WARCON '81. A Diplomacy tournament will be only part of the activities at Texas A&M on February 20-22 at the Memorial Student Center. Sessions will also be organized for Cosmic Encounter, Ironclad, Kingmaker, Nuclear War, Ogre/GEV, Stellar Conquest, Victory in the Pacific, and Squadleader/Cross of Iron. The latter is a \$100 winner-take-all tournament sponsored by Nick Schuessler, editor of the Journal of WWII Wargaming. Role-playing games will include The Fantasy Trip, Traveller, and of course, Advanced D&D. There will also be a session on miniatures. A number of Austinites are planning to attend, and I hope to meet other LSD readers from farflung regions of Texas. BILINGUAL EDUCATION. A recent federal court ruling mandates a 12-year bilingual education program and a better bilingual teacher-training program to ease a severe instructor shortage. But Gov. Bill Clements has vowed to fight the ruling. It would affect some 250,000 Mexican-American students and cost roughly \$100 million a year. It seems to me that \$400 per student is a real bargain, especially when you consider that the state now has a projected budget surplus of \$569 million. We owe all students the best possible education. That means teaching in their own language, as well as instruction in the effective use of English. I would go a step further and make foreign language classes available to English-speaking students in all the grades. Proficiency in more than one language is a valuable asset that all Texans should have the opportunity to obtain, not just a select minority.





MORE FAKES! During the last month no less than five fakes were perpetrated on an innocent hobby, maybe more. It's not always easy to detect them. Most of them came from the strikebound Jack Masters, but now that the strike's over, the number of fakes will surely dwindle. I think he's responsible for PEEK, purportedly an effort by Jane Proskin to prove she's real. My copy had a provocative cover and an equally provocative personal note on the back. It was sealed with a kiss, but Jane must have the tiniest lips in the world. Maybe she knows Ron Brown's friendly gnome "Johnnie". I hope she turns out to be real so I could whisper something sexy to her in Russian. of the best fakes I've seen targeted Mark Berch's DIPLOMACY DIGEST. Complete with typical typos, it wasn't too hard to figure out the author--his name appeared on almost every page ("...pompous and egotistical yet entertaining..."). The topic of the phony DD? Fakes, of course! I'm not sure who faked WHITESTONIA, usually published by John Caruso and greatly aided by Kathy Byrne. I suspect Gary Coughlan or Bruce Linsey (one of the bloodsucker

Computerization Next?

The computer age has come to the wargame industry. Both Avalon-Hill and SPI are now developing computerized version of the classic hex-map wargames, while another firm is already marketing three all-new games for the TRS-80 and Apple III.

Avalon-Hill's first plan was to develop and market a special wargame machine, but they were unable to find a firm willing to undertake the difficulty of such a design because of the low profit margin involved. A firm in the Midwest has agreed to develop programs for machines already on the mass market.

With an eye toward quality rather than quantity, most of the games will be designed for the Apple III and then converted to other machines. Even though the Apple III has just been introduced and is not available in some parts of the country, its graphics and memory capability are better than any other home/hobby microcomputer on the market.

While computer wargames are logical extensions of such games as Star Trek and Adventure, a computerized version of Diplomacy does not seem to be the next thing to come. A firm in Bethesda, MD is indeed working on a gameboard version (i.e., the computer is not a player) which has its advantages, but this seems a bit extravagant. This version would also act as GM, and would be 100% accurate. With the addition of a good micro-information system, the computer would become a great boon to the overworked GM or multi-game postal player, but only if he were very wealthy or already had a computer at his disposal.

As for computer participation, yes, the two-player version would not be much of a problem. But it would be very dull for the skilled player. We are simply going to have to live with the fact that today's small computers cannot handle the complexities of diplomatic overtures, alliances, and the like. Then again, only ten years ago there were no home computers at all; computerized chess was still found only deep in the bowels of the major university computers.

The coming years will no doubt see an explosion of wargames in the home computer industry. Along with those games will come a multitude of articles. But if you haven't seen any before, just remember you saw it here first.

The PUZZLER

Enough of mathematical puzzlers! Here's one that deals with words: Names in alphabetical order are not easy to find. "Betty" is a common example. - 3) Which poltergeist-infested ship of the US Navy is credited with the most injuries in a 12-day period? How many were hospitalized?
- 4) What electrical power is required to run a (*) brain? (*Insert your favorite ethnic group.)

Randolph also submitted a correct answer to the pill puzzler, but the best answer came from Bob Donaldson:

The answer to your puzzler is that Ms. Black is the bigger square! She has spent so much time in a math book that she has gone over the straightedge.

She apparently has in mind a system where in the first case one pill is taken from bottle one, two from bottle two, etc. These pills (55) are weighed against 55 pills from any single bottle. If the pills from the same bottle are heavier it is the guilty party, otherwise the selection of pills will be heavier by 10 mg times the bottle number of the heavy bottle. This solution is somewhat pedantic but nevertheless feasable.

The latter case, though, is ridiculous. A solution along the same lines requires powers of 2: 2° from the first bottle (1), 2¹ from the second (2), 2² from the third (4), etc. These would then be weighed against an equal number of pills taken from a single bottle. OOPS! It would require 1023 pills (out of a bottle of 1000?). Even if the bottles were bigger this is clearly an absurd if not ludicrous solution to a problem which could be solved by weighing only ten pills. Besides, fishing pills out of child-proof containers is harder than operating a scales anyway, and if Ms. Black is so smart why isn't she rich?



HOBBY MASCOT CANDIDATES - VOTE!


- 1. Since Rod Walker claims the position of mascot for his cat PUSSY GALORE, we will give her place 1 on the ballot.



For those who have been holding their breath since last issue, we finally have room to explain why we chose the names for LSD's newest games:

ENCHANTED ROCK

Enchanted Rock is the site of a state park between Fredericksburg and Llano near the heart of Texas' Hill Country. It is a massive dome-shaped granite hill that rises more than 400 feet above the surrounding terrain.

It is said that Indians feared the rock and believed it sheltered evil spirits. One of the reasons was that the rock appears to glitter on clear moonlit nights following a rain--possibly caused by the moon shining on water trapped in the many indentations on the rock's surface or reflected from the wetted faces of feldspar minerals.

Another reason for fears and superstitions is attributed to strange creaking noises which can be heard on cool nights following hot days. Geologists believe these sounds may be caused by the contraction of the rock's outer surface as it cools from the heat of the day.

The granite bedrock is part of a large igneous rock structure called a batholith, and was formed millions of years ago when molten rock material intruded the earth's crust and cooled below the surface.

Through subsequent eons of geologic time, the overlying rocks and the top of the batholith were stripped away by erosion exposing the pear-shaped outline of the intrusion. Differential erosion of the exposed granite eventually produced the landforms seen today. A process called exfoliation, caused by the development of joints or fractures parallel to the rock surface, produced the smooth, rounded outline of Enchanted Rock.

In the United States, this massive dome of granite is second in size only to the famed Stone Mountain in Georgia.

FRIENDSHIP

Texas derives its name from the Tejas or "friend-ship" indians. Thus, it is highly appropriate for the national motto of Texas to be "Friendship". Taking southern hospitality a step further, Texans commonly extend the hand of friendship to newcomers and visitors. Even the national highways of Texas are dotted with signs urging motorists to "Drive Friendly".

The name is also appropriate for a Diplomacy game, since only through friendship can a player find eventual success.

GULF COAST

The Gulf Coast is one of the major geographical features of Texas. Extending 367 miles from the citrus-growing region of the Rio Grande Valley to the Louisiana border, the "Third Coast" as it has recently been nicknamed, offers sand, sun, and surf to its visitors.

Padre Island is the longest in a chain of islands off the shore of Texas, running 110 miles from Port sabel in the south to Galveston. It is four miles wide at its widest point. This island barrier of 133,918 acres separates the Gulf of Mexico from the mainland of Texas and is the longest barrier type reef in the US.

Laguna Madre is the largest body of protected water on the Texas coast. It lies between Padre Island and the mainland. It extends from Port Isabel to Corpus Christi Bay.

One area of the Texas coast, where the Brazos River empties into the Gulf, is the wild bird capitol of the US. More than 97% of recorded migratory species are seen in the Surfside Beach area where two continental flyways come together. In 1973 the Brazosport area with its numerous bays and sloughs offering roosting grounds for migratory birds, registered the highest national 12-hour bird count ever recorded: 226 species.

The rare Whooping Crane (Grus americana) winters in Texas at the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, 54,829 coastal acres some 85 miles north of Corpus Christi. In 1939 only 14 whoopers were counted along the coast, but in 1978 the count was around 75.

100,000 square miles along the Texas-Louisiana coast is the location of a Geopressured-Geothermal zone, one of 7 such basins in the US and among 26 in the world. The basin extend into the Gulf to the Continental Shelf and inland for 125 miles.

About 60 million years ago this zone was formed from successive delta deposits that were compacted to their limit. When the sands could be compressed no more, fluids around them began to take up the pressure. Over time the organic material in the compressed shales was changed to methane.

from the South and Southwest. Germany has no desire to war with neighbors, but without exception, missives from trans-Rhein wine-growing areas (where emphasis is always on quantity) have been rude, commanding, and threat-laden. However, a wait-and-see attitude was adopted. Germany extends friendship to all, but is wary of belligerents who bargain with brickbats when other more gentlemanly avenues are available. After a briefing, the Press Secretary confirmed rumors that European peace negotiations have been hampered by difficulty in deciphering the code-like messages coming from the South. Facsimiles of the strange script, bebelieved either ancient Magyar or Roman in origin, are now under study by experts in ancient Visigoth languages at the Institute in Heidelberg.
