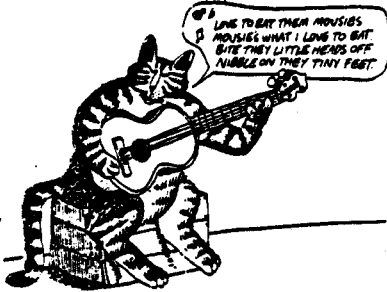

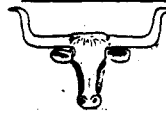

CARUSO RETREATS OTB. Two weeks before DipCon, Caruso the Cat, official Diplomacy Mascot, was attacked by a neighborhood dog and sustained serious damage to a rear leg, stabbed as it were. He was making slow progress until the Wednesday before the con, when he slowed down and began to complain of severe pain. I took him to the Emergency Vet Clinic at 4 am Thursday and to his regular vet later that morning. The doctor was pessimistic about his chances, but stayed by his side. He called me at 7 Friday morning with the sad news that Caruso had sung his last aria. He had died during the night of septicemia. Caruso's doctor had treated him since he was a kitten and asked me if I would allow him to bury Caruso on his "ranch" in the Hill Country west of Austin. Caruso was given to me by my wife and son on my birthday eight years ago, a Maine coon tabby with a surprising vocal range and a personality that wouldn't quit. He stayed close to me when I was home, sitting in my lap when I typed, and sleeping at my feet when I went to bed. His greatest honor was acceding to the title of Diplomacy Mascot when the incumbent, Jack Master's dog Brux, was dispatched by his owner. His empty office will be filled by a special election this fall, and I will probably be getting a new kitten in the next several months, but there will always be a Caruso-sized hole in my heart.





How did you know I'm interested in the Egyptian language? Enclosed are my answers to latest Puzzler (how did I do, teach? Huh? Huh?). Actually, I had a lot of trouble with them, which I've detailed as follows:

#5 is the hieroglyph for a "chair" or "stool" (which doesn't appear in the answers). "Seat, throne" comes closest so I chose that, although I know the hieroglyph for a "seat" or "throne" is: 


#10 is the hieroglyph for a "field" or "garden". I chose "plants in a field" as the answer since it seems  to come closest although "plants in a field" would be:




#11 is the hieroglyph for a "basket" or "receptacle for offerings". "Bowl" was the closest answer I could find.


#12 is a "stylized" hieroglyph for "jawbone". On chiseled inscriptions it would appear thusly: 


#14 is the hieroglyph for a wine, or oil, press. "Grape juice was the closest answer I could find, although this is the hieroglyph for wine: 

#15 is the hieroglyph for the consonant "t" in the Egyptian alphabet. I've never seen this hieroglyph, used by itself, i.e., standing alone, to denote anything else. The same can be said for #33, which denotes the vowel "a", and #35 which denotes the consonant "r". So for #15, #33, and #35 I've hopefully made educated guesses, mostly thorough a process of elimination.

#25 is the hieroglyph for "rain", although the closest I could come to it in the answers is "storm". Actually, the hieroglyph for "storm" is:  (represents the sky falling).

 is the hieroglyph for "sky". #26 is the hieroglyph for "crown", although in the list of answers "headdress" seems to come closest. The hieroglyph for "headdress" would be , literally a covering for the head and neck. This hieroglyph leaves  no doubt its a headdress:

#34 really gave me a lot of trouble, because it's the hieroglyph for "governor". "King" was the closest I could find among the answers, although it's well known that any hieroglyph denoting royalty, the figure always wears some form of headdress. The royal staff  which means "to rule, reign, or govern" gave me the clue to assume it meant "king".


#36 is the hieroglyph denoting "to shine" or "lighten". The word "radiance" was the closest I could come to it among the answers. The hieroglyph for "radiance" is:  This hieroglyph can mean "light, radiance, brilliance", or "to shine".

Although I had a lot of trouble with the Puzzler, Mike, I nevertheless much enjoyed doing it....because you've forced me to put my thinking cap on. By the way, where did you get your list of answers? Are you interested in hieroglyphics, too?

PS. This is what your name, "Michael", might look like in hieroglyphics:  The letter "e" is usually not indicated in the Egyptian writing system.

{You mentioned your interest a couple of years ago when you commented on one of my cartoons. Mine comes from a general interest in languages and the striking graphic quality of the hieroglyphics. I don't actually know very much about the system.}

Dear Mike:

Re: your puzzle in #35. Too easy, perhaps, although I have a couple of quibbles:

14. This refers not so much to grape juice per se as to the act of squeezing it.

22. Yes, I know Budge gives "tunic" for this one, but strictly speaking a tunic is an upper garment, usually about knee-length. What you have here is a loincloth or skirt and not a tunic at all.

25. This can be used as a determinative for storm (see "tempest"), but by itself, it really means "rain".

33. A most peculiar sign. There is every evidence it means "feather", not "reed", and yet it also relates to plants.

34. You forgot the headdress here.

Re: p. 3. The picture regarding the Spanish Inquisition is wholly inaccurate. The Soft Cushions are entirely absent, and I don't see the Comfy Chair, either. I was really surprised to see this; I didn't expect the Spanish Inquisition.

tournament, but I kibbitzed until 6 pm when I GMed the 1939 Diplomacy variant tournament. When that was done I met some friends from Dallas for a couple of drinks and crashed about 1 am. The next morning I played in the first round of the regular Dip tourney. I shared a voted draw with Matt Fleming and Dan McCooley in a game that was remarkably fluid, no permanent alliances taking hold, and general willingness to continue negotiating: one of the best FTF games I can remember. Later that evening I presided at the DipCon Society meeting. Several amendments to the charter were voted down unanimously (redrawing the regional boundaries to reduce the number of regions from four to three, proxy voting, etc.), and one minor housekeeping amendment was approved. Seattle was chosen as the site for DipCon next year. Pete Gaughan, Terry Tallman, and Rod Walker were elected the Committee of Three to plan the event. I intentionally overslept the next morning, had a couple of blintzes for late breakfast, and headed back down IH-35 to Austin.

M-GAME. OK, it's time to get off the dime. I will begin the M-game as soon as I get confirmation from seven of these folks: Fritz, Pierce, Smith, Tatsch (or Mayes), Milewski, Albrecht, Tinker, and Quinn. The best confirmation would be submission of a gamefee and preference list. Since both Pierce and Milewski live in Ohio, and Pierce was the first to sign up, only he may play. The same applies to Tatsch and Mayes, with Tatsch getting the nod. In addition, I think one other person listed here told me he might not be able to play, so if there's one more out there who wants to play in LSD's last game, let me know.

PLUGETTE. Greg Ellis, 700 Rio Grande, Austin, TX 78701 is starting up a new zine FEUILLETONIST'S FORUM, which will feature political discussion, a game of Presidential Politics, and of course, Diplomacy.
