As most of you realize, I have since its inception tried to keep MM running on three week deadlines. There have been several times when we have run on a 4 week deadline, however. The usual policy in setting the next deadline has been to figure the third Friday after the time you have received your copy of MM. So, if MM was ready to go into the mail on Tuesday, the 2nd, for example, then the deadline for the next issue would've been the 20th. Now for the change: I am going to switch to four week deadlines. There are many reasons for this. A big reason is the simple fact that when we have set longer deadlines, the number of NMRs has diminished. There is also the consideration that it will be easier on me to put a bit more time into the quality of the zine with an extra week. So more quality combined with fewer NMRs should equal a better zine to house your games. What do you think? Anyone care to share an opinion in the RRR?

BLACK FROG, North America's Number One zine in the 81 Leeder Poll has folded. This a sad event for those who received and enjoyed BF. Jack has decided to fold and all but drop out of the postal DIPLOMACY Hobby due directly to the problems caused by the "feud" with Bruce Linsey, in my opinion. It's unfortunate that once again the only consequence of a feud is a negative result for the vast majority of hobby members. In DOT HAPPY #12 Allen Wells writes bout BF: "In the time that BLACK FROG graced my mailbox, it was certainly one of the most unique and usually enjoyable zines that I received. In its peak, it was undoubtedly without peer. I looked forward to seeing the next BF arrive, and I usually didn't have long to wait. It's first place showing in the Leeder Poll was no surprise to me. . . If anyone has lost, it has been the hobby." Jack hasn't completely severed his contacts with DIP though as he is playing in 80KZ still and maybe a few others too. I hope that in time, Jack returns to his previous level of involvement in postal DIPLOMACY. I won't hold my breath waiting for it to happen, but it would be most welcome.

There isn't that much to report on at this time, so I think I'll wind this up and get you right into the games. So turn the page and see how many knives you can discover lodged in your back!

"Stantinople-Con Report or Berkeley Brouhaha"

Come gather around children and you shall hear of the events in Berkeley February, this year. Stantinople-Con was held in the Ida Sproul Hall Dormitory at University of California, Berkeley on the 13th and 14th of February and was hosted by Don DelGrande publisher of LIFE OF MONTY. This article is, however, not only about that CON but about my interface with and impressions of it. To preface the event, let me relate my morning experiences before getting there. The evening before, I was playing in a dart tournament at the "Prince of Wales Pub" in San Mateo. Every Friday, they have a doubles dart tournament with no entry fee and a case of beer as first prize. The price is right and that's where I am most Friday nights. The only reason to bring this up is that this place features some 50 beers from around the world and it seems on Saturday morning that I tried them all. But, back to the trip to Berkeley. Now Berkeley is only about a half-hour drive from my place in San Bruno -- usually. First, it was raining. It was not your small shower-type rain, but the type that caused the problems in Northern California around the first of the year. Well, I was thinking about the rain and little else on the way over to Berkeley and the next thing I discovered was that I was about to cross the Golden Gate Bridge. Well, that's not the right direction. For those not familiar with our topography, it's rather like intending on driving from Kansas to New York and finding that you are entering Canada. I came out of my daze as the traffic all began to back up just about the last exit prior to the crossing. with such fascinating characters as the Sniveler and the Interpreter. (The Interpreter can make an interpretation of anything that anyone else says such as, "No, what you meant was that you will give me a planet in your system and quit the game".) I dealt myself some powers and cards but, by the time I finished reading about them on the "Chowchilla Expansion Kit" rule sheet, the game was over and everyone wanted to go eat.

At lunch, I learned that "Chowchilla Cosmic Encounters" was only the tip of the Dave Grabar iceberg. There was "Chowchilla Risk", "Chowchilla Wooden Men and Iron Ships", and a whole line of "Chowchilla" rules for games. Chowchilla, for those of you who don't know, is Dave's place of residence. ## ENGLAND

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England is the safest country to play, but one that can be the most difficult to handle, especially in the first two game years. Being an island, it is difficult to invade since each of its potential early enemies has only one home center nearby in which it is able to build a fleet. But being an island, it is also difficult for England to expand early in the game. This may seem to be a strange statement considering the fact that 27 of the 34 supply centers can be reached by fleets, England's strengths, but then again, 31 supply centers can be reached by armies without any aid from fleets, and 3 of those which can't are England's home centers. Also, an attack with armies usually doesn't take as long to set up and is more easily supported by one's allies' pieces than is an attack with fleets alone.

The major alliance combinations involving England in the opening are England/France, England/Germany, England/France/Germany. I'll discuss England/France first.

England should always try to gain France's cooperation for the game's opening, even if he does not intend to honor the alliance right from the start. The standard procedure is to agree to maintain the English Channel as a neutral zone. While this is advantageous to both countries, it does favor France as the loss of Brest is more devastating to the French than the loss of London is to the English. It also usually commits England to a war with Germany that will greatly depend upon French and/or Russian support, while France retains a wider choice of options. An English fleet in the English Channel forces France to cover Brest; should the English not move to Brest in the next turn, no new French fleets appear where they are needed most. If the situation is reversed and England is faked into moving into London, fleets built in Liverpool and Edinburgh are only slightly less effective than the one that could have appeared in London. In any case, since the English Channel is the first key step to an invasion of England (through the weak spot of Wales), the English player must keep it free of foreign fleets or occupy it himself.

An English-French alliance can be made more secure by an agreement not to build fleets in Brest and London (better for England). This won't prevent a stab necessarily, but it can give the stab victim some warning before it takes place. Later in the game, the building of armies in Brest and London can extend this warning period.

The opening I like to follow, given an England-France alliance is F Lon-Nth, F Edi-Nwg, A Lpl-Yor. Russia is urged to either join the attack on Germany (he probably won't until much later) or at least stay neutral in the conflict. England, of course, guarantees the safety of St. Petersburg and Sweden (pointing out the likelihood that Germany will not allow him to take Sweden in '01) and offering Denmark (not Norway) as a future Russian center. Giving Norway to Russia would weaken England's position since it forms a good springboard for a Russian invasion and also allows Russia to gain and hold on Scandinavia that will be very hard to break. Germany is asked (yes, you do talk to the countries you're going to attack) to move F Kie-Den in S'01 and F Den-Swe in F'01 to keep the Russian at bay (realize the attack on Germany is not revealed until Fall 1901 or Spring 1902.) Germany is also asked to support F Nth-Bel from Ruhr. France should get his army in Paris to Burgundy or Picardy and you should strongly ask his support of army Edinburgh to Belgium. Don't suggest to Germany that he support a move of Edi-Bel; he will probably refuse (if he knows what he's doing) and it might tip your hand too early. If he supports F Nth-Bel, Belgium is your if France doesn't stand you off; if Germany doesn't support the North Sea Move, then Belgium is at worst a stand-off, again if your ally France doesn't mess you up.

## ENGLAND (Con'd)

Germany is the main objective, of course, but there are other things to keep in mind. One is your disposition towards Russia; St. Petersburg is a very tempting target for F Nwy in the second game year and beyond, but you must weigh the consequences carefully. If Russia is sending armies against Germany you obviously don't want to antagonize him early in the game; even if he is neutral, his northern fleet can give you problems if he uses it to support Germany. At the other extreme, if Russia has sent his armies south and is having trouble with Austria and Turkey, you'd be a fool not to take St. Petersburg in Spring 1902. For any situation in the middle you must use your judgement based upon the game situation, your letters from the other players, etc. You must also decide what you're going to do after Germany is gone. What you build in '01 and '02 will have a great effect on your ability to stab France if that is what your plans call for; the more armies you can get to the continent, the stronger your position will be, and the more options you will have. You must also keep an eye on France. If he builds F Bre, alarm bells should start to ring.

The invasion of Germany is one that may take a long time to accomplish; France's first goal is Burgundy and Belgium while England's is Helgoland Bight. From here it's push and shove until the defenses crack. Here is one possible combination: F Lon-Nth, F Edi-Nwg, A Lpl-Yor, F Bre-Mid, A Par-Bur (S by A Mar), A Mun-Ruh, F Kie-Den, A Ber-Kie, F StP-Bot, and then in the Fall: F Nwg-Nwy, A Yor-Bel (S by A Bur, C by F Nth), A Mar-Spa, F Mid-Por, F Den-Swe, F Bot-Swe, A Kie-Hol, A Ruh-Bel. Builds: A Mar, A Par, A Lon, F Edi, A Mun, A Kie. This opening is not unreasonable and leads to a tough fight. The next step is to surround the German; I'll assume Russia is friendly for now. F Nwy-Ska, F Nth-Hel, (this insures one of them is yours), F Edi-Nth, A Bur-Ruh, (S by A Bel), A Par-Pic, A Mar-Bur, A Spa-Gas, F Bot-Swe, F Den-s-F Bot-Swe (Germany needs friends), A Hol-Bel, (S by A Ruh), A Mun-Bur, A Kie-Hol. The possibilities are many now, for example: A Bel-s-A Bur-Ruh, F Hel-Kie, F Nth-Den (S by F Ska), etc.

Given an English-German alliance, I prefer to open aggressively right from Spring 1901. In the early negotiations, an agreement should be reached with France to keep the English Channel neutral; on the first turn you move F Lon-Eng. If France suspects you and stands you off he may only get one build in 1901; if he doesn't stand you off then you should have him. For example: F Lon-Eng, F Edi-Nth, A Lpl-Yor, F Bre-Eng, A Par-Bur (S by A Mar), A Mun-Ruh, F Kie-Den, A Ber-Mun, F StP-Bot. This is the slow game; France, England, and Germany each get one build in 1901. F Den should stand F Bot out of Sweden (unless Russia is a trusted, active ally) to keep Norway secure for England next game year (assuming there is no army in StP). A Yor convoys to Belgium with German support. F Bre goes to the Mid-Atlantic, A Mar-Spa. Builds are A Kie, F Bre, F Lpl, The English Channel, (if you didn't get there in the fall), Bur, and Pic should now be accessible in 1902: F Lpl-Iri, F Lon-Eng, F Nth-s-F Lon-Eng, A Bel-Pic, A Mun-Bur (S by A Ruh), etc.

The English-German alliance is a fairly safe one for the English player, since the building of German fleets will not be useful in the war against France. The German player can pursue a land war vs. Russia, Austria, & Italy while the English player sends his fleets to the Mediterranean and neither player will interfere with his ally. If England should decide to stab Germany later in the game, he should be in a good position to do so. The German cannot enjoy this advantage since he can't build fleets without alerting his ally to his intentions.

The most powerful alliance on the board is, in my opinion, the English/German/French alliance; it is also the most difficult to set up and maintain since it involves a great deal of risk for the French player, a moderate amount of risk for the German, and very little risk for the English. If such an alliance can be set up, it is best to keep its existence a secret as long as possible so that the French and English fleets can get a stranglehold on the Mediterranean before the Italians and Turks can react. F Lon-Eng, F Bre-Mid, followed by F Eng-Mid, F Mid-Spa(sc) should give the Italian player fits. Germany is free to send at least one army east in '01 to attack Italy or Russia with Austrian support.

WRAP-UP!

And that brings us once again to the last page of yet another issue. Before I forget to mention it, someone asked about Al Rodriguez. Some of you may have heard he's going to Europe soon. Yep, good old Mr. Rodriguez is on sabbatical this semester. That means he's off work now (has been since the first part of Feb. and doesn't have to go back until Sept.) drawing 1/2 salary. Not too bad. His first stop will be in Egypt and although I don't know the exact order, he'll be hitting Greece, Italy, Spain, England, and Belgium. Some guys have all the fun! He even mentioned that he might like to get into one game of DIPLOMACY after he has returned. So maybe you haven't heard the last of Al in the postal hobby after all.
