Despite that, there are 15 openings each week ranging from "proofreader"(or "poorfreeder") to "editorial assistant" to "Major Men's magazine needs bright editor for writing. Originality an asset." (the last means that an imitation *Playboy* needs someone to write those inane life-stories of the girls whose pictures they use.)

It is therefore only natural that even after three months of jobhunting that I leave home each Monday morning with a confident smile on my lips and hope in my heart, certain that this week I'll get a job. After all, I am a genius. My mother says so.

I get over to the Richard M. Nixon Memorial Job Agency at 8:30, knowing well that there are many people trying for these editorial jobs and it is necessary to strike while the type is hot.

In I go and after waiting for thirty minutes I finally see an advisor. After explaining which job I am applying for and handing over my resume I wait ten minutes while she examines it and talks to other applicants on the phone. I begin to notice that the employment agency is

kept at a constant 95 degrees and my woolen suit is sweating.

After a short eon the advisor turns to me. "How fast can you type?" "Forty to fortyfive words per minute on an electric machine, thrityfive to forty on a manual." It is a likely question. Proofreading and other editorial work requires a good bit of typing. "How's your shorthand?" she next asks and my heart sinks into my diaphragm. As has happened thirty or forty times in the past, I discover that this advertisememt for an "Editorial assistant" is for a secretary.

Occasionally I do get an interview. The interviewers are always very personable and helpful. "How much will you work for?" they ask. "One hundred fifty," I say, knowing that I can always go back to college for my Master's degree. "Well, the actual salary is \$165, so I'll mark it that way." "Thank you. That's very personable and helpful of you." "It's my job to be very personable and helpful." This statement is borne out two weeks later when I receive a very personable and helpful letter which states I have not gotten the job.

The letters of rejection are pips. The only honest rejection I got was from Doubleday & Co., the hardcover publisher. That rejection read "We do not have a position open for you, but we are saving your application and if an opening appears we will contact you."

Usually the companies try to salve the rejecteds' feelings. The usual phrase is "overqualified." Just as when you try to call any executive the secretary says that he is "in conference" three seconds before he picks up the phone any position I don't get is too simplistic for my mind. I shall always cherish the letter of rejection I received, the text of which read:

"We were very glad to meet you and discuss your qualifications for an editorial position, but unhappily the position that was open was for the supervision of translations of Hegel's works of philosophy into Swahili for our Kenyan subsidiary. We feel you are far too qualified to be hired for this position. It is a truism that people who are overly qualified for a position soon grow tired of it, and thus have a higher turnover rate than is acceptable. When a position equal to your excellent training opens, we shall contact you immediately."

It's just as well. Hegel bores me to tears.

HARRY DREWS ((POB 282, Kitchener, Ontario, CANADA N2G 3X9: 8/26/76)) Concerning certain off-hand remarks with respect to 1975 J in recent issues of the *Mixumaxu Gazette*:

I am rather puzzled by remarks made by, I presume, Joel Klein, about my temporary substitution as the Russian player in 1975 J last summer which imply that I failed to follow instructions supplied by John Gross and that in some way I fouled up the game, so to speak.

As I recalled my limited participation in 1975 J, I was approached to be the temporary replacement of that game because I was the only Ontario resident that John could call on who was already on the sub lists of TMG. John, to the best of my recollection, stated that there the position was. Do the best with it you can. He may have said he had an alliance with Germany, Joel Klein; I can't remember. In any case the thrust of his summary was that I was to do as I saw fit, he wasn't too interested in the game.

My analysis of the game showed me there was a lot of potential in the game and I enthusiastically started correspondence. I received several prompt replies that were equally enthusiastic but there was a general theme that John had been lax when it came down to negotiation. Based on my perception of what would be best for Russia I decided to hit Germany and ally with her neighbors. Let me reiterate that I recall no restrictions from John and that I place no responsibility on either Joel or myself for our failure to continue the alliance. We simply did not continue the alliance.

... To sum up, any talk that casts doubt on my conduct in that game is unwarranted and perhaps malicious. Within the context of the game and instructions I did my best and just because I did not see fit to ally with Joel is strictly immaterial. For those months I wasn't John's substitute, I was the Russian player. I hope that clears up the matter since I was perturbed to read comment in TMG which, in my opinion, approached unfair and inaccurate proportions.

*((Well, we've had Joel's side and your side. I wonder what the truth is. Just kidding.))*

NICK ULANOV ((c/o THE DAILY PRINCETONIAN, 46 University Place, Princeton, N.J. 08540: 9/3/76)): More trivial matters first. On the (perhaps erroneous) assumption that it is better not to let misstatements stand uncorrected I should note that the two letters sent out to New Yorkers by Gil Neiger and myself concerning the then-upcoming IDA elections were not an attempt at bloc voting in its usual sense but an attempt to insure representation of the sizeable group of New Yorkers in its organization, and that my last name is Ulanov, not Ulanoc.

New Yorkers in the hobby had, two years ago, been undergoing a long-standing attack by individuals in the hobby -- most of whom have long since admitted they were wrong -- for trying to take over the hobby, trying to destroy apple pie and Diplomacy and coming from a rotten place. When the nominations for Council elections came out several New Yorkers were nominated for almost every post. It became clear that if something were not done the New York votes would be split among two or three New Yorkers running for one position and the underrepresentation of the largest group in the organization would continue for another year. Since most New York hobbyists were very sensitive to the exclusionary attitude of many non-New Yorkers, this seemed particularly cruel.

Accordingly Gil Neiger and I sent a letter to New York members of the IDA urging them to participate in a "primary" to eliminate duplication of New York candidates -- in essence to have everyone who wanted to run from New York run, but in different elections, thereby not splitting the regional vote. Virtually every New Yorker responded (a higher return than that of all IDA members in the general election that followed.) and those nominated for more than one office gladly agreed to run for the one suggested by the members in the primary..

At every point it was stressed that there was no attempt to force anyone's hand, that each individual should vote in the "primary" and regular elections as he saw fit, regardless of the geographical area the candidate was from. As a result of the effort New York votes were not split and several New Yorkers, though as fully expected in a fair continent-wide election, by no means a majority of those running, were elected, approximating New York's proportion of the IDA membership. Everyone I know, including myself, voted for non-New Yorkers as well as fellow residents in the election.

It is questionable whether one should be so concerned about regional representation as many of us were at the time. The climate of pre-election attacks on New York (now almost forgotten given the good relations between City residents and other North Americans) made such a concern automatic. There was no bloc voting but rather an unscrambling of candidacies before the election. It was fair and probably a good idea since it saved many of our friends from feeling that they had been defeated by other friends who valued them beneath still other friends.

On the subject of the new IDA constitution: it seems to me that the difference between the new structure and the old one is not so much of procedure as of the philosophy behind the organization of IDA (or IDA-NA if you prefer). The ridiculous, insulting bureaucratic tangles of the Council this past year have little to do with the constitution. It serves only as an excuse and a method. Almost any organization can get completely hamstrung if enough members want it so. But the old constitution, extremely bulky and poorly structured as it is, was and is designed to serve as an organization of hobby members, preferably representing as large a percentage of the hobby as a whole if possible. The new constitution is designed really for for the five people who sit on the Council. To be sure, they are elected by the members every year, but other than that members receive no benefits, no prurpose and no representation. I cannot deduce one reason, save philanthropy, for joining the new organization... unless one hopes to join the small Council. The value of the new group will be to distribute

money money to hobby services and that money comes only through memberships, and there is little incentive to join. A fund-raising drive by various hobby officers for their respective services might be more successful.

At various times gm/publisher groups have been formed. They have had their place and value. The IDA was not one of these, but rather an organization for players. That it did not do as well as it might have is sad. It does not deserve burial and that, I fear, is what its fate is. I suspect that fewer IDA-NA members will renew than IDA members have. I hope I am wrong. A new structure may be needed. A new organization is not.

Congratulations on the new typewriter. I am jealous of and full of admiration for the result. Bravo!

((I have already expressed my opinions on the new constitution in the past two issues and see no need to reiterate. For additional comments on the Canadian nationalism, see the letter below.))

TOM KISSNER ((1305 Maitland Avenue, Ottawa, Ontario, CANADA K2C 2C4:8/27/76)): I really liked issue #54. I thought that the cover picture was very good. Your article on the latest Canadian paranoia was quite accurate and made good reading. The new print is also very good looking. Overall, a pretty good issue.

((Thanks. D'ye hear that, Ralph? More covers are wanted. There has been some suggestions of converting that illo into a silkscreen for a Diplomacy t-shirt. Would anyone be interested in buying such a t-shirt?

((On the Canadian cries of non-representation: Besides the office of Canadian Secretary on the present Council, only one Canadian ran for an IDA office in the last election: John Leeder. He won.

((In a letter from Doug Beyerlein in John Leeder's Runestone #132 Doug Beyerlein suggests that Robert Correll could put in a good race for IDA's presidency, Leeder for the new Ombudsman and Cal White for Periodical Editor, a set of choices for which I could unhesitatingly vote, along with Harry Drews and Doug Ronson for assorted other posts.

((Yet John Leeder replies: "Correll doesn't want the Presidency, White does not own duplicating facilities and would likely be ineligible, Drews has expressed a growing lack of interest in hobby organizations, and my own plans are unclear."

((Under the new constitution White does not have to own his own facilities. He has definite access, and he could do the job. What John is saying is that the Canadians want the representation, but that none of them are willing to do the work. In the last election Stephen Tihor and Gil Neiger ran unopposed. Rosenberg ran against Anderson, which is better than being unopposed. Against Gordon Anderson anyone less obnoxious than Buddy Tretick or Charles Reinsel could win easily. An informal poll I took about New York showed that less than a quarter of the New Yorkers voted for Matt Diller in first or second place for At-Large Secretary. He was elected by the rest of the hobby. If the Canadians insist that they want representation they could get it. If some Canadians were willing to run, Canadians with some exposure in the hobby. If the Canadians want representation they can easily get one or two members on the new Council, if they can find someone to run. Anyone so concerned with representation that a Canadian must be elected can swing it. If they can get someone to run.

((What has particularly annoyed me was a copy of the letter that Leeder and Correll had circulated on the possibility of a Canadian organization, which referred to Leeder as a Canadian representative. Leeder is not a Canadian representative, any more than Len Lakofka is a Chicago representative. It may be true de facto, but certainly not de jure.

((What it all boils down to is that if the Canadians are willing to stop crying that Americans will not permit a Canadian any power, and see if the Americans will, there will be at least one, maybe two or three Canadians on the new IDA Council.))

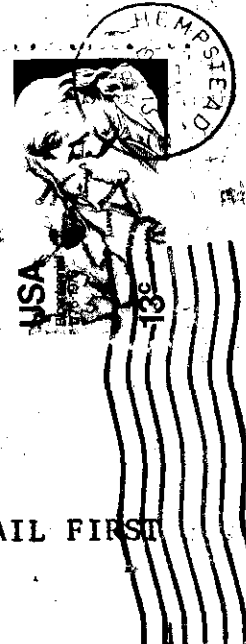
