\*No standby for Dan (as if I had one anyway!) - I got a call from him regarding a clarification on the last game report, but never received a set of order from him. I'm sure he wants to stay in the game and that this NMR was just an oversight.

GM Note: A player brought up an interesting rules interpretation question; to wit, "Rule No. V, D, 2, a, (pg. 4): 'Once complete control of another player's home country is gained, the controlling player may start to use the conquered home country as if it were part of his own home country.' I would construe this to mean that the conquering player gets to use the conquered country's treasury as well as cities and provinces. What do you think?" Nice try, but no cigar. No, I don't think that's the correct interpretation. A conquered Principality yields the right to build in that conquered player's cities -- plus the variable income roll from that country. Nowhere do the rules state that the treasury is captured as well. It's more logical to assume, perhaps, that the fleeing Ruler took with him all the Gold from the Treasury.

Clarification on Victory Conditions: A reminder that the first player to control 15 cities at the end of a campaign is the winner. I believe Milan is in the lead with 13 or so. This game shouldn't last another year!

(( Thanks, oh omnipotent granter of divine wisdom! I will of course, stop referring to my "Partial Trades" and begin immediately using the correct "One for One". Jeez, give me a break. As for your English Common Law statement, besides I see it as totally irrelevant, the capper is that I agree with you! My whole point is exactly what you close with; that is, the fact that there was no harm done to the game at all!! My gripe is that "rules" are being dreamed up to justify someone's "gut feeling". And as for No. 2 in your list of points, I think you're crazy. The first I heard about 1984CH being Irregular came from the OG Honcho, Jim Burgess. He said about this incident in YES, VIRGINIA! THERE IS A SANTA CLAUS #4, "To recap, Ben Schilling requested that game be moved to another GM and did hint (as Ron noted) that he might ask that it be declared irregular if it were not moved." I never said that the game had any reason to be declared Irregular. - RB ))

(( from Jim Burgess - YVFIASC #4 excerpt - 1/31/86 ))

Ron was (and is?) upset that I brought up the irregularity issue ((in an Aug. 26 letter to the players of 1984CH)), but as a USOS Co-Director and not being the BNC, I really had no choice. The players had a right to know what the possible consequences of staying with Ron might be. I do not intend to discuss the irregularity issue per se, because this is the wrong soapbox to make public my views on the BNC's domain, but I would like to point out a very disturbing aspect of the concept of calling games irregular. Has a game ever been called irregular without an appeal to the BNC for the label to be applied? Does the BNC review every game finish to probe for possible grounds for irregularity? (obviously not) Irregularity of the validity of any objections about the conduct of 1984CH (or any other game), the irregularity issue will only come up if someone prods the BNC about it. Obviously, the attachment of the label is and always has been inconsistent. I leave you to draw your own conclusions, but I wanted people to know what I meant by the statement, "The decision (made officially by Bill Quinn, the BNC) may or may not be affected by our decision on whether to move the game or not." Look at it from my position. It was ((not)) and is not my job to use my position to tell the BNC what to do, but I was faced with a decision concerning a request to move a game. My decision was the decision that must be made in my position; I left it up to the players. I would have been remiss in failing to inform them of all relevant information I had that might affect their decision. Their decision was to remain with Ron and the fact that they made it makes it the right decision.

As I said . . . I'll be more than pleased to run a letter column discussing anything concerning the Orphan Service.

However, I did wish to object to the announcement the way it struck me at the time. That is, that the players were informed of a desire by at least one player to move the game. And then it was implied that if they left the game with me it could very well wind up with the Irregular tag but that if it went to a GM then there was nothing to worry about. Now, how do you other GMs out there feel about this? Would you have also felt that the scales were weighted against you? Under such a threat, I'm still surprised that the players (all but one) wanted me to finish the game as GM. I guess there really is such a thing as Loyalty? I don't know why they chose to keep it here. But I'm glad they did. I understand the duties and responsibilities of Jim's office, and that he felt he owed it to the players to give them all the info pertaining to the game. But somehow, it still doesn't seem fair that the players were given the choice as it was stated. Any comments? Once again, I'd like to thank Jim Burgess for the fine job he has done. He is acting in his office in a considerate, polite, and caring manner. Please keep it up, Jim! - RB ))

\* Got the latest MM, and if I've time I may write something for DW on the subject of irregular labels, though I'm so busy now I'd have to re-read all the relevant material to organize my thoughts. A basic reaction I have to the affair is: Irregular is not a binary, or on-off, notion. All games should have anything irregular noted in the BNC's report in EVERYTHING. I mean anything: holdovers, late or lengthy turn-arounds, anything. Making the criterion for a regular game near-impossible would diminish the importance of the word irregular in a report. It would make the ratings keepers decide which games to include, and keep the options open depending on the ratings keeper's idea of irregular. Not too clear, eh? Gimme time, and I'll make something out of this.

(( Thanks for writing, Bruce. I think you have something here and hope you do get a chance to pursue it. I kinda agree with Steve Langley, that the ratings masters are the "review board", so to speak. The only problem now, is that every ratings master I know of accepts carte blanche the irregular recommendations of the BNC. Your idea might change that, therefore, it is worth pursuing. Jim Burgess asked in his letter (above) if the BNC has ever declared a game irregular without a player first bringing the matter to the BNC's attention and making a request for irregularity. He answered, of course not. But when Kathy was BNC, she wrote me a letter informing me that 1983CR would have to be declared irregular because of too many Californians in proximity to each other. At the time, I thought it kinda weird that someone 3,000 miles away would assume that the most densely populated state in the Union would have to have 3 or more of the same telephone area codes simply because 4 of the players were from Calif. When I pointed out to her that there were no 3 players with the same area code, she quickly and efficiently withdrew the tag. So from that experience, it does seem as though BNC's do, from time to time, move to declare games irregular without a player's request to do so. The Review Board idea probably wouldn't work for the reason Steve pointed out in his letter. Your idea may be the only practical solution to the problem. Please work on it! - RB ))

It's been awhile since I've done anything like this and I kind of felt like doing it so here we go. Naturally this review is only of zines I've received in the past few months. Some will be quite brief and I may have only seen 1 or 2 issues or because there's just not much to say. How many of these do you receive? If any of these sound interesting to you, I highly recommend you send 39¢ worth in stamps to these publishers and request a sample. (44¢ might be smarter, then if the zine is smaller, you can get two instead of just one) (?) What's he babbling about? Oh well, here we go, and in no particular order . . .

COSTAGUANA - Conrad von Metzke, 4374 Donald Ave., San Diego, Ca 92117-3813. Subscription rate is 22¢/issue. Trades are welcome. There are no gamefees although you must maintain a sub or trade, but that's it. Conrad has game openings in a Cline 9-Man Variant to be dubbed "William Rufus DeVane King" (only two spots left so hurry!) I think I'll complain to the Miller Number Custodian that this game should be declared Irregular before it begins. You see, Conrad is going to play in the game and use a GGM. Conrad is the one who gave this game the dreadful name of "William Rufus DeVane King" (only Conrad could have thought that one up!) and we all know that giving a postal game its name is the irrevocable right and privilege of the Gamesmaster and not the players! (Hal) But seriously folks . . . I've seen COSTA get going again a bit unsteadily at first and then really taking off and establishing itself once again as a classic DIPLOMACY Zine! C is probably my favorite zine that I get on a regular basis. And you can't beat his gamefees! COSTA contains lots of games and all kinds of different reading stuff. The last issue (#15 of Vol. 10) was a hefty 44 pages long and an excellent issue. I think Conrad has certainly started to hit his stride again and I would highly recommend it to all - whether you're looking for a game or stuff to read that's entertaining.

YES, VIRGINIA, THERE IS A SANTA CLAUS - Jim Burgess, 100 Holden St., Providence, RI 02908-5731 (401) 351-0287. Subscription rate is 25¢/issue. Trades are possible. Jim publishes YVTIASC on an irregular basis in line with his duties as Orphan Games Honcho. Jim is encouraging letters to form a letter column in YES, dealing with the area of concern surrounding Orphan Games, and his duties thereof. Interesting stuff of late.

EXCELSIOR - Bruce McIntyre, 6191 Winoh St., Burnaby, Brit. Columbia, Canada V5B 2L4. Subscription rate is \$2.00/3 issues in Canada; 60¢/issue in USA. I think Bruce might be interested in trades but I'm not sure. EX is an EXcellent zine. It reminds one very much of Ronald Brown's SNAPUI, which comes as no surprise since Bruce was attempting to emulate the style of Ron's former publication. EX offers reading material in the form of "DipGab" and various forums. A real high-class zine with excellent graphics and reproduction. Features art work on cover frequently (I think every issue I've seen has) that is very well done, usually a caricature of the Publisher in some related pose. I don't think there are any game openings currently, but if you were looking for a zine from Canada to play in you might keep it in mind down the road a bit. Bruce does have openings for a \$2.00 gamefee in some sort of soccer game he is organizing. Check it out. A superior zine. Digest size.

DIPLOMACY DIGEST - Mark Berch, 492 Naylor Pl., Alexandria, VA 22304. Subscription rate is \$4.50/10 issues. I believe Mark uses mutual subscriptions if you're interested. DD is a long-time hobby friend. Mark just recently published his 96th issue! DD offers NO games; it is a reading-only zine. The reading specifically consists mostly of old articles reprinted, and Mark's comments and/or remarks about them. It always has good stuff to read. Some people even look on DD as a hobby service zine because of its use in keeping the best material on the game of DIPLOMACY of the past from being forgotten. Highly recommended. Natch it's digest sized.

IT'S A TRAP - Steve Knight, 2732 Grand Ave. S. #302, Minneapolis, MN 55408. Subscriptions cost 50¢ plus postage/issue. Game openings are available in DIPLOMACY games: the first is a black press game; the second is a novice-only game. The game fees are \$5.00 plus a \$5.00 NMR fee. If you don't NMR during the course of your game you get the NMR fee added in issues to your subscription. IAT is offset produced and digest sized. The Jan. 5th issue (#8) weighed in at a hefty 32 pages. IAT features maps for its games, like EXCELSIOR. While the graphics may not be quite as flash as EX, they are superior. Cartoons ("Eyebeam") are scattered throughout giving it a pleasant touch of humor. Looks like a real good zine if you're looking for a game (and don't mind black press) especially if you're a novice. Check it out.

EUROPA EXPRESS - Gary Coughlan, 4614 Martha Cole Lane, Memphis, TN 38118, (901) 362-7206. Subscriptions are used to be \$6.00/10 issues but I think it's increased recently. Check with Gary. EE continues to be one of the standards other zines are compared to. Gary runs international games of DIP complete with maps and cartoons, features lots of letters from all over the international DIPPY community, articles on the game, personalities, travel, ideologies, and more! EE features a regular photo contest where one of its many subbers is pictured and everyone guesses his/her identify. It's been great fun over the years. This is one of those rare zines where everyone should be getting it!

WINSOME-LOSSOME - Jerry Lucas, 3902 Lakemead Way, Redwood City, CA 94062 is winding down and helping Judy Winsome complete the GMing of 1983CK, its only remaining game. Judy has done an outstanding job publishing W-L and served as a masterful GM for several games of DIP she completed. The hobby will miss this one. In her last issue, Judy spoke on the topic of science fiction (#38). She said, "I enjoy the glimpse of possibilities that SF gives me. The word that comes to mind is 'fancy,' as in 'It suits my fancy'. SF allows me to abandon my grasp of my reality and examine other possible systems of reality." Yes, science-fiction is a joyful medium. Judy Winsome, closing out a most unique publishing career!

LIBERTYBELL - Kevin Kozlowski, 2401 E. Northern Parkway, Baltimore, MD 21241 - (301) 426-5332. Subscriptions are (??) - not sure, I think around \$6.00/10 issues. Ask Kevin and see. Kevin has taken over the LIB from Jim Bumpas and picked up where Jim left off. He will continue to utilize Jim's former procedure of deadlines every third Saturday with the publication in the mail by the following Monday. LIB under Jim and now under Kevin, has always been a gamers' zine. Not much to read but lots of games running on 3 week deadlines. These games move fast(!) compared to your average 4-5 week deadline zine. Maps are featured with games. Kevin will continue opening new games everytime he has 7 people signed up to play. He also features a DIP Bourse and a grand tactical game of futuristic warfare called ARMORED BARDARISM (a game designed by Bumpas). If you are interested in a good zine to play in that moves quickly - no frills - then the LIB is perfect!

NOT NEW YORK - Paul Gardner, Rt. 1, Box 2338, Newfane, VT 05345 - (802) 365-7635. Subscriptions cost is: (??) (Paul is another one of these guys who like to keep that info secret and not put it anywhere in their zine!) Gamefees for Regular DIPLOMACY are \$5.00. NNY has been published somewhat erratically of late. Kind of reminds me of MM in that regard! The last issue is #10 dated 1/21/86. In it Paul warns, "I do intend to go on pubbing, but since I can offer no guarantee that I will ever stick completely to my stated 4 week pubbing schedule, I want to offer everyone a-way out" ((by refunding subs if anyone is angry over his 4½ month delay.)) NNY is an interesting little zine which features maps with its games and amusing pictures in press. It reminds me of the old RETALIATION a bit in atmosphere and looks. Same open page photo repro. Paul has an excellent sense of humor. If you aren't real uptight about punctuality, NNY could appeal to you a great deal. I believe Paul could use some standbys, so why not send for a sample?

BUSHWACKER - Fred C. Davis, Jr., 1427 Clairidge Rd., Baltimore, MD 21207 - (301) 747-7248. Subscription rate is \$6.00/12 issues for non-players. Players get their subs included in the gamefee. Fred has a game opening in "Turnabout Dip", a variant of his own design. The former neutrals have become the Great Powers and the former Powers the hapless neutrals. A sort of "what if?" version. Gamefee is \$9.00 to newcomers to the zine; \$8.00 to current readers, with another dollar off for people already playing in another game here. A standby fee is available; \$5.00 for newcomers, \$4.00 to people currently on the BUSH mailing list. For your fee, you also receive copies of the rules/maps for your game(s), plus receipt of BUSH for the duration of your game. Fred's zine is a Variants-only zine. Is it the only one? Is there another zine which publishes only DIPLOMACY Variants exclusively? I don't think so. I think Fred has the market cornered here. He also keeps you up to date on all the news regarding DipCons and other major hobby events. Occasionally we are treated to an article on astronomy giving some interesting info for us. And of course, there always Variant Rules and maps being published as a matter of course. Open faced, it is the premier Variants zine. Highly recommended.

PRAXIS - Alan Stewart, 702-25 St. Mary St., Toronto, Ontario, CANADA M4Y 1R2 - (416) 961-8095. Subscriptions are 80¢/issue (\$7.00/10 issues) for Canadians; 60¢/issue (\$5.00/10 issues) for USA subbers. I've only seen his first issue (Nov. '85) so I'm just assuming that Alan still has game openings in regular DIPFY. There were no gamefees assessed for his first game; better get a recent issue as a sample and see what the scoop is regarding gamefees. P is open-faced with very clear and beautiful full size repro. Alan will utilize 5 week deadlines for his games. PRAXIS looks like it's going to be a strong and attractive zine. Definitely worth asking for a sample to see . . .
