Dear Ron:

My goal in DIPLOMACY is to win a game playing each country at least once. Someone told me that nobody had ever done that before. Is that true? ((Randolph Smythe and Edi Birsan (I think - Mark Berch would know for sure) have both won with every country, but they are the only two. Tim has won with Russia and Germany and is about to win one with Austria - RB))).

Well! I am still recovering from the shock of 1981AP. A draw for which neither draw participant voted for (or against) and was decided by the most minor country in the game? That seems to be pushing things a bit to me. Yes, I know rules are rules, that's what the Germans said, however, since this has happened to me before (in a game where my France had an excellent chance to win) I feel I should make a comment on the subject of NVR = 'Yes'. In fact, I think I will make several comments about it.

First, I think it is a direct contradiction of Rule II in "The Rules of Diplomacy", i.e., "... Players may terminate the game by mutual agreement before a winner is determined, in which case all players who still have pieces on the board share equally in a draw."

This means, to my mind, that each player must express agreement (mutual agreement the rule says). Someone once said: "Silence is golden." However, that does not seem to hold true in this case. Your contention, as well as others, is that a non-vote means that the player is in favor of a proposal. I find this reasoning difficult to understand.

Second; I surveyed my back issues of MM (all 54 of them) and failed to find any explanation of this rule. It just seems to have popped into your rules one day. However, in issue #53, you state, "It is not the GM's obligation to go around vetoing draws and/or concessions he feels aren't 'right'..." Well, I would contend that it is not the GM's obligation to go around ending games because the players didn't vote the way he feels is "proper". This, in my mind, is highly arbitrary and most unreasonable.

Third; another publisher, Al Pearson, or perhaps former publisher is more accurate, had the same crazy rule. He defended it by stating on page 3 in his #17 issue of JUST AMONG FRIENDS:

Currently the rule includes -- "no vote is a vote in favor of the issue; submitting orders and failing to vote is obviously a vote against the issue."

(Emphasis mine) Well, I think some players just forget to vote, so I am changing that section to read - "Failure to vote is a vote in favor of the issue. If a player submits orders and doesn't vote, he is voting for the issue."

This represented a major rule change for Al at the time and his only explanation was: "I think some players just forget to vote..." Talk about subjecting the publisher's feelings into the course of the game. Did you, or anyone else who uses this silly rule, ever stop to think that you are depriving every DIPLOMACY player in your games of a very strong and useful diplomatic weapon? Many times you may not be in favor of a proposal that is good for your ally, but you don't want to have to vote against it so you can tell your ally you didn't vote against it. This is a negotiating tool, a diplomatic weapon and even a sneaky stab in the right situation. I, personally, resent being deprived of this option. I also resent having my intentions interpreted by the Gamesmaster.

True, some players may forget to vote, but, on the other hand, some players may not want to vote preferring to veto by silence. I think Al Pearson's old rule - "... submitting orders and failing to vote is obviously a vote against the issue..." is hitting the matter dead on the head. Now, if you want to consider a NVR as a yes vote, I could accept that without too much of a struggle, but, when I send in orders only to find that they have been completely ignored because I did not vote on some silly proposal in which I had not the slightest interest, my blood begins to boil.

I pay to play DIPLOMACY, not to have my games disrupted by silly, pointless houserules. Someone, I forget who, said that this rule was necessary to keep games from dragging on forever simply because the players would not vote on the proposals. Whose games are these anyway? The players or the Gamemaster's? The players should always have the option of voting or not voting without being subjected to penalties imposed by the Gamesmasterx to "move the game along."

Suppose the move is Spring 1901 and I propose a concession to whatever country I am playing or I propose a draw between two countries. All the otherx players think that it is a cute remark but they don't take it seriously, so, they don't vote on the proposal. However, I vote 'yes'. Are you telling me you would call a concession or draw to my country in the Spring of 1901 because nobody else voted on the proposal? If that is your contention and you are not willing to recognize the inherent unfairness of this rule, I would have to inform you that, that would be the last game I would play in, in your zine. Probably the others would feel ripped off as well.

Come on, Ron. Let's have a rule a little bit more realistic than this one.

PS I just returned from Clark Reynolds' "St. Valentine's Day Massacre II Tourney" in Sacramento. I just reread the ~~xx~~ foregoing and I hope it doesn't sound too unfair of your position. However, I stand by it. Let me tell you about the tournament. Aside from driving up in a heavy rain, driving back (to Oakland) in a massive traffic jam and getting eaten alive by the Sacto version of a mosquito (they like to sneak up on you when you are sitting on the toilet and bite you on the ass.) I had a great time. The tournament was GMed by Clark Reynolds, sort of. He gave everyone three pages of rules, none of which explained how the tournament would be ~~xscored~~. Big surprise! It turned out to be the Pacificon scoring system. Clark would come around at the end of each Fall turn and write down supply centers for his records and then disappear again until the next Fall turn.

The tournament had about 30 or so contestants and there was always at least one game going. Dave Grabar came late and left early and still won best England. I don't think he even played Italy. Toward the end, I got him into a game of "Russian Campaign" and my Russia beat the Panzers off his Germans. For the record; 1st place went to John Huestis, 2nd place to Rick Elfbrant who I believe said he was from Portland. 3rd place went to a real nice guy who said this was his first tournament. His name is Mark Twitty. Best country awards were some very nice plaques. Best Austria - G. Fitch; Best England - D. Grabar; Best France - J. Huestis; Best Germany - M. Twitty; Best Italy - Cathy Cuning (the only woman in the tournament, I think); Best Russia - M. Twitty (again); and Best Turkey - Mark Nielsen (a guy you love to hate).

I didn't win anything but I got some terrific mosquito bites. Honestly though, I had a lot of fun, too. One game I was in, I had to force Germany to win, can you believe that? What happened was that I was playing Turkey. Austria was ~~kpuppetting~~ for Germany and Germany was keeping me from taking him out. France was allied with me against Germany, however, he made a couple of mistakes and Germany got the upper hand and France agreed to help Germany in order to survive. So, I had France, Austria, and Germany all coming at me at the same time. Germany publicly said he was going to reward his good ally Austria with third place which meant that I had to go or at least be reduced below Austria. The final move had Germany, who was at 17 centers, attacking my A Sev to cut its support to my A Bul attacking into Rum which he was in at the time. At least that is what he thought he was doing. In the Fall move I simply moved my A Sev-Ank by convoy on my F Blk. This allowed Germany to move into Sev and win the game. I tied for second with France. Better than fourth, anyway.

Well, my hot breath has cooled off somewhat now and my wife is giving me freezing looks, so, I think I will end this for now.

((Wow, Tim, you don't write often but when you do . . . thank you very much for your lengthy and interesting letter. I disagree with you on a few of your contentions. Before I go into detail on these points, I'd like to make sure you know that I feel one of the greatest aspects of this hobby is the opportunity to express one's opinion. I always enjoy hearing an opinion on a subject in which I am interested. I don't always agree with them, but everyone is invited to express them,

First of all, I can truly sympathize with you about 81AP. It's too bad the game ended in an E/I draw if your Turkey wasn't in agreement. The first question that comes to my mind is, "Why didn't you veto the draw vote when it was proposed?" You meant to? But you didn't. You are proposing that I read intent, or rather, try to interpret what that unstated intent of your non-vote was. I'm sorry. I flatly refuse to do so. Once, early in my gamesmastering "career", I presumed to do that. I thought I was doing the best thing and following the obvious (it seemed obvious to me at the time) intent, but non-stated, of the orders. After the results were mailed out I got an immediate long-distance phone call from a very experienced player, very angry that I had not followed his orders exactly as they had been stated. When I explained how I had followed what he had certainly "intended", he coldly replied that he did not know it was the gamesmaster's duty to interpret, but merely to adjudicate the moves he received. I was dead wrong and knew it. I felt like a real scumbag and promised never to do that again. I haven't. Not even in cases like yours where the "intent is clear".

Next, I personally feel that draw and concession proposals are a very real and valid and important aspect of a postal DIPLOMACY game. You must understand this if you want to play within these pages. When a draw or concession is proposed, it will pass if no one vetoes it. There is no excuse for a caring, interested player to "forget to vote". If you do, then you've got no right to complain about it. Hey, you know, it's just like real life when you don't vote on election day and some Geek gets elected governor or something. You don't like it, but you really can't moan and bitch if you didn't even take the time to vote. About the only thing you can really say about what happened with 81AP is that you disagree with the 'NVR'='yes' vote concept. There's two ways you can go about it. You can hold that no vote received constitutes a 'yes' to the proposal. The second way is to hold that no vote received constitutes a 'no' vote. You do it one way or the other and say so in your Houserules which it will be. From there it's up to the players. I happen to favor the 'NVR'='yes' vote. As a player I would much rather play in a game that does it this way. In many games you see players lose interest if they are losing. Many of these submit orders (sometimes perpetual orders) because they feel obligated but don't bother to vote on any proposals. They abstain, which is their right. Most don't care when the draw or concession finally passes. You know what I mean. We're talking about someone with one or two units left, usually in a somewhat hopeless position. A good illustration which demonstrates what I'm talking about comes from my own experience. In 1977HQ, one of my first games (and a game which just ended about 3 mos. ago) found my France down to a single unit in Portugal and totally surrounded by enemies. A power struggle emerged between two superpowers: Germany (Dave Grabar) and Turkey (Roy Henricks). My one solitary unit became a sort of "beleaguered garrison" caught between the two giants and therefore survived. My one unit remained in Portugal for I don't know how many game years; it seemed like 8. What did I do? I submitted the perpetual order: 'F POR-H' and ignored all proposals. That situation should not prevent a proposal from passing -- I certainly would not have wanted one to fail because of me. Quite the contrary, I wanted anything to pass so I could survive the game with one center! Well, this has really gone on enough I think. I don't expect you to agree with me; I just hope you can respect my opinion of how the best way to run a DIPLOMACY game should be just as I respect yours. Thanks for the information on the Valentine's Day Massacre. Sounds like another great time organized by Clark. Thank you for writing. - RB))

((I might as well go ahead and add a little bit more before going on to the next item. Mark Berch's latest DIPLOMACY DIGEST (#69?) covers the topic of games ending because of mix-ups on voting procedures and stuff and very much related to the matter discussed in Timothy Haffey's letter. The other thing was a comment of Tim's that the rule just "popped" up one day. The Jan. 1981 revised Houserules state (#16): "All calls for a draw or concession must be unanimous to carry. Only the success or failure of the draw proposal will be published; all ballots will remain secret. NVR constitutes a 'Yes' vote on the proposal. If there are multiple draw proposals that pass, the draw involving the largest number of players will be the one that passes." If you vote for a non-existent proposal and NVR on a real one . . . well, I guess you know by know what the result is. . .
