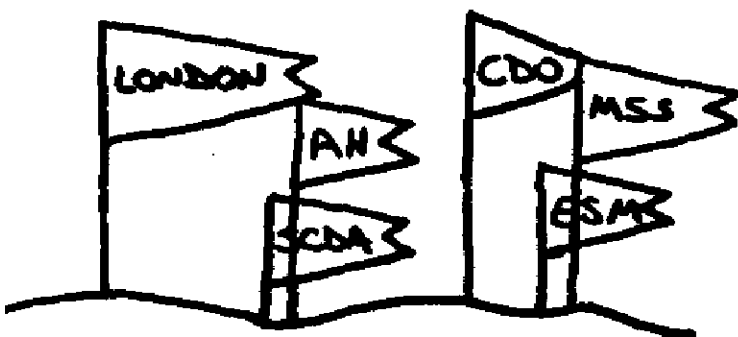

For the past few months, I've promised to print an article by me on how to get to ORIGINS by car, plane, or whatever. I don't know how to do it by whatever, but car and plane are easy, so here's HOW TO GET TO ORIGINS.

First off, BY CAR....From Southern California, get on I-5 and drive north to I-580, then drive west on 580 until you reach State 238; head SOUTH on 238 (Foothill Blvd.) until you reach State 92 (Jackson Street); head west on 92 over the San Mateo Bridge, and follow the instructions under "Now What?"

From mp north, you can either take I-5 down to I-80 (that's via Sacramento; there must be a shorter way), west on I-80 across the Bay Bridge, then south on US 101 until you reach the Highway 92 (Half Moon Bay) turnoff (you can see the Dunfey from the highway); take the turnoff and follow the instructions under "Now What?"; instead, you can take US 101 down across the Golden Gate Bridge, turn off at 19th Avenue (Highway 1), follow 1 to I-280 to I-380 to the airport, then take 101 to the Half Moon Bay turnoff, head west, and see "Now What?".

BY PLANE: From San Francisco International, take US 101 SOUTH down to the Highway 92 turnoff (Hayward/Half Moon Bay); head west (toward Half Moon Bay, away from the bridge), and see "Now What?"

From Oakland International, get on State 17 down (south) to State 92 (Hayward Bridge), cross the bridge, and see "Now What?"

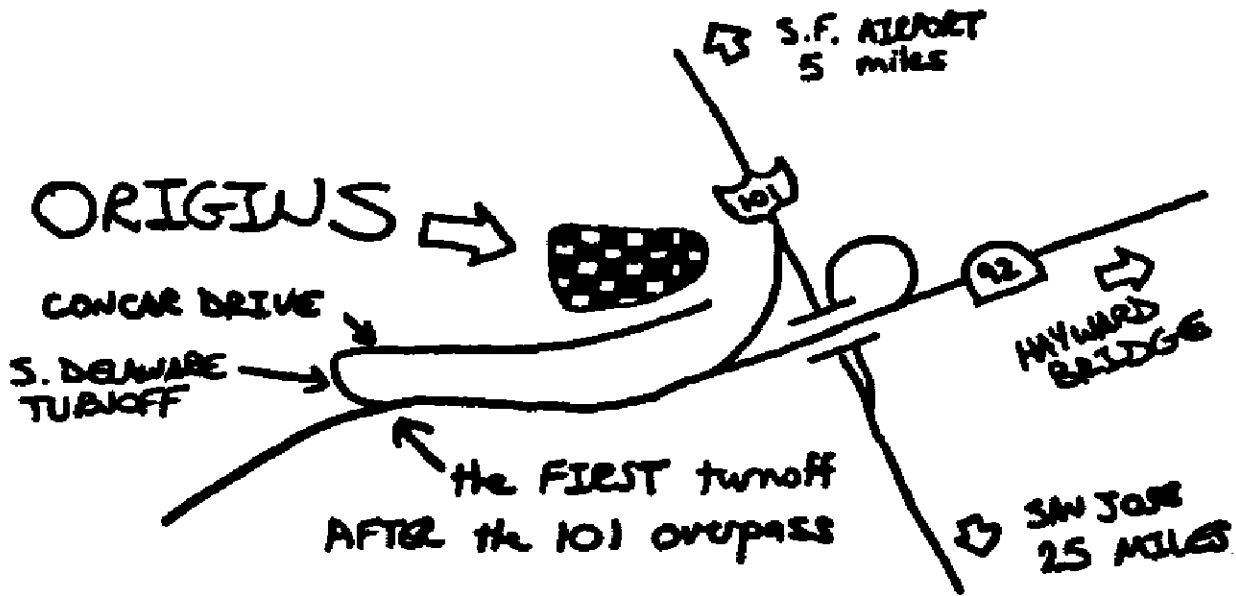
From San Jose, take US 101 NORTH to the Highway 92 (Half Moon Bay) turnoff, head west (to your left, away from the bridge), and see "Now What?"

This month's 'ZINE THING features an almost complete rundown of the 'zines I happen to have. First off, there's DOT HAPPY by Allen Wells, 550 Memorial Drive #2E3, Cambridge, MA 02139, with game openings in Diplomacy (\$5 + \$5 NMR deposit) and Flexible Build Diplomacy (just like Regular except before Spring 1901, you may build any type of units on your SCs, and during each Winter turn, you can build on ANY

SC that you control, NOT just the ones in your home country; same fee). Subs are 50¢ an issue; DOT HAPPY is 16 digest-sized pages with cover. For those of you that have DOT HAPPY #3 and are planning on attending ORIGINS, let me warn you that the Junipero Serra Freeway (I-280) adds about 5 miles to the trip (it might be closer to 10).

WHITESTONIA, by John Caruso, 160-02 43rd Avenue, Second Floor, Flushing, NY 11358. Forget what I said last month about the boring commentary; this 'zine's got IT! Game fee for IT! is only \$100 or so, plus \$5/turn to cover the postage for all of those forms. (IT! was first announced in the Mar/Apr 1977 issue of THE GENERAL, complete with a library of rules, 2 cardboard boxes of errata, and 31 acres of map in 128 colors.) Also available, Diplomacy for \$2 fee. Subs are \$5 for 10 issues. Each and every WHITESTONIA contains the "Player Profiles," an up close and personal look at the Dip players of today, plus a few articles, a few games, a few good letters, an occasional "look-alike" contest, and, if you're real good, a good cover illustration. Oh, I almost forgot KATHY'S KORNOR, by Kathy Byrne of the same address. The KORNOR is a subzine to WHITESTONIA, and contains "Dear Kathy," a letter column of a different sort, and DIP SHUTES (sic) AND LADDERS. I must question Kathy's nomination for hobby queen, though: mainly because I'm a writer for....

ALARMS & EXCURSIONS, available at a hobby store near you or from Lee Gold, 3965 Alla Road, Los Angeles, CA 90066, for \$1.50 plus postage (63¢ book rate, \$1.40 UPS, \$2.42 first class). This has nothing to do with Diplomacy; rather, it deals with FRP games such as D&D, RUNEQUEST, THE FANTASY TRIP, TOP SECRET, DRAGONQUEST, etc. The articles are written by amateur publishers who have things to say about FRPing, either fiction stories or facts dealing with the playing of these games. Off the record, I've heard rumors that the 'zine wants to back Peggy Gemignani for hobby queen, since she writes for A&E occasionally, but since A&E isn't a dip 'zine, it can't make any nominations. Being an A&E writer myself, I have to go along with this choice. Sorry, Kathy. (Wasn't it Roy Henricks who once said that Kathy Byrne was a Peggy Gemignani pseudonym?)

ENVOY, by Roy Henricks every 5 weeks or so, 128 Deerfield Drive, Pittsburgh, PA 15235. Subs are 3.125¢ per digest-sized page (not incl. cover) plus postage (minimum \$5 sub required). Games open in (take a deep breath) Diplomacy, Deadman Dip, AREA-rated Dip, Prize Dip (additional \$20 fee, but the winner(s) split the \$140 evenly), Kingmaker, Rail Baron, Gunslinger (whenever AH publishes it), Richthofen's War, WS&IM, AREA-rated Machiavelli, Source of the Nile, and Submarine. Fees range from \$2 to \$4, plus \$20 for Prize Dip. ENVOY is mostly games, but there are also contests, articles, and the occasional hobby news word or two.

MANIACAL AND A LOT OF OTHER GARBAGE, by Dick Martin, 26 Orchard Way N; Rockville, MD 20854, for 80¢ a month; if you can't convince Dick to give you this special rate, it's \$1.60 a month. This 'zine has never been called the same thing twice (for that matter, it's never been called THE SAME THING TWICE), so use my title. The 'zine contains articles about the hobby and the hobbyists, a few games, lots of press (mainly black press), and other stuff like that. Dick is one of the combatants in the LOM CHALLENGE GAME, which is somewhere in this issue.

THE WHITE DUKE has apparently folded. Steve Shaddix doesn't get LOM any more unless he pays for it.

BORN TO DIP did likewise. This causes a bit of trouble, as both Steve Shaddix and Brad Wilson are in current games. Anybody out there want to be a standby and fill either a KINGMAKER or a DIPLOMACY (SIAS) position, let me know.

BLACK FROG, by Jack Masters, 25711 North Vista Fairways Drive, Valencia, CA 91355. Available for \$5/10 issues; game openings available in Diplomacy and Cosmic Encounter. This is one of the three 'zines that I consider to be MUST READING (ENVOY, for the games, and RETALIATION

being the other two). Jack has written such stories as the Pug Bocarsley tale, the Linsey-Rodriguez-McKibbin letters, the April Fool issue (originally, just about everything said in the issue was supposed to be false, but a bunch of stuff ended up true, like the Chutes and Ladders opening in KATHY'S KORNOR and John Boardman's leaving the SON (Source of the Nile) game here), and the original EUROPA EXPRESS. Highly recommended for fake collectors, since Jack's fakes are mailed to BLACK FROG subbers.

ARES, by Simulations Publications, Inc., 257 Park Avenue South, New York, NY 10010, for \$16/year (6 issues). ARES is the sci-fi/fantasy version of STRATEGY & TACTICS (available for \$18/year); each issue contains its own game, usually with 100 counters and an 11 x 17 map, although from now on, occasional issues will have larger games. Past games have been WORLDKILLER, WRECK OF THE PANDORA, BARBARIAN KINGS, ARENA OF DEATH, CITADEL OF BLOOD, VOYAGE OF THE PANDORA, RESCUE FROM THE HIVE, and RANGAROK. Also in each issue are stories based on the game, and two running features: SCIENCE FOR SCIENCE FICTION and FACTS FOR FANTASY. Note that these are professional-style magazines (S&T and ARES), unlike the other 'zines mentioned; S&T and ARES, if you didn't already know, are SPI's answer to the AVALON HILL GENERAL, except that the SPI magazines have games and don't limit their talk to the games of their own company. NOTE: SPI's new policy states that games in S&T and ARES will NOT be made available to the general public outside of the magazines. (Exceptions: Great Battles of the American Civil War, Victory in the West, Central Front, and any other series.)

EUROPA EXPRESS, by Gary Coughlan, 4614 Martha Cole Lane, Memphis, TN 38118, for all of \$6.00 (or 30 20¢ stamps) per 10 issues. This one features international games printed in any of eight languages depending on who's ahead, a lot of nasty letters (in #2, John Boardman lets Gary have it, only to get it from Rod Walker in #3), and rather picturesque plugs. Gary has been complaining because his GREAT WHITE SHARK didn't win the Hobby Mascot contest.

SLEEPLESS KNIGHTS, by Dave Carter, 118 Horsham Avenue, Willowdale, Ontario M2N 1Z9 CANADA, sells for \$3/10 issues with \$2 game fee. Issue #2 contained 8 pages of talk on fakes, a Dip Crossword puzzle, and some sick jokes. Oh, yes, it's printed upside down - even the staple.

HOOF AND MOUTH, by Don Sigwalt, 125 Hebard Street, Rochester, NY 14605 with an actual retail price of 60¢ per issue plus \$2.50 game fee. Issue #14 had a circulation of 6 and 3 legal-size pages (8½ x 14 inches). It needs time and subbers, if you ask me.

TETRACUSPID (I always thought it was a tooth, but it's the graph of $x^{2/3} + y^{2/3} = a$), by Richard Kovalick, Jr., 9 Ladd Place, Watertown, MA 02172. Mostly games here for 1¢/page plus postage, plus \$2 fee. Reminds me of RUNESTONE a lot, except the copying is better.

Since nobody cares about the AWA, I won't plug the AMERICAN WARGAMER.

ORIGINS.....I currently hold two records. One of these, longest time to fill a game, will NEVER be broken. The other, 28 games sold at one auction, is in trouble at this year's ORIGINS, LIVE from the Dunfey Hotel in San Mateo, CA, July 2-4. Afterwards, a special issue of LIFE OF MONTY will be published to commemorate (or however that word's spelled) the occasion AND to celebrate the FIRST ANNIVERSARY of this 'zine. This year's DipCon tournament will use the BUMPS SYSTEM: 16 points for a win all the way down to -6 for a seventh; draws range from 10 each to 0 each depending on the number of players involved. In addition, 1 point is added for each SC held at the end of a fall turn (i.e. you get points for 1901 AND points for 1902 AND for 1903....), minus 0.1 for each season you're in the game. Your scores are averaged, and the top seven players at the beginning of Monday play in one final game, with points directly added on. Whoever's ahead after that game WINS the tournament AND the NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP....although I think that it should be split into regions - Pacificon, Atlanticon, Michicon, and whatever happens to be held down south
