PLAYLIST: Stevie Ray Vaughn and Double Trouble, THE SKY IS CRYING **** ((post-mortem discs often give off that telltale stench of exploitation, but not this one. Sure, it's a patchwork of odds and ends from a seven-year span, and, sure, it doesn't hold together as a planned-out disc would. But it contains six solid tracks. three top-shelf, A-list SRV cuts: 'Life by the Drop,' a ballad of addiction; 'May I Have a Talk With You,' a fine slow blues; SRV's soulful, where's-Hank-Crawford take on the Kenny Burrell jazz classic 'Chitlins Con Carne' and one masterpiece, an instrumental 'Little Wing' that if I may say so myself easily tops the version cut by the song's author, one J. Hendrix. This 'Little Wing' is scorching, gutbucket blues of a visceral intensity. It belongs in ANY blues collection; so does this disc.)) Paul Barritt, violin/Catherine Edwards, Herbert Howells (England, 1892-1983), MUSIC FOR VIOLIN AND PIANO ****! /2 ((Howells, a 20th-century English neoromantic like Vaughan Williams, wrote three sonatas for this combination as well as some salon pieces. They are haunting, soaring, bittersweet bits of that brand of gentle quasi-Ravelian pastoralism that is British music to so many that you either adore (me) or despise (many Americans). The 3rd Sonata (1923) has the most substance and should be a recital regular. The 2nd sonata (1917) has a yearningly magnificent slow movement that makes me cry. Quiet, tender music that can be used as aural wallpaper but has so much more to offer.)) Neil Young, SLEEPS WITH ANGELS ***** ((can't get enough...)) City of Birmingham Symphony/Rattle: Stravinsky, FOUR STUDIES ****; THE FIREBIRD *** (Not bad by any means, these EMI recordings, but better exist. Recordings of the Four Studies, neat Stravinsky tidbits of a austere sort, aren't overly numerous, so this isn't a bad way to acquire them. For the ballet, I'd recommend Leinsdorf, Boulez, Muri, or the composer.)) Berlin PO/C.M. Giulini: Vivaldi, CREDO *** ((very stately Vivaldi. Those you admire who perky Baroque music look elsewhere. This is sort of a heavy German dinner, very nice but not something to eat all the time.)) REM, AUTOMATIC FOR THE PEOPLE ****1/2 ((haunting, spare pop-rock that grows on you. Introspective; good for really listening to the lyrics. Thoughtful runes for thoughtful people. 'Nightswimming' is wistful nostalagia; 'Man on the Moon' rather touching.)) San Francisco SO/Blomstedt: Sessions, SYMPHONY No. 2 ****1/2 ((a great American work. Thorny but so harmonically and rhythmically rich. Dense yet still clearly American in the same way that Gershwin is. A treasure-trove of modernism, brilliantly recorded and well-played although Blomstedt never quite lets go (Bernstein should have done this) and the SF brass is a little timid. No matter, get it.) Various Artists, PHILADELPHIA soundtrack **1/2 ((I rarely buy a disc for one song but I did here; Peter Gabriel's 'Lovetown' is a spare, gripping, almost disturbing four minutes. Nothing like 'Sledgehammer!' This is the private Gabriel of his early solo LPs. Springsteen's Grammy-winning song is very good as well, but the rest is relatively disposable.)) Academy of St. Martin's in the Fields/Christopher Parkening, guirar; Iona Brown, conductor: Vivaldi, various CONCERTOS ***1/2; TRIO in C ***; Warlock, CAPRIOL ****; Praetorius, SUITE IN D from 'Terpischore' *** ((this odd mix of baroque, renaissance and modern based on renaissance music is nice as ear candy, but Parkening's playing could be livelier and friskier. The cool formal feel of Warlock's 20th-century take on 16th-century dances suits Parkening best. The Praetorius needs to be guttier and the Vivaldi crisper.)) Pansy Division, UNDRESSED **** ((gay punk rock. Hilarious lyrics, great riffs. Imagine the Ramones with Joey loving Dee Dee, Something different.)) Chicago Symphony/Boulez: Bartok, CANTATA PROFANA (with Aler/Tomlinson/CSO Chorus) *****; THE WOODEN PRINCE ****1/2 ((the CSO -- brassy, showy, tough, not overly pretty -- might be the perfect Bartok orchestra. Certainly Boulez has total command of the idiom. This DG disc of an unusual choral week and Bartok's least-known ballet sounds dazzling, with clear highs and plenty of bottom. Cool cover, too. Matt Fleming thinks Bartok will someday join the 3 'B's (Bach, Beethoven, Brahms) on the A-List of classical music. If so, this wonderful disc will have only helped.))
