MORE STUFF

The Seventh Annual North American Zine Poll and the Sixth Annual North American Gamesmaster Poll will be combined into the 1983 RUNESTONE ZINE & GM POLL, headed up by Randolph Smyth. For the GM Poll, you are urged to voted for any GM in whose postal game or games you were a player during the period beginning April 1, 1982, and whom you played under for long enough to gain an objective assessment of his or her competence as a GM. Rate each GM on a scale of 0 to 10 (0 being the lowest possible rating, 10 the highest). No fractions, please. Gamesmasters may not rate themselves. Others may not rate Gms in whose games they were not active players during the poll period. Violations of these rules will result in invalidation of the entire ballot.

Rate each GM by name, not by zine. Votes which do not use the Gm's name will not be tabulated. To help in tabulation, please list the Gms in alphabetical order by surname.

For the z Zine poll, you may rate any publication substantially devoted to DIPLOMACY (including genzines, house zines of organizations, etc.) which has published more than two issues since April 1, 1982. Rate the series, not individual issues. Rate only zines of which you have seen enough issue to form an objective assessment of the quality of the publication; do not base votes on hobby feuds, agreement or disagreement with the editor's opinions, etc. Rate each zine on a scale of 1 to 10 (0 being the lowest and 10 the highest), no fractions. Specify subzines and rate them separately from the parent zine: subzines will be listed separately in an independent list.

Publishers may not rate their own zines; violation will result in invalidation of the entire ballot. Sign your ballot and indicate one way in which you participate in the hobby (to establish eligibility (i.e. - player, publisher, parasite) All votes will be confidential. Please list the zines in alphabetical order to make tabulation of results easier. I reserve the right to tabulate ballots which do not follow the format outlined above. The deadline for both polls is July 4, 1983. Results will be tabulated as soon thereafter as possible, and will be released as they become available to anyone wishing to phone (403) 526-7963. As Ron has mention, 15mm Napoleonics have become the current rage around these parts. In one of our most recent battles, The Battle of Four Roads the object was to control a hill that dominated the intersection of four roads. Ron and a friend of his named Tom were ~~the~~ commanding the French forces which included Swiss, Neapolitians, Nassau, westphalians and, of course, Rons infamous Dutch Grenadiers of the Gaurd.

The Allies were Jon Baldwin with his Russians, Dan Johannesen with the Prussians and a group of late arriving Brunswickers, and myself with my Austro-Hungarian force.

The hill that each side was to control was place by Ron, since it wa<sup>s</sup> his scenario, in the ~~center~~ middle of the board. The allies planned to place the Austrian main force to our left, with the object of taking two small farm complexes and of securing that flank. The prussians were placed on the right with the goal of advancing through the light woods on that flank and to hold. Jon, with the Russians was to take and hold the hill. Two baatalions of Austrians, plus two Austrian Cavalry Regiments were designated as the ~~XXXX~~ reserve force. Ron will have to explain his plans in the rebuttal.

The battle open with a clear but hazey has both sides began to deploy. However, the weather quickly turned foggy, and there-by neutralizing much of the cannons effectiveness. This caused both sides to push forward their lead units in order to quickly grab, or as it appeared on RON's sided to cut it off. In the center Jon ran over the hill with some Cossacks that threatened the flank of Rons undeploy artillery. Ron rushed forward a regiment of Cuirassiers to counter the cossack on their flank. On the other side the Austrian Hussars of Lichtenstein charge the lead units of a French heavy cavalry brigade. These hussars over-ran the Neapolitian Gaurd Dragoons and hit the French Dragoons with out breaking stride. The mellee between these two units evenually caused the French Dragoons to retire in disorder and kept most of the Frnch heavy Cavalry tied up all day. However the Austrian attempt to capture the second farm was repulse by musket fire of a French light unit.

About a third of the way through the battle the fog lifted and a massive gunnery duel began between the batteries. The largest succéses were almost simultaneous as 3/4 of the Prussian battery was taken down at once, while a French battery was totally destroyed by the Russian howisters at the same time.

With their artillery destroyed, the French light Cavahry was forced to withdraw. The Prussians were able to advance along with the newly arrived Brunswick force, which included Ron's favorited the famous Brunswick Lancers. In fact, a morale check caused by the retreat bringing tales of the Lancers arrival, caused one of the Dutch Grenadier battalions to fall back, not a bad idea since the last time the Dutch saw the Brunswickers half a battalion of these boys didn't come back.

As the battle got latter the Austrian flank quieted down for lack of reserves and the fact that the battery which was earlier over-ran by the Russian Dragoons was back in French hands, creating a deadly fire on that flank. The prussians continued a slow advance on their flank as the French massed in the middle for one last try at dislodging the Russian infantry from the hill.
