and the policeman that shot him was himself wounded in the neck. At 2:00 pm an armoured car was held up by armed robbers in the parking lot of a local shopping mall, the one where I've been fairly often. There's some psycho murderer on the loose in Seattle or just south of it that's killed 22 known victims, all women, in the last year-and-a-half who still hasn't been caught. The husband of a PhD student in the lab was beaten up and robbed by muggers in the University district the weekend before I arrived.

All these things make my skin crawl. Violence like that isn't even in the same magnitude of frequency in Canada, and in Halifax, the city closest to my home (population about 200,000), if there is one murder a year, it's a catastrophe. If some sailor gets knifed (seldom fatally) it's the spark for the city fathers to talk about "cleaning up" a neighbourhood. The police spend 95% of their time locking up drunks or issuing speeding tickets. Most civic police don't even carry guns--only the RCMP do, and they are instructed only to draw their guns if they are themselves threatened.

Sorry about that tirade. For a warmonger in Dippy, I do go on, don't I?

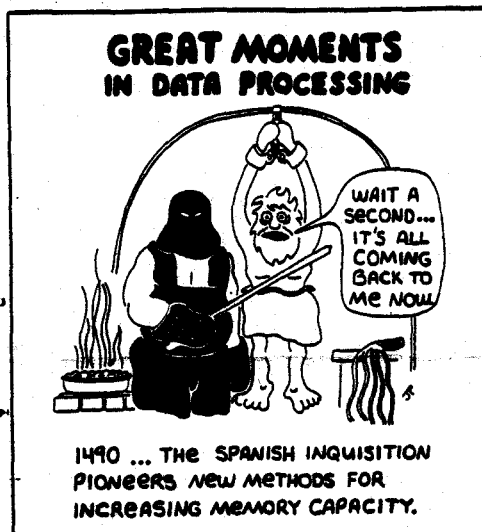

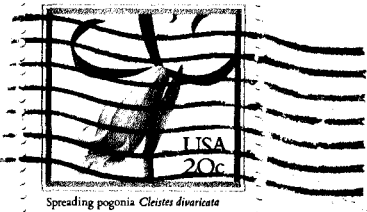
